## Dougherty Club Enjoys Luncheon At Lighthouse

Dougherty Home Demonstration Club met on Friday, July 11 for a 1 o'clock luncheon at Lighthouse Electric. Mrs. Harry Morckel was hostess for the affair. She gave a demonstration on roasters, and planning roaster meals consisting of baked hams, corn and black eyed peas, new Irish potatoes, green salad, German sweet chocolate pound cake and lemon pound cake with Pa-toka ice cream.

Card tables with red and white checked cloths were used for the luncheon at which eleven members were present. Miss Sherry Mullin was a guest.

Mrs. Morckel opened the meeting and read of the first demonstration held in Lighthouse Electric kitchen on Feb. 25, 1954 which was also a roaster demonstration given for the 1922 Study Club with Mrs. C. A. Caffee as hostess.

The meeting read as follows:

The first demonstration held in the new all-electric kitchen of the Lighthouse Electric Cooperative, Inc. was a roaster demonstration given for the 1922 Study Club of Floydada. Mrs. C. A. Caffee of Dougherty, Tex., a member of the Cooperative, was hostess. She was assisted by Mrs. Nancy Morckel, Home Economist for the Cooperative.

The menu consisted of baked turkey, carried rice, cabbage-slaw, green beans, sweet peach pickles, ripe cucumber pickles, pound cake, grape ice cream, freshly baked loaves of bread, butter, all "old time favorites", but prepared with modern day appliances.

In keeping with the theme of the program "How old time Favorite Recipes May be Adapted to our Modern Cooking Methods", the turkey was prepared by a recipe given to us by Mrs. Bundy Campbell, of Dougherty, who now resides at Matador.

This recipe was given to her by her mother-in-law, Mrs. Harry Campbell of Matador, who learned it from her mother-in-law, Mrs. Campbell, who came as a bride 75 years ago to the Matador Ranch. Her son, Harry Campbell of Matador, was the first white child born in Motley County.

The first year she was on the Ranch, she cooked a Christmas dinner for the cowboys. This became an annual affair — wild turkey, pork, venison, antelope, and beef were the meats used for Christmas dinners.

The day before the turkey was to be served, she cooked it very slowly, until it was tender. It was left in the broth over night, then before serving, it was removed from the broth, and covered with a medium thick paste, made with flour and butter, or flour and some of the broth, then placed in a hot oven, until this paste was brown and crunchy.

Mrs. Campbell said the paste for the turkey was a necessity, since the turkey (wild) were so poor they need the added fat.

Some time they used strips of bacon on the turkey.

Mrs. Bundy Campbell's modern version of this traditional recipe is to use the roaster for preparing the turkey.

The rice was cooked in an electric roaster: — 1 cup of rice, 3 cups of cold water, 1 teaspoon salt. Put into roaster for 1 1/2 hours with temperature set at 250 degrees. Just before serving, melted butter and curry powder was added.

When he had both of them out of the cesspool, Upton immediately began applying artificial respiration and continued until he had both boys revived. An ambulance crew arriving shortly afterwards then took over.

The boys were taken to Olton Community Hospital and Clinic where an attending physician said that had Upton not acted promptly and correctly neither of the boys would have survived. Their condition were described as "fine" late today.

The attending physician pointed out the probability that the tots might develop pneumonia and all precautions were being taken at the hospital.

When the ordeal was over the Upton had donned his clothes again he asked only one question of those present.

"Does anyone know where I can take a shower?"

The two boys are the sons of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Delion of Olton.

A Hesperian reporter talked to Ronnie's mother Tuesday and she said Ronnie, his wife, the former Betty Blum and their three children, Christy, 6, Ricky, 4 and Rocky, 2, spent Monday night with them. 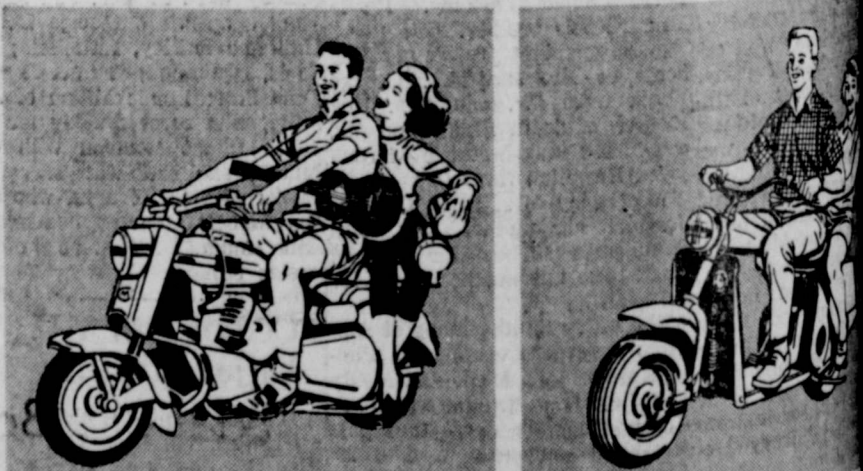

Infestation Found in Lubbock Area Sorghum

Don't dry up and become discolored, appearing blighted or "brusted." Sorghum midge infests all varieties of grain sorghum, sorgho, broomcorn, Johnsongrass and Sudan grass. Successive life cycles occur throughout the season from first emergence in the spring until the fall frost. U. S. D. A. reports as many as 13 generations of sorghum midge occurring during the growing season near San Antonio, Texas.

Experienced growers have found an effective control for these daily abundant, as to 2" pounds of Sevin 90 percent sprayable insecticide per acre of sorghum. Experts say accurate timing for effective midge control is of the utmost importance.

They use 1 1/4 ounce per spikelet of Sevin 90 percent of the heads before the midge can develop and begin to feed. Growers reportedly like the safety features of this new-type carbamate pesticide that can be used on many food crops up to the day of harvest. They say they need not worry about drift or residue, because the material does not show up in the milk or meat of livestock fed treated forage, when used according to label directions.

paid by increased taxes. Let's assume that they won't be transferred and look at the revenue from a realistic angle and see if it will pay for the bonds. In the brochure mailed to the voters, Article 12 shows an anticipated net revenue of \$14,000.00 per year. Article 14 shows an annual principal and interest requirement of approximately \$43,617.00. The net revenue from the Electric Fund for last year was \$17,064.96. To arrive at the anticipated net revenue to pay these bonds would mean getting \$96,935.14 of new business. That is an increase of over 400 per cent. This is a pretty wild speculation, particularly on such a large scale investment.

The past provides a clue to the future that no thoughtful person would doubt. It doesn't pay off. Wouldn't it be true that if we default on the payment of these bonds that the bonding company has the right to take charge of the Electric Department and operate it and raise rates sufficient to pay the bonds? It is customary that they make provisions to get their money back!

It would be more feasible to buy electricity as does the R. E. A. Better still, explore the possibility of leasing the present facilities for a period long enough to pay the bonded indebtedness out of the business of competing with private enterprise.

Floydada should be getting their finances in shape to provide an adequate water supply for the future. Yours truly, John R. Williamson

Comparable figures for 1960 were \$98.8 billion, \$17,913 and \$9,430.

At about the same time - from 1949 to 1959 - capital assets per dollar of net farm income almost doubled, rising from \$6.87 to 11.54.

Farm capital includes all the financial resources and all goods and services used in farming except the farm family's labor.

Biggest part of farm capital is investment capital - money tied up in land, machinery, and other property used more than a year. The remainder is working capital - money or property used up within a year.

Switching fluorescent lights on and off at frequent intervals is an expensive rather than an economy say lighting experts.

This is because the life of a fluorescent tube is shortened by frequent turning on and off. Operating cost of fluorescent lighting, when properly used, is less than incandescent. Tube replacement, however, is higher than bulb replacement.

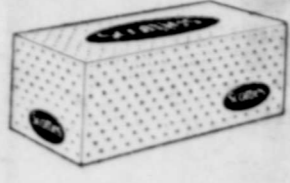

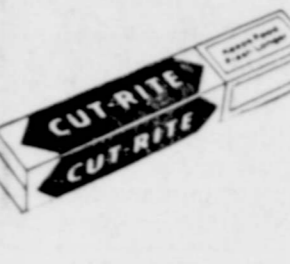

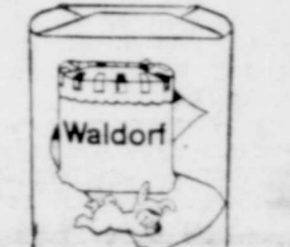

Dear Sir:  
I read where you had published a very interesting editorial about the present needs for more electric power for the City Municipal Power Plant.  
You being somewhat of a newcomer to Floydada might be interested in what took place when we started in the electric business, so I will rehash my memory back to 1939 when I began my first term as a City Councilman.

In April 1939, we had just begun construction of a municipal plant consisting of 3 two hundred K.W. units under a P.W.A. project and at the time, government engineers thought this would take care of the needs of a city like Floydada.

I assumed the duty as power commissioner, and the commission consisted of myself, J. W. Lanier, Conner Oden, R. E. Fry, Ulmer White, with Glad Snodgrass as Mayor, and Ben Ayres as city attorney. To me this was a very successful administration and Ben Ayres contributed more time and worry seeing that this plant was put in operation than any of the elected officials, for before we got started, we were served with 3 injunctions and Ben went them all, knowing that there might be a possibility of him never getting paid as the City was so broke.

The first night we met after being elected, we just paid what bills we could, and I know we had to pass up and not pay over \$800.00 worth. As John Lanier was appointed street commissioner, he was told to go to Lubbock and get a new grader blade that cost \$5.50. He was told the city had no credit and he paid for it out of his pocket.

And in January, 1940, when we were ready to start operation, no major oil company would sell us enough fuel on credit to get the plant started, and one of the coun-

citizen went to the Consumers Fuel Association and purchased \$420.00 worth of fuel and oil to fill the engines and diesel tank. I remember the first month, we took in over \$800.00 and the next month about \$1600.00. So the Light Plant was on her own.

This Municipal Plant has never cost the tax payers a penny! There is no doubt in my mind the revenues have always absorbed the extra improvements and there is no doubt in my mind that it will do so in the future. The people of Floydada have been very loyal to this plant which belongs to them. I am sure that 75 percent of the people who first started with us are still using electricity from their Light Plant, and are satisfied with the service given them.

We have people who think that we should never have gotten in the power business, but they forget that the power companies used to furnish water, sewer, and even ice to cities. But they are big and smart, and I like them, but they looked ahead and saw that only electricity could be made anywhere, and water, sewer and ice was a headache. So they have gotten rid of about all these headaches, but I think they still have a water system at Clovis, and possibly a sewer system at Matador they can't give away. At Clovis a few years back, they called an election trying to get the City of Clovis to take over the water system, which election was defeated as the voters of Clovis did not want a water system either. The power company sure didn't offer their electric system for sale.

So when you have no takers for a water or sewer system, it falls on the various cities to furnish water and sewer. To me when

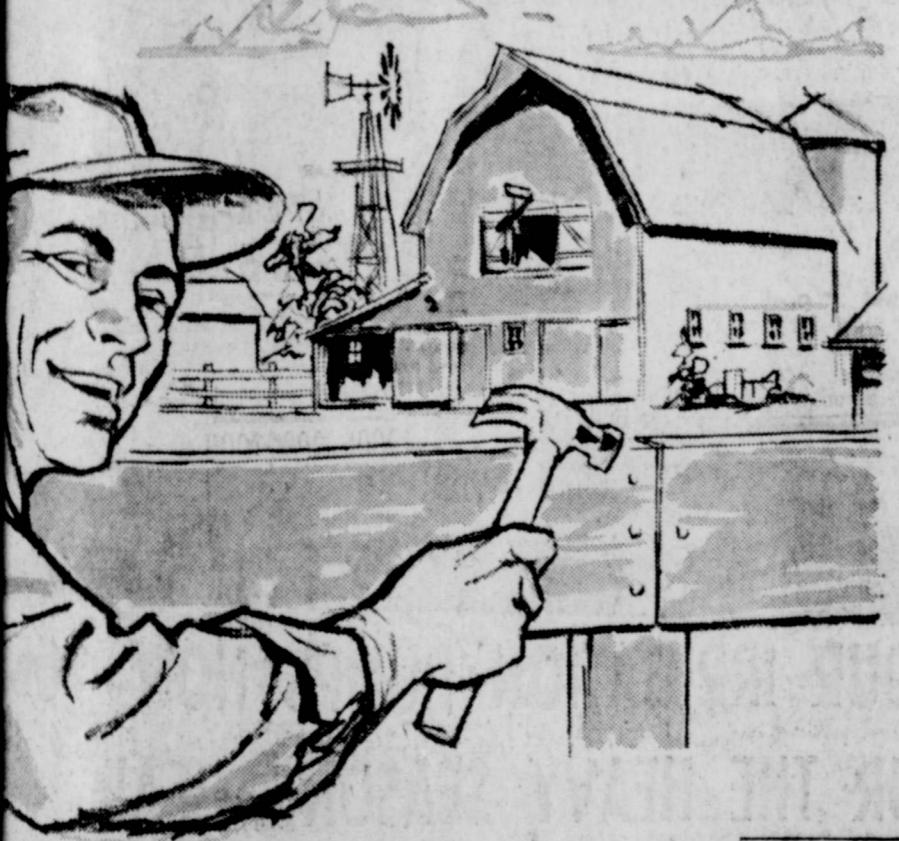

# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

**AUSTIN** — Gov. John Connally says Texas is making a lot of progress on civil rights without demonstrations and disturbances. He urged Texans to avoid the trouble which is plaguing other states.

Roy Evans, secretary of Texas State AFL-CIO, indicated mass demonstrations are needed in Lower Rio Grande Valley to improve working conditions of Mexican workers. Connally commented such statements are irresponsible and inflammatory.

Governor also rejected labor's appeal for a special session of the Legislature to abolish right-to-work law and enact state minimum wage, saying he saw "no need, emergency or desirability" for such a session.

Evans said labor's traditional role is to try to influence people against injustice, and he intends to keep on trying to do that.

**QUICK CHANGE** — From one of the unpaid boss jobs to a \$16,500-a-year assistantship is the story of Dr. J. B. Copeland of San Antonio.

When the Legislature created the new job of deputy commissioner of the Health Department, Dr. Copeland resigned as chairman of the State Board of Health to accept the job of deputy commissioner. He had been Board Chairman for the past ten years.

**DO FENCE THEM IN** — Texas Highway Department has endorsed the idea of building "median rails" on busy urban expressways.

Heavy-duty fences which keep traffic from careening into opposite lanes - have been or will be installed on expressways around Houston, Fort Worth and Austin.

Also under development by highway engineers is a woven wire mesh fence - similar to backyard chain-link jobs - to reduce headlight glare and to prevent pedestrians from crossing the freeways.

**OIL HOLDS UP** — Despite recommendations by several major oil buying firms that Texas production be cut in August, the Railroad Commission held the line.

Production will continue at the July rate of 28.5 per cent of capability of the wells. Independents praised the action.

**HIGHER EDUCATION** — Texas Committee on Education Beyond the High School has selected one of its members as paid executive director.

He is Dr. A. B. Martin, president of Amarillo Junior College. He will co-ordinate all staff work for the big study.

Committee has one year to finish its study and report to the Legislature.

**SADLER ACTIVE** — Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler con-

tinues to be much in the news, back to sports press relations. Clay Cotten, longtime attorney for State Insurance Department, as State Liquidator to succeed H. Langdeau, who is retiring due to ill health.

**LOANS** — Frank Miskell of Austin, who headed up the Texas Legislature's studies on the loan shark problem, will be the administrator of the new law which regulates licensed lenders.

Miskell was chosen by the State Finance Commission to be the first Regulatory Loan Commission chairman on August 22.

**DRY AND WET** — Texas is spotted with drought and flood. Texas Water Commission found that reservoirs declined a little in June. They wound up the month 76 per cent full, so there's room to store more floods when and if they come.

In general, Northeast Texas reservoirs are full, while those in South Texas are shrinking.

**ROADS** — Highway construction is one thing dry weather helps.

State Highway Engineer DeWitt C. Greer reported that contractors on state-federal projects completed \$24,673,319 worth of work during June.

But there's plenty yet to do. \$22,472,203 and an other \$25,000,000 worth of contracts will be issued this week.

**POLLUTION QUESTION** — Texas Water Pollution Control Board granted a permit to discharge thousands of gallons of "treated effluent" into the waters of Copano and Aransas Bays in connection with plans for a big new resort motel and marina at Lamar Township, Aransas County.

Objections voiced at public hearings led to the Commission's action in instructing backer of the new project - American Liberty Oil Company - to extend the point of discharge 500 feet farther out into the bay area.

**STATE SCHOOL** — Dr. James Turnam, Director of the Texas Youth Council, defended his council's action in either firing or retiring - Superintendent O. F. Perry of Gatesville State School. Perry and his supporters claim too much interference from Austin, too little discipline of boys. Youth Council denies this, contends policy differences caused the dismissal.

M. B. Kendrick was named to replace Perry.

**SHORT SHORTS** — Texas Game and Fish Commission, Department of Public Welfare, Board of Plumbing Examiners, Board of Professional Engineers, Board of Pardons and Paroles, Department of Agriculture, Department of Banking, and Building Commission are moving into the new John H. Reagan State Office Building.

Dr. Dorman Winfrey, Director of the Texas State Library, announced that the Val Verde County Library, recognized in December as one of the "Ten Best Small Libraries in the U. S.," also has been cited for its "top-flight public relations program."

Rep. Robert H. Hughes of Dallas will resign from the Legislature on September 1 to accept appointment as domestic relations court judge in Dallas.

Dear Fellow Texan:

Once each year Americans take part in the observance of Captive Nations Week. The purpose of Captive Nations Week is to remind the world that hundreds of millions of people whose governments have been enslaved by Communism no longer enjoy the simplest of freedoms.

The countries we usually refer to as captive nations are East Germany, Poland, Rumania, Hungary, Latvia, Lithuania and Estonia. Since World War II, many so-called colonial areas have been made into free nations in Africa and Asia for the first time. But these ten captive nations are ancient countries with great civilizations and traditions of freedom.

This year, fellow Texans, I'm adding Cuba to the list of captive nations in this historic observance because Cuba is unquestionably under the total domination of the Soviet Union. It belongs on the list of nations whose people have lost their freedom as much as any European nation.

Fidel Castro is no longer a Cuban. He is an agent of Communist Premier, Khrushchev. He has sold his people to the Communist powers in order to finance his own personal power, his own hegemony, to balloon his own over-grown vanity, to give him money with which to stroke his own whiskers.

The observance is a way of letting the people in captive nations know that the Free World continues to commit itself to the achievement of freedom for all mankind. It's a way of saying to oppressed peoples:

"As long as the memory of freedom is kept alive in the Communist countries the desire for freedom will also live on. The Communists have destroyed whole free governments, burned records, rewritten history books. But they have not smothered the old longing for past freedom."

The people of Cuba who desire freedom by flight have fared better than most people of the captive nations. Cubans have been admitted to the United States by the shipload and the plane-load. More than 150,000 Cuban refugees have come to the United States. But East Germans who try to flee to freedom to West Germany are still being shot like dogs on that Wall of Shame in Berlin. So while individual Cubans have been permitted to come to the United States, the people of Cuba as a whole are still captive in a Communist-dominated country.

Let us talk about freedom for these eleven captive nations as the Communists have talked about freedom for colonies in Africa and Asia.

Let us light anew the fires of freedom in Cuba. Let us move until Cuba and the ten captive nations in Europe are free of the Communist conspiracy, so they can again enjoy old liberties they once knew.

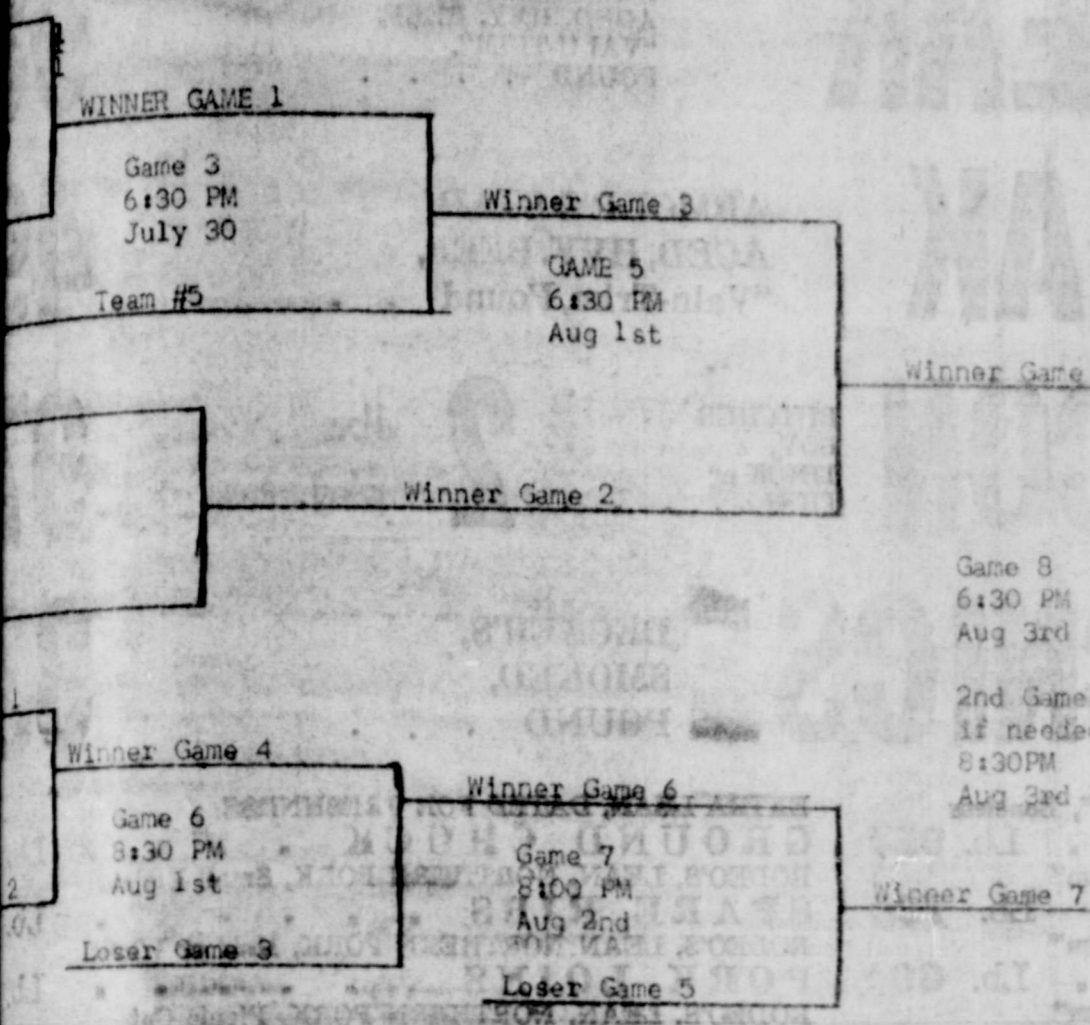

Davison concluded by adding that in addition to screwworm resistance of live-control, the materials previously mentioned will control horn flies, house flies and other external parasites. The reduction of fly populations, which transmit and agitate pinkeye conditions of livestock, is an additional benefit. A regular spray program also aids in reducing animals and to plasmosis. Additional insecticide recommendations can be obtained from your county agricultural agent or from L-256, Texas Guide for Controlling External Parasites of Livestock and Poultry.
