'Winds Play Ralls Here Friday Night

Crowd Of Year Expected For Grid Classic

The Floydada Whirlwinds and the Ralls Jackrabbits will meet on Friday night, September 21, at Wester Field in Floydada. The big football game is expected to draw a capacity crowd that may well overflow the local stadium if weather conditions are anything like favorable.

The Floydada - Ralls rivalry has always been a popular one and added to this is the fact that both Lockney and Crosbyton have been dates like week. Normally their fans like to check up on coming opponents and this could swell the number in attendance here by several hundred.

Ralls started the season with six returning regulars and a large number of lettermen who had seen reserve and B team duty. The Jackrabbits field a team that normally averages 178 pounds in the line and 164 pounds in the back field. This will make the visitors by far the heaviest team the locals have faced to-date, with the Ralls backfield holding a decided edge over the Whirlwind backs.

Coach Neal Chastain's Rabbits have not won a ball game this season but they have had a rugged schedule. They lost their opener to Class AA Post by a score of 6 - 20. Last week Ralls lost to a good O'Donnel team 20 - 26.

The Jackrabbits have a habit of being double tough against Floydada. Twice in the past ten years they upset the locals when Floydada was the big favorite. On two other occasions they played the green and white to very close scores. The last Ralls victory over Floydada was in 1957 when the Rabbits won 16 - 6. The following year Floydada managed a narrow 8 - 6 victory.

The two schools have one of the oldest rivalries in south plains football. Recorded game scores go back as far as 1920 and the two teams probably met in earlier contests. The 1920 game was won by Floydada by a 78 - 0 score. Since that time Floydada has won 28 and Ralls 5 of the 35 games played. There have been two ties.

Probable starting line-ups and other interesting football information appears on a football spread in this issue of The Hesperian.

Early this week the Whirlwinds team was suffering from colds and flu. Six were absent from practice Monday and several others were not up to par.

Coaches Bill Curry and Billy Carmack were juggling their line-ups to see what could be done about patching up the sagging defense and mounting a more effective offense. These changes coupled with the sickness bug

Work Begins To Make Site Spot of Beauty

Several years ago a 17 acre tract of land was donated to the City of Floydada by the W. M. Massie family and the Floydada Garden Club has taken it over as their project. The plot of land located in southwest part of town, is now going to be turned into a beauty spot of the city. Members of the Garden Club recently completed plans to make it a park. The barren land, which has stood for so long collecting debris, contaminated water and such will eventually be a meeting place for family gatherings and outings.

The land breaking started Saturday morning when Grady and Bill Walker showed up with their tractor and plow, followed in a short time by Fred Martin and his machinery. Work was well underway when the men volunteered to do the plowing. As the park progresses Tom Porter, B. A. Robertson and Jim Fitzgerald have volunteered their services, to assist in leveling the land and cleaning the acreage. Any other farmers who have spare time are welcomed to help in any way.

Today results are showing from the "get down to work" basis the members have been on the past several weeks. People are helping and more help is needed for the new project. The club feels those of the county and in the city as well will welcome the new sight.

The Garden Club has the sole responsibility of completing the park, of securing the trees, shrubs and flowers. The work they can do and are doing, the money to do with is their problem. They are needing \$2,350 and this amount can only be reached by donations.

The club will be needing trees, good healthy ones with trunks not less than two to three inches in diameter. Their plans call for Sycamore, American Elm, non-bearing Mulberry, Cotton Wood, Russian Olive, Silver Maple, Pecan trees, Cedar Elm, Western Catalpa, Weeping Willow, Honey Locust, Chinese Elm, Arizona Ash, Pyracantha, Blue Vase Juniper, Camnarti Juniper, American Red Bud, Mimosa, Honeysuckle, Blue spruce and Pitzer Juniper.

How can people in the county help? Members say by donating for a good cause. Civic clubs and other organizations are asked to join in and assist with the park project, the general public is being asked to contribute toward the park, which in a sense will be theirs for family reunions, cook-outs and a place where you can go just to relax and see the beauty of Mother Nature.

The blue print for the park was drawn up by Gordon Durham of Sunview Nursery in Plainview, free of charge.

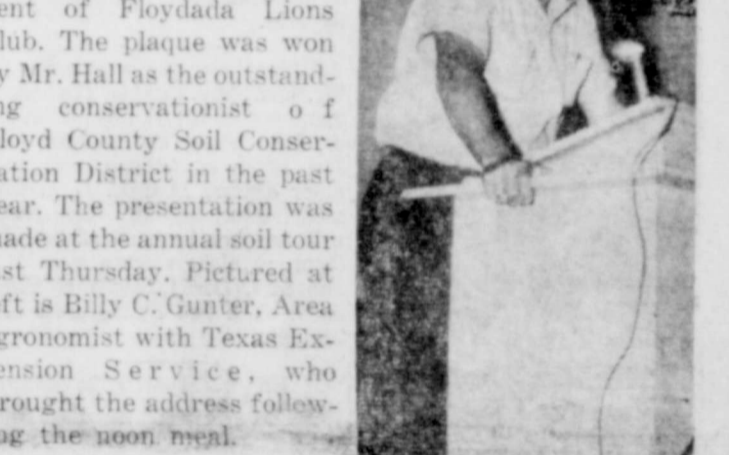

Floyd Soil Tour Well Attended, 335 Served

The annual Floyd County Soil Tour last Thursday is now looked upon as a big success. Some 300 made the tour and 335 were served barbecue and the trimmings at the noon meal.

Floydada Chamber of Commerce and the First National Banks at Floydada and Lockney made the feed possible.

The tour this year took a new route and had some interesting items that were different than in past tours. One of the highlights was a visit to the new Blanco Feed Lots west of town and also some hybrid grazing grasses were viewed.

Mr. Vaughn Hall of Quitaque who ranches in northeast Floyd County was recognized as the outstanding conservationist of the year and Claude Weathersbee, president of Floydada Lions Club, presented a plaque to Mrs. Hall for this honor. Hall was unable to be present for the tour and program.

Following the noon meal at the Baptist Encampment grounds the group heard Billy C. Gunter, area agronomist with the Texas Extension Service tell of the importance of soil and water conservation in all farming and ranching practices.

The touring group seemed well pleased with the site of the Baptist Camp as place for the meal and program. A large number of those in attendance voiced their appreciation of the camp facilities and their thanks for the use afforded sponsors of the soil tour.

Lion President Claude Weathersbee had this to say of Mr. Hall and of his conservation practices:

"Again this year we are proud to present this special award to the outstanding conservationist for the Floyd County Soil Conservation District in honor of his soil and water conservation accomplishments. His selection was based upon his individual conservation plan he developed with assistance from the Soil Conservation Service and with the speed in which he carried out this work and has maintained the practices installed. He follows a long list of past winners who have been selected for this honor and recognized by the Floydada Lions Club.

Our winner for this year first requested assistance in developing a conservation plan on his land in December 1958 after discussing the possibility of a Great Plains Conservation Program Contract with technicians of the local Soil Conservation Service office. He went over the land with technicians and a conservation plan and Great Plains Conservation Program contract developed at this time. The land is a 4 section acre ranch and was heavily infested with cedar and mesquite, had only two pastures and was watered by springs that sometimes went dry. The land wouldn't run over 70 cows with a lot of winter feeding required. This was due to the heavy brush cover and lack of his being able to distribute grazing property due to one 2,000 acre pasture and one 400 acre pasture.

The conservation plan that was worked out included complete conservation treatment on all conservation problems in order

Sugar Beet Association Sends Stovall To Capitol

Richard F. Stovall was named by the Department of Agriculture on September 25 in Washington at a meeting next Tuesday at Washington D. C. Stovall is due to leave Floydada on Sunday and was hoping to start his return trip next Wednesday.

The sugar division of ASC is expected to have some 24 applications from over the United States for new or increased sugar beet allotments. The High Plains Group, of which Stovall is spokesman, is one of that number. The Hereford area will also be in attendance asking for beet allotments there.

The High Plains Sugar Beet Growers Association and the Floyd County Sugar Beet Growers Association have been working hard and have held several meetings preparing their case. They are armed with acreage figures, the history of sugar beet production in south plains counties, cattle feeding possibilities here, and proposals by Plainview for the location of a sugar mill in that area.

Stovall along with several of the above named group returned only last week from Denver, Colorado where they met with officials of Great Western Sugar Co. in the interest of establishing a sugar mill in the Plainview area. They received the assurance of that company of their interest in the south plains and in the High Plains Association. Great Western would make no definite commitments about building a plant, of course, without the necessary beet acreage allotments to back up such a move.

Following the Denver trip High Plains Assn met again on Monday night of this week where final plans were made for the presentation of their case in Washington.

Mrs. Sikes was an entry in the fiddlers contest Saturday night and had her own cheering section, winning third place in the 18 - 35 division.

The couple's own children are four boys and six girls. One foster daughter, Joyce, 17; Stacy, 13; Sharon, 12; Stevie, 10; Shari, nine; Stanton, seven; Shelly, six; Shawna, five; Sherna, four;

and Stewart, two. Mr. and Mrs. Sikes commented "we plan to have two more of our own for an even dozen".

The home at Hollis is sponsored by the churches of Christ and the board of directors are men from the state of Oklahoma and Texas. Their dwelling, which is an old consolidated school building with cafeteria, gym, dorm and swimming pool, is located on six acres at the present time with hopes of buying a farm soon. They have their own cows for milking, their hogs for butchering and four horses. The boys attend a small country school in Arnett, Okla., and turn out for the cotton harvest to make their own pocket money.

Two other couples assist Mr. and Mrs. Sikes at the home. They are Mr. and Mrs. Olen Michell, Mrs. Viola Landreth, and assistant, Addie Edmondson.

Youths at the home come from broken families. Some are orphans but they are never turned away after a certain age and they may stay as long as they choose.

Mrs. Sikes is barber for the group. She said, "I cut 13 heads of hair a week, and every three weeks they are up for another trimming". She also cuts hair for the staff.

Many honors have been extended to the boys during Christian camp sessions.

Prior to taking over responsibility of the home, Mr. and Mrs. Sikes were at the New Mexico Christian home at Portales in 1956 where he was superintendent, and at Tipton, Oklahoma Childrens Home in 1958 where he was manager and Mrs. Sikes, choral director. They moved to Westview in September, 1961.

While at the Fair, the "hat" was passed during the fiddlers contest and a donation of \$160.00 was collected for the home along with 500 bushels of Midland Bermuda Grass sprigs given by the J. A. Nolands.

The money will go toward a larger building in order to accommodate more boys and the grass will be set out in the spring to later harvest, the Sikes family said.

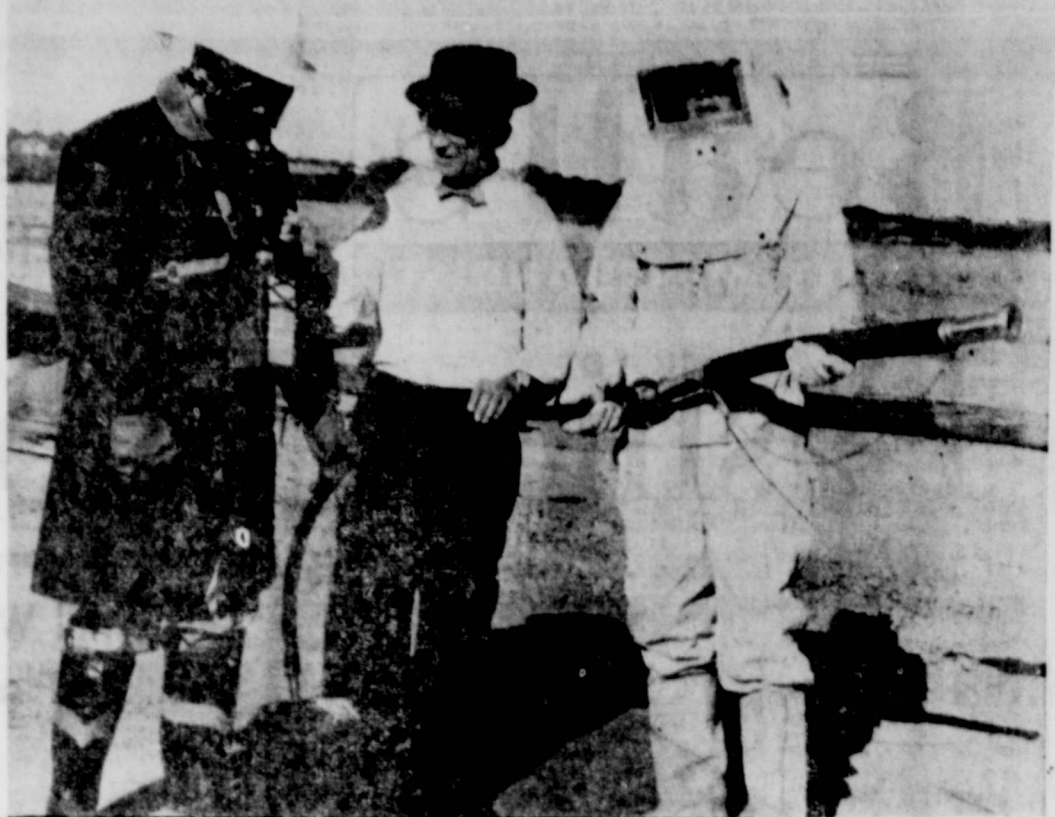

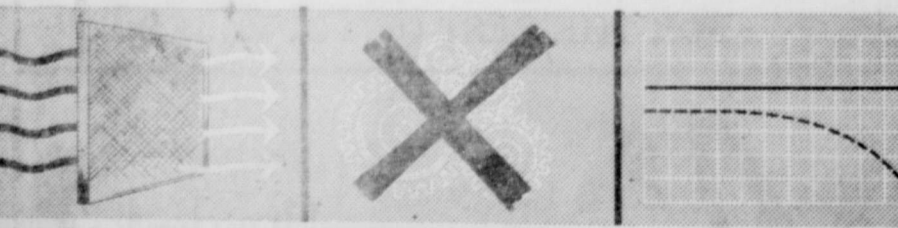

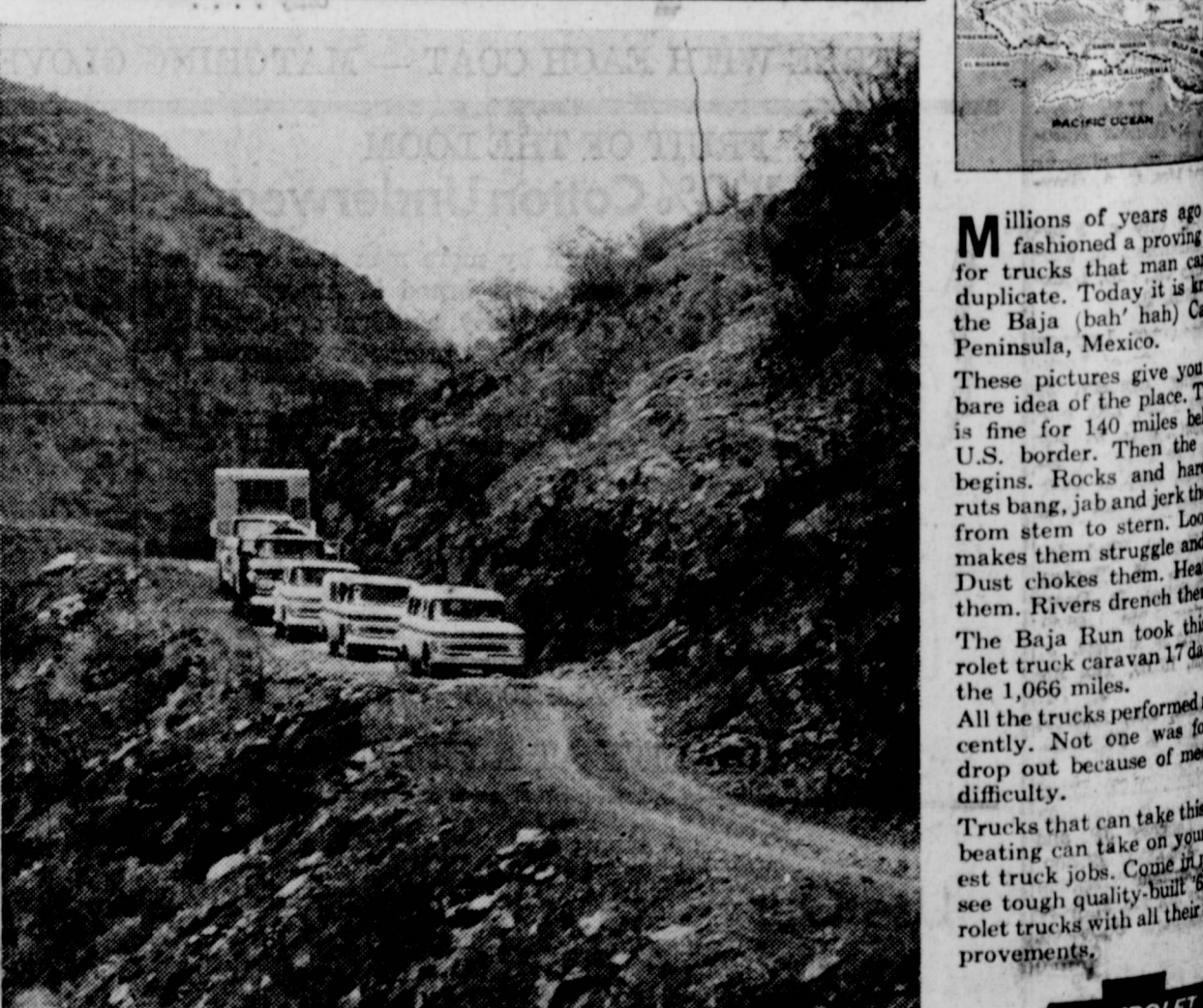

The Floydada Whirlwinds blew first period when Joe Priest hit like a gentle autumn breeze for Clyde Galloway with a nine yard TD strike in the end zone. The Mustangs failed to convert and caught fire and scored 21 points in the final frame to win going away. The final score was 28-12.

The Whirlwinds took to the field looking tight and tense. 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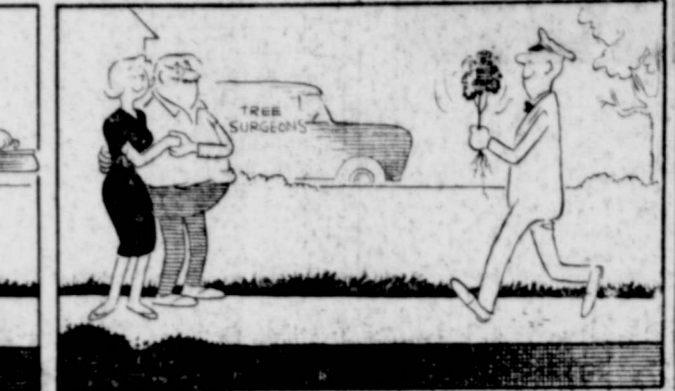
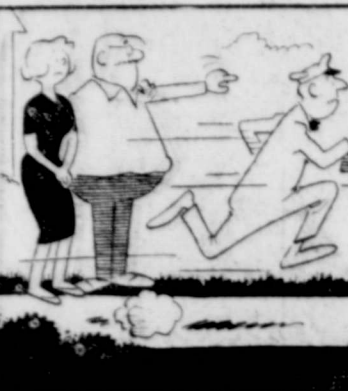
