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

Barbecue accidents: Treat burns by holding the burned hand or finger under cold water until the pain stops. Then make liberal applications of Vaseline petroleum jelly and add a small bandage covering.

To keep the rain from splashing the dirt from your window boxes onto your windows, cover the dirt with a layer of fine gravel.

Tubs and barrels make attractive and durable planters for decorating your backyard or porch. Cut or drill holes in the oottom for drainage. Paint the container so the color mixes or matches with your decorating scheme and paint the inside with a wood preservative. Then line the bottom with broken pottery est the outside door.
