

ing of March 21st to late in the evening of June 21st. The longest day of the year, then, will be June 21st, and the first day of Spring is divided about equally between night and day. (Summer this year will extend until September 23rd.)

When we say that the longest day will be summer solstice, June 21st, this is correct but sometimes misleading. For example, starting about the 8th of June, the difference in the time the sun rises differs only

by seconds until the last days of the month. In April and May, however, the sun rises a minute or two earlier every day of the month.

But whatever the facts and figures on the astronomical chart, the pleasing symptoms of warmer weather are already appearing and the sun is shining long-



This warning is to warn those who are guilty of these things that the City Council will be forced to take whatever steps neces. sary to stop this depredation. If those who violate these things do not have enough civic pride to help your city council and your neighbors in seeing these things stopped then it becomes the duty of the city council and those officers who are responsible for the orderly conduct of the city to take the only course left to them within the law.

If you have a person in your home who has any kind of a gun capable of doing damage, take him outside the city limits away from any place where he might inflict damage to do his shooting. If you have a dog and want to keep the dog, you must keep the animal on your own property or run the risk of having him destroyed. If you do not have a trash container or if you have more trash or garbage than your container will hold, then you must secure enough containers to hold your trash and garbage to keep it from blowing on your neighbors property.

All of the ordinances which have been enacted were of the sole purpose of creating orderly and decent surroundings for the citi zens and the city council is asking for your cooperation in trying to make our city a decent and pleas ant place to live.


