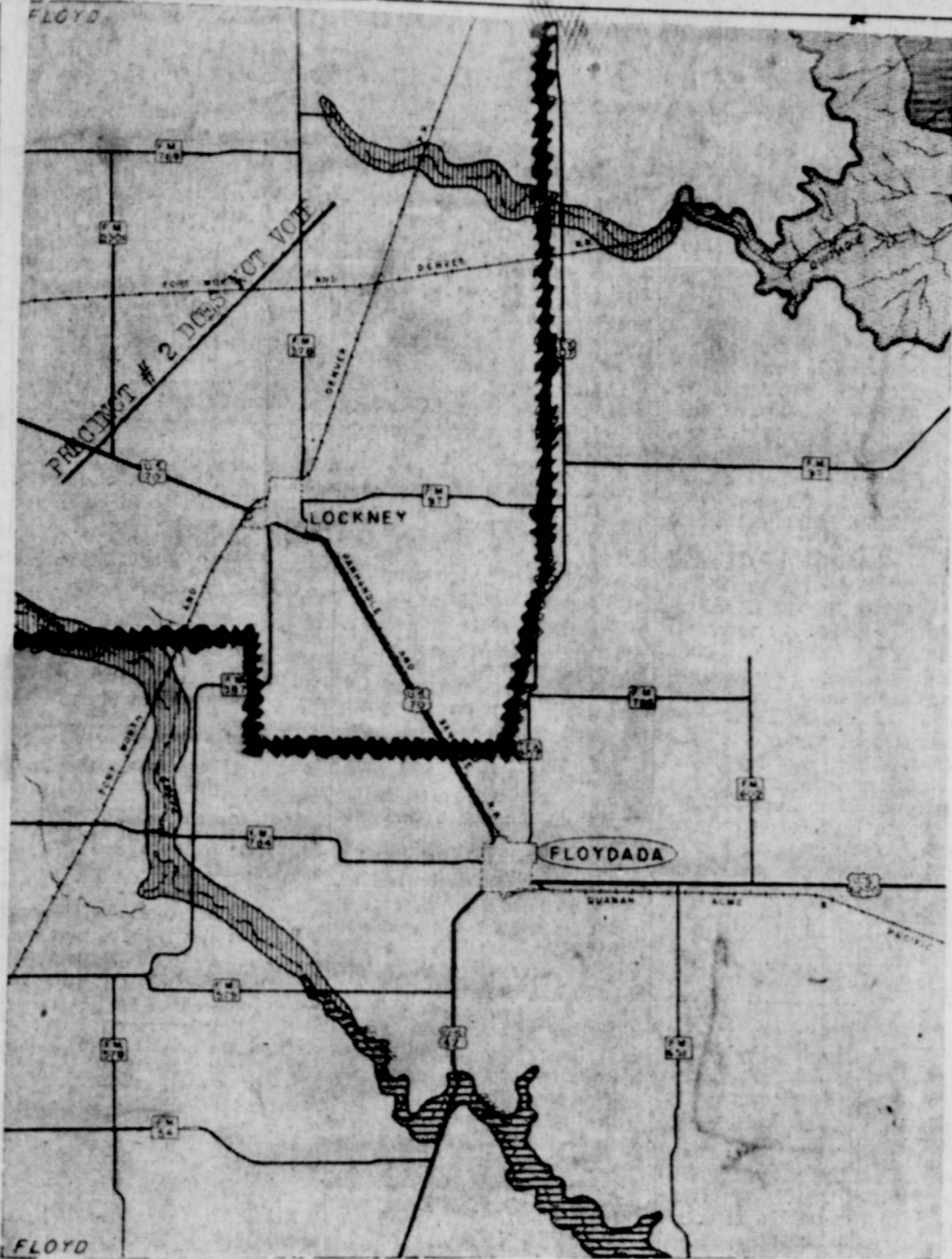

CAPROCK HOSPITAL DISTRICT is outlined above. The group of interested individuals presented petitions to Mr. Crain, signed by over 150 persons in Floydada and South Plains requesting that the highway department put up some sort of flashing red light at the South Plains railway crossing.

Exceptionally Good Price; Over 800 Latins Employed

Floyd County's "big money per acre crop" began to roll to the packing sheds this week as three onion associations began harvesting operations.

The S & H Onion Shed, The Floydada Growers And Marketing Association, and The Barwise Onion Association were employing over 800 Latin-Americans in the fields and grading sheds and growers estimate the harvest will be finished in two or three weeks.

Yields are average with 400 to 500 sacks per acre and prices are exceptionally good. Prices are averaging up to \$3.00 per sack. It is possible that the 700 acre in the county could produce almost a million dollars gross money.

Italian Girl Exchange Student Here

Maria Antonietta Capocceffalo of Rome, Italy, who is studying to become a teacher, has been selected as foreign exchange student in Floydada for the school term 1963-64, according to the report from the American Field Service to local representatives.

During her stay in Floydada Miss Capocceffalo will be housed by Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Rucker, and will use the name "Mary".

Miss Capocceffalo is planning on becoming an elementary teacher. At present her subjects in school are Italian, Geography, History, Mathematics, History of Arts, Drawing, Religion, Physical Education. Her previous subjects are History, History of Arts and Mathematics.

She is of a family of four, her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Antonio Capocceffalo and a ten year old brother. Mary is 18 years of age, 5 feet one inch and weighs 120 pounds. She was born in Italy.

Mary wrote in her letter that she is interested in all sports especially horse racing and football. She said the reason she was applying for the program to come to the U. S. was that she

Post Office ZIP Code Goes Into Effect July 1; New Method To Speed Deliveries

Our five-digit ZIP Code is 79235. Postmaster Wester announced today.

"Everyone in Floydada, Texas will use this ZIP Code on all their correspondence to speed

mail deliveries and reduce the chance of mis-sent mail." Postmaster Wester said.

ZIP Code, the Post Office Department's revolutionary new system of improved mail dispatch and delivery, goes into effect nationally on July 1.

Postmaster Wester stressed the importance of all citizens of Floydada learning this city's ZIP Code and using it in their return address on all correspondence. In answering mail, he said, ZIP Codes take from return addresses on incoming mail should be used.

"The ZIP Code is literally the last word in mail addressing."

County Agent Finds A Live Boll Weevil!

County agent Tom Davison said that in an extensive search for boll weevils in the southeast section of the county that one boll weevil was found in a cotton field in the Baker community.

In company with entomologists who joined in the search, Davison said other types of weevils which aren't necessarily harmful to cotton were also found. He said that actually, very few insects of any kind were discovered in the several fields of cotton inspected. Davison said there was no cause for alarm, but every farmer should keep a close check on his crops for insects.

The new ZIP Code plan, Mr. Wester said, for the first time will permit the Post Office Department to short-cut repeated address reading.

"The address on mail must often be read as many as eight or ten times by postal employees, to get it to the proper destination," Mr. Wester said. "Each handling slows the process of mail dispatch and adds to the opportunity for human error."

"With ZIP Code, a clerk needs only to glance at the code to know immediately to what national area state and post office the letter is destined, and to speed it on its way, cutting up to 20 hours off the time between deposit and delivery."

Mr. Wester said that when ZIP Code is in full swing, the United States will have "The most modern system of mail distribution and delivery in existence."

Dougherty Post Office ZIP Code is 79231, South Plains Code is 79228.

In talking with one of the growers a Hesperian reporter learned that prices in years past have ranged from 90c to \$6.00 per sack.

Floydada business firms are enjoying increased business as the onion workers are paid in cash each week and lose no time in spending the money for groceries, clothing, and other items.

According to the growers, this "big gamble" crop keeps one in a sweat until the last sack is in the grading shed - then the risk of daily price quotes is hazardous. Rainy weather has delayed the harvest to some extent and two onion growers north of Sand Hill, Raymond Rucker and Gene Handley were hailed out last week.

Reports from Barwise indicate that Rucker and Handley will try to salvage the crop and market it.

TEXAS POTATOES
(Quick main dish with cheese)
4 cups diced potatoes
1 cup minced medium size onion
1 teaspoon salt
1-3 cup chopped pimiento
1 teaspoon pepper
2 cups grated cheese (American)
2 cups white sauce
1/2 cup cracker crumbs
2 teaspoons butter
Cook potatoes five minutes with onions and salt in small amount of water. Drain then add pimiento and place in greased casserole. Add pepper and cheese to white sauce and crumbs. Dot with butter and bake in moderate oven at 350 degrees until brown. Makes 4 to 6 servings

To the People of Floyd County: I'd love to write my opinion about the new hospital that the tax payer and the state are planning to build. We, the people of Floyd Co. built the one we have and it was a very good one, when we had doctors, but it couldn't run without a doctor. It was turned over to a nurse to manage that wasn't even a R. N. —she never went to a school of any kind to make a nurse, but was a very good nurse in her way. We have two very good doctors in Floydada and they have their own clinics and can't be expected to give their time to the hospital. They get a lot of criticism because they don't. Do you, the people of Floyd think a five hundred thousand dollar hospital is going to make a go of it without doctors in it? Just taking chances on doctors coming here to devote their time to it and have their clinics elsewhere? How many of us are able to pay taxes to build that kind of a hospital? Why don't we just give the hospital we have in Floydada to two good doctors and let them make a go of it. There's nothing wrong with the hospital we have, except for the lack of doctors and R. N's. Lockney has a good hospital that a doctor bought when it wasn't making good and has made it pay and keeps building on to it and didn't tax the people in that lone district to do it or ask the state to help. Have you ever set down and figured how much tax you will have to pay into a hospital this

size on your property in 20 years and still will have to carry hospital insurance if you expect to be admitted or have your money in your hand? I have worked 5 years in a hospital and know a little about how they are run. I know a little about how the one was run in Floydada and how one that is making good is run. I worked in both. Farmers Facing Another Danger

Area farmers which have been plagued by rain, hail, no cotton legislation, and potential loss of income from wheat were alerted today of another danger facing them. The 1964-65 Grain Law passed by Congress only last month will be wiped out if Wheat-Feed Grain bills now being advocated by some farm and business groups should pass, according to Elbert Harp, president of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association. Harp said that all current new bills calling for wheat-feed grain legislation provide for abolishing the feed grain program and lowering the price of grain sorghum. He pointed out that no further legislative action is required to assure continuation of the current level of farm income from grain sorghum through the Feed Grain Act of 1963.

Lightning Seldom Strikes Same Place Twice

Lightning seldom strikes the same place twice, but it strikes multiple points tend to dissipate its destructive force. Enough places once every year to start two of every five suburban and rural fires. Other defects in do-it-yourself rodding systems can be just as serious, so this is a job which should be left to experts, particularly for farm buildings, suburban houses, country churches and other lonesome targets. Boats with masts should have lightning rods leading directly to

the water. One heartening note — don't worry about the thunder. If you hear it, the lightning missed you.

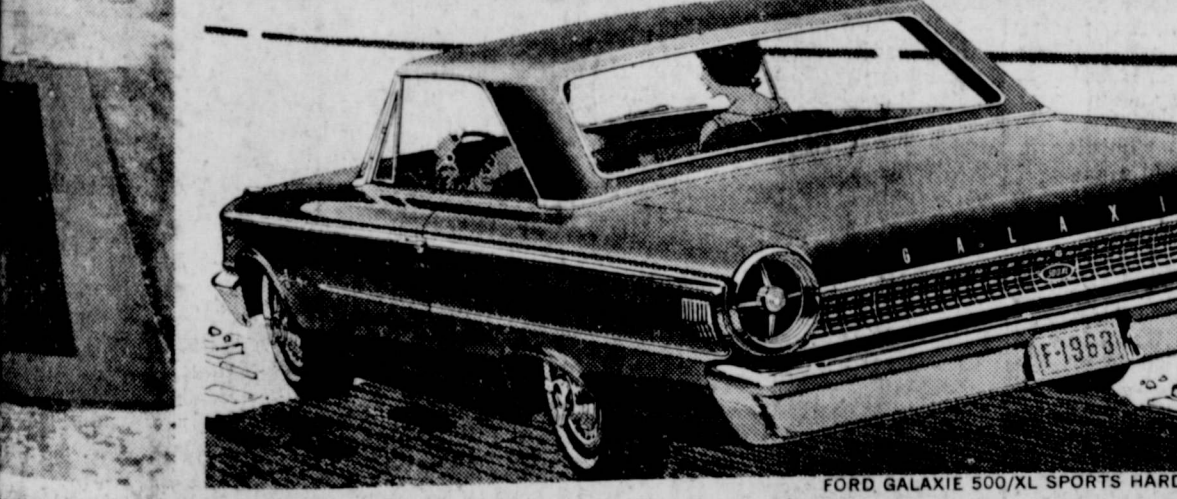
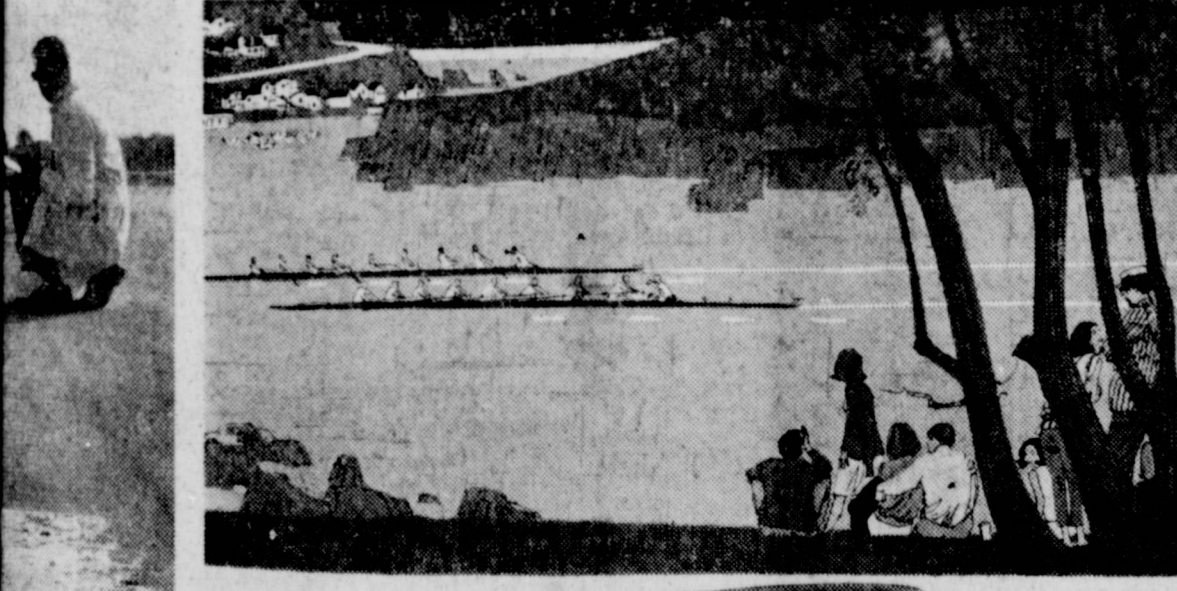

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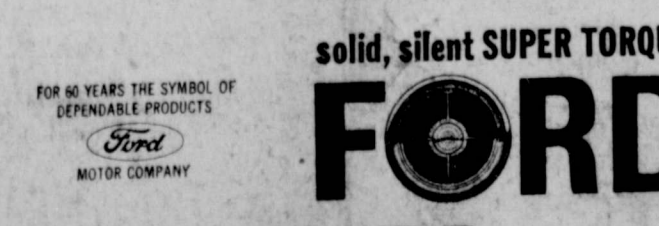
