Mass Oral Innoculation For Polio Taking Shape

Hospital Has Report Ready For THA Study

Carl Prichard, administrator and laboratory technician at Peoples Hospital, has been busy the past week preparing a report from the local hospital for the Texas Hospital Association to be used in their study of local hospital needs.

Prichard and the officials at Peoples Hospital have been most cooperative in working with the Chamber of Commerce and the THA in the recent survey. No small amount of work went into the report and it is hoped that the facts presented will help in finding the right answers to the problem.

Prichard's report shows that with improvements in management and operation practices coupled with a slight increase in average daily census the hospital operated without a deficit for the first seven months of 1962. Records indicate that this is the first time this has happened since the hospital first opened its doors.

Prichard's summary of his report findings state:

"A first glance assumption would, of course, be that the hospital is not being utilized at its maximum rate; but, when one considers the number of active physicians on the hospital staff, an alarming fact comes to light—the addition of one practicing physician to the hospital staff would place the hospital in the position, within one year of the start of another physicians practice, of operating at over 100 percent of its potential!"

I would respectfully offer the suggestion that a feasible approach to the problems concerning the health and welfare of the citizens of the Floydada trade area include a concerted effort on the part of all concerned to induce a young physician, capable in surgery, to settle in Floydada. I would continue in urging that a clinic group be formed, including all the professional personnel in the community, to encourage equal usage of the hospital facilities by the medical personnel. I feel that as the utilization of the present medical facility increased, the problem of more hospital beds would be much less difficult to resolve."



Sabin Vaccine Available For All Residents

Floydada Lions Club will cooperate with the Floyd County Chapter for Infantile Paralysis in a mass Sabin oral vaccine program that it is hoped will reach everyone in the county. A similar program will be carried out at Lockney.

Weldon Harris is chairman of the project for the local Lions Club and says that the plans are not quite complete. Saturday, August 25 is the date that has been earmarked for the first round of inoculations. Starting time will probably be marked for 12:00 noon at First National Bank in Floydada.

The county chapter will make funds available and if sufficient vaccine can be had the program will include a series of three inoculations, one on Aug. 25, one six weeks later and another 12 weeks after the first.

Sugar for the vaccine will be donated by the bank and help for the project will be furnished by the Lions Club. Harris said he did not know as yet how much professional help from medical men or nurses would be required but hoped that this could be worked out as other details began to be taken care of.

The polio chapter here has some \$1200 that could be used in the mass vaccine program, but persons taking advantage of this offer will be given opportunity to make a donation of 25c or whatever amount they would like to give.

The donation is just that, however, and is not required as it is hoped that the program will get mass participation. More details will be made available next week.

Polio has not been too much of a problem in West Texas since the Salk vaccine was put in use several years ago. This year, however several cases have started cropping up again and it is hoped this big effort will help to keep the dread disease stamped out or at least under control.

Men Stress Grain Sorghum Crop Promotion

Thirty six farmers and grain men met for breakfast at Golden's Restaurant in Lockney Tuesday to map plans for expansion of grain sorghum promotion efforts. Ewald Quebe, president of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association in Floyd County was in charge of the meeting.

Bill Nelson, executive vice president of GPSA and Nolan Chandler, association assistant, both of Amarillo, reported on past association programs and progress in interest of research, market development and service.

Nelson pointed out that since the organization was founded in 1955 uses on all fronts, cattle feeding, swine feeding, foreign markets and industrial use had been increased. School Board Will Present 1962-63 Budget On Tuesday

The Floydada Independent School District Board of Education met Tuesday night with an agenda of business that kept them until midnight. Superintendent A. E. Baker and School District Secretary Bennie S. Liebfried presented the proposed budget for the 1962 - 63 school year.

The budget calls for a total expenditure of \$649,650.00. Total revenue receipts for the year from all sources are expected to be one dollar more or \$649,651.00.

Assessed valuations of the district are in excess of \$14,000,000.00. Tax rate is \$1.83 per hundred dollar valuation with maintenance getting \$1.50 and debt service, interest and sinking fund getting 35c of this figure.

Public hearing of the budget will be held in the board room of the high school at 2:00 o'clock p. m. on Tuesday, August 14.

The board is advertising for bids on school bus service, gas, oil, wash and grease, anti-freeze and free services such as cleaning windshields and sweeping, etc. The bids will be examined at the next regular meeting of the board.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. Monthly bills totaling \$4,823.54 were examined and voted to be paid. A list of these appear in this issue of the Hesperian.

Floyd Sugar Beet Men Map Out Plans At Recent Lockney Meet

Floyd County Sugar Beet Association met on Saturday morning at Golden's Restaurant in Lockney. Vice-president Owen Thornton presided in the absence of president Richard Stovall.

The group heard reports from the recent tour of the Plainview area by officials of Great Western Sugar Corporation. County Agent Cecil Lewis and Assn. Secretary John Reue told of what they learned on the tour and at the Plainview meetings.

Members present voted unanimously to attend an organizational meeting on Monday night in Plainview and to advise the Plainview group that Floyd County wanted to be included in any acreage allotments that were made available to West Texas. Representatives were named to attend the Plainview meet.

On Monday night John Reue, Owen Thornton, Cecil Lewis, Don Marble and Louis Pyle were present at the Plainview meeting.

The Counties of Hale, Floyd, Lamb, Swisher, Castro and Lubbock were in attendance and voted to organize an area wide association to push for beet acreage.

Homier Garrison of Hale County was named president of the association. Thornton of Floyd County was named vice-president, and Hall of Lamb County was named secretary-treasurer.

Graddy Tunnell, Plainview attorney, drew up rules and by laws for the association and they were adopted.

Association officials were instructed to contact the proper government officials asking for beet acreage allotments at the earliest possible date.

Sugar Beets For Floyd County?

Developments during the past month have Floyd County farmers a little puzzled as to just where they stand in the overall picture if sugar beets are to come to the Texas high plains. Several years ago interested farmers and business men met and formed a Floyd County Sugar Beet Association. They were prompted to take this action by beet boosters from the Herford area.

In that first meeting a lot of interest was shown in beets as a cash crop. Richard Stovall was elected as president of the association and the county came up with a pretty good organization, one with a constitution and by-laws and one that raised some cash to go into the fight for some beet acreage and a possible sugar beet mill.

Early in the fight it looked like Herford had carried the ball alone and that there was the cause to fall in behind.

A lot of work was done and a lot is still to be done. Much was accomplished by the Herford group and the Floyd County Association under the leadership of Stovall hit some very good leads working with Herford as well as some good leads working on their own.

Many of the county organizations have patterned their set-ups after the one started here and the trips to Washington that Stovall and others made carried just as much if not more weight than those efforts that originated in Herford.

Any way you look at it a job was accomplished. Growers on the high plains showed the folks in the nation's capital that they wanted a sugar mill. Up to this point everybody from Texas was on the same side fighting for a share of the sugar producing acreage. The beet people were able to get an increase of some 65,000 acres each year for their crop and this was more than enough to put in a new mill somewhere in the US each year for the next four years.

A Parting of Ways
Once efforts had reached this point there seemed to be a parting of ways. Herford was interested in securing a mill for their city and have some definite plans for such. Holly Sugar Corporation has shown an interest in locating there and backers have an option on a proposed building site. Their plans seem to need only the approval of the government and the allocation of beet acreage to back up the operation.

Now Great Western Sugar Company is taking a close look at the Plainview area as a prospective building site. Plainview backers had not been talking too loud until they had things pretty well under control. Now they Barbee flew home recently to be suddenly come out and start seeking support from surrounds to undergo surgery.

We can all hope that we wind up on the winning team, especially if this is the only way to get an acreage allotment for the county.

Of course there are some 20 or more areas in the United States that are interested in securing a sugar mill and in getting the beet acreage that goes with it. It is entirely possible that neither Plainview or Herford will be the site chosen or that there will even be one in Texas at all.

Herford is in the Texas 18th Congressional District which is represented by Walter Rogers. Plainview and Floyd County are in the 19th Congressional District, represented by George Mahon.

If there is to be a fight perhaps it is better to go along with Plainview and have your own Congressman on your side.

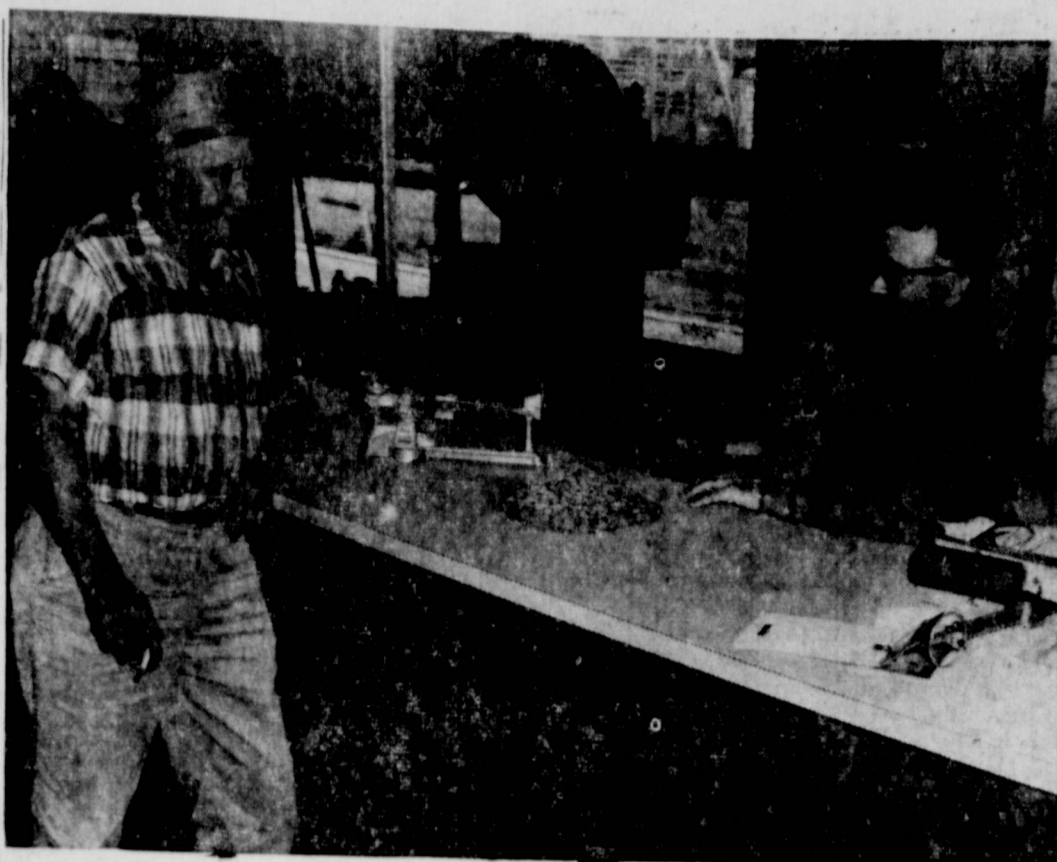

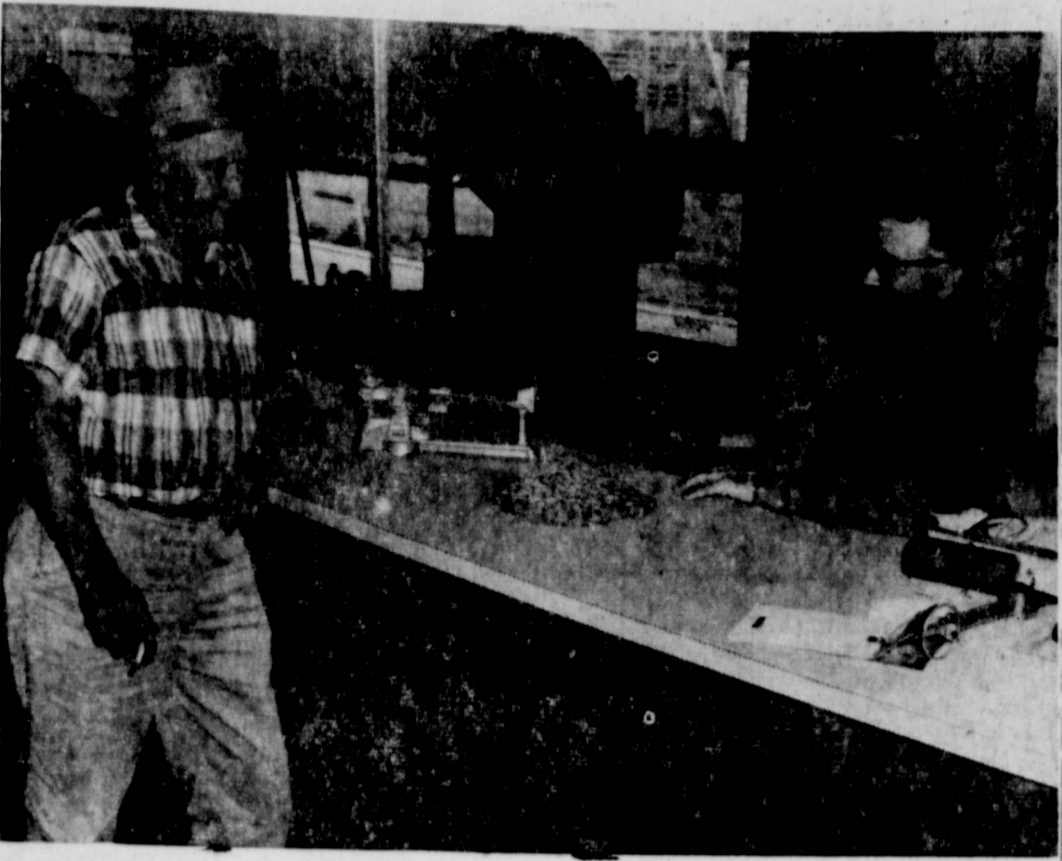

Historical Spots In County Will Be Marked Soon

In a meeting Friday morning in the county court room, a committee named by Judge J. D. McBrien will make a quick survey of public and private buildings which are old enough to have interest for tourists and sightseers.

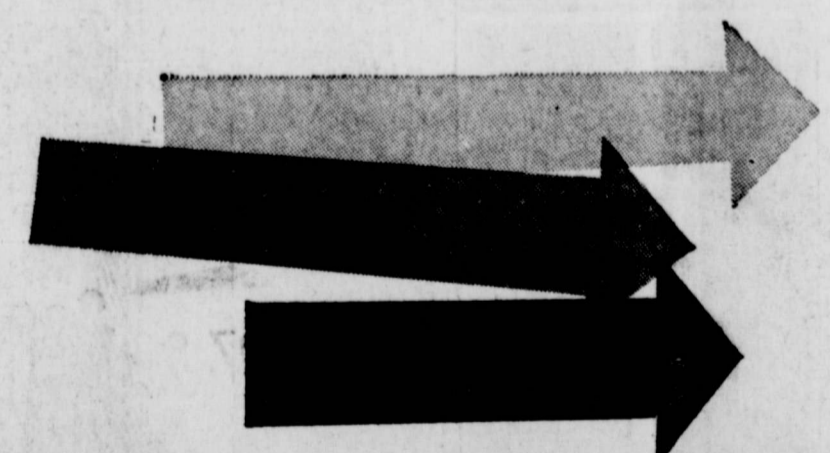

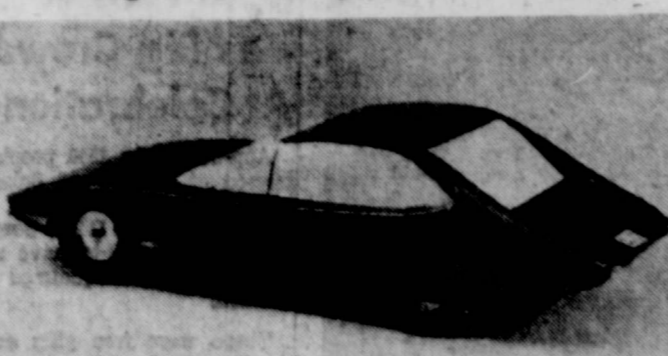

Dear Brad,

We were discussing the possibility of double treating wells to make sure all the plugging material was removed. Sometimes there seem to be too much material for a single treatment to remove because we have had some excellent results with a second treatment.

For example, the new gravel-packed well we treated east of Floydada was making only 52 gpm initially. A 275 pound Dry Acid treatment increased the capacity to 150 gpm. After this treatment was cleaned up, we retreated with 350 pounds of Dry Acid and developed the well at 300 gallons per minute.

The thing I like about Dry Acid is that it is really good for chemically breaking down the clays, shale, and drilling mud so they can be pumped or bailed out. Also, since it is packed in 50# steel pails, we can keep a supply on hand and carry it around on the rig or pick-up without any loss or damage.

In all the wells we treated we have had only one failure, which is something we cannot say of any other material we have used.

P.S. Our last well treated was only a single treatment, but it increased the flow from 46 to 92 gallons per minute.

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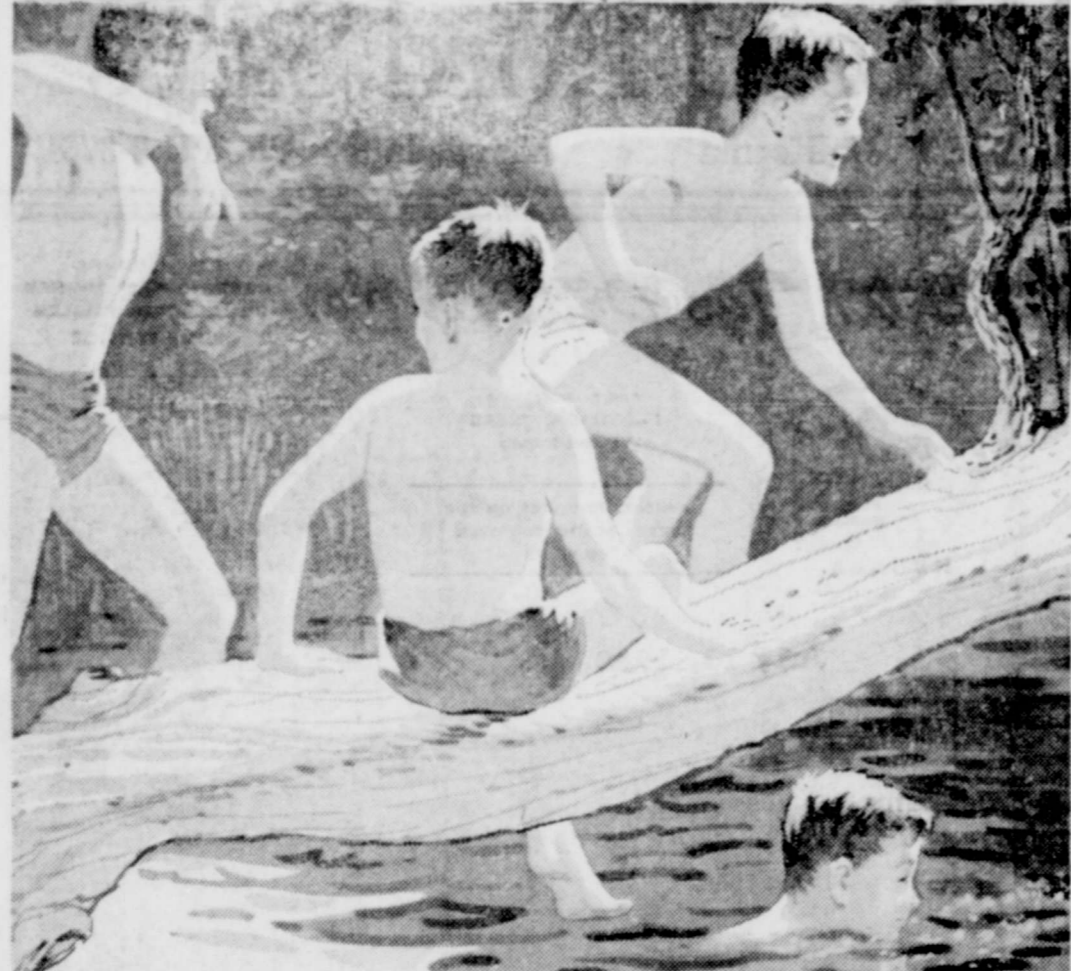

Good Irrigation Management Is Most Important

The rains which finally covered the Southern High Plains rather generally have been excellent, and as a result the farmers have saved thousands of dollars through reduced irrigation pumping costs.

Now, however, may be commencing again to pump water to the growing and fruiting crops. Some never stopped. During this stage of crop growth—when the crops are in peak bloom—adequate moisture is most necessary for optimum yields.

This is the time also when a minority of irrigators will have water losses due to "tailwater" escaping from the cropland. It is apparent that many farmers should take better care of their irrigation water. Particularly in view of the fact that the High Plains Underwater Water Conservation District has just published a map which shows declines of the underground water level amounting to more than 100 feet in some areas of the southern High Plains during the past 24-year period.

In a day when farmers do considerable talking about high production costs, and justifiably so, many of them could effect substantial savings through the use of good irrigation management practices. To maintain an adequate level of economic prosperity in this region will require wise use of both rainfall and irrigation water by each and every water user.

Spokesmen for the High Plains Water District state that the economic life of the ground-water supply will be prolonged if each farmer will practice this "good sense" approach to one of our most serious problems.

Space Problems Will Be Aired At State Fair

Unearthly problems, such as liquid that won't pour and food that won't stay on plates, will face orbiting astronauts at mealtime 250,000 miles from home. In a central exhibit in the Electric Show at the 1932 State Fair of Texas, October 6 through 21, the Whirlpool Space Kitchen will show proposed solutions to the problems.

How all foods and beverages required by a three-man crew on a fourteen day mission could be stored and prepared will be shown in this mockup of the Space Kitchen recently constructed by the Aeronautical Systems Division, Air Force Systems Command.

Although it contains versions of most appliances found in American homes, the Space Kitchen weighs only 800 pounds and is seven and one-half feet high and ten feet long.

Food-expelling devices, a thermoelectrically operated freeze and refrigerator, a self-contained wet and dry waste disposal sections are a few of the features to be found in the kitchen.

Every inch of space will be used and some space will even be double-duty. Racks of canned frozen foods will be stored within the freezer while the freezer door contains tightly-shelved layers of bite-size sandwiches. When the spaceman has eaten food contained in cans, the containers will be dead-stored in their original storage location to conserve space.

Many foods will be stored in pull-down bunkers until selected for use, then the astronaut will heat them to 170 degrees in a special three-cavity oven. When he is ready to eat he will screw a metal expelling device to the bottom of the can and a nipple-like mouthpiece to the top. Each squeeze of the expelling handle forces some of the food through the nipple into his mouth.

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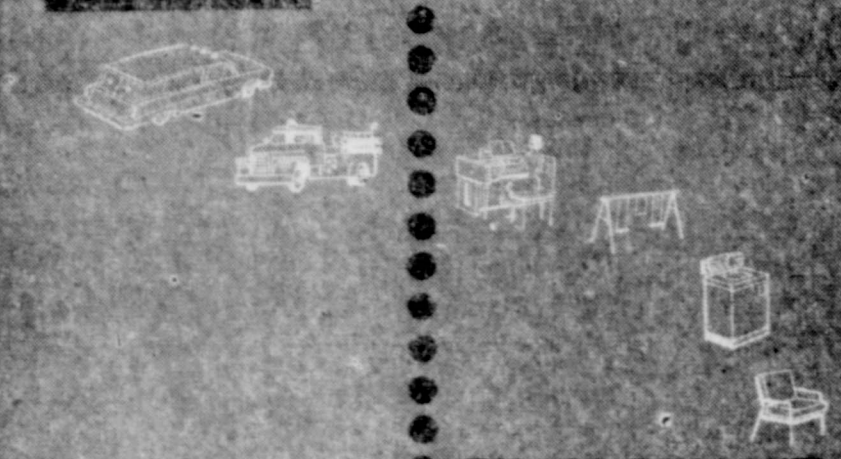
