How are hospitals financed? Most of the hospitals are built today are financed one half by Hir Burton, the other half by either city or county bonds. Hill Burton money is a government grant and does not have to he naid back. The Spearman hospital appears to be the most for the pletely equipped. The county voted a bond for \$150,000. Hill Burton paid the other half. Because the new hospital does not make monthly payments back to its construction cost it is now operating in


