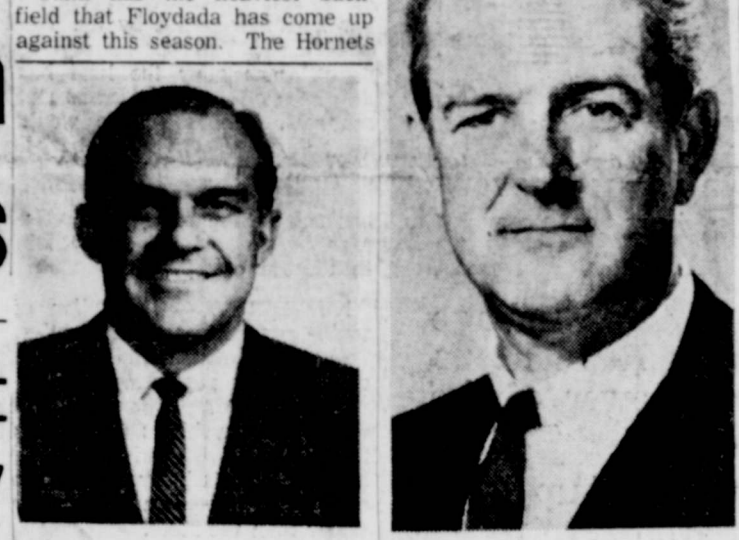

Ken's Column

The general election is just around the corner. (Tuesday, November 6 to be exact), and a good number of the voters seem to be a little bit disturbed by the long list of constitutional amendments that will appear on the ballot. The Hesperian has received several letters and phone calls asking that the propositions be put in every day language so that they may be better understood.

The amendments were published in full during the month of August appearing in four issues of this paper. Seven were in the Hesperian and the other seven were published in the Lockney Beacon at that time.

There are several publications now being circulated which explain these fourteen proposals and

give the pros and cons on each amendment adopted five years ago providing for a Texas Water Development Board, in which police subdivisions of the state are helped in the conservation and development of water resources. This amendment would authorize the State itself to get into the water conservation business by the construction or enlargement of reservoirs by the State. Also it would allow the State to negotiate for water storage in reservoirs developed by the federal government.

**NUMBER 1** — Authority to provide insurance for employees of political subdivisions not already covered. This amendment would allow political subdivisions such as school districts and others to provide workmen's compensation insurance to employees. Counties, towns and villages already have this power.

**NUMBER 2** — Assistant to needy children, aged and blind. This amendment would increase the total amount of money which can be expended each year out of State funds for the needy aged, needy blind and needy children. The increase would be five million dollars per year to allow \$52,000,000 total expenditures. The present limit is \$47,000,000 of state funds. Added to federal funds a total of about \$175,000,000 per year is now available for these causes in the state. State funds to this cause have been increased regularly for the past several years.

**NUMBER 3** — Creation of hospital districts in certain counties. This amendment would allow the creation of hospital districts in certain counties, but does not require a vote on the matter. It must be approved by the voters, however, in an election before the district can be formed.

**NUMBER 4** — Water Development Board, Storage Facilities in Reservoirs — This amends the

**NUMBER 5** — This amendment would give the Legislature authority to provide by law for the creation of hospital districts, thus making the voting of amendments for certain counties or areas unnecessary, as in Amendment No. 3 on this ballot. The county or political subdivision seeking to create the district would have to secure the approval of a majority of the voters voting on such a district just as in Amendment No. 3.

**NUMBER 6** — Setting up a retirement, disability and death compensation program for elected and appointive officers and employees. This amendment would extend this right to other political subdivisions which do not now have it. Counties now have this authority but other political subdivisions do not have it.

**NUMBER 7** — Continuity of state and local governmental operations in event of enemy attack. This amendment would allow the Legislature to provide for temporary succession of powers and duties of public officials in periods of emergency resulting from disaster caused by enemy attack.

**NUMBER 8** — Assistance to totally and permanently disabled persons. This amendment provides for the increase in the amount of funds which the Legislature may appropriate for needy persons who are totally and per-

manently disabled by reasons of mental or physical handicaps from \$1,500,000 to \$2,500,000, an increase of \$1,000,000.

**NUMBER 9** — Creation of two hospital districts in Brazoria County and home for aged in Titus County. Both would have to be approved by the voters of the counties involved.

**NUMBER 10** — Allowing state employees to serve on advisory committees. This would allow a state employee to serve on an advisory board or as a consultant with other agencies of the state providing that there was no conflict of interest. He could be reimbursed for expenses only. The amendment would also allow retired officers of the Air Force and Coast Guard to hold office.

**NUMBER 11** — Resale of unsold lands held by Veterans Land Fund. This amendment would allow land now owned by the Veterans Land Fund to be sold to non-veterans after the land has first been offered to veterans and not sold. The legislature would prescribe the quantity, terms, price and rates of interest. Some land has been accumulated which has not been purchased by veterans. This would allow the State to dispose of this land.

**NUMBER 12** — Delegation of zoning powers to certain counties. This amendment would delegate authority for regulating and restricting speed, parking and travel of motor vehicles on beaches to the counties bordering the Gulf of Mexico. It is believed that the counties can regulate this matter easier than the state.

**NUMBER 13** — Independent School District taxes. This amendment affects Dallas County only and allows the school districts of that county to work out by agreement boundaries which would afford a more efficient and economical use of tax revenue and better serve the children of that district.

**NUMBER 14** — Trials de novo on appeals from rulings of administrative agencies such as Courts, zoning commissions, etc. Also the state boards such as board of medical examiners, board of demistry, etc. would be affected. The amendment allows an appeal from the rulings of these boards and agencies to a court in which the court would use its own judgment on the merits of the case. There would be so many appeals, if this amendment was passed, that the number of Courts would have to be increased by many times to take care of the cases, opponents say. Proponents of the amendment believe that the jurisdiction of administrative agencies should be limited and point to the large increase in administrative law, particularly on the federal level.

### Outdoors In Texas

Many of the smaller fishing lakes of Texas are Chamber of Commerce projects built for multiple uses.

Typical is Oak Creek Lake in Central West Texas near Bronte. Actually, this lake was planned by the Sweetwater Board of City Development, a tax-supported Chamber of Commerce.

It was undertaken when the Gulf Oil Company, which had a refinery at Sweetwater at that time, told of its future water needs.

Already there were several small lakes around Sweetwater, mainly the city's municipal water supply. But Sweetwater is in the low rain belt. So it was evident that this lake, plus Lake Transmanchee and the Santa Fe Lakes — all small impoundments — could not take care of future water needs.

Besides that, Sweetwater residents had to travel too far for their fishing.

Accordingly, in the late 40s, right after the end of World War II, talk began about a new lake. Engineers were brought in. They said the best chance was on Oak Creek.

But Oak Creek was on the other side of the Callahan Divide and in the Colorado watershed. Sweetwater was in the Brazos watershed. Naturally some of the local residents protested that it would be too costly to pump the water up over the divide.

Engineers, however, soon proved this was a wrong philosophy. And work began! The dam was completed in the early 50s. It was still a small lake, compared with Whitney or Buchanan, but its 2,000 surface acres, backed ministrative agencies. This a-up into dry creeks and canyons, provided a lot of good fishing water.

Is a good catfish lake, and has plenty of bream. Still remaining is some of the structure of the old highway bridge across the Oak Creek portion of the Lake. Here of course, is a good spot for fishermen to operate.

This is an interesting lake to fish. There are numerous access spots around its shores.

There are several oil wells pumping on the banks of the lake, but every care has been taken to prevent pollution of the waters.

Boaters can go several miles back up Oak Creek when the lake is filled, fish among fallen trees and have excellent luck on bass. The channel also is fine for catfishing.

There are good camp sites around the lake. For this reason many families from West Texas use the area as their recreation grounds.

Although most of the permanent type camps around the lake are owned by Sweetwater residents, many of them have been built by other West Texans. Here is a good lake in a West Texas area where there are no larger lakes. Thus it becomes virtually an ocean.

So the activities of a civic organization, with the help of the municipality and industry, have created another West Texas playground.

Oak Creek Lake can be reached over paved highways from Sweetwater, Abilene, San Angelo and Coleman.

It is a real nice place to spend a very pleasant weekend, and to enjoy some good fishing.

### Distress Signals To Be Used In Texas

Have you ever been in distress beside the roadway with a flat tire, out of gas or any of the other numerous things that seem to plague us as motorists on our highways?

Forty-six states including Texas, have adopted uniform distress signals to be used by motorists in trouble. The problem now is to educate the public to their meaning and use. Major Harry Hutchison, Commander of Region number 5 of the Department of Public Safety said today: "The American Association of State Highway Officials is responsible for crystallizing and standardizing the following rules."

In an emergency on freeways, whenever possible, drivers should stop their cars on the right hand shoulder well away from the thru traffic lane.

At night the tail lights and the interior lights of the stopped vehicle should be turned on. If the vehicle is equipped with a turn signaling indicator having an "emergency" switch, it should be turned on so that both the right and left turn signals will flash simultaneously.

Where a disabled vehicle is stopped in such a position that part or all of a traffic lane is occupied, portable warning devices should be placed to the rear of the stopped vehicle to notify oncoming drivers of the traffic hazard.

Whenever help is needed, a white cloth or handkerchief should be displayed from the stopped vehicle so that it readily can be seen from other vehicles on the highway. For example, the white cloth may be hung from the window next to the driver's seat so that it is conspicuous to passing motorists. In addition, when practical, the hood of the car should be raised.

While waiting for help, motorists should remain in their cars or nearby in a safe place. If the vehicle is on a traveled roadway, it should not stand or be left unattended. After observing a disabled vehicle, the nearest police officer or automotive service person should be notified of the location of the vehicle in need of assistance.

### Let's Look At History:

The Republican candidate for Governor has been saying that Texans are financially suffering because our state has been electing Democrats. He says that Texas trails 27 other states in personal income, even though ours ranks highest in the South.

Jack Cox ought to know history; he should be very well aware that the economic plight of the South was desperate for nearly a hundred years following the War Between the States, and he should know that the South's destitution was designed and engineered by the self-same Republican Party under whose banner Mr. Cox is seeking Texas' governorship.

The Republican Party of the North reduced every citizen of the South, regardless of color, to peonage.

They set up an economic system that put them in financial control over the South, they bled the South of billions of dollars. The actions of the Northern Republicans have no parallel in history.

It was not until the Democrats returned to power in 1933 that the South could begin a long, hard return to recovery. In recent years, per capita income in Texas and other Southern states has been rising faster than that of other regions. IT WAS DEMOCRATIC POLICY THAT MADE THIS PROGRESS POSSIBLE.

And now that this recovery is under way—now is not the time for a return to the Republican Party politicians, under whose rule Texas suffered so long and so bitterly.

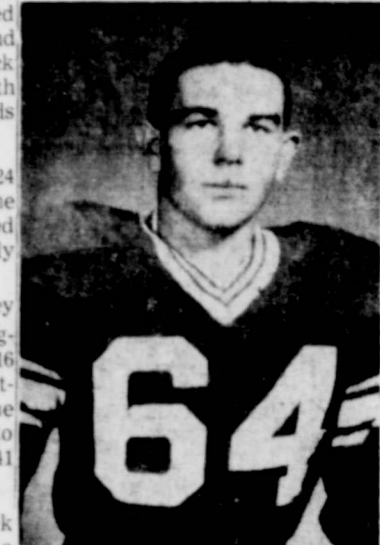

**LIBRARY JOB TAKEN** — New assistant director of the rural library services division of the State Library is H. Kenneth Jackson of Fort Worth, former head of the Kilgore Public Library. Jackson will be assisting Mrs. Emily H. Welty in promoting library development in areas not served by a public library.

**POLIO COUNT** — Latest polio count by the State Health Department showed 229 cases in Texas so far this year, with 174 of them paralytic.

Last year at the same time there were 29 paralytic cases on record. One new case each was recorded in Bexar and Coryell Counties.

**A&I RULINGS** — Rep. Don Kennard, chairman of the Texas House interim committee on migrant labor, has been advised by the attorney general that members serving on the committee may not receive State funds for travel reimbursement.

Kennard had asked for a legal opinion on the subject.

In another opinion, requested by Jerry Dellana, county attorney of Travis County, the attorney general held that motor boats are not permitted to be sold on Sunday.

**TRUCK HEARING** — Truck operators who have applied for permits to haul fruit and vegetables over the State were cross-examined by attorneys for common carriers at a hearing before a Railroad Commission examiner here.

Some felt the hearing would last until Christmas. It is a continuation of similar sessions held earlier at San Antonio, Lubbock and McAllen.

More than 130 operators are seeking the permits authorized by the Legislature in 1961. Common carriers oppose granting the permits on the ground that there is no need for them.

**ESCHEAT LAW** — Reports to the State treasury department indicate there is approximately \$3,140,000 in personal property in Texas subject to the new escheat law.

So far the State has collected 108,000 through three suits. But 946 reports of this kind of property have been certified to the attorney general. Involved is \$678,724 more.

It may turn out that the \$3,140,000 estimate is too high, so far as the state's expectations of getting the money are concerned. This since a lot of owners of the property are being found.

In other instances it was discovered that some property is not subject to escheat, or at least not yet.

Seven years have to elapse before the State can make a claim. At this stage, it appears that the best "mining" country will be old meter deposits.

**TEXAS GROWTH** — Industrial growth of Texas in the next 15 years is being projected by the State Industrial Commission in a brochure called "Goals for Texans."

It will be several weeks before the brochure is finished and ready for distribution. But Commission officials feel it can be

adapted to the needs of any area or community with benefits for the Commission based its plan on National Planning Association studies, and got assistance also from the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

**HONOR FOR TEXAN** — De Witt C. Greer, State highway engineer, is one of the "top ten public works men-of-the-year" for 1962.

Announcement of his selection was made by Kiwanis International and the American Public Works Association, co-sponsors of the annual awards.

A plaque was presented to Greer at a meeting of the Austin Kiwanis Club at which John S. Redditt of Lufkin, former chairman of the Texas Highway Commission, described the engineer's accomplishments which won him the national honor.

With characteristic humor, Greer accepted the award "with all the humility that a Texan can muster."

Greer has been an employee of the State Highway Department for 35 years, the last 22 of them as the No. 1 engineer. He is a past president of the American Association of State Highway Officials, and in 1933 received the George S. Bartlett Award for outstanding contributions to highway progress.

**CRUDE DEMAND UP** — Texas Railroad Commission reports that purchasers' nominations for Texas crude oil in November have increased.

November requests average 2,524,186 barrels daily. This is 33,853 more than for October.

Commission is expected to keep its 8-day schedule for prorated wells in November. This would increase the daily average permissible by almost 50,000 barrels.

October is the ninth consecutive month on 8-day production.

**INTEGRATION VOTE** — Texas' governor apparently won't be plagued with integration nightmares like Arkansas and Mississippi.

University of Texas students in Austin will vote on the subject on November 14.

Program is reportedly running behind in other states.

Texas has consistently led all other states in completion of its portion of the superhighways since the program was initiated in 1956.

Texas' program also has operated at costs substantially below the national average.

**PARKS A MESS** — Texas State Parks are a mess. Some of them have no excuse for existence.

That's the jarring report given the Texas State Parks Board by a newspaper reporter who toured the parks system.

Paul Timmons, associate editor of the Amarillo Globe-Times and News, reports that none of the parks are properly planned and many of them are little more than city parks in rural — and far — locations.

Others serve only to give access to lakes or streams. Some don't equal the competition of nearby resorts.

**SHIVERS MUM** — Former Gov. Allan Shivers is having nothing to do with the November election for governor of Texas. Shivers says he plans to make no public endorsement of any candidate. He is a friend of both candidates.

"I've stayed out of this so long for a few more weeks," Shivers openly supported Jack Cox, this year's Republican nominee for governor, when Cox ran unsuccessfully two years ago in the Democratic primaries against Lieut. Gov. Price Daniel.

Ex- ample: Farm normal yield 32 bu. times 188 per bu. equals \$5.76 per acre times number acres diverted.

The compensatory payment will be determined in this man- ner: The farm normal yield times 188 per bu. times the measured acres of wheat on the farm (not to exceed the permitted acres). Example: 32 bu. normal yield x 188 per bu. equals \$5.76 per acre times the acres in wheat.

Farms that have a 1963 allot- ment of less than 15 acres but have a three year average of more than the allotment may par- ticipate in the diversion program and receive diverted acreage payments, and may also receive price support and compensatory payments provided the planted acres of wheat is not in excess

(December 22, 1961) After Connally's victory over Yarborough, Time said "His mentor Lyndon Johnson thus tightened his grip on the Texas Democratic organization." (June 8, 1962)

# Students Build A Cell

It includes teacher and student manuals with demonstration material that enables high school students to observe the behavior of magnetic domains under an applied magnetizing force. It is the first time this experiment has been made possible outside a university or industrial research laboratories.

Mark Vincent, Southwestern Bell engineer from Dallas, recently demonstrated these new science teaching units for science teachers and administrators in this area.

Teaching material and experiments on solar energy were designed especially for advanced high school science students by D. M. Chapin, Bell Labs scientist and one of the inventors of the Bell Solar Battery.

Working under supervision of their science teachers, Floydada students will make a working solar battery cell from raw materials. The cell will convert sunlight into usable electrical energy, just as solar cells are doing today on satellites to provide power for electronic gear.

The science teaching unit on magnetism was developed by E. A. Nesbit of Bell Labs. Bell scientists believe this material is the first to present current theory on this complex subject in terms a high school student can understand. The material also includes latest information on magnetic domains that has not yet been widely published.

These science units are made available by Southwestern Bell as part of its program to stimulate

interest in scientific studies in secondary schools. K. E. Garrett, manager, said. Bell Scientists worked with leading educators to prepare the materials.

Baxter attended a meeting at Holiday Inn at Lubbock about a month ago when arrangements were made to bring the experiment to the Floydada School.

The physics class will have demonstrations and displays to show to the public in early March during Public Schools Week.

Funeral service for Ronald Lynn (Ronnie) Flenniken, 17 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. T. W. Flenniken of Hamlin, formerly of the Lakeview community in Floyd County, were held Monday in the First Baptist Church in Hamlin. Burial was in Hamlin East cemetery.

Young Flenniken died Saturday afternoon in Hamlin Memorial Hospital shortly after the car in which he was riding hit a west bound diesel engine train four miles northwest of Hamlin. Two teen-age girls, also occupants of the car, were injured. A 17 year old girl, driver of the vehicle, is in serious condition and the 15 year old girl passenger is reported in fair condition.

Ronnie was born in Levelland and attended school at Lakeview and the 8th grade in Floydada Junior High. His father was manager of the Lakeview Gin for several years.

Ronnie was a junior in Hamlin High School and junior director and member of the American Junior Rodeo Assn. He had won numerous awards in junior rodeos and was a nominee for the Bob Crosby award, a top prize for young rodeo performers.

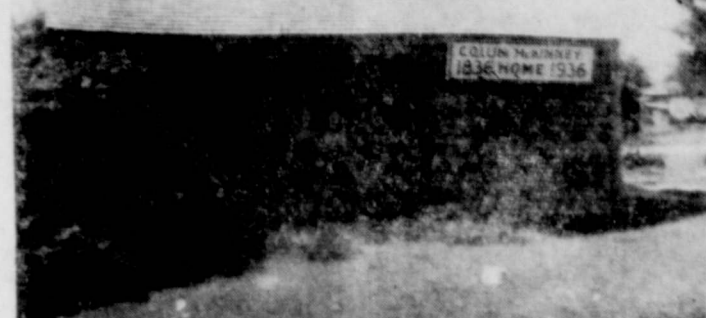

THE HOUSE ABOVE contains a history of Texas which dates back to the year it was built in 1836 by Collin McKinney, who signed the Texas Declaration of Independence. McKinney was the great great grand-father of Tom Stout of Floydada. The original home still stands in Van Alstyne, Tex., and this portion was moved to McKinney, Tex., located in McKinney Park as a memorial building. The town of McKinney was named for McKinney. The structure was built without nails using pegs instead. The fireplace chimney spans seven feet across and the building houses its original furniture bought in 1836 by Col. McKinney and his bride. The couple were also married in the home. The other portion of the house stands in Van Alstyne where Mr. and Mrs. Collin Milam reside. Milam and Mr. Stout are second cousins. The picture is priceless to the Stout family as are many others and also documents and other important papers dating back in prior years of 1836. People standing in front of the building are identified as a cousin of Stouts with her children.

### Historical Home In Collin County Links Local Man

Mr. Milam and Stout are second cousins. Jefferson Milam, McKinney's son-in-law, was a nephew of Col. Ben Milam, leader of the Texas volunteers who drove the Mexicans from San Antonio in 1835. Col. Milam died in the battle of San Antonio.

Collin Milam, now 78, was reared by his grandmother after he became an orphan at the age of four months. Most of his life has been spent at the present home. The house remains virtually as it was when built. One small room has been added and the house has been reroofed three times.

Historians and antique collectors get interested once they enter the home. In almost every room can be found articles that date from Texas Revolution days. One of Milam's most prized possessions is a walking cane given to Collin McKinney by Sam Houston. The head of the cane was made from a deer's antler.

Many old pieces of furniture are in the house and one trunk contains letters mailed to McKinney during the days after the revolution. It has been years since Mr. Stout has visited the home place, but it is his wish to return someday and visit the Milams who plan to spend their remaining days at the historical home.

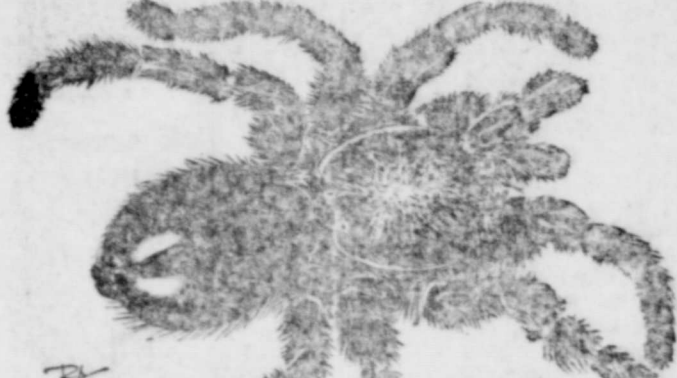

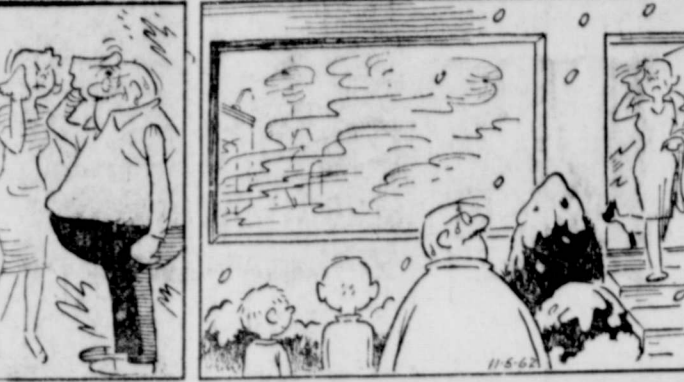

# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

AUSTIN — Attorney General Will Wilson issued an opinion that the Constitution Party of Texas cannot nominate members for district offices at its state convention.

But the opinion came a bit late. Election ballots already have been printed, and the tardy nominations are listed.

Secretary of State P. Frank Lane made the request for an opinion on Constitutional Party nomination procedure in September. The "third party" didn't release its list of nominations until early summer, whereas Republicans and Democrats had to comply with a law that says candidates must announce by the second Monday of February.

According to Wilson, the same law applies to the Constitutional Party.

**HIGH COST OF LEARNING** — Tuition for Texas' 20 state universities and colleges may be doubled by the time members of the 1964 high school graduating classes are ready to enroll.

Texas Commission on Higher Education decided to ask the Legislature to double tuition — from \$50 to \$100 a semester — and increase appropriations by 55 percent during 1964-65.

Commission approved a \$4,000,000 boost in the previously recommended biennial budget of \$182,000,000, agreed to raise college presidents' salaries, and ordered its staff to look into the

On October 9, the State was in the red to the tune of \$41,250,349. By October 24, the deficit was \$54,074,283.

At a meeting of the Texas Mapping Advisory Committee, Harry Clark, director of the Texas Industrial Commission, said that topographic maps are very necessary to industries considering sites here.

Chairman John J. Vandertulp said the maps are essential to industrial and agricultural planning.

Topographic maps are those that show the physical features of a region in minute detail.

When a mapping program of 73 counties is completed, Texas will be half-mapped.

**ATTRACTIVE NUISANCES** — State Health Department officials issued a warning against the use of arsenious acid containers for water bottles.

Field engineers recently found about 40 of the one-gallon sized containers along the highway in Collin County. One had about one and one-half ounces of arsenic left in it — enough to kill more than 100 people.

Death of three members of a Josephine farm family was attributed to accidental poisoning caused by drinking water out of a container which had been used for cotton defoliation.

"These plastic bottles are attractive nuisances — and deadly," an official said.

**RADIATION DETECTION PLAN** — An officer of the Texas Department of Public Safety soon should be able to help out at the scene of a radiation accident or incident anywhere in the State in about 30 minutes, Col. Homer Garrison Jr. announced.

Agency appointed an advisory committee to assist in carrying out the terms of the 1962 Man-gan on October 29 is expected to provide enough trained men to handle any emergency.

Recently Governor Daniel repeated that opinion by saying that the pledge on the primary ballot does not obligate anyone "legally or morally" to vote for the Democratic ticket in the general election.

That is an opinion handed down by Gov. Price Daniel when he was attorney general of Texas. State Republican chairman Tad Smith of El Paso, and other Republican leaders, are using the "Democratic" decision as grounds to urge voters to vote however they please on November 6, regardless of party primary pledges.

Daniel's opinion noted that the courts of Texas have answered this question by holding "that the pledge... does not create a legal obligation."

**MILITARY DUTY RULING** — State employees requesting another year of active duty with the 49th Armored Division can have their jobs back when they get out.

So says Attorney General Will Wilson.

He held that those staying on for another year "are entitled to restoration of state employment."

Many members of the 49th Division were recalled to active duty when the Berlin situation became tense last year. Most of the men were released in August. Some requested and were assigned another year of active duty.

**LONG BALLOT** — Texas' general election ballot will be about as long as a newspaper.

November 6 ballot will contain not only the lists of party nominees for congressional, state, legislative, district, county and precinct offices, but also "for" and "against" questions about 14 proposed constitutional amendments.

**NO WAITING** — There is no longer a waiting list of applicants for land purchase under the veterans' land program, says Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler.

Sadler said that 70,000 veterans were given land-buying opportunities the past 21 months.

Commissioner reported a backlog of 40,672 veterans on January 1, 1961. Many of them had been waiting their turn for three years.

A total of 116,885 applications have been received since the program began operation in 1949.

**VALUABLE MARKERS** — Historical markers are worth their weight in gold according to the Texas Highway Department. Three tourist markers recently erected to mark significant historical sites are proving this.

THD says each of the markers earns nearly its original cost in added tourist revenues each month. Original cost was about \$630 each. They will earn this cost ten times in a year. Each marker is credited with earning an average of \$17.55 per day.
