Make Your Christmas Decorations Safe

Whatever you do, or are doing about Christmas decorations, be sure that they are safe. Christmas trees, especially when dry, will not be used for one season can burn easily. Buy a sprayed tree or spray it with anti-wilt or flame-retardant solution, and keep it in an cool place as possible. Keep the trunk in water or moist sand.

Check over your old Christmas lighting equipment for safety. If fall flower beds into nighttime you buy any new equipment, look beauty spots. When strings of lights are placed on the ground safety approval by the Underwriters Laboratories. In arranging the lights, avoid contact bulbs, the leaves and flowers to give and sockets with tinsel, cotton, evening color and beauty.

Other outdoor Christmas lights that have year-round uses include colored plastic lanterns and many types of garden equipment, such as projector spots and floods on stands or metal stakes. Shine light on house decorations or yard ornaments at Christmas time, and then use the same equipment to light trees, shrubs, other outdoor plants, and points of interest during other seasons of the year.

Concentrate your outdoor Christmas lighting and decorations in a few spots to create major and minor points of interest in a unified design. For example, outline a doorway, and brighten the area and highlight a door decoration by spotlighting it. Place two spotlights at angles on each side of the door and shield eyes of danger. You can avoid them behind shrubs so that light some hazards by disconnecting or equipment while repairing or re-guests when entering or leaving the house.

If you plan to outline a picture line with lights, use enough lights to make an effective show. Christmas light indoors and out. You can accomplish this in a year-round use, and the smart buyer will choose equipment that stagger the bulbs for even spacing.

Della Plains First, Second In Tournament

Della Plains teams took a first and second in their own basketball tournament last weekend in the local gym. The Della Plains girls team of Coach Josie Harper downed Olton 33 - 17 on Saturday for the championship.

The Della Plains boys of Coach Alvin Johnson lost in the finals to a tall Plainview team 47 - 37 to come in second in the meet.

In earlier action in the girls bracket Sudan won over Slaton 24 - 23; Snyder downed Plainview 36 - 18; Floydada won over Sudan 31 - 14; Olton took the measure of Snyder 25 - 21, and then playing for third place Snyder won over Sudan 36 - 33.

In the boys bracket Plainview beat Slaton 46 - 35; Olton won a 27 - 25 game from Sudan; Plainview took Snyder 53 - 37; Floydada bumped Olton 51 - 32; and then playing for third place it was Snyder 45 - Olton 30.

Concerned Over Income
Concerning reasons for raising the price supports, Nelson said USDA officials "simply reemphasized their concern for maintaining farm income and also indicated that a reappraisal of feed grain stocks and livestock production warranted the reconsideration."

The increased price support rates were confirmed later Monday in a wire service dispatch from College Station. It said the increases will be accomplished through higher loan and purchase agreement rates with no change in direct support payments from the previously announced figures.

W. T. Price, chairman of the Texas Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Committee, said Barley will be raised from 93 cents to 96 cents per bushel. Supports on oats will remain at 65 cents per bushel, and rye will be unchanged at \$1.07 per bushel.

The action is designed to assure that the twin objectives of the feed grain program—to improve farm income and to make progress in balancing feed grain supplies with national requirements—will be met. Price said.

Thi High Plains is the nation's top grain sorghum producing area, usually turning out around 60 per cent of the Texas crop and approximately 40 per cent of the U. S. production.

All Eligible For Loan

Under another change for next year, all grain actually produced by cooperating growers will be eligible for the storage loans. This year's program limited price support storage loans to the normal yield on the land kept in production.

Harp and Nelson said diverted acreage payments for 1963 will be left at the same level as was announced earlier.

This means that payments on the first 20 per cent of farm acreages diverted from grain sorghum next year will be at 20 per cent of the normal production on the idled acres times the county support rate.

Diverted acreage payments this year were based on 50 per cent of the so-called normal production on the first 20 per cent acreage cutback. Producers must take at least 20 per cent of their feed grain acreage out of production to gain compliance with the program.

On the second 20 per cent lay-out, which is optional, diverted acres payments next year will be based on 50 per cent of the normal yield times the county support rate. It was 60 per cent of the normal yield this year.

Harp said protests to the USDA over the feed grain program changes it had announced earlier "had been running high."

Floydada Residents enjoy Living In Trailer Homes



PERMANENT RESIDENTS — these Floydada "mobile home residents" have lived in Floydada for the past two and a half years and are beginning to feel at home. Mrs. E. F. Lake is pictured with her children at the door of their 55 foot trailer.

Observing that many Floydada families live in house trailers, a Hesperian reporter set out to interview some of them to see how they liked living in these "moving homes" and to learn something of their occupations.

Approximately 14 of Floydada's house trailer families have just moved here from Seminole and will be seismographing for Atlantic Refining Company until Spring. At present they are seismographing near Cone, south of Floydada. A total of 18 persons are employed by the company, four are not married.

The Leroy Liphams live in a 50 foot trailer in the northwest area of town. Mr. Lipham is in the paving business and the couple has two children. They have lived in a trailer for several years and find it is the best home for their type of business.

When the G. J. Luke family was interviewed, the reporter was surprised when told that the family had five children and an Aunt "at home" — however it was later explained that they all lived in two house trailers instead of the one 45 foot, two bedroom in which they were eating breakfast.

Luke and boy, Billy, have an enjoyable hobby which centers around seven greyhounds — they do a lot of rabbit hunting and have chased coyotes with the hounds. Luke is a paint contractor, and their trailers are located in the northwest area of Floydada.

The C. E. Durham family lives in a trailer house because they couldn't find a home for rent in Floydada and "because we just like living in one." Their trailer is 42 feet long and eight feet wide, it is a two bedroom and they have three children at home. Durham is a mechanic.

One of the nicest trailers in town is the over \$7,000 one owned by Mr. and Mrs. E. F. Lake. It is 55 feet long, and has three bedrooms with a large living room area. The Lakes have lived in trailers for the past six years — have lived in Floydada the past two and a half years. They moved here from Farmington, New Mexico. Lake is with the Dallas-Mavis Transport Company. They have two boys and a girl.

It is evident that "trailer house folk" make good citizens of any community. They join or attend the town's churches, work in the children's school activities and most are big sport fans.

The George Selmans' moved here about a month ago from Seminole with the Atlantic crew. They live in a one bedroom modern trailer and they have a pet named Peter, a parakeet. Mrs. Selman brags about the time they lived in a town "a whole year" without moving! She is a native of Billings, Montana, and he is a native of Fort Worth. They enjoy the conveniences of TV, and like most of the trailers have air conditioning for the summer time.

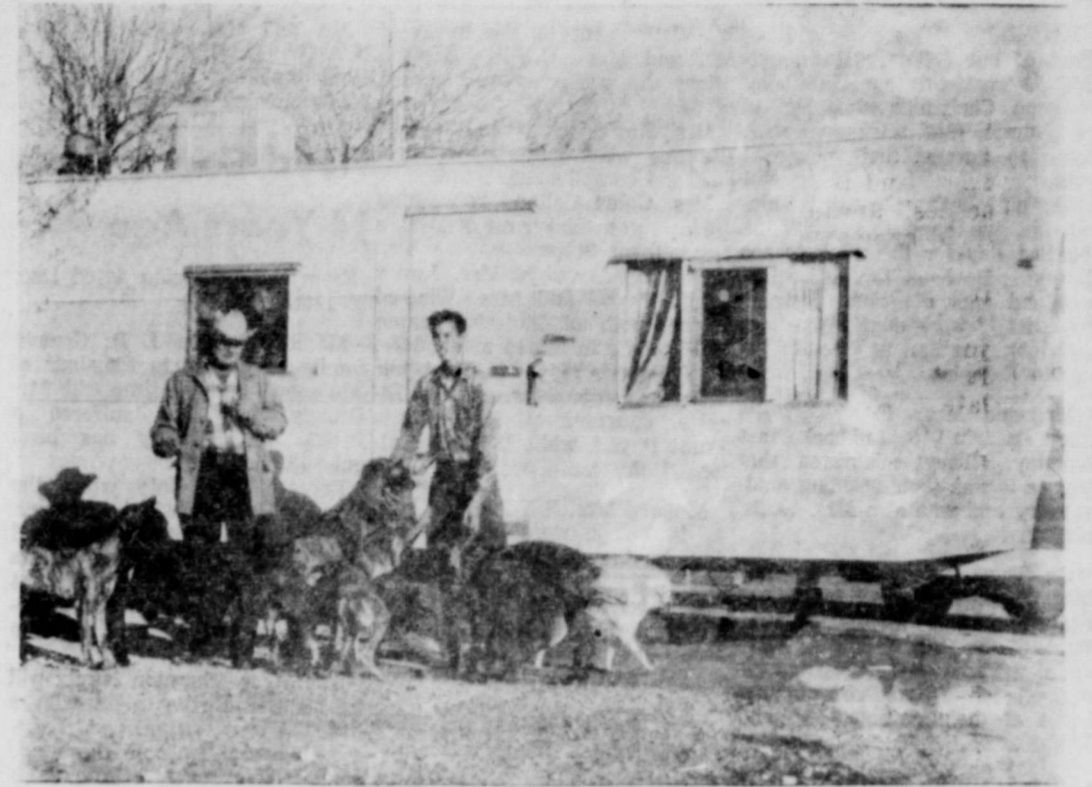
Mrs. Selman said that Floydada people were friendly and that they were enjoying their stay here. She said that they moved on an average of every month or six weeks, but hoped to be here until February or March.

The J. C. Singers, like the Selmans live in the Hollums trailer court in the southeast area of Floydada and occupy a 55 foot trailer. Mrs. Singers said their first trailer was 32 feet long and they "just love" the one in which they now live. Singer is a gin worker and was formerly a farmer north of Floydada. They have no children at home, but enjoy the large trailer when some of their children visit them. It is a two bedroom style. They lived in their first trailer in Roswell, New Mexico.

Another Atlantic seismographer interviewed was Al Auer, Al and boys were home watching TV while the wife was out shopping. Al said this was his fifth move for 1952. Their trailer is 42 feet long and a two bedroom. Al said that he was here in 1950, when his crew was seismographing for Atlantic — so it's his second time to live in Floydada. He also lives in the Hollums trailer court. He has been seismographing for the past nine years.

The Revis McGrew family has lived in a trailer house for the past three years. They recently moved to Floydada from Louisville, Kentucky. He is the director of music and education at the First Baptist Church. The McGrews have three children and their trailer home is a three bedroom, 55 footer. McGrew explained that although trailer houses seemed high priced, it must be remembered that a person buying a trailer house also receives his furniture, drapes, etc. in the deal.

The McGrews enjoy air conditioning, central heat and even have enough room for their piano.

County Agent Quizzes Lions Club About Floyd County

County agent Cecil Lewis gave wife demanded more services along with the food product. Lewis also mentioned that business people complained about farmers being subsidized and he related the amount of subsidy farmers received in comparison with the post office department, airlines, Maritime Commission and other business concerns.

The questions and the answers are as follows: The number of farms in Floyd County, 953; This is a decrease of how much since 1954, 20 percent; The average size of the farm unit is 651 acres; Approximate land area in Floyd County is 635,520 acres; The average value of land and buildings for each farm is \$139,264; The highest income producing crop is cotton; Income produced from crops is 95 percent of the total agricultural income in Floyd County. The latest figures show that Floyd County ranks 8th in agricultural income.

Following the quiz Lewis spoke on the importance of farmers and business men understanding each others problems. He said that 11 percent of Texas population were farmers and that two-fifths of Texas people are directly related with the state's agriculture.

He explained that the cost of the farmer's product was not the reason that food products had increased in price, but that it was due to the fact that the middleman (packager and processor) increased his costs as the house-

hold

In closing Lewis said, "progressive agriculture means progressive businesses and communities."

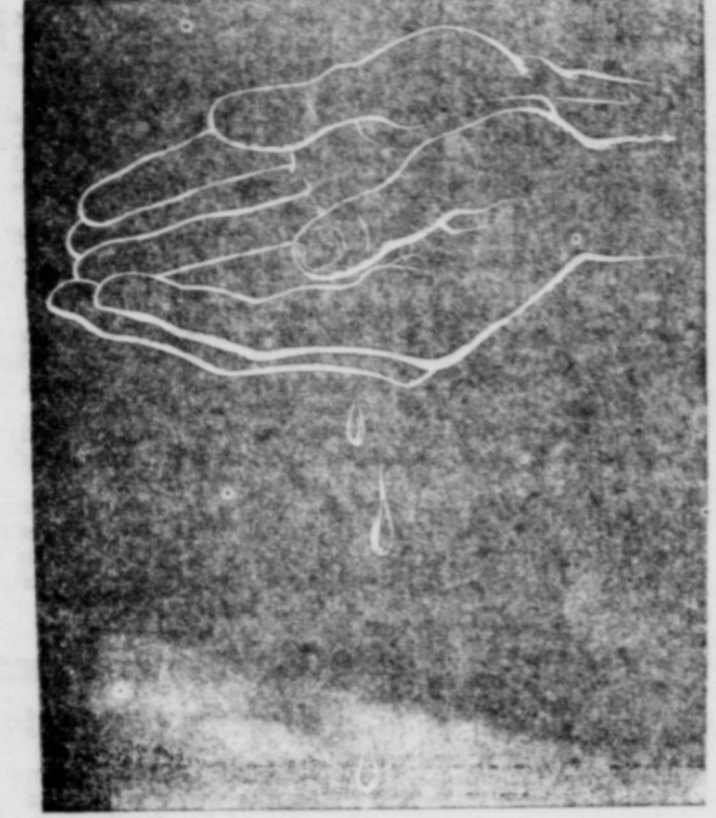

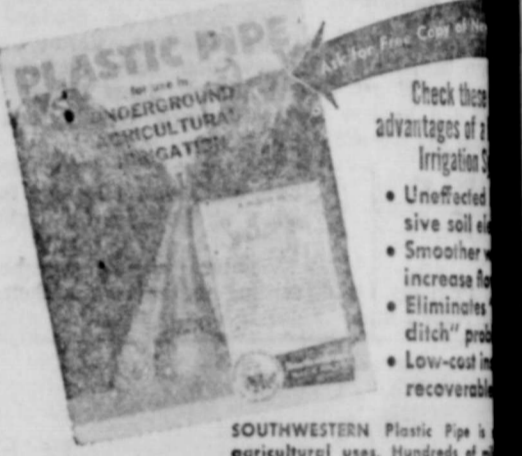

S. L. Powell Retires After 46 Years As Rural Carrier

Sherrill L. Powell, local rural mail carrier, is retiring effective December 31, 1962, after serving the people in Floyd County since June 1, 1915.

In commenting on his retiring, Mr. Powell said "I wish to say that it has been my good pleasure to serve some of the best routes in Texas and the best patrons to be found anywhere. Retiring is something we all look forward to but it is not quite like we have dreamed it would be. Martha and I are thankful for all the friends we have where we have lived and worked and especially thankful that we have reached this goal together. We want to thank the patrons on my route for being so kind and considerate and shall miss seeing you from day to day."

Mr. Powell was born in Eulogy, Bosque County on Dec. 20, 1892. He is the son of the late Dr. and Mrs. W. H. Powell. His father served as a physician and surgeon and practiced in the northern part of Bosque County, western Johnson County, and in Somervell County for several years. He later moved to Meridian, then to Glen Rose, before moving back to Meridian in later years.

Mr. Powell's great grandfather, George Powell, was one of the organizers of Bosque County in 1854. The settlement where the Powells lived was called Powelldale and was down the Brazos River from Kopperl. Much of the land they owned is now inundated by Lake Whitney.

The rural mail carrier and Miss Martha Wright of Glen Rose were married on Sept. 15, 1911. During the fall of 1912 they moved to Meridian where he taught a rural school for the next four years.

Mr. Powell relates that he was not happy teaching school for those days a teacher was unemployed several months during the year.

A rural route vacancy at Meridian came up so Mr. Powell decided to try for it. Thirty applicants took the examination but Mr. Powell got the appointment. He served there from July 1, and Mrs. Johnny West of Floyd, 1916 until April 20, 1939 when he

transferred to Slaton in order that two of the children could attend Texas Tech. He was mail carrier at Slaton from May 1, 1939 until Oct. 31, 1941. Mr. Powell went back to Kopperl in Bosque County in November. He said everything was so unsettled in 1941 and he was homesick too.

Mr. Powell recalled he could see World War II coming on and he said he would never forget what a wet year it was. However in May, 1945 he came back to West Texas and the Plains and started work at the Floydada Post Office on June 1, 1945 and retiring after 46 and one-half years in the rural service.

Mr. and Mrs. Powell have four daughters and one son; twelve grandchildren and two great grandchildren. The children are Mrs. B. J. Darden of Denton; Mrs. Harold Williams and Mrs. Travis Ray of Grand Prairie; Mrs. W. J. Mangold of Lockney; Mr. and Mrs. Fred Marble who went to Weatherford last Saturday for the funeral services of his uncle, the Rev. John Burgett, later went on to Dallas where they spent several days, coming
