
### Annual Union Worship Services To Begin This Sunday Evening

## City - Wide Clean Up Drive To Start Monday, July 16th

Monday, July 16, is the kick-off day for Floydada's "Clean-up, Fix-up, and Paint-up Week," with the drive lasting through Saturday, July 21. Mayor S. W. Ross has issued a special proclamation designating the week as such and "urging the citizens of this city to observe these dates by means of a community wide demonstration and thereby contribute to making our city a more beautiful and healthful place to live."

The Clean-Up Committee of the Floydada Chamber of Commerce is sponsor of the event, with the assistance of other organizations in the city and county.

Monday through Saturday has been set aside for all areas of the city to give their property a thorough clean-up and Friday, July 20 has been set for a city-wide pickup. On the 20th everyone is asked to place all trash, junk, etc., in their alley for the volunteer workers to pickup.

Downtown property owners are urged to clean-up their property, especially vacant buildings with posters, etc., plastered on the windows. The City of Floydada will move vacant lots for the very small fee of \$2.50 for an average size lot. The lot must be clear of junk and trash though before equipment can be moved in. It was pointed out that weeds usually can be killed with 2-4-D if sprayed in their early stage, if they get too high though, they will have to be cut.

The committee suggests the following measures to make the drive a success:

- Clean up alleys and yards in residential areas.
- Clean up downtown area.
- Encourage owners of downtown vacant buildings to clean off circus signs, etc.
- Cut and remove weeds from vacant lots.
- Remove old stoves, refrigerators and junk from vacant lots.
- Encourage the use of Litter Bags for car owners.
- So next week everyone is urged to get out and give the city a good clean up and on Friday, the 20th gather up all trash and junk, and place in your alley to be picked up by the volunteer workers.

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

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

# Moisture Content Increases on Land With Stubble

## SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Recent studies conducted with the value of leaving litter from different sources on the surface of the soil have been completed. Two types of litter were used in the studies - cotton burs and grain sorghum residues at the rates of 0, 2, 4, 8, and 16 tons per acre. Small grain residues would give about the same results. Moisture penetration and yields per acre were determined in the tests.

Marked increases in the penetration of moisture following rains were obtained where the litter materials were left on the soil surface. Little or no increase in moisture penetration occurred where similar quantities of litter were plowed under. This difference is attributed to a partial elimination of surface sealing resulting from raindrop splash and to a reduction in runoff rate, permitting more time for moisture penetration. Surface application of litter produced sizeable increases in cotton yield.

In most cases no increase in yield resulted where the litter was plowed under. There was little difference in yield between type of litter, where equal quantities were used. The average depth of water penetration where 4 tons of residue was left on the surface was 32 inches as compared with 17 inches penetration on land that had been listed.

The effect of tillage on yields is represented in pounds of lint cotton per acre. On land that was listed and litter planted, 193 pounds of lint cotton was produced as compared with 169 pounds where litter was left on the surface and flat planted. These tests were made on dry land farms.

The same principles of leaving litter on the surface applies to irrigated farms. Mr. W. O. Whitehead of the Cedar Hill Community has found this to be true. He had been turning under all his residues for many years. Last year on land where residues were turned under, irrigation was necessary to bring cotton up as com-

pared with chiseled land where he had adequate moisture. He received a poor stand on land where residues were destroyed.

Similar stories are commonplace. Many Floyd County farmers are carrying out similar methods of residue management and finding that it pays. Crop residues left on the soil surface provides valuable protection from wind erosion, aids the infiltration of water, and by shading the soil, helps keep soil temperature down.

of the U. S. Soil Conservation Service.

Smith called for caution on the part of farmers, for extra care in the management of residues on croplands. Some areas of Texas are now in their third year of damaging drought, Smith pointed out. At such times, damage to cropland through wind erosion may take years to overcome.

At the same time, it is not too early to plan for crops that will produce residues for the protection of croplands and to provide for the kinds of tillage that will keep these residues intact through the critical months. Smith added a special plea to irrigator farmers to exercise care in the use of water. Most areas have adequate supplies in sight for this season, he pointed out. But it is only the part of wisdom, he said, to conserve all supplies possible for later needs.

The latest information by the High Plains Water Conservation District shows that the water in Floyd County has increased 10 percent since measurements were started in 1958.

Stubble mulch tillage conservation practice that is showing to be especially valuable in successful areas, Smith added. However, farmers have to be careful, first to provide for soil protection and second, to be sure they get it. "This is a stationer's job," the stationer said. "This means the difference between a profitable crop and a loss. It also means stable soil, a factor the farmer-minded farmer considers extremely important."



## Physical Examination Advise For Children Starting School

Early this fall more than 238,000 young Texans will be entering both private and public schools for the first time. Even though the opening of school is still some weeks away, parents are busy making preparation to insure that their child makes a smooth adjustment to his new environment.

The child's adjustment will be more rapid and satisfactory if he starts his school life in good, sound health.

Have your family physician or local clinic give your child a complete physical examination including an eye check. His teeth should also be checked by the family dentist. If these examinations show there are ailments or defects that can and should be looked after, then follow the doctor's and dentist's advice and have them corrected, if possible, before you enroll him in school.

It's likely that your child has already been immunized against certain of the childhood diseases such as diphtheria, whooping cough, and smallpox. If not, have it done immediately either by your doctor or by the local health clinic. If all immunizations have been done previously,

make sure your child gets the necessary booster dose. Insist on your child's getting regular and sufficient hours of sleep to help him enjoy school. He needs ten to twelve hours of sleep in a quiet, darkened room with an open window to build up his energy and offset his tiredness.

Proper nutrition is very important. When school starts, allow enough time for a wholesome breakfast. A good breakfast includes citrus fruit or juice, milk, whole grain cereal or bread, eggs or bacon or both.

Lunch and dinner should be a leisurely meal. The new adventure of school is a pretty fast pace, but mealtime offers an opportunity for the family to pause and relax together.

Also, nearly every school district in Texas requires proof of age for first year students in the form of a certificate of birth.

You may obtain a copy by sending a dollar and a half plus the name of the child, the date of birth, the place of birth, and both the father's and mother's names to the Division of Vital Statistics, Texas State Health Department, 410 East 5th Street, Austin, Texas.

## SCS Releases Publication For The Home

A new publication designed to help city and suburban dwellers understand soil erosion problems on their lots, gardens, and small farms, has just been released by the U. S. Soil Conservation Service. It is called "Soil Conservation at Home" and interprets the Service's experience in working with farmers and non-farm people.

A copy may be obtained from the local SCS office, Box 877, Floydada, Texas, Joe McEntire, Work Unit Conservatorist said. McEntire, who is assigned by the SCS to assist the Floyd County Soil Conservation District, said that the publication consists of 30 pages of suggestions on what the homeowner can do to reduce the amount of water runoff from his lot and cut down on soil erosion.

It describes the ideal soil and how to know what kind of soil you have. There is a section on a conservation plan that includes

safe disposal of water, and shrub planting to encourage helpful wildlife, particularly birds. The bulletin is illustrated with photographs showing contour gardening, miniature terraces, grass waterways and other conservation practices.

# THE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

**Safe driver in the year ahead.** The other with its penalty one-third — those who have been with violations paying as much as 100 per cent extra because of bad driving records — will save substantially. They will pay the same rates as everyone else.

One factor in the decision to drop the plan was concern by members of the Board — and the insurance industry — over the increasing number of car owners who just were doing without insurance. Board members felt that to increase the penalties, which would have been necessary to maintain the 20 per cent discount for the "safe drivers," would drive even more people into un-insurance. This would have made the safe driving insurance plan even more out of balance statistically.

Because auto insurance rates are set by counties, and by types of cars and the age groups of drivers, it is not possible to say just what effect the rates will have. Local insurance agents soon will have the information.

**SCHOOLS' ALLOTMENT CUT** — State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert advised the Texas Board of Education that the Available School Fund's income for the 1962-63 school year should be \$197,058,604. The revenue is pooled from ad valorem taxes, poll taxes, interest on securities the school fund owns, motor fuel taxes, omnibus taxes and other revenue.

Board deducted \$8,737,536 to finance cost of purchasing and handling textbooks, and divided the balance between Texas' 2,387,234 children of school age.

\$73.50 per child next year; 22 less for each than they were allotted in 1961.

While the 21-member board was on the subject of money, it passed a \$459,877,843 education budget for 1963, and offered State Education Commissioner J. W. Edgar a \$4,000 annual raise through federal funds.

Edgar "declined the honor," saying he felt his three assistants are more entitled to supplements since they are directly concerned with administering federal programs.

So, raises from \$11,090 to \$13,500 were voted for L. R. Graham, assistant commissioner of administration; Lee J. Wilborn, assistant commissioner for instruction; and M. A. Browning, assistant commissioner for vocational education.

Then the board agreed to ask the 58th Legislature to raise Edgar's salary of \$18,500 a year to \$24,000 when it convenes in January.

**CREAM OF THE CROP** — A preliminary glance at the Texas Education Agency's survey of 80,000 teachers revealed that the state's public schools system is getting the "cream of the crop" of high school graduates. Study chairman R. W. Byram of Austin said that new teachers came from the top 25 per cent of their graduating classes.

But the distribution of education specialists seems to be uneven. All teaching colleges in the state graduated a total of only 30 language teachers last year, and only 12 per cent of those who took mathematics education degrees plan to teach in those areas.

On the other hand, there's an estimated surplus of English and history teachers. — almost all the college graduates who majored in those two subjects plan to teach.

**"EXPATRIOTS" ON WAY TO DAKOTAS** — Spindletop V. Spindletop V and their children, Paysand and Gushie — a quartet of "geologists" prairie dogs — took a long trip to Bismarck, N. D., where they'll take up residence at the Dakota Zoo.

The prairie dogs were a gift of Acting Governor Culp Krueger, who decided "to uphold the honor of Texas prairie dogs" by sending four of the best he could find, after the zoo's president, Chris Dahl, asked for some.

Krueger assured the zoo that "these prize prairie dogs will feel at home and will dig right in and endeavor to be worthy of the 'Texas heritage,'" in a letter claiming the animals have built in advanced seismographic training which should help in North Dakota oilfield explorations.

**JUNIOR COLLEGE COST BUMPS** — Texas taxpayers are having to pay more and more to educate youngsters who attend the state's 32 public junior colleges, according to a report from State Auditor C. H. Cavness.

In the year ending August, 1961, they spent \$223.67 apiece on 23-150 full-time student equivalents, but the per capita cost leaped \$42.91 to an average of \$266.58 for each of 26,075 student equivalents — a total of \$6,951,000.

Although 37,175 full and part-time students are actually enrolled in the state schools, the legislature bases its appropriations on the total number of semester hours taken, divided by 15 (a full-time course load).

Biggest share of the current appropriation of almost \$7,000,000 went to San Antonio Junior College, which got \$775,730 for its 3,323 student equivalents. Clarendon Junior College, which has 113 student equivalents, was 32nd on

the list with 58 per cent share of \$400.

**"TAIN'T TRUE"** — Railroad Commission Chairman William J. Murray Jr. surprised Capitol newsmen this week by issuing a denial of rumors about the East Texas Oil Field scandal before he even was asked about them.

He introduced, and then denied, a rumor that the Railroad Commission has provided the major oil companies with damageable evidence against independent operators through inclination tests, but said Attorney General Will Wilson has "changed the rules" by accepting contributions for directional tests from the big oil firms, and providing information for them.

Murray also refuted rumors that some crooked-hole operators were under his protection. He admitted that he has friends among those under investigation, but stated he'd granted no favors: "I swear that I have treated them alike — independents and majors — and will continue to do so," he added. He further stated that he has not accepted money for campaign expenses in any of the political races he's run since his 1947 appointment for commission.

Regarding a year-long delay in investigating illegal well deviation in East Texas, Murray moaned, "Why didn't I suspect it earlier? I had too much faith in my fellowman."

**BUSINESS BETTER THAN EVER** — The seasonally-adjusted index of Texas business activity rose to a new all-time high of 137.1 percent in May, reported Dr. Francis B. May, statistician for the University of Texas' Bureau of Business Research.

High score reflects a seven per cent increase over April this year and a 12 per cent increase over May, 1961, according to Dr. May. He considers the sharp rise a potent reminder that the recovery from the 1960 recession has not yet spent its force.



The 20 research projects are arranged in five major groups. The soil fertility studies on cotton include seven projects: (1) fertilizer rates and ratios (continuous since 1957); (2) time of nitrogen application; (3) nitrogen and phosphate carryover (started in 1961); (4) sources of phosphate; (5) phosphate placement; (6) magnesium and trace elements; and (7) time of phosphate application.

The cotton variety testing program at Halfway, includes: (1) standard commercial varieties; (2) field scale variety tests; (3) regional cotton variety tests. Irrigation and water management on cotton include studies on: (1) irrigation methods; (2) soil and water management; and (3) crop rotation.

The weed control of cotton has five separate tests and they are: (1) chemical versus flame weed control; (2) flaming height test; (3) flaming versus conventional method of cultivation; (4) burner position comparison; and (5) flaming speed tests.

Cultural methods research on cotton include: (1) skip-row planting systems; (2) plastic mulch; (3) pelleted cottonseed; (4) cotton topping; (5) row spacing; (6) in-furrow fungicide test; and (7) crop climate tests.

The twenty acre devoted to cotton research at Halfway in 1957 has been increased to 121 acres in 1962. The new 20-acre laboratory, new research laboratory, and new cotton research equipment will permit increased research efficiency and early completion of each year's research reports. Dr. Collister stated that the expansion of the cotton research program is an example of the Foundations desire to meet the needs of the High Plains area.



Texas A&M Faculty and Staff Probe Deeply Into Research

This development, as with some others stemming from research through the years, actually is a by-product of a project concerned with a different problem...


By Henry L. Alamy Jr. COLLEGE STATION, Texas (Sp) — Texas highway shoulders — the earth adjoining the paved surface — may someday wear the equivalent of a raincoat due to research conducted on the Texas A&M College campus.

Dr. Bloodworth is working on this project in cooperation with the Soil and Water Section of the Department of Soil and Crop Sciences and the Trans-Pecos Substation.

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
