Floyd Pioneers Ready For Big Reunion In Floydada Tuesday

HAIL IN SOUTHEAST FLOYD Much Needed Rains Fall In County

All Day Program Scheduled With Parade In Afternoon

"The Good Lord willing . . . and if the creeks don't rise" . . . Floydada will be brimfull of old timers come Tuesday, May 28th for the annual all day Pioneer Reunion.

Over \$800 is up in prize money for the various winners in the parade competition and other contests during the day.

Champion fiddler 75-year-old I. V. Lynch of Hale Center will be here for the Old Fiddler's contest at 4 p.m.

Hard lashing rains came to the South Plains and Floyd County Tuesday afternoon benefiting cotton and grain sorghum crops and doing little damage to area wheat which was not mature enough to be damaged by the wind.

Tuesday night it continued to rain slowly and added more beneficial moisture which has been sorely needed. Although the rains will be of no benefit to the wheat crop which is almost ready for harvest, row crops that were already up and growing will grow off without immediate irrigation from underground water sources.

Four farmers in southeast Floyd received hail. Kenneth Willis, Millard Watson, Otis Anderson and Wayne Appling farms were pelted with small hail on Tuesday afternoon. All except Willis must replant cotton, however wheat was damaged only slightly. All received over two inches of rain.

Jack McIntosh, farmer 12 miles east of Floydada reported 7 on Tuesday afternoon and 9 Tuesday night.

Floydada proper received 1½ inches Tuesday afternoon and another inch Tuesday night with no hail.

Ned Bradley who lives eight miles south of Dougherty received 2.6 inches. E. D. Morgan at Baptist Encampment reported 1.25.

Northeast of South Plains 1.40 inches were received.

Ernest Lee Thomas, eight miles southwest of Floydada received 1.75 and no hail.

A farmer 1½ miles west of Sand Hill reported 4 Tuesday afternoon and 1.3 Tuesday night. H. Muncy, six miles north of Floydada reported two inches.

Henry Price, farmer, 4 miles east and 4 south of Floydada reported over an inch and a half.

Gerald Lackey at Cedar Hill reported an inch and a half — the Lockney area reported 1½ to 2 inches.

In area towns, Lubbock was one big lake as a flash flood poured down — hailstones measuring 18 inches deep "level" covered the countryside between Farwell and Bovina in Parmer county. Roads were closed temporarily because of the icy blizzard.

At press time Wednesday, there were still possibilities of more rain in the Floyd County area.

Floyd Farmers Vote "No"

Floyd County wheat farmers of operation as far as wheat farming is concerned.

The nine boxes reported the following counts:

The vote evidently indicated that the county's farmers have had enough government control and wish to maintain a freedom.

Nation's Vote

President Kennedy lost the battle for his 1964 wheat program under an avalanche of opposition votes in a national referendum on the hottest farm battle in recent years.

The outcome of balloting by wheat growers in 49 states could determine the future of all government farm programs, especially

The store now has 42,000 square feet of floor space and is housed in a modern brick front building with ample walk-in refrigeration space in the meat market department. The last big building job was completed in March, 1961.

The annual Awards Assembly saw many outstanding and deserving students receive medals, trophies, scholarships, and certificates.

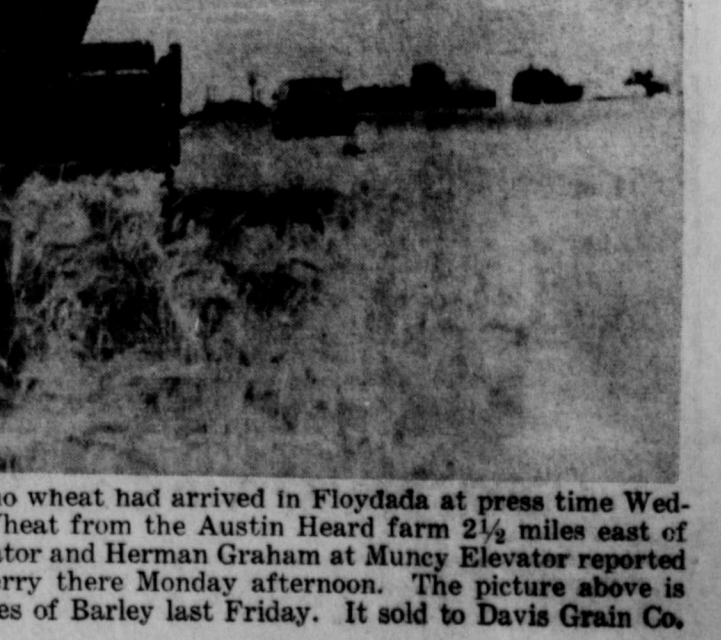

Grads Of 1913 To Be Honored

Something very unusual and unique will occur tomorrow evening at commencement exercises. At least three of the four Floydada graduates of the Class of 1913 have been invited to be present and will be honored.

On May 17, 1913, there were three girls and one boy to get diplomas. They were Mrs. Ethel (Tubbs) Wells, valedictorian, who now lives in Amarillo; Mrs. Kate (Butler) Daniel, salutatorian, of Floydada; Mrs. Massa (Petty) Bruce, who lives in Longview; and Mr. Walter Newell, of Floydada. Mrs. Wells, Mrs. Daniel, and Mr. Newell all will be present, but Mrs. Bruce will not be able to attend.

Graduating 50 years ago, the former students were the fourth group to go through an actual Floydada graduation "ceremony", but they did not wear caps or gowns. And they were the fifth class to finish 11 years of education in Floydada.

They were the first class to choose Green and White as school colors. Since that time, FHS has used these same colors.

A capacity crowd was present to see the foursome walk across the stage to get diplomas in the East Ward building, which was torn down some 18 years ago.

Since about 50 per cent of today's graduates go on to college, it might be of interest to everyone to know that all those half-century grads went to college.

Kate (Mrs. J. V. Daniel) went to Wayland at Plainview; Ethel and Massa went to the Normal school in Canyon (now West Texas State University); and Walter went to Simmons College (now Hardin Simmons University) in Abilene.

Some of the courses in high school back in 1913 were Latin, physics, "New School" or "Higher" algebra, plane and solid geometry, English, and English history.

Mr. F. E. Savage was superintendent, and Mr. Timothy E. Yarbrough was principal.

"The senior class is indeed privileged to have these graduates come back to their hometown to be present for the graduation service," Mrs. Helen Patterson, senior sponsor, said.

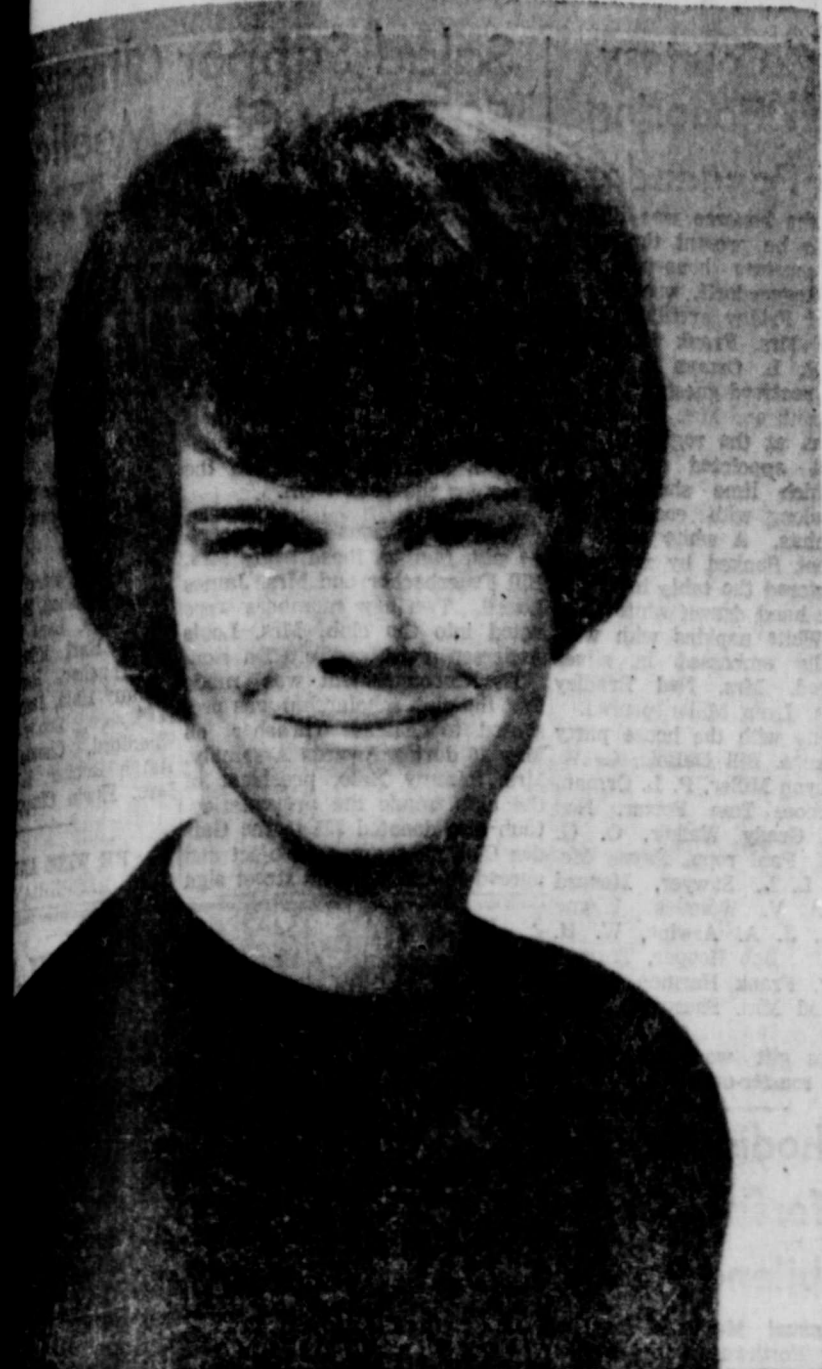

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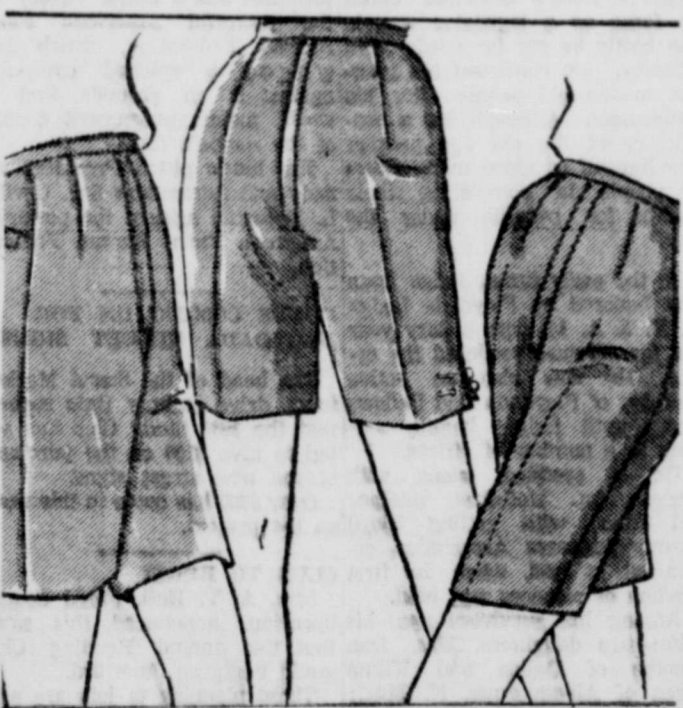

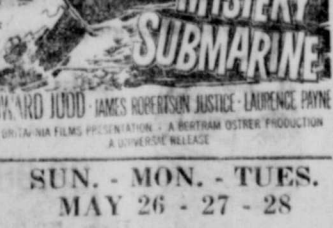

sister, H. O. Cline and Doyle Walls. Judge Deen was a native of Hamilton, Tex. He was born in 1878 and came to Floyd County in 1900. He married the former Addie May Haines in Floydada in 1903 on December 6. W. H. Carr, pioneer Methodist minister, performed the ceremony.

First Office in 1904

A political minded man, Judge Deen was honored with office by Floyd County citizens several times. His first connection with official affairs was in 1904 when he was appointed justice of the peace by then Judge Arthur B. Duncan, while teaching school at Baker. The following year he was elected county treasurer.

Other successes included serving as county and district clerk from 1914 until 1920, county judge from 1936 until 1940 and state representative of the old 120th Representative District for three terms, 1941 - 1946. Judge Deen's principal claim to fame as a legislator was in the battle he put for needy aged citizens. He continued his interest in the old people after his retirement. Although not a beneficiary of the old age pension law himself he aided many elderly people in completing their claims for benefits under the law.

In the early fifties Judge Deen was honored by Floydada Lodge A. F. & A. M. with a fifty year pin for services rendered the order. He was also an active member of Floydada Odd Fellows Lodge until failing health, serving in a number of offices. He is credited, along with Judge Wm. McGehee, another old timer, with getting Floyd County Pioneers Association organized in 1928, when the first reunion of pioneers was held.

Among his survivors are his wife, two daughters, Mrs. Don Boone of Dallas and Wilma Deen of Albuquerque, N. Mex.; two sons, Fred W. Deen of Indio, Calif., and Tommie Deen of Lemon Grove, Calif.; one foster son, Jesse Haines of Fort Worth; seven grandchildren and seven great grandchildren; three sisters, Mrs. Maude Wheat of Deer Lake, Wis., Mrs. Lola Derr of Huron, Ill., Mrs. Ella Robinson of Comanche, Tex., and one brother, Dave Deen of Marysville, Calif.

ally those most directly concerned with handling farm surpluses that have plagued the government since World War II. The nation's farmers voted 596,943 against the government's plan, 547,151 voted for it, 47.8 percent total "for".

It required a two thirds vote for approval of the wheat "supply management" plan which probably would have been proposed for other crops if accepted by wheat farmers.

After studying the returns, far heavier than in any previous 12 referendums since 1941, an Agriculture Department official conceded defeat. He said flatly that "the administration plan has been defeated."

Major Victory For AFB

Rejection of the administration program was a major victory for the powerful American Farm Bureau Federation, which waged a spirited campaign against it on grounds that it would mean government control of the nation's farms. The battle pitted President Kennedy and Agriculture Sec. Orville L. Freeman against the powerful American Farm Bureau Federation.

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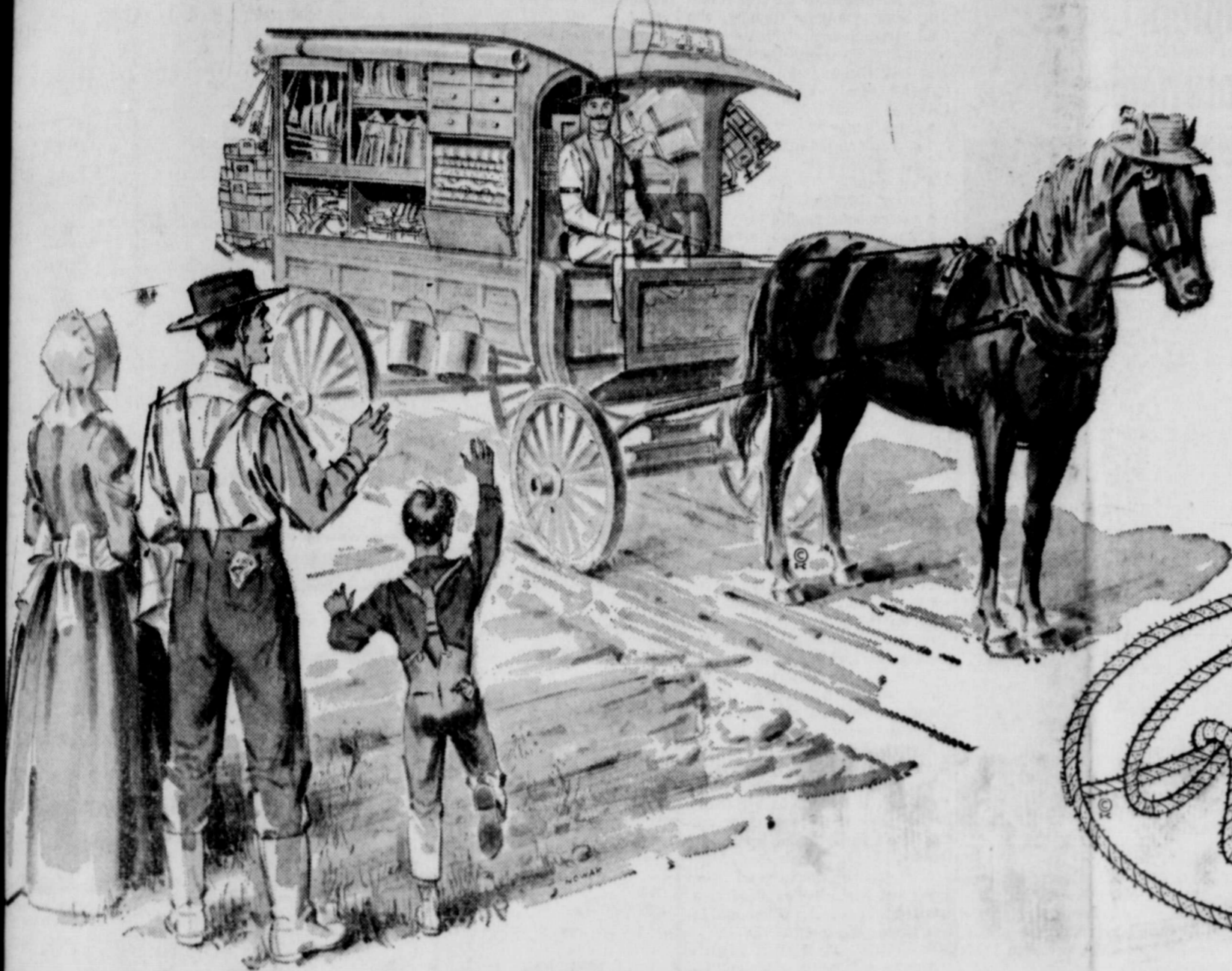

and all in your food freezer. For a home-made ice cream that will bring the kids running, the food specialists in USDA's Agricultural Research Service suggest this recipe:

HOME-MADE VANILLA ICE CREAM

2 cups sugar
1-4 cup cornstarch
1-4 teaspoon salt
4 cups milk
4 eggs, beaten
2 tablespoons vanilla
4 cups light (table) cream
Mix sugar, cornstarch, and salt in the top of a double boiler. Blend in milk gradually. Cook over boiling water, stirring occasionally, until thickened, about 12 to 15 minutes. Stir a small amount of the hot cornstarch mixture into the beaten eggs, then stir the eggs into the remaining cornstarch mixture. Cook over boiling water 4 to 5 minutes longer, stirring constantly. Chill thoroughly-this is essential for a smooth ice cream.

Stir in vanilla and chilled cream. Fill a 1-gallon freezer container in a hand cranked or electric freezer with a mixture of 1 part ice cream salt and 6 parts crushed ice.

Remove dasher and repack freezer with ice and salt mixture (1 part salt to 8 parts ice) and allow to ripen in the freezer about 2 hours. Or, pack ice and harden in a home freezer.

Makes 3 1/2 quarts ice cream, enough for about 28 servings. As a special treat, serve the strawberries, or other fresh fruits. Or, if you prefer you may add the fresh fruit to the ice cream itself.

For Household Insect Control
Here's a word of caution to users of household insecticides for minor pest control jobs around the house.

A space spray from an aerosol bomb will kill flies and mosquitoes inside the home.

Be careful, for not all pressure-type cans contain aerosols. Some are designed for crawling insects. Only cans labeled for flying insects control should be

used as space sprays. If you reside in an area where satisfactory control of houseflies cannot be obtained with DDT, use activated pyrethrum sprays or commercial fly baits. Pyrethrum sprays are effective against most kinds of household insect pests, although the effectiveness does not last long as it does with most modern insecticides, and therefore it is usually necessary to spray more often.

Floydada Man With Directors Seeking New Plainview Bank

Robert Muncy is listed with a group of proposed directors for a bank charter in Plainview it was revealed last week.

Proposed name for the new bank is the First National Bank of Plainview. More than \$1.4 million has been pledged in writing for deposit in the proposal.

A supplement to the application for a charter for the bank has been submitted to the Comptroller of Currency in Washington, said Gene Mitchell, proposed chairman of the board should the bank be organized.

Of the pledged deposits \$918,875 is represented in statements from 165 business firms and \$485,350 by farmers, professional persons and individuals.

The original application was filed May 29, 1962. A decision by the Comptroller of the Currency was postponed Oct. 5 with a request by that office that a supplement to the application be submitted after a period of six months.

If a charter is granted, the new bank would open with a capitalization of \$750,000 representing 30,000 shares of stock.

Of the 30,000 shares, 142 stockholders would be issued 24,000 shares in a total amount of \$600,000, the application reads. The board of directors, collectively, would hold \$150,000 worth of stock (5,000 shares).

Proposed directors of the bank are Thomas E. Mitchell, chairman of the board; Ted Boedecker, Harold A. Hubbard, Kenneth P. Jordan, James M. Miller, Virgil Rowland, Harold M. LaFont, all of Plainview; and Muncy.

A president of the bank has been chosen, subject to final approval by the comptroller. No other officers or employees have been selected.

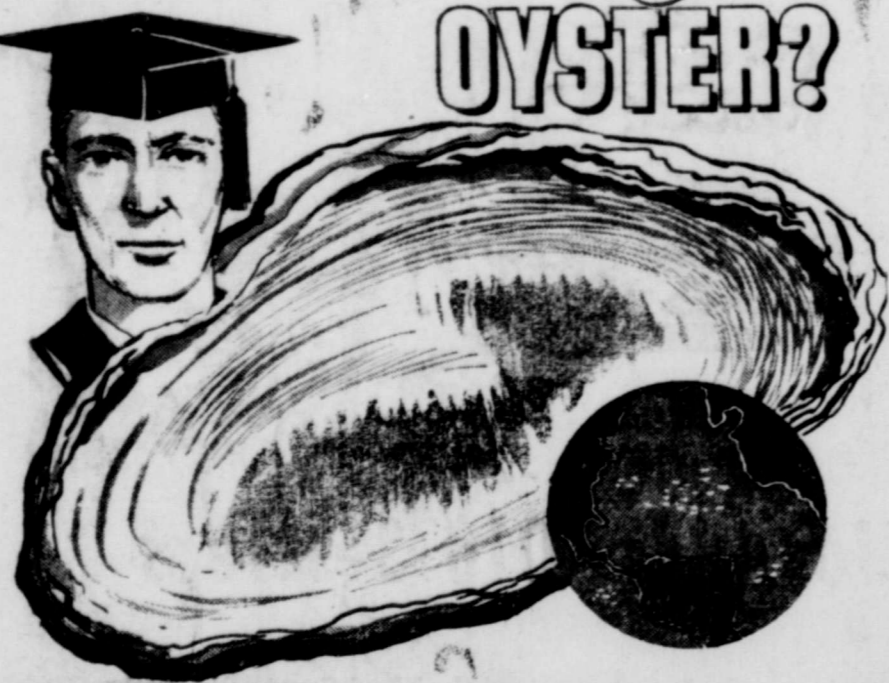

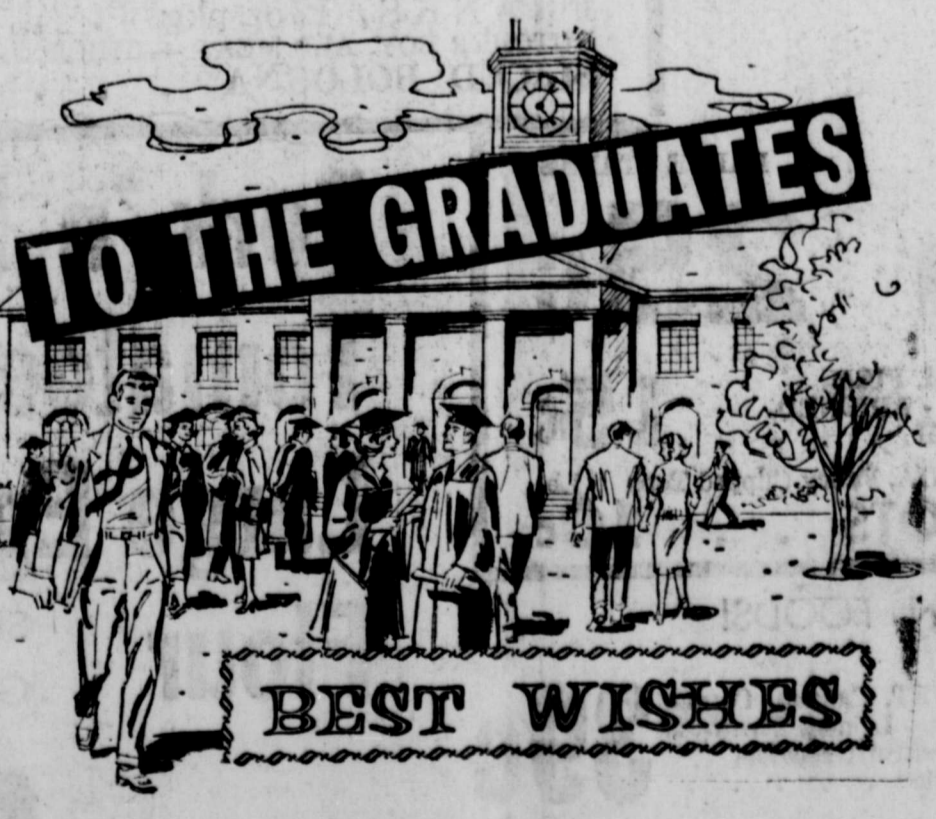

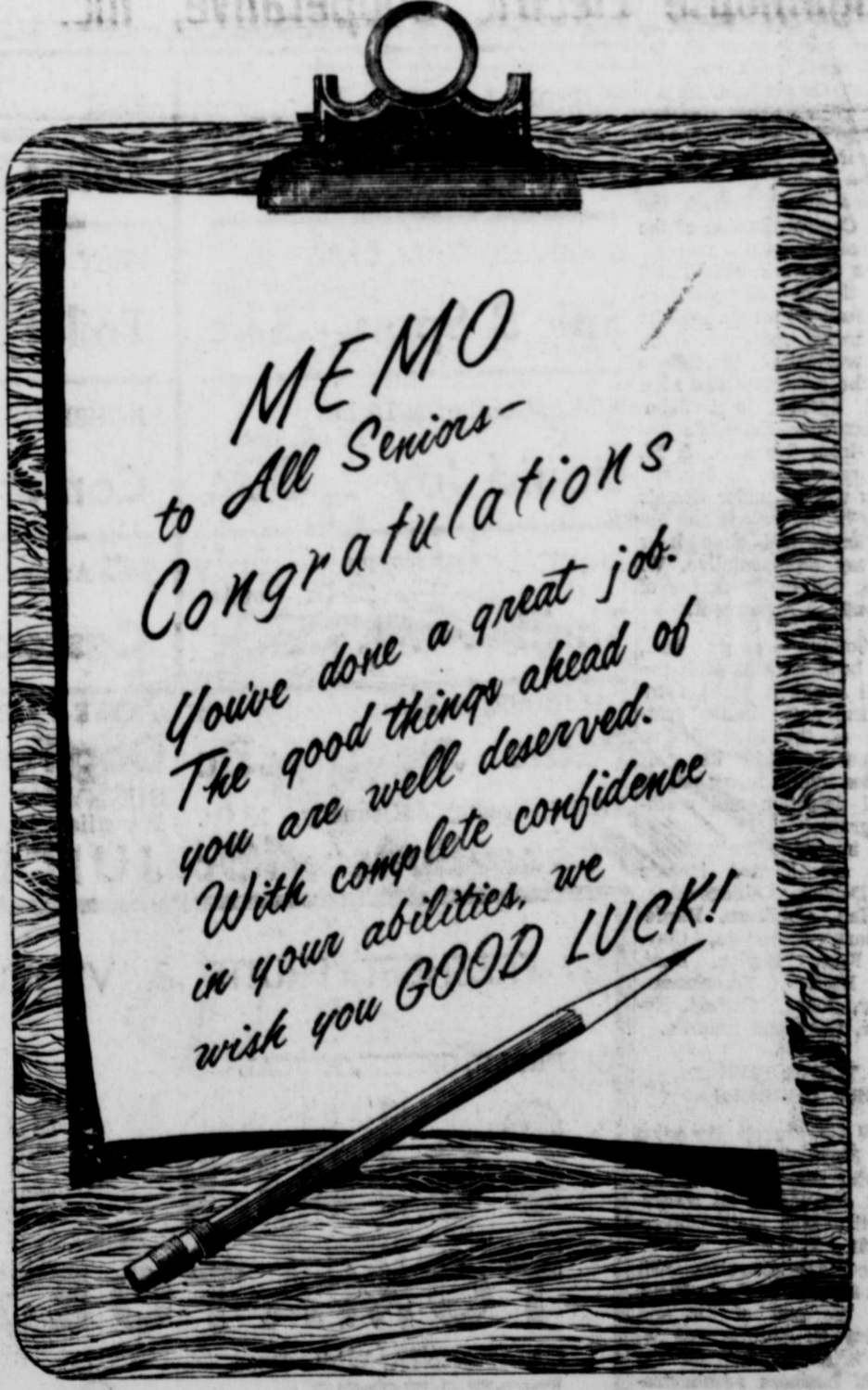

Highway Patrol Investigates Two Rural Accidents

The Highway Patrol investigated 2 rural accidents in Floyd County during the month of April according to Sergeant D. S. Lawson, Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for property damage in the amount of \$1,145.00.

The rural accident summary for Floyd County from January through April of 1963 shows a total of 14 crashes resulting in 3 persons killed, 15 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$11,986.00.

If you travel the rural roads this month, you will meet up with lots of slow moving farm machinery. The Patrol Supervisor reminds motorists to be ready to slow down in plenty of time to avoid collision - and pass only if you are sure you can do so successfully and safely. Remember too, where there is a farm house, there is a driveway - even though it may be hidden from view. So be prepared to yield, if you must, to traffic entering and leaving. Yielding right-of-way costs you nothing. Demanding it can cost you an accident.

The Sergeant also stated "Owners of boat trailers should check to see that they meet the State's Motor Vehicle Laws. If they do not you are asking for an arrest or an accident or both. Every time you take your trailer on the road, make sure all warning and safety devices are working properly. Check especially the lights, and the strength of hitch and coupling. It is a good idea to make additional checks whenever you make a stop."

Boll Weevil Study Begins

LUBBOCK - W. L. Owen, Associate Entomologist at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Lubbock has reported to Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. that TAESS will begin an intensive vigilance for cotton boll weevil appearance in 26 counties in and around the High Plains Area. Actual checks for weevil presence will start on Monday, May 20th, and will continue for two weeks.

From one to seven farmers in each of the 26 counties have planted plots of early cotton on land adjacent to possible weevil hibernation points, and initial checking will be done on these plots along with any other cotton in the area which may be far enough advanced to attract the dreaded pest, Owens said. He added that recent hot weather should bring the weevils out of hibernation if they have overwintered in the area.

To assure a complete check, the Plant Pest Control division of the USDA is sending about 8 men into the area to work with TAESS personnel; the aid of county agents and Future Farmers will be enlisted. Charles Chapman of the Texas Department of Agriculture will be in the area with two men from that agency, and John Thomas, Associate Extension Entomologist from Texas A. & M. will assist on a part time basis. The survey will be under Owen's supervision in the area from Aspermont North, and another TAESS Survey representative, W. H. Newton, will be in charge of counties south of Aspermont.

Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., which has been working with the boll weevil problem since damage was first noted in the eastern section of the High Plains, will continue to make its staff and facilities available for use in boll weevil detection and eradication programs.

Counties in which early planting plots are located include Wheeler, Donley, Collingsworth, Briscoe, Hall, Childress, Hardeman, Wilbarger, Wichita, Clay, Dickens, Knox, Baylor, Kent, Stonewall, Haskell, Throckmorton, Fisher, Jones, Mitchell, Nolan, Taylor, Coke and Runtels.
