Johnson Reports Annual Business and Financial Forecast For 1963

Business situation will vary in different industries, and in different cities. Some will boom; some will find the going better than a year ago. The high level of activity in 1962 will not be repeated in 1963 to show a moderate decline in business. If so it should come in the second or third quarter, with recovery in the fourth quarter, followed by a good 1964.

Disposable personal income will remain high. With increased savings deposits and little change in the cost-of-living, the public should continue to spend freely, especially if merchants maintain their advertising outlays.

Inventories will remain about the same during 1963. But government spending will increase over \$3 billion — largely on defense — and \$2 billion on new roads.

All this means that business and employment for your city in 1963 will depend largely upon the attitude of its leading businessmen. If they will be optimistic...

Over 69,000 Bales Of Cotton Ginned In Floyd County

The Texas Employment Commission reported that 69,027 bales of cotton had been ginned in Floyd County as of noon last Friday. Due to inclement weather, the county's gins have been unable to catch up on the harvest operation and agriculture officials estimate that over 80,000 bales have possibly been ginned to date.

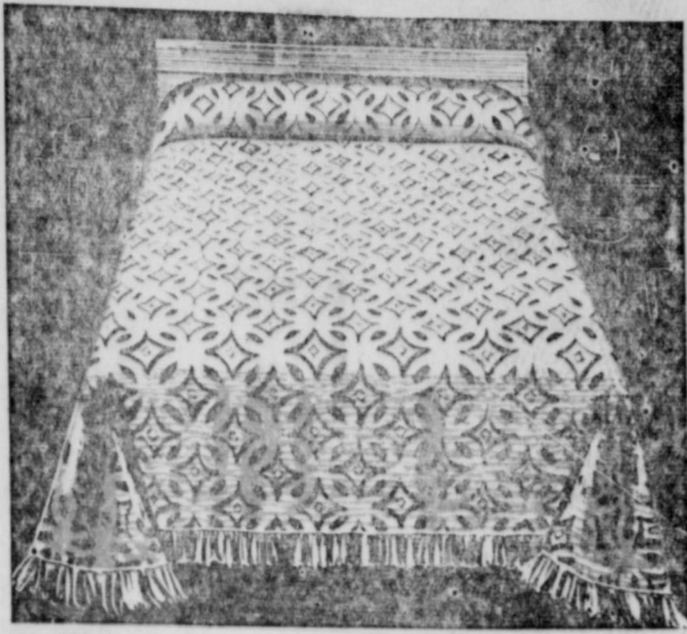

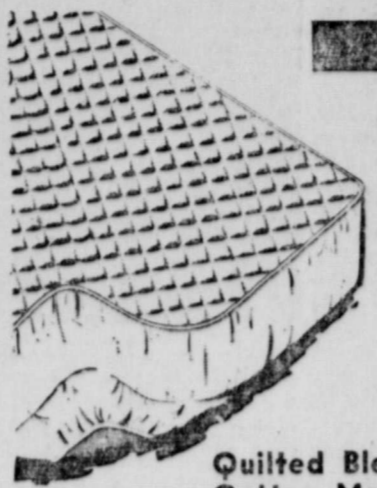

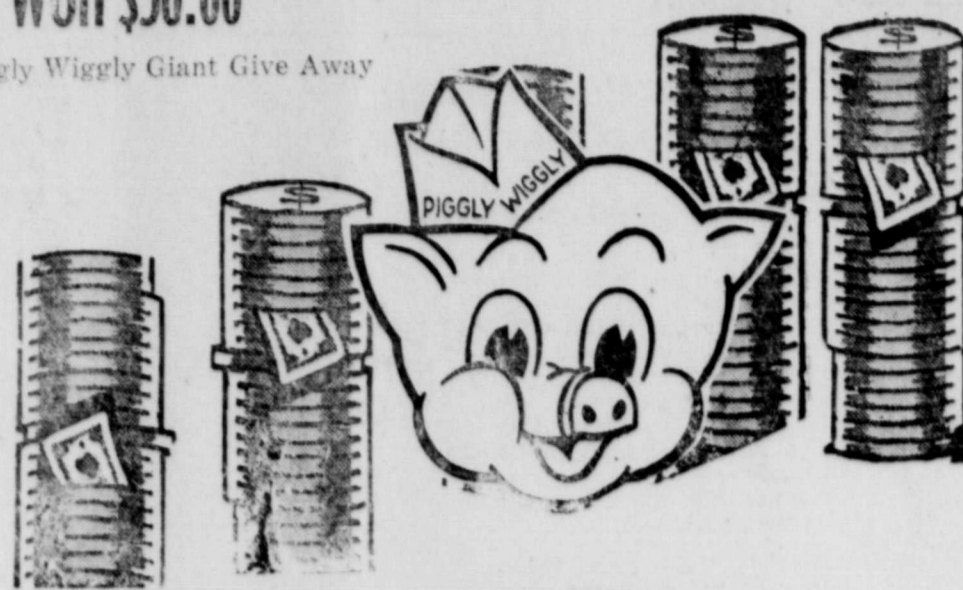

Witnesses' Assembly January 11

Jehovah's Witnesses' mid-winter assembly for Texas Circuit No. 9 will be held in Lubbock, January 11-13.

Each of the 16 congregations from Wichita Falls to Hobbs and from Lamesa to Plainview, will make a report of their ministerial activity for the past six months. An analysis will be made of the circuit's weaknesses and ways considered to bring the weaknesses up to circuit and national levels.

The presiding minister, Clarence W. Hall, of the Plainview congregation, said, "According to the 1962 annual service report ending last August, the 4,564 congregations of Jehovah's Witnesses in the United States had an eight per cent increase in the number of Witnesses preaching and teaching the good news of the kingdom."

In the 189 lands where the ministry work is done by Jehovah's Witnesses, Hall said, there was a 4.1 percent increase over last year in the number of those preaching "publicly and from house to house". He said this included 12 Communist dominated countries and troubled areas where reports were incomplete. The semi-annual circuit assembly carries the theme, "Copy the Master's Zeal."

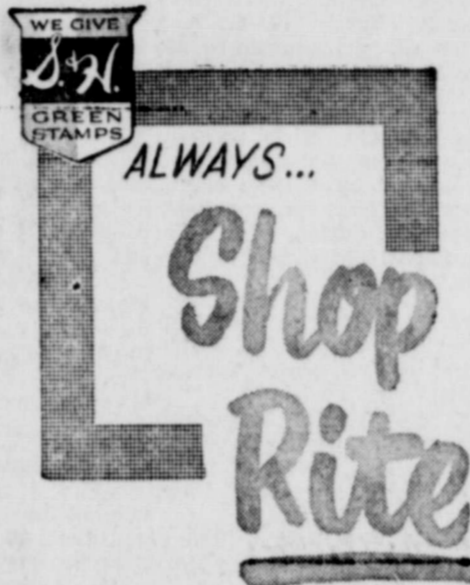

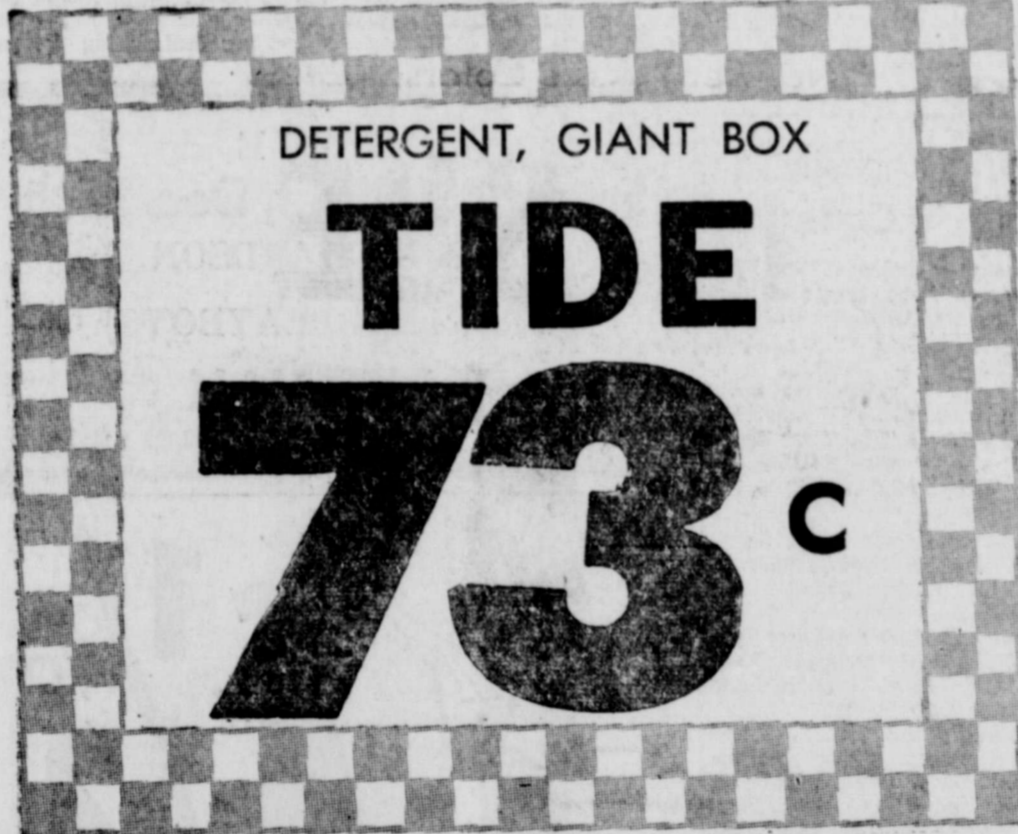

Veterans To Receive Early Insurance Pay

More than five million Veterans will share in the early payment of the regular Government Insurance Dividends for 1963, the total of which will amount to more than 327 MILLION DOLLARS. Included in this total will be some 23 MILLION DOLLARS, which will go to World War II Veterans who have Government Insurance Policies in force. More than 15 MILLION DOLLARS will go to Veterans of World War I. Also, included will be some 90 MILLION DOLLARS, which will be paid as a Special Dividend to Veteran Policy-holders of World War II. All of the regular 1963 Dividends, also the Special Dividend, are to be paid in JANUARY 1963. The President made the announcement of this accelerated payment on Thanksgiving Day. He said that this plan is designed to help the Veterans with their Christmas bills, and at the same time, it will give the Nation's economy a needed boost. All regular Insurance Dividends are normally paid annually on the anniversary date of each individual Policy which is in force. These payments will be automatic, and Veterans SHOULD NOT WRITE TO THE VA ABOUT THEM.

A new baby often requires adjustment on the part of older children in the family, too. Actually, it is normal for a young child to be jealous of a new baby in the home.

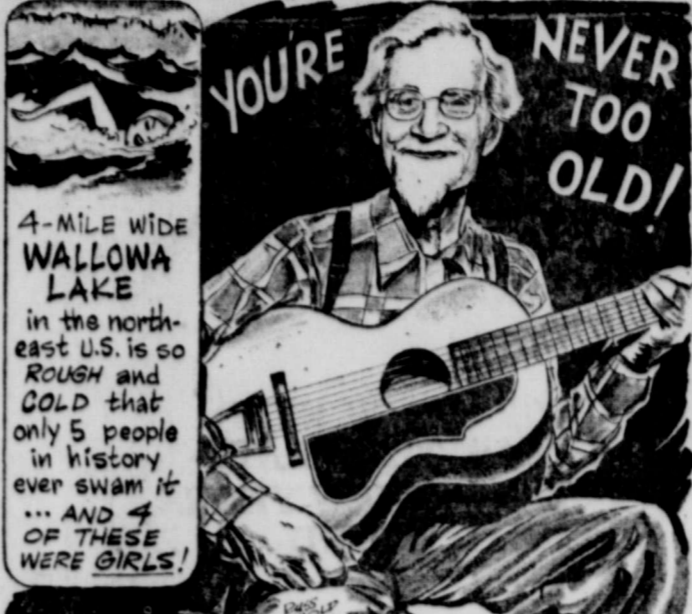
Child care specialists tell us that every child develops at his own rate of speed, and that comparisons with other children are not wise.

days for processing. Q— I am a 60 percent single, disabled veteran and my October compensation check was \$132. I know this contained a retroactive special bonus payment. Now what will my regular monthly payment amount to?

A — Starting this month the payment will be \$123 a month. The old payment before the new law was passed was \$120.

Civil Service Reports

Public Law 87-730, approved October 11, 1962, provides for a FIVE PERCENT ANNUITY INCREASE effective January 1, 1963, to those persons who have retired from Civil Service, and to certain survivors. This Law also authorizes a further Annuity increase whenever the nationwide cost of living rises at least Three Per Cent. Even though the new law was passed, Congress has not yet provided the necessary funds for the increase. However it is expected that as soon as Congress convenes in January 1963, the necessary funds will be made available.

A large number of retired Civil Service employees are currently in receipt of VA Disability Pension. This increase in some instances will be sufficient to make their total income excessive. Such Veterans (or their survivors) should immediately notify Veterans Administration whenever they receive such increase, and cannot wait until the end of the year to report such increase, under terms of PL 86-211.

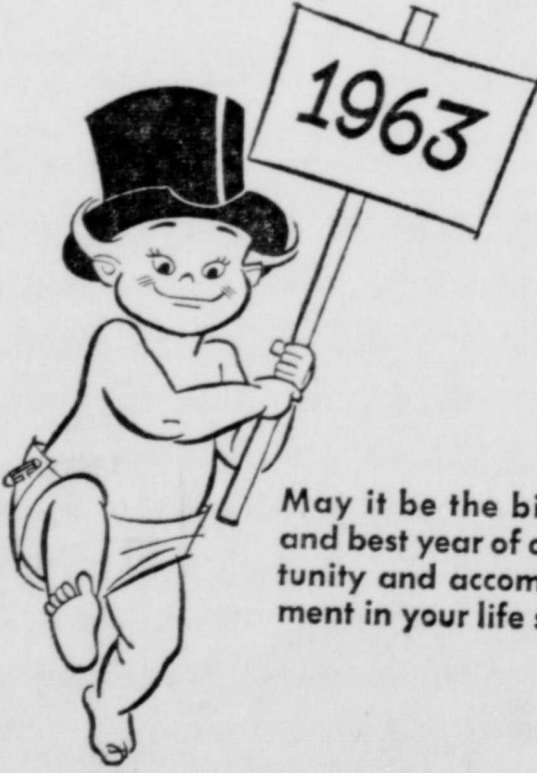

Q — Can I borrow money under a GI loan to build a fallout shelter on my property?
A — The Veterans Administration cannot under law loan money for such a purpose, however, if a house you wished to buy with a GI loan had a fallout shelter that would be taken into consideration in the assessment of the property.
Q — How long does it take to obtain a loan on my GI insurance?
A — On the average, if the policy is "clear" the loan is processed in three days. In one instance, however, in a dire emergency a Texas veteran borrowed \$4,600 to buy cattle feed and it took less than two hours. Be on the safe side and allow three

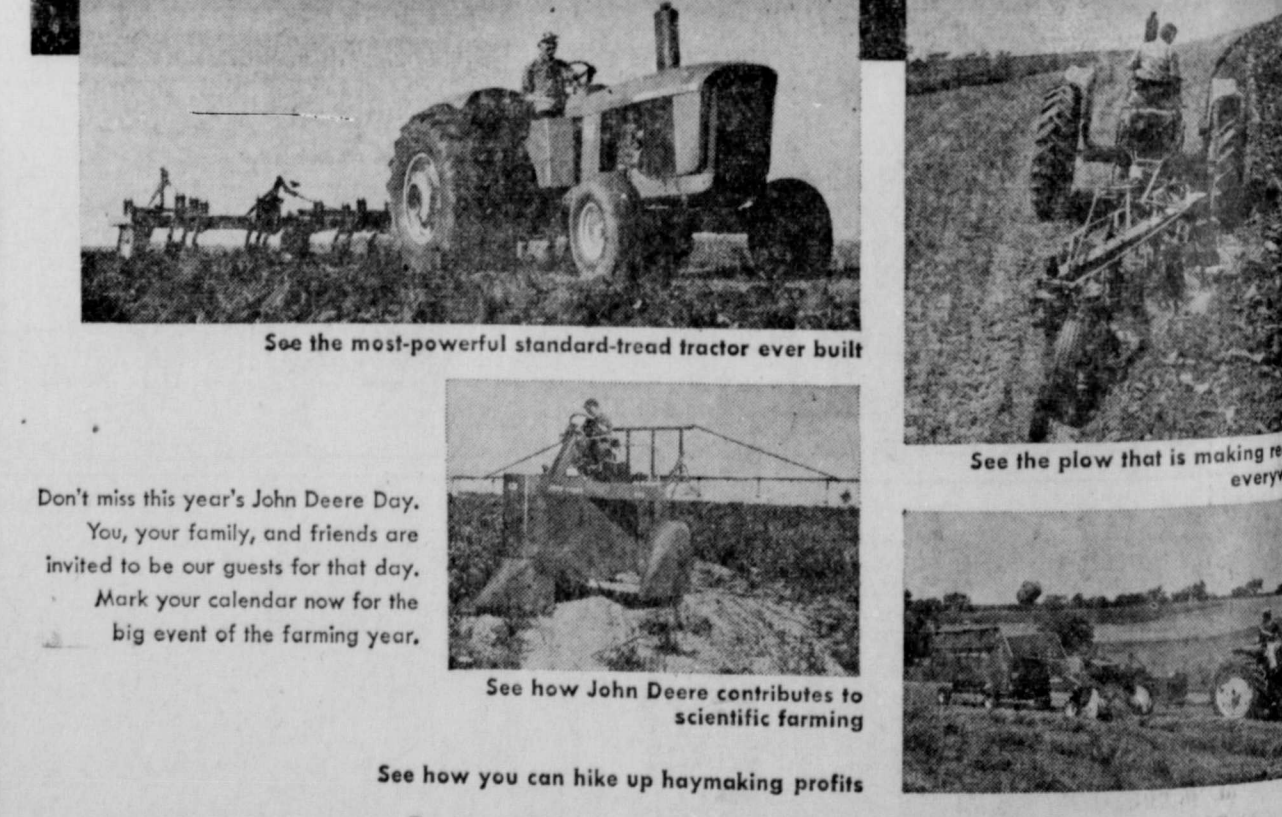

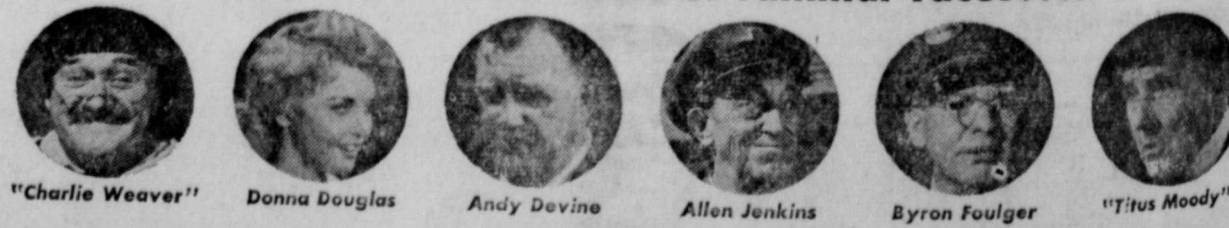
