





# Austin Gets New Public Safety Center

AUSTIN—Col. Homer Garrison Jr. announced today ground has been broken for a \$630,000 underground state emergency center at the Texas Department of Public Safety. The center will be capable of withstanding a 20 megaton nuclear bomb blast three to four miles distant.

The project, jointly financed by the state and the federal government, will cover some 12,000 feet of floor space and will be capable of uninterrupted full activation when impending operation for approximately 30 or threatened disaster is evident. The center will be manned and operated on a 24-hour schedule at all times, providing monitoring service on all warning channels and will be maintained on a constant ready basis for activation when impending disaster is evident.

The message center facilities replacing the existing state control center in the basement of the DPS headquarters where many statewide police communications are coordinated since 1954. The new structure will be large enough to accommodate approximately 120 persons, with dormitory facilities. It will be equipped with modernizing with a kitchen, dining area, infirmary and office space for members of the Governor's Defense and Disaster Council and key personnel of the Department of Public Safety.

The center will have its own independent water supply from a well capable of pumping 500 gallons per minute, an independent fuel supply and auxiliary power for utilities. It also will be equipped with a decontamination area at the entrance for exposed persons or equipment entering the center, and it will have blast proof doors at the entrance and emergency exit.

### Low Cost Loans Available For Recreation Sites

L. J. Cappelman, State Director of Farmers Home Administration, today announced that loans may now be made to farmers and ranchers who personally manage and operate no larger than family farms for providing recreational facilities which will enable these family farmers to supplement their farm income.

Loan funds for recreational enterprises may be used to develop land and water, construct buildings, and to purchase land, equipment and other related recreational items including the payment of operating expenses. Recreational enterprises which may be financed on family farms include camping grounds, swimming facilities, riding stables, vacation cottages and lodges, lakes and ponds for boating and fishing, docks, nature trails, picnic grounds and hunting preserves.

Each loan is scheduled for repayment within a period consistent with the borrower's ability to repay, taking into account his income from farming, recreation enterprises and any other income he may have. The maximum repayment period of the loan depends on what the funds are used for and the security provided for the loan. Repayments on loans secured by real estate may not exceed 40 years. Repayments on loans for non-real estate purposes may not exceed 7 years. The interest rate is 5 per cent per year on the unpaid principal.

The county or area committee of the Farmers Home Administration determines the eligibility of the applicant. The committee consists of three farmers who know rural farming and credit conditions in the local area. Technical management assistance will be provided with each loan. The amount of the loan depends upon the applicant's needs and repayment ability. A borrower's total principal indebtedness for intermediate-term FIA loans and equipment and operating expenses may not exceed \$35,000. A long-term loan secured by real estate may not exceed the normal value of the farm and other security, minus any debts against this property and may not exceed the amount certified by the county committee. In no case may such a loan plus other debts against the security property exceed \$60,000.

A farmer may apply at the County Farmers Home Administration Office located at 202 Bishop Building, Floydada, Texas. There he will be given an application and the supervisor will be glad to answer any questions he may have.

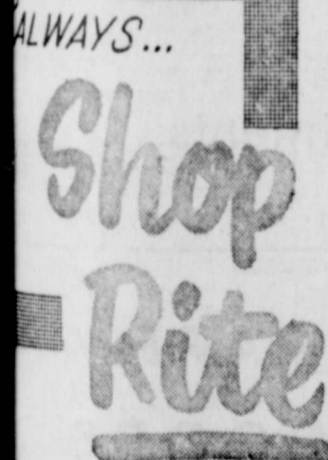

### District Treats 1393 Acres Of Noxious Weeds

As of November 1 the Floyd County Noxious Weed Control District has treated 1393 acres of weed with various types of herbicides. 376 acres of this has been with soil sterilants. Treatments were made on farm land, railroad, highway, and county rights-of-way.

The District has great hopes of reaching 1500 acres for the year. They would like to encourage farmers to mark or stake patches of bindweed as they lay their crop land by, so that they can be treated this winter.

The District and the Experiment Stations have found that plant growth is not necessary to get good kills with the soil sterilizing herbicides, this winter is as good as any time to make treatment. The District is also equipped to sterilize fence rows and implement parking lots and is encouraging farmers to do this type of work this winter.

4 envelopes gelatin  
1 cup water  
Sifted gelatin in water  
2 cups orange juice  
2 cups sugar

Heat juice to simmer, add sugar, stir until dissolved. Add softened gelatin and heat until this dissolves. Remove from heat; chill until gelatin begins to set.

4 No. 2 1/2 cans fruit cocktail  
1 tall can crushed pineapple  
1 package marshmallows, quartered  
2 cups pecans

Mix and put into refrigerator to chill  
1 quart whipping cream, whipped until stiff  
1 pint Miracle Whip salad dressing

Fold salad dressing into whipped cream.  
When gelatin mixture begins to congeal add it to the fruit mixture, then immediately

add whipped cream mixture. Pour into containers with lids to freeze.  
NOTE (This recipe is for 50 servings; it may be divided by four for smaller amounts. Add cherries and juice for pink color by replacing some of orange juice.)

grated rind of 1 lemon  
1/2 cup milk

Cream butter and sugar. Add eggs and beat until light and fluffy. Sift dry ingredients. Add nuts and lemon peel, then milk. Put into loaf pan and bake for 1 hour at 350 degrees F.

**GLAZE:**  
Mix juice of 1 lemon and 1/4 cup of sugar. Pour over cake while hot.

Cake is best if let stand 24 hours before using.

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### Packaged Hospitals On In Texas

Each unit - already crated for instant shipment into stricken areas, is a complete 200-bed affair with facilities for three operating rooms, a pharmacy, X-ray service, clinical laboratory, sterilizing room, central supply room, and electrical power supply. Each hospital weighs 24,000 pounds and contains 8,000 individual pieces of equipment, including a 1500-gallon water tank and pump for emergency water supplies. There are also complete medical supplies, from surgical cans and gowns to ether and alcohol which are separately packaged and marked to avoid fire hazards.

Local civil defense authorities provide refrigeration for items such as insulin and blood derivatives. Antibiotics and other materials with expiration dates are labeled "deteriorative" to indicate they must be periodically inspected and rotated.

State civil defense and health authorities estimate that emergency hospitals will have to provide at least half the total hospital beds following a major emergency, since most conventional hospitals are located in metropolitan centers which may be targets of enemy action.

Doctors and nurses to staff emergency hospitals will be recruited from the community where the unit is installed for service according to present planning. (A weekly feature of the Health Education Division, State Department of Health.)

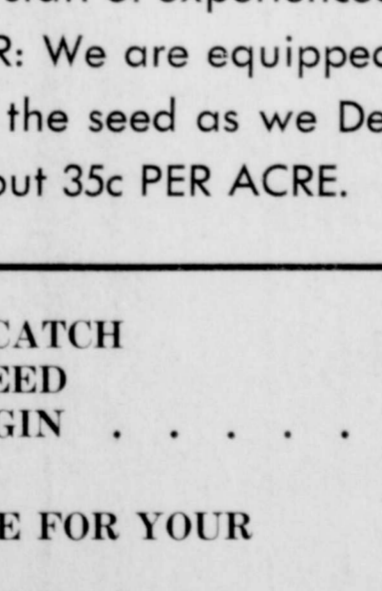

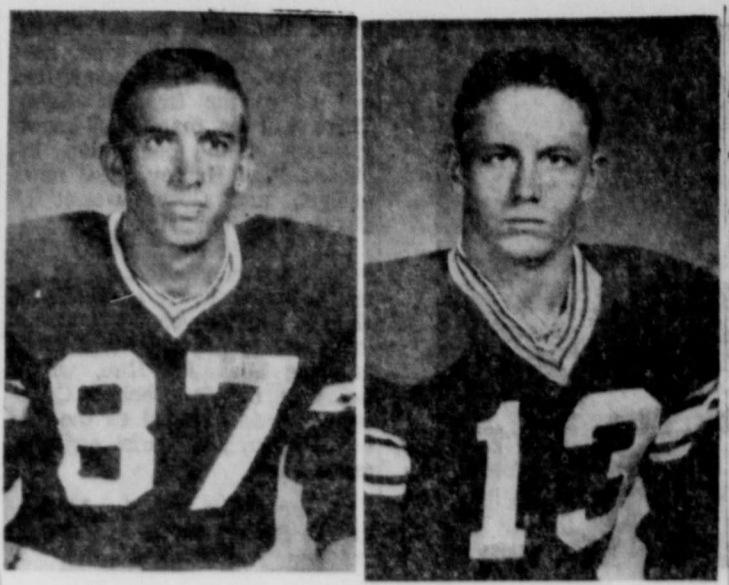

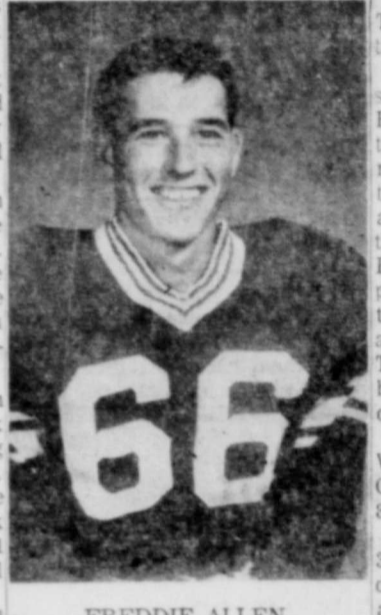

### Bonus Deer Tags Are Explained

SAN ANGELO, Nov. 1962 — Three deer tags on the 1962 Hunting License have caused some confusion among hunters. An explanation from Henry Burkett, Region 1 Director for the Game and Fish Commission should clarify their limit.

A BONUS (or third) deer tag is attached to hunting licenses so hunters may legally kill as many as three deer in specific areas of unusually high deer populations.

In high deer populated areas landowners have been issued Antlerless Deer Permits by the Game and Fish Commission. Landowners are urged to harvest as many deer as the Game Department recommends, but the use of Antlerless Permits is solely at the landowner's discretion.

Hunters wishing to use their BONUS DEER TAG must acquire an Antlerless Deer Permit from the landowner on whose property they plan to hunt. If Antlerless Deer Permits are not available the BONUS DEER TAG CANNOT BE USED LEGALLY.

### Rural Housing Loans Now For Senior Citizens

Mr. L. J. Cappelman, State Director, Farmers Home Administration, advised the local County Supervisor, Mr. Alfred A. Harrison, that recent legislation amends Title V of the Housing Act of 1949 by adding new provisions which authorize loans and grants for moderate cost housing and related facilities for elderly persons and families in rural areas. It liberalizes some regulations on rural housing loans now being made by Farmers Home Administration and sets up new direct and insured loan programs.

This new legislation will be administered in Floyd County by USDA's Farmers Home Administration. Rural housing loans are made by this agency to farmers and other families living in rural areas who need improved housing and cannot qualify for credit from other sources.

One new provision will give those people, who are 62 years of age or over, special advantages not available under the earlier loan program. First, they can buy previously-occupied existing housing as well as improve their homes. Second, they can finance the cost of the building as well as the dwelling with wheat etc. The loan proceeds; other families must own the land on which to build the homes before they can apply for a loan. Third, co-signers may be used by elderly applicants who are deficient in their repayment ability. Like rural housing loans now being made by Farmers Home Administration, these direct loans will bear interest at the rate of 4 per cent and may be repaid over a period not exceeding 33 years.

## Floyd Has 460 Miles Of Pipe For Irrigation

Irrigation pipelines in Floyd County Soil Conservation District represent a considerable capital investment. Since the early 1950's landowners have installed over \$4,000,000.00 dollars worth of irrigation pipelines in Floyd County. This represents a distance of over 460 miles or when figured from Floydada this amount would reach to Houston, Texas.

During the past fiscal year with the continuing decline of our irrigation water level farmers have become more mindful in their efforts to conserve irrigation water. A total of 72.5 miles were installed on which Soil Conservation Service technicians assisted in planning and design of the irrigation delivery system. An irrigation pipeline must be installed so as to deliver the required quantity of water to each part of the system.

The location needs to be determined before any pipelines are installed so that the pipeline will fit into an overall irrigation system.

There is now a great variety of irrigation pipelines on the market to fit the individual needs of each farmer to select his preference lines.

The Soil Conservation Service technicians in the Floyd County Soil Conservation District will be glad to discuss the problems that might arise in the planning of your irrigation delivery system. Also the Great Plains Conservation Program and the A.C.P. Program offer cost-share benefits on pipelines that fit into a planned re-organized irrigation system. Plan ahead and help conserve water and soil resources that are so important to each of us.

### Management of Irrigation Water Important Phase

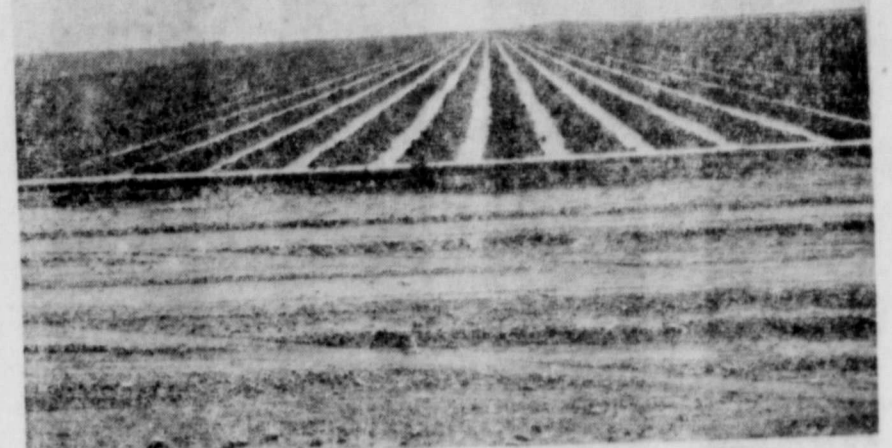



grow cattle fodder. In an unusual land conservation project in Algeria, CROP distributed wheat as part of the wages paid to Arabs who planted trees on barren, eroding hillsides. Tools and a tractor have been sent to an orchard project in Jordan and a CROP windmill is generating power in an Italian village.

Each harvest time, CROP conducts 650 community appeals in the United States. About 75,000 volunteers — farmers, clergymen and youth — canvass farmers in their respective states for corn, wheat, rice, beans, cotton and other commodities.

They have little difficulty in reaching their goals. "When our natural desire to help others in need is reinforced by a vehicle such as CROP, we gain the satisfaction of being a part of a force for good in the world," said an Iowa farmer who is a regular supporter.

Shipments are made only after careful analysis of the world situation by Church World Service. Arrangements are always flexible enough to permit re-routing of food shipments to areas hit by natural and man-made disasters.

Grains are sometimes sold and cash used to buy "self-help" materials or foodstuffs native to the recipient country. On one occasion, about 47,000 bushels of corn were exchanged for a high-protein soybean food, which had the advantage of less bulk and proportionately higher food value.

All aid is given solely on the basis of need, without question of race, creed or politics. To date, 29 countries have been aided by CROP's "ambassadors of peace."

## WHAT IS CROP?

Tell an American that two-thirds of the world's people go to bed hungry and chances are he won't believe you. Even if he does, he's likely to respond, "That's terrible, but what can I do about it?"

Individually, there is little he can do about it. But working together, Americans can share their abundance with the two billion persons who climb into bed (if they are lucky enough to have a bed) with empty stomachs.

Member churches of Church World Service — long concerned about the world's hungry — have adapted their shipping and overseas distribution facilities to handle foodstuffs collected in community appeals. The appeals are known as the Christian Rural Overseas Program (CROP).

Since 1947, CROP has handled \$14 million worth of supplies for export to relief agencies overseas. In addition, contributions have paid for the handling and distribution of a half-billion pounds of government-donated food valued at \$46 million.

Yet feeding hungry people for a few weeks does little to solve the problems that caused the hunger in the first place. Aware of this, CROP is gearing more of its aid toward "self-support" programs, especially in Latin America, the Middle East, the Congo, Korea and Hong Kong. Hundreds of the thousands of refugees from famine-struck Red China have already overtaken Hong Kong's food supply and made the situation critical.

Recently, a road project in southern Haiti was in danger of being abandoned because of a lack of funds. CROP offered food gifts as "work payments" and the project was completed. Not only were the road workers able to provide for their families and themselves in a dignified way, but the completed road connected a remote village to a main highway. Soon after, industry moved into the area, creating work for the unemployed of the village.

Expressing their gratitude in a letter to CROP, the villagers said that "aid in this form is a neighborly handshake, not a degrading hand-out."

In Greece, CROP contributions are giving crippled youths the opportunity to receive vocational training. For a Korean orphanage farm, CROP has earmarked a shipment of clover seed to

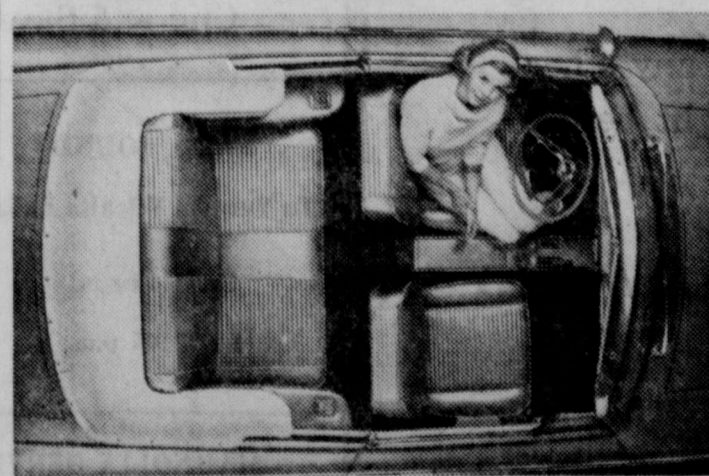
