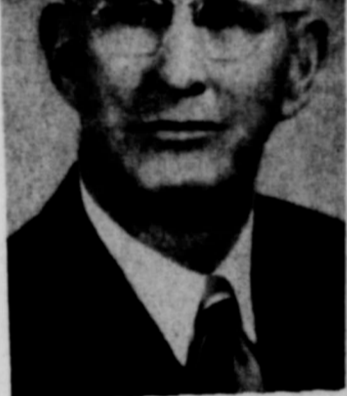

Lockney To Vote On Two Bonds

Lockney residents got the "go ahead" signal Tuesday for a bond election for a street paving and a new city hall project.

The election will be held March 15, according to Madge Jones, Lockney city secretary. The election will be a split ballot.

The two bonds call for a \$100,000 paving project and \$50,000 bond to build a new city hall for Lockney. Joe Smith of First Southwest Co., of Lubbock is handling the bond.

The street paving bond issue was presented to the voters in October of 1961 but was turned down. A minimum of 250 signatures were needed for the petition before the Council called the special meeting Tuesday.

Much interest has been shown since the first of the year in the bond election by civic groups, council members related.

PLANNED \$414,602 BUILDING

Floydada First Baptist Membership To Give Architect Go Ahead

The estimated \$414,602 building project will include the building of a new sanctuary that will seat 987 persons which will be built onto the side south of the present educational building and face south.

The sanctuary will also have a 2,074 square foot choir assembly room basement and a 3785 square foot balcony.

The older part of the church which now occupies the north end of the block will be dismantled and new church offices, library, kitchen and fellowship hall will be built. The three story present educational building will remain as it is.

When the entire building plan is finished the church will run from one end of the block to the other north and south.

Although no exact building date has been set a building committee headed by J. Hale is working toward the above plan with the architect.

A total of 44,747 square feet will be included in the overall plan when it is finished.

Further plans and the architect's drawing will be published by The Hesperian when final agreement has been reached.

Pastor Floyd Bradley said a building fund had already been started and a considerable amount of money would need to be added to it before actual construction begins.

ROVER! Saturday Is Dog Day

City officials have declared Saturday dog tag day in Floydada. The public is asked to bring their dogs to the City Hall and get a rabies shot and license tags at a combination price of \$3.00 per pet.

Dr. T. R. Thedford, veterinarian will be on hand from 10 to 12 in the morning and 1 to 4 in the afternoon to administer rabies shots.

City secretary Bill Feuerbacher said the shots would be \$2.00 and the license tag \$1.00. He said the rabies shot was ordinarily \$2.50 and that the pet owner could save 50c if he brings his pet in Saturday.

At present the South Plains school district's rate is \$1.50 plus 30c for bond indebtedness. An additional \$7,000 is being paid by the district to the Floydada school district as tuition for South Plains students who attend Floydada schools.

President of the South Plains school board H. S. Calahan, Jr. told The Hesperian at press time that his board had secured a lawyer and had been working with Representative Wells and State Senator Andy Rogers for introduction of the above bill.

Calahan said the extra \$7,000 being paid to Floydada was being voluntarily contributed by taxpayers above regular assessments.

A-To be eligible, he must have been discharged or retired under conditions other than dishonorable and must need the medical or physical examination to apply for certain Federal benefits. For example, the VA gives a medical examination for determination of the presence of a condition claimed to be service-connected, for Government life insurance purposes, and when application is made for hospital or domiciliary care.

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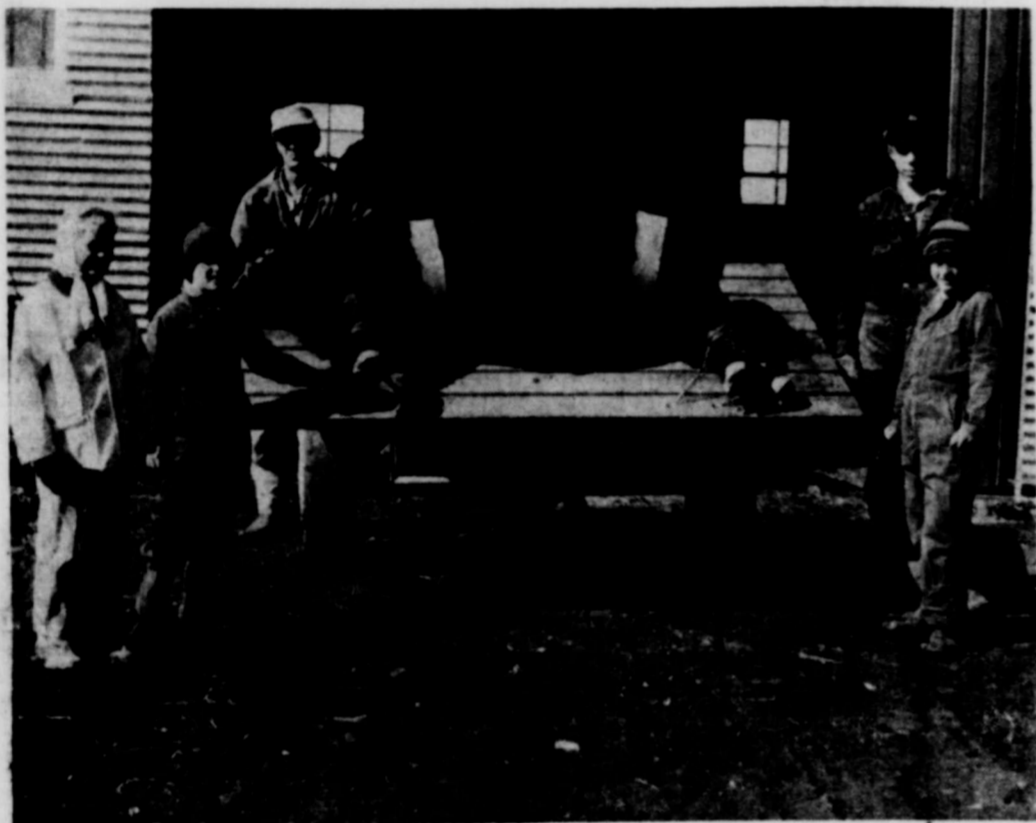

Several Floydada persons have plans to attend the conference.

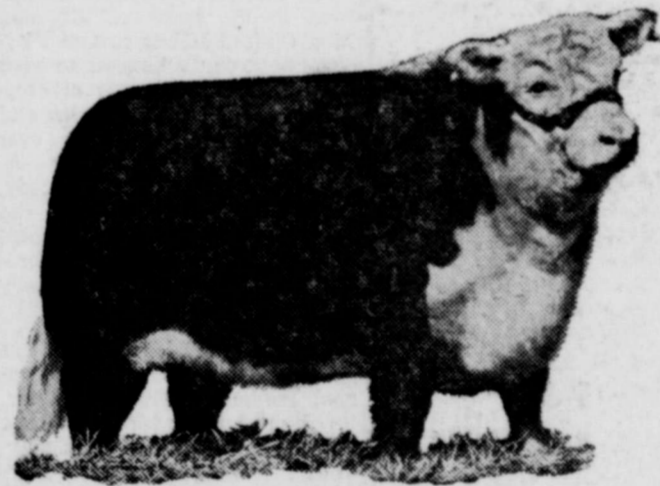

Lockney School Board Is Asking For New Building

H. H. Nicholas, superintendent of Lockney Schools, announced that the School District Board has decided to ask for a \$700,000 bond election for an addition of a new 22 room elementary school building and additions and improvements to existing school facilities.

The board is asking for \$475,000 for a new grade school, \$135,000 for an addition of four classrooms in junior high, a tax and administration department and physical education building, and \$70,000 to remodel the high school. The remainder of the money would be used for paving and improvements around the schools, Nicholas said.

Elmer East, bond attorney for the local district met with the school board Monday night and presented the bond schedule for the program. Petitions are being circulated this week calling for the bond election.

A called meeting for a trustee election of Lockney School District has been set for Saturday.
