What Is Hill-Burton Money?

Since the beginning of plans for a new hospital in y Hill-Burton

Hill-Burton money is a government grant. It is not aid back to the government and it can only be used or the construction and equipping of new hospitals.

In order to apply for Hill-Burton money the hospital board must first have in hand bond approval or equipment before it will be considered for the grant. in 1962 for horse theft.

Hill-Burton money can only be used for the construction of the hospital and its equipment. It will tot be concerned with whether or not the hospital loses or makes money after it is built. Most of the requirements of the grant are centered around specific building requirements and specifications. A Hill-Burton built hospital must be of excellent construction that is the main importance.

Does the government control the hospital's operation after it is built and loan is granted? To answer this question we called Bob Vaughn, manager of the Hansford County Hospital in Spearman. Bob said that there were two requirements as to the operation of the hospital. First, the governing board must operate the hospital for a minimum of two years before it can be leased, rented or sold. Second, the hospital cannot be discriminatory as to race or color of persons to be admitted.
