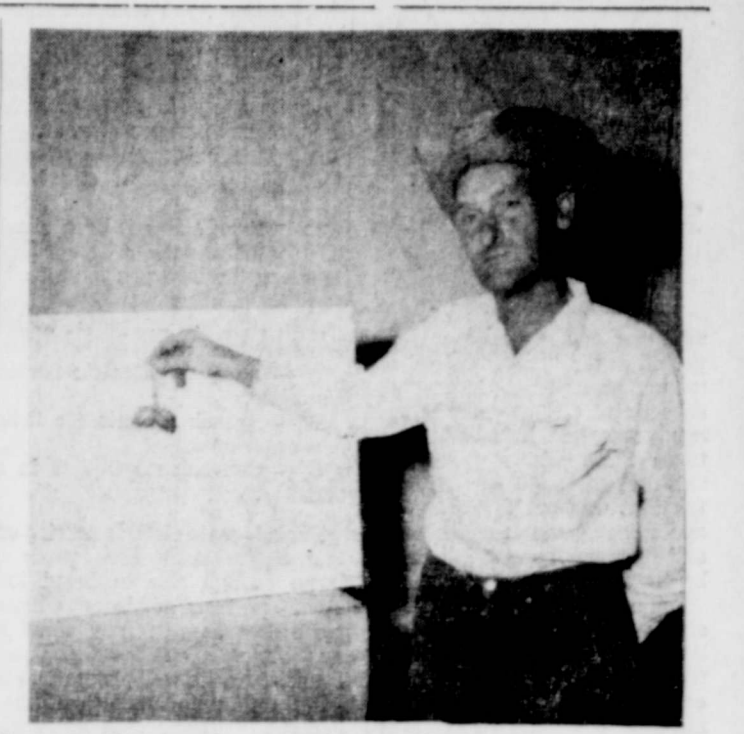

A Look At The Sales Tax

Reports coming out of Austin say that state legislators and people in the "know" are already talking about huge increases in school and college costs the next few years and of the additional taxes these will require.

Some are favoring a general sales tax that will go straight across the board and hit all items that had not been included in earlier tax measures.

Governor Daniel had been against a sales tax as such all along but it turned out he was willing enough to accept one if it could be called something else.

None of us like taxes but we all agree they must be collected to support the programs we vote for.

The Texas Commission on State and Local Tax Policy has been studying the situation and recommends an amendment exempting motor vehicles from the property tax but allowing the legislature to tax them.

Their plan would be to let voters of the State of Texas pass on a proposed amendment to abolish the state poll tax last May.

Perhaps folks here were thinking of the tax exempt voters that would be drawn to the polls 40 percent and the balance being divided between the cities and the county according to population.

Kitchen And Field Report

From Lighthouse Electric Cooperative, Inc., by Nancy Morckel, Home Economist

Is Your Electrical Equipment Hungry??

You wouldn't starve your soil, you wouldn't keep your stock on short rations, you wouldn't starve hired hands, but - - - what about your "wired hands"?

Are your "wired hands" well-fed? Has your farm and household wiring been improved since it was installed? Has it been checked to determine if it is adequate to carry the load you have on it?

Here they are: A - Adequate Electric Service Entrance, B - Branch Circuits for lights and appliances, C - Convenience Outlets in abundance.

For adequate electric service entrance you need three wires of large enough size to bring into the home and farm buildings as much electricity as you may need at any time.

Nursing Diploma Dream Come True For Mrs. Pierce

A former Floydada woman is realizing a childhood dream come true when she received her diploma as a licensed vocational nurse from the San Angelo School of Vocational Nursing at exercises held at the Baptist Memorial Hospital Chapel in San Angelo Friday night.

She is Mrs. Raymond Pierce, the former Helen Robertson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Robertson of Ralls, and sister of Mrs. Thomas Pierce of Sand Hill. Mrs. Thurman Richards of Starkey and of Zeke Robertson, farmer in Floydada High School.

Mrs. Pierce received her diploma on her 16th wedding anniversary as her family looked on and her son, Orval, ushered. She gained national distinction when the class took the national nursing achievement test sponsored by the National League of Nursing in New York City in July. Mrs. Pierce had the highest score possible on the test, 99 per cent and out of the 3,655 taking the test over the nation, hers was the highest score made.

Mrs. Pierce made the comment after learning of her score. "I'd been just as happy if I'd passed. I'm sure, no one was any more surprised than I was that I made the score".

The tests were given as preparation for the state board examinations which take place in Austin in October.

The nursing program was Mrs. Pierce's first actual experience. Classes last a full 52 weeks and students work in each division on each floor of the Shannon Hospital in San Angelo.

HOMEMAKING HINTS

By Phyllis Roggenhoff, County Home Demonstration Agent

Do you wonder why some products at the fair receive a blue ribbon and others a white? In foods there are score sheets for the foods entries from canned to baked foods. These score sheets are used as a guide by the judges in judging the foods entered. These score cards can also be helpful to you in deciding which products to take to the fair.

The score card for canned vegetables includes these points: CONTAINER — clean, polished standard size jar, and lid free from rust and corrosion, (and same brand as jar) neat, plain label 1/2 inches from bottom of jar. If jar leaks it is disqualified.

PACK — Practical but not fancy, uniform in size whether whole or in pieces, space in jar filled but not crowded, large proportion of vegetable to liquid, vegetable covered with liquid, one-half inch headspace in the jar.

COLOR — of the freshly cooked product — not faded or darkened; liquid characteristic of the product.

TEXTURE — shape held, evenly graded, not overly mature, not mushy from over cooking.

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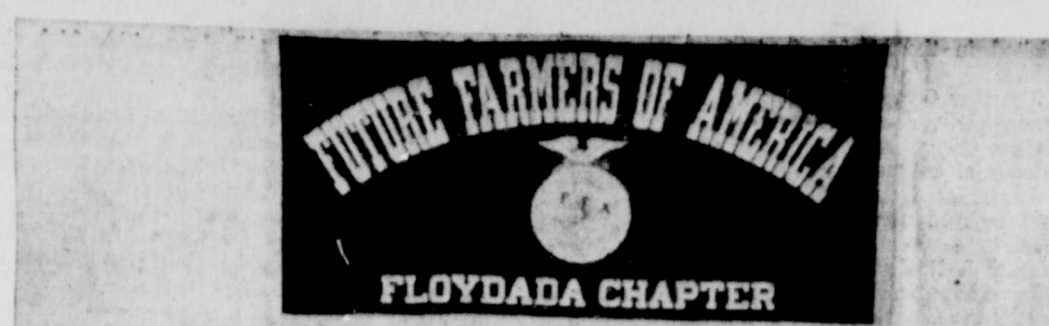

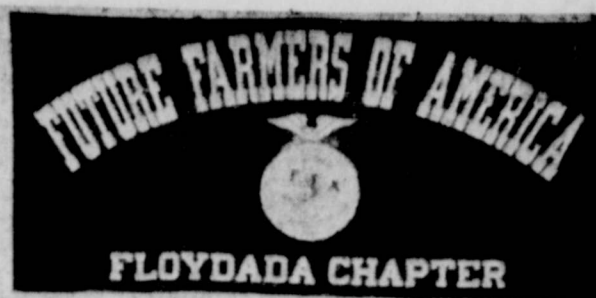
