

Proper design is essential for proper irrigation using any method, but it is especially important that the sprinkler system be properly designed. Pipe sizes, lengths and nozzle sizes should be chosen that will give the de sired results and avoid excessive riction and pumping cost

When we speak of a properly designed system we mean one that will apply the water no fast er than the soil will take it so there is no puddling or runoff nor any soil erosion. It will apply water evenly throughout the in rigation length, not excessive losses of water on one end and lack of water at the other end. However, the best designed sy stem is of no value unless the farmer used the designed system accordingly. He should plan his irrigation and irrigate by his plan. He can, with a properly designed system, apply the exac amount of water that he want by using one variable-time. He is provided with the inches per hour that he is applying, and by multiplying this by hours he can determine the exact amount of moisture applied in inches.
