Whirlwinds Host to Olton In First Home Grid Game

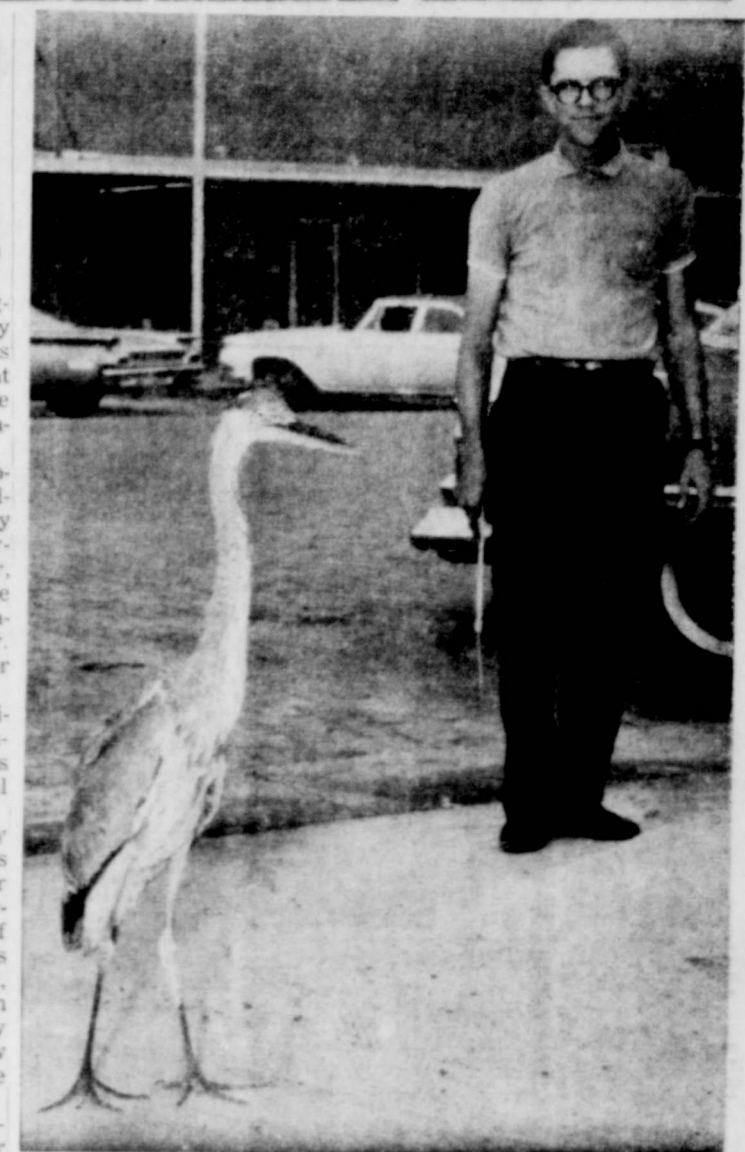

Wheat sowing time is here. Many of you have already selected your wheat varieties for the coming year. Varieties should be selected by their maturity dates, stiffness of straw, yielding capacity, and milling quality. The recommended varieties as shown by yield test from experiment stations plots are Tascosa, Bison, Kaw, Aztec, Ponca, acceptable varieties are Crockett, Comanche, Concho, Improved Triumph, Kaw is a new variety with about the same maturity as Wichita, stands better, and has better milling quality, then Wichita.

A soil test will aid in making top yields. Many fields lack enough phosphate to make top yields and a soil test is one way of determining the need of phosphate.

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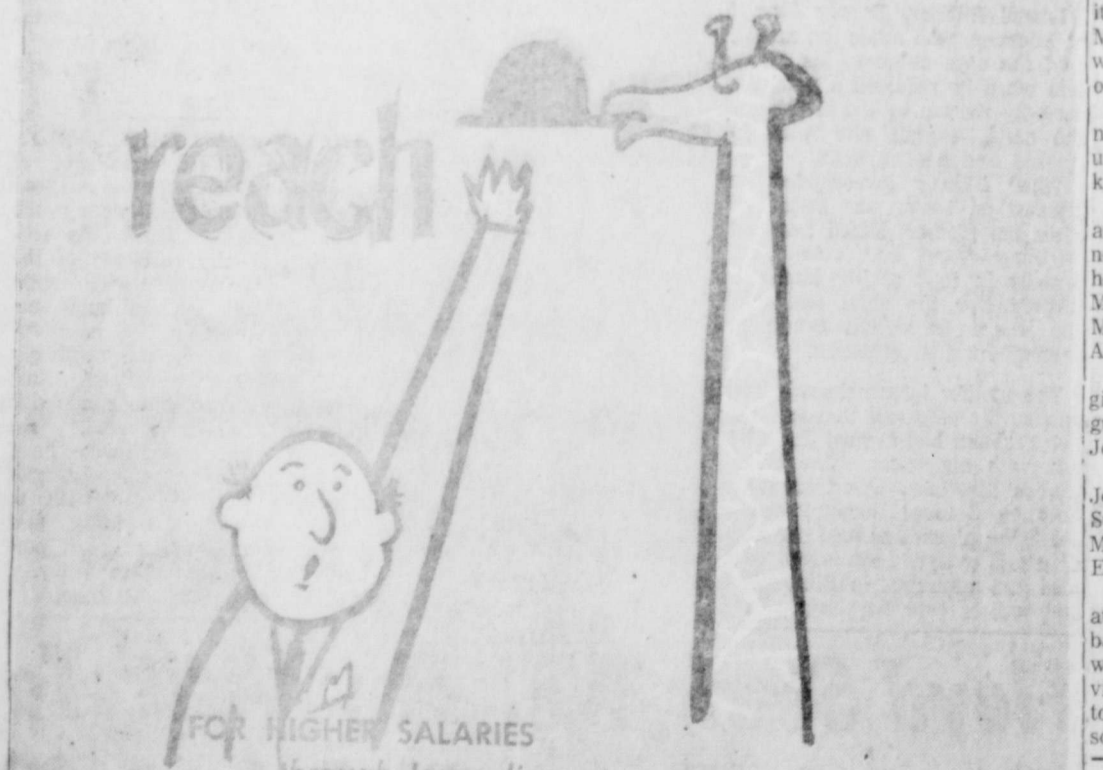

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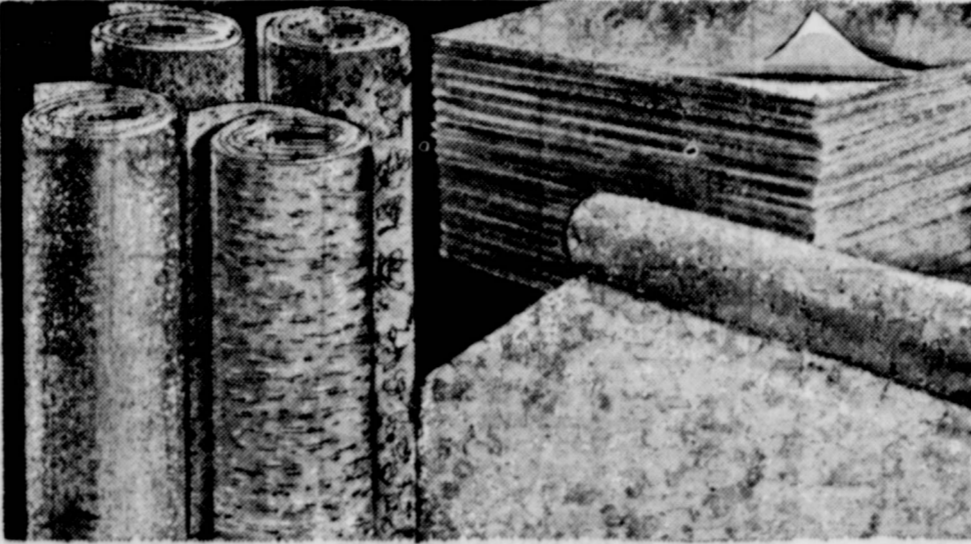

Safety Belts

Last year, 38,000 Americans died on the nation's highways. The National Safety Council and the American Medical Association agree that 5,000 lives could be saved every year if all cars were equipped with seat belts. And they add that the 1,500,000 injuries resulting from highway crashes could be reduced by up to 50 percent.

If you should be involved in an automobile accident, chances are that your car door will be sprung open by impact and you might be thrown out. This is one of the greatest causes of highway deaths and injuries. A seat belt will prevent you from being ejected and will keep you in the car where your chances of survival are five times greater.

This is one of the chief reasons so many police departments require their men to wear belts. They see many accidents and know that once a person is thrown to the pavement, chances of survival are slim.

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USDA TIGHTENS RULES ON CCC OWNED COMMODITIES

NEW REGULATIONS INVOLVING THE TIGHTEST MEASURES YET TAKEN TO GUARD AGAINST SHORTAGES OF COMMODITIES STORED BY THE COMMODITY CREDIT CORPORATION IN COMMERCIAL WAREHOUSES HAVE BEEN ANNOUNCED BY SECRETARY ORVILLE L. FREEMAN

THE REGULATIONS

Involving new procedure or dealing with shortages which generally fall into three major categories:

1. If the shortage is small and does not exceed the normal operational loss which can be attributed to shrinkage and handling losses, the warehouseman can make up the shortage through purchase of grain from outside sources. Within a short period of the time after the initial discovery of shortage,
2. If the shortage exceeds the normal margin for operational losses, warehouse examiner will be stationed at the warehouse to determine the cause of the shortage. If it has occurred through no fault of the warehouseman, the examiner will remain at the
3. If it is determined that improper conduct on the part of the warehouseman—such as conversion carelessness of operation, or other liability—has caused an unjustifiable loss of quantity or the quality of the commodity the USDA will take the following steps:

- *—AN EXAMINER WILL BE PLACED AT THE WAREHOUSE TO KEEP OPERATIONS UNDER CONSTANT SUPERVISION.
- *—ALL EXISTING CONTRACTS WILL BE SUSPENDED, AND THE WAREHOUSE REMOVED FROM THE APPROVED LIST.
- *—ALL PAYMENTS FOR SHORTAGE AND OTHER CHARGES WHICH ARE CURRENT AND ACCRUED WILL BE STOPPED.
- *—THE WAREHOUSEMAN'S BONDING COMPANY WILL BE NOTIFIED OF USDA ACTIONS.
- *—ALL GOVERNMENT OWNED GRAIN WILL BE PLACED ON LOADOUT ORDERS.
- *—ALL SHIPMENTS FROM THE WAREHOUSE WILL BE STOPPED, EXCEPT THOSE FOR WHICH USDA HAS ISSUED LOADING ORDERS.
- *—IF THE WAREHOUSEMAN CONTINUES TO REMOVE GRAIN FROM THE WAREHOUSE IN VIOLATION OF THESE ORDERS, IMMEDIATE STEPS WILL BE TAKEN TO OBTAIN A COURT INJUNCTION TO STOP THE LOADOUT EXCEPT ON USDA ORDER.

THE SECRETARY SAID THE NEW PROCEDURE WILL APPLY TO ALL COMMODITIES OWNED OR UNDER LOAN FROM CCC

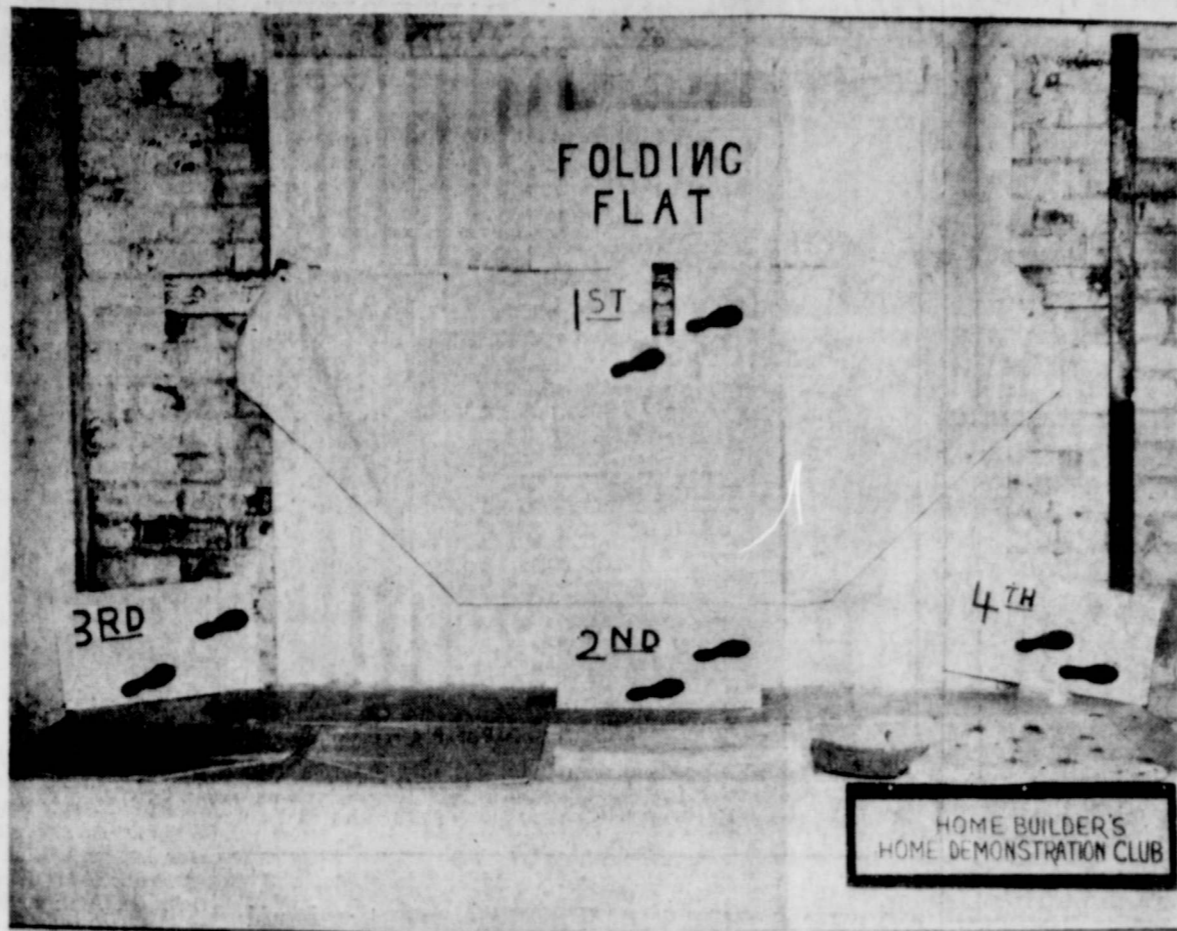

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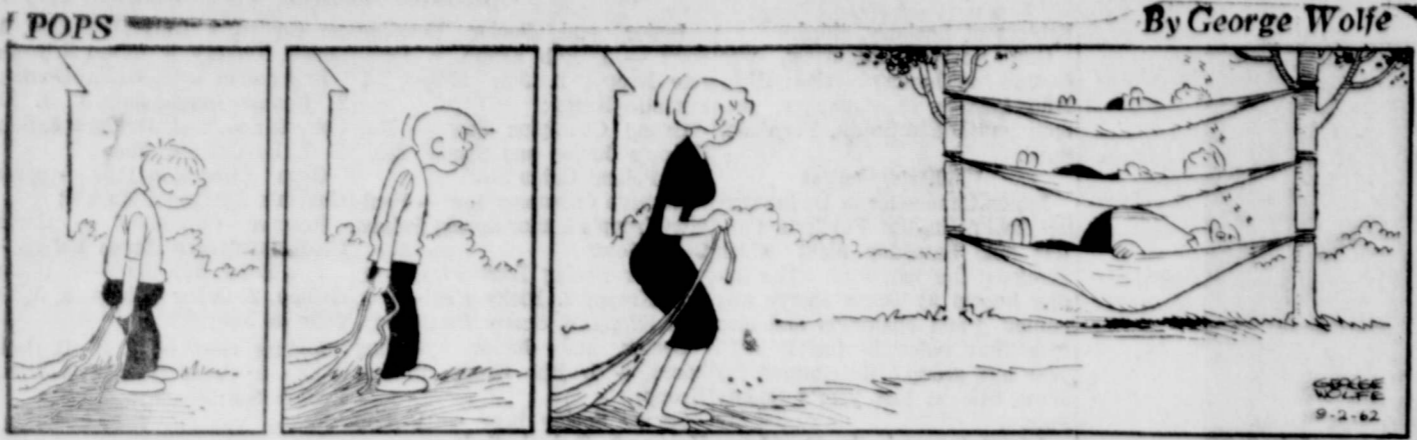

Safety Inspection Stickers For '63 Are Available

AUSTIN — Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced today a new-type motor vehicle inspection sticker is now available for the new inspection year beginning September 1.

"The only thing new about the inspection this year is the sticker itself," he said. "This new sticker is a dry mount decal which we believe will adhere regardless of weather conditions and one which has been used very successfully in other states."

More than five million vehicles registered in the state are required by law to be inspected at one of the 5,000 official inspection stations between this date and April 16, 1963. Owners of vehicles not displaying the current inspection sticker after that date will be in violation of the law.

Garrison urged motorists to get their vehicles inspected as early as possible, and pointed out:

"With hard summer driving coming to an end, fall is an excellent time to have vehicles safety checked in preparation for the winter months."

In announcing the new inspection period, the public safety director said the Vehicle Inspection Program in Texas has proved itself to be a valuable tool in reducing accidents on Texas streets and highways.

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Erosion is the dominant problem on 739 million acres of America's farm land. This is more than half of the agricultural land in the United States. Erosion is a problem requiring constant attention on 234 million acres of cropland.

These facts, along with many more, are found in a new publication just issued by the U. S. Soil Conservation Service. It is called "oil Erosion, The Work of Uncontrolled Water". A copy can be obtained from the local S.C.S. office in Floydada, Joe J. McEntire, Work Unit Conservationist said.

Mr. McEntire, who is assigned by the SCS to assist the Floyd County Soil Conservation District, said that the new bulletin contains 16 pages and 25 pictures describing and illustrating the causes and types of erosion caused by water. It is the latest publication by the SCS that deals with this basic problem of American farmers and ranchers. A few months ago Farmer's Bulletin 2171, "How to Control a Gully" was issued. This is also available from your local SCS office. Come by and pick up a copy of either of these new bulletins the next time you are in Floydada.

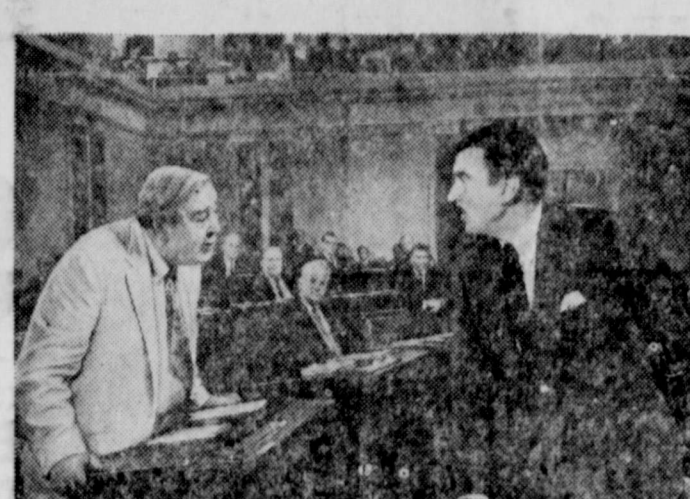

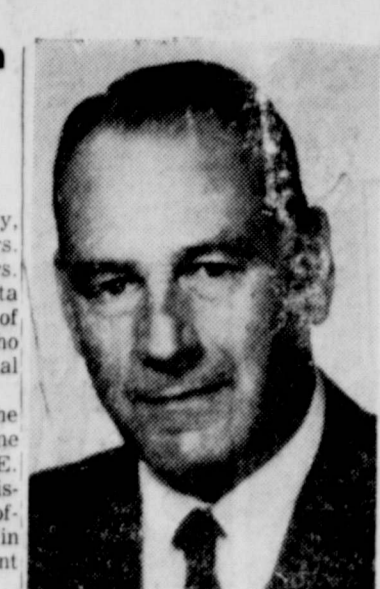

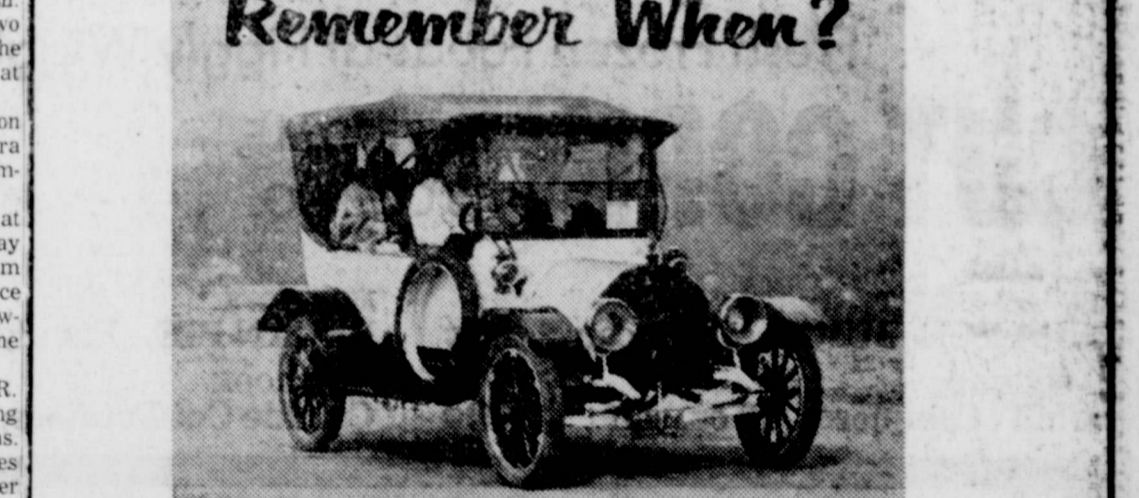
