## Two Men Die In Flaming Plane Crash Near Cone

### Horrified Mother Sees Crash In Front Of Home

The mother of Albert Lamb, 23, watched in horror Wednesday morning as the plane in which her son was flying with a friend and pilot from Midland crashed and burned in front of their home five miles southwest of Cone.

The pilot, Darrel Thomas, 32, had agreed to take Albert by the A. J. Lamb home, parents of the deceased, and the two had flown to Lubbock from Midland where they both resided.

The pair left Lubbock airport at 7 a. m. Wednesday, flew to the Lamb home and had started a circle to the west of the home and evidently nosed into the ground making the circle at a very low altitude. It is surmised by the parents of the deceased that when the plane circled back east with the wind to its rear that the plane motor died and caused the plane to nose into the ground.

The crash occurred about 7:15 a. m., both occupants were burned beyond recognition and the plane was totally destroyed. Lamb's wife and three month old son were to travel by auto to visit his parents Wednesday and he decided to take the faster trip by plane with his friend in order to enjoy a longer visit with his parents. Lamb was also learning to fly.

Lamb was employed by the Phillips Oil Company in Midland. He is survived by five brothers of the home and one sister, Mrs. Buddy Watts of Floydada.

Funeral arrangements were incomplete at press time Wednesday.

Contracts have been signed and effective September 1, 1963, Producers Cooperative Elevators of Floydada and Dougherty have purchased the Henry Edwards Elevator at Dougherty.

This will give Producers three elevators in this area, one in Floydada and two in Dougherty. The business transaction marked the end of 49 years in the elevator business and retirement for Edwards who began in the business with his father in 1914 in the present location of (See Producers, Page 5)

### Pepper Patches Put Pesos Picker's Pockets

Another important Floyd county crop is in the process of being marketed this week. Both bell and hot peppers are either being hauled directly to Fort Worth markets or processed at the shed in Floydada.

Over 125 acres will be harvested in the county. One grower, B. A. Robertson markets through a Fort Worth broker; Guy Ginn, Lane Decker, John Kimble, Grady Walker, Chuck Holmes and the Simpson Brothers are marketing through a central plant in Floydada. According to the growers this year's crop is average and it appears at this time that prices will be average or better. An average crop is five tons to the acre. The peppers are picked three or four times.

The above "pepper men" also will soon be marketing tomatoes and cucumbers.

A big watermelon feast for the entire family and the annual meeting of Plains Cotton Growers of Floyd County is scheduled at the Floyd County Fairgrounds in Lockney Friday night at 7:30 o'clock.

An interesting program is planned and two new directors will be elected. Every cotton farmer and his family is urged to attend this annual meeting. Many current and future cotton items of interest will be discussed.

### Members Golf Tournery Starts Sunday At Club

Floydada Country Club will start a club membership golf tournament on Sunday, September 1. Golf Professional Bobby Westfall says there will be one match played each week for the next three weeks and flight champions and runners-up will be named by Sunday, September 22.

Entry fee for the tournament will be \$5 and the above named winners will each receive trophies.

Golfers will be bracketed in each year flights and all contests will be in matched play. There will be no qualifying rounds played and interested golfers need only contact Westfall who will handicap contestants and place them in proper flights.

The championship flight bracket has already been drawn up and first round matches will be between Skinny Winn and Aaron Carthel; Morgan McReynolds and C. L. Davis; Max Dyess and Bill DuBois; Bill Walker and T. W. Battey. Westfall is expecting some eleven to eight man flights to participate in the three week event.

### School Tax Sessions End Yesterday

The scheduled tax sessions, which were designed to inform the school tax payer in the Floydada district about next year's taxes were closed at the high school yesterday.

However, the school tax office reports that anyone who was unable to meet with the McMorries Company and the equalization board is invited to come by the school tax office in the county courthouse and a new schedule of interviews will begin in about ten days.

School officials said that both the McMorries Company and the equalization board would endeavor to meet with every interested patron of the school district. Approximately 300 of the 2700 tax payers in the district have met with the group.

It is reported that most of the tax increase has been assessed the farm property in the district, although most city property has also been increased.

School officials report that some adjustments up and down to property evaluations by the McMorries Company have been made in order to be fair to the tax payer. The tax payer is invited to compare his assessment with his neighbors.

### Whitaker Buys Cotton Bowl

Harold Whitaker announced this week his purchase of the Cotton Bowl, bowling lanes in Floydada from Glen Batson of Littlefield.

The sale becomes effective September 1. The bowling lanes opened here in early 1960 and Whitaker has been associated with the business. (See Whitaker, Page 5)

### Children Must Attend School

Superintendent of Floydada schools A. E. Baker said his week that the state's compulsory school attendance law will be enforced here this school term.

Baker quoted HB331 as follows, "every child in the state who is seven years of age and not more than 16 and who is not a high school graduate or exempt from public school at-

tendance as provided in Article 2893 shall be required to attend the public schools in the district of its residence or in some other district to which it may be transferred for a minimum of the entire regular school term."

Baker said that he would be happy to answer any further questions and discuss the matter with all interested parties.

### Boll Weevil Experts Converge On County Tuesday; Discuss Control Possibilities

Entomologists from College Station, FHA advisors from this area and many interested local and area farmers joined in a meeting in the agricultural building in Floydada Tuesday morning to begin an organized effort to control or rid this area of boll weevils.

Dr. P. L. Adkisson of College Station, outlined the experience he and other entomologists have had in the El Paso valley and central Texas in controlling and eradicating the boll weevil.

College Station's head of the entomology department, Dr. J. C. Gaines, next spoke on various

spray methods and the life cycle of the boll weevil. He said that late irrigated crops allowed the weevil to fatten late in the season enabling him to withstand the cold winter.

W. L. Owen, Jr. entomologist with the agricultural experiment station at Lubbock who last year and this year has studied the boll weevil infestation in the Dougherty area said there was no doubt in his mind that some of this year's weevils withstood the unusually cold weather of last winter. This was proved by the fact that boll weevils were found as early as June 25 in the Baker community.

He said that other weevils which have been found on as many as 20 farms in the Dougherty area have probably migrated from below the cap because they arrived this month.

Adkisson said that in one big area of the El Paso valley they had been able to completely eradicate the weevil. It was his recommendation that Floyd county farmers use control measures up to cotton harvest time, then begin a heavy spray schedule to completely eradicate the weevil. . . . begin-

Results of the meeting center around the agreement of a four county area of Dickens, Crosby, Biscoe and Floyd to begin a war with the weevils just below the cap rock in order that they will be unable to migrate onto the plains.

The fight is two-fold. First, to kill the weevil that is migrating onto the plains from below the cap rock. Second, to completely eradicate the weevils that are already on the plains and evidently able to withstand the cold.

Owens pointed out that the weevil likes damp weather and that he remembered weevils were in the Dougherty area back in 1941 . . . a particularly very wet year. He said that early cotton, which could be defoliated, dried out. (See Weevil, Page 8)

### The "True And False" Of The School Tax Increase

For the past week we have heard talk up and down the streets of Floydada concerning the school tax increase following an increase of property evaluation by McMorries & Company and the equalization board. We have interviewed several persons and looked at several tax records to try to answer the statements that we have heard . . . and answer them with the true facts.

Statement: "Everybody's up at the school protesting the high taxes." This statement is false. Although school tax officials invited every school tax payer to inspect his new property evaluations, only 300 of the district's 2700 tax payers came in to discuss the new tax rate. Only a small percentage of the 300 have complained about the increase.

Statement: "They raised everybody's taxes." This statement is false. In some cases of down town property in Floydada that remains unrented, the taxes were lowered.

Statement: "The farmers are suffering the biggest tax increase." This statement is true. Because the district's farmers had a land evaluation of \$25 to \$35 per acre on top irrigated land, the evaluation group of McMorries & Company set a more realistic value of up to \$350 per acre. In fact much of this re-evaluated land has been selling from \$400 to \$600 per acre.

Statement: "Town property owners should have the largest valuation increase." This statement is false and a quick look at tax records for several years back will indicate that townspeople have been taxed on a very realistic appraisal for many years.

Statement: "The school board spent \$20,000 to hire that McMorries bunch to put high values on all this property." This statement is false. The school board paid McMorries \$13,200 for the property valuation.

Statement: "They're just gonna build more schools for all these Mexicans." This statement is true . . . and for the white people. The Mexican families were brought to this community by the farmers who appreciate their work and pay them for it. By schooling our Latin-Americans they will become better citizens in our community. The merchants appreciate their business also.

Statement: "The school board is just a bunch of spendthrifts . . . they're spending too much money running this school"

This statement is false according to a recent statement of an expert from Austin whose business is cost of operation of schools. He made the statement about two months ago that he was "surprised at the ability of the Floydada school board to operate the schools on the small amount of money used." He also stated that Floydada's cost of educating a child was below the state's average.

Statement: "The school board is going to waste several hundred thousand dollars remodeling those old school buildings." This statement is false when architects report that the basic structure of the two older buildings is in better condition than the new High School. It would be poor business to give up these good structures for initial cost of new.

Statement: "Well, we'll just vote the school bond election down if they're gonna raise the taxes." The person who makes this statement may be making a true statement about his voting intentions yet voting the bonds down won't lower his new higher taxes. If the school board isn't allowed to build a new grade school, it can only continue to spend money for temporary rem-delings and continue to move in ready built temporary housing for more needed grade school space.

Statement: "I only met with the tax board and the McMorries Company to find out what my new rate was . . . I didn't go up there to complain." This statement is true and it is quite possible that the school tax office would be smart even now to send its patrons a post card, indicating the new rates.

Statement: "The equalization board and McMorries Company isn't fairly evaluating property." The tax payer is invited, even urged to compare his property evaluation with that of his neighbor. If errors in measurements, evaluations or other phases of the tax is incorrect, the taxing officials are happy to rework the evaluation for fairness and correctness.

In conclusion The Hesperian asks this question: "Who would trade places with anyone in the world today who doesn't have the obligations . . . and the privileges of paying taxes?"

### Looking Down The Road

Following is an editorial published by the Ochiltree County Herald concerning the problem of aging.

None of us ever think we are going to get old - but we will. And the problem of aging is becoming more and more real to Americans faced with it.

Rev. Don Davidson of Hereford, manager of the King Manor home for aged people, spoke Monday night to the Methodist Men in Perryton and pointed out a few facts about the problem of age and aging which impressed us.

King Manor takes those over 65 years of age but they are considering raising this to 70 because a person of 65 is no longer really old.

Just as children are getting older faster, adults are staying

younger longer. The age categories of even the recent past scarcely apply to the present time.

The airlines and the stewardesses had a dispute recently because the airlines thought 32 was "old" for a stewardess and the stewardesses who were that age objected to the loss of their jobs.

Actually most women of 32 today look 10 years younger.

A generation or so ago, a woman of 40 had nearly had it. She was settled into middle age and usually looked it. Today's women are incredibly young in appearance and vitality in their late 30's and 40's.

Men in their 40's and 50's are still young and vigorous while their fathers and grandfathers were often in their old age by

then. Rev. Davidson said that the oldesters that come to King Manor are more than likely to be crowding 80 before they begin to show about setting old. He pointed out that those of us who are a long way from that age today may as well be thinking about reaching old age because more and more people are living into their 80's and in another generation it will not be uncommon at all to see those in their 90's still putting around.

Men and women who are into their 80's usually have outlived most of their friends and seem to be happier with new friends somewhere near their own age. Rev. Davidson said. A place like King Manor affords the opportunity to have companionship and activity with those in the same age category.

Modern medicine has worked wonders in prolonging life and extending the usefulness of men and women in this society of

ours. The average age of the population will continue to get older, and as more and more men and women reach the age of 70 and above, they need to have things to do and a place to go where they will be happy.

There is a boom on now in the construction of these "senior citizens homes" and we are witnessing the construction of one of the most modern in the country right here in Perryton where the Sanford rest home is going up.

This will be a real asset to Perryton and it will become even more valuable to the area as time goes by.

The problem of what to do with old people is one peculiar to America because no other country has the standard of living, the quality of food, the medical care, the other ingredients necessary to make people live longer. It's up to us to make the latter years more enjoyable and meaningful.



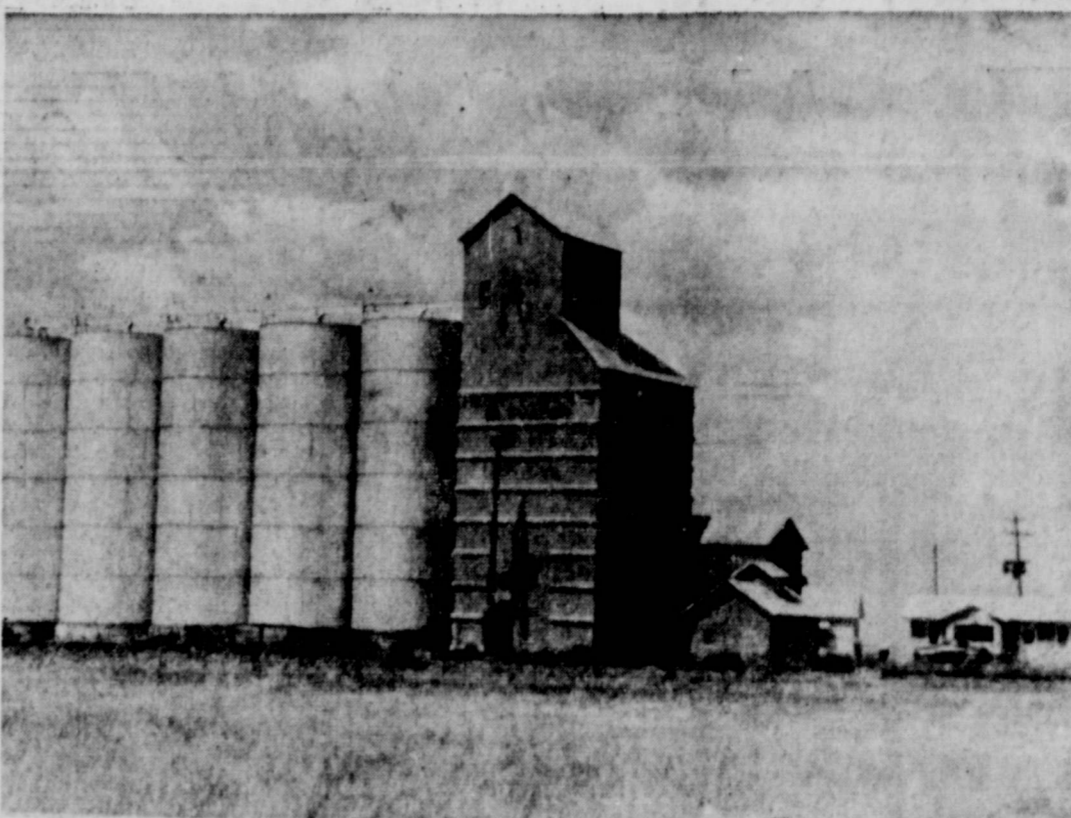

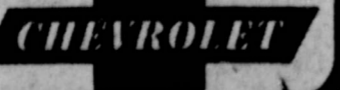

and spraying applications made would be a big start to the complete kill out of the weevil on the plains.

Weems Norman of Dougherty said that he could trace a pattern of weevils which followed a railroad onto the caprock. He said he was spraying mostly isolated spots in various fields in the Dougherty area.

The state entomologists admitted that they were in this area seeking information as well as giving advice. They said they had 50 years of experience fighting the weevil in central Texas, but only one year of observation of the weevil on the plains.

Besides the local county agent and assistant agent, FHA supervisors from Lubbock, Floydada, Crosby, Hale, Childress, Tulia, Seymour and Spur were present. The FHA state officer William Krouse of Temple was present, C. E. Fisher of the Texas agriculture extension office and Weldon Newton entomologist from College Station.

County agent Tom Davison said that an organized effort will possibly be made to help finance the drive to eradicate the boll weevil just below the cap rock.

close friendship with a scout from Norway.

Mac is an eagle scout and was given the honor of patrol leader at the Jamboree. Both boys received "Laurel Awards" for participation in "World Wide Games, Labors of Hercules, Friendship Exchange and Trialathlon". The above contests considered how fast a scout could meet other scouts from 11 different nations, an obstacle course, fellowship participation over food, and track events. In order to win laurel awards the scout must qualify in five out of eight events.

The scouts were impressed by the hard crusted bread that scouts from other countries were eating. Phil said you could hollow the bread from the inside and the crust was so

tough it would hold water.

Charcoal was supplied to each patrol for cooking purposes. Patrols were eight scout size. There was an abundance of fresh tomatoes.

Mac said what was supposed to be a soft cool gentle sea breeze reminded him of a Texas sandstorm. The encampment was not grassed.

Chief scout of Greece, Prince Constantine was emcee of the Jamboree and the American Contingent presented one of the programs during the event.

The boys said it seemed that they received more attention when they stated they were from Texas—than simply saying they were from the United States. Some of the scouts from other countries would mimic the Texans fast sixgun draw indicating

they were familiar with Texans.

After leaving the Jamboree the scouts were very much impressed with the Switzerland Mountains, especially one they viewed by cable car known as Mount Pilatus.

In Venice they were amazed at the streets of water and the resident's little care for sanitation as they threw garbage from upstairs windows into the watery streets . . . and later took a swim in the water.

They were in London four days on the way back to the States . . . saw Big Ben and many other well known tourist attractions there.

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# Floyd Philosopher Expounds On The Pros And Cons Of The Test Ban Treaty

Editor's note: The Floyd Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm takes a wide-angle view of the test ban treaty this week. Dear editor:

Although Congress hasn't asked me for my opinion on the test ban treaty and I don't think I could get away from this Johnson grass farm at the moment anyway to testify - it's not that I have anything to do here, but when it comes to not doing anything, this is the place to have it happen, not in Washington - I have decided to go ahead and state my views.

I did this after reading about the experts who have been testifying. The way I see it, when one group of scientists with all the facts says it's wise to sign the treaty, and another group with the same amount of facts says it isn't, this opens the door to anybody. What I mean is, if the same set of facts can lead to two exactly opposite views, facts aren't as impor-

tant as people claim and this allows me in, as I have about as few facts as anybody and half the time those I have are misplaced. I don't know what this does to the old and respected saying that a man isn't entitled to an opinion till he has the facts. If facts are going to lead to confusion, a man might as well take the short cut and be confused without them.

But to get down to my opinion, I'm not sure of this, but it may be that some nuclear scientists want to keep on testing firecrackers. A firecracker is to shoot, a bomb is to explode. Everybody knows that.

On the other hand, the testers claim they need to keep on testing to figure out a missile that'll destroy another missile before it lands. When you look at it that way, and try to picture the job of shooting down 1,000 missiles flying at us from Russia at 15,000 miles an hour in the middle of the night during

a snow storm you begin to see you're getting more facts than a man can handle.

I therefore want to go on record as being for the test ban treaty if it's safe, and against it if it's not, although safety is a word the scientists have just about nuclearized out of the dictionary.

In other words, to make myself clear, I'm in favor of the ban on one hand, and opposed to it on the other hand, recognizing that the facts may be that both my hands are tied away, probably behind my back.

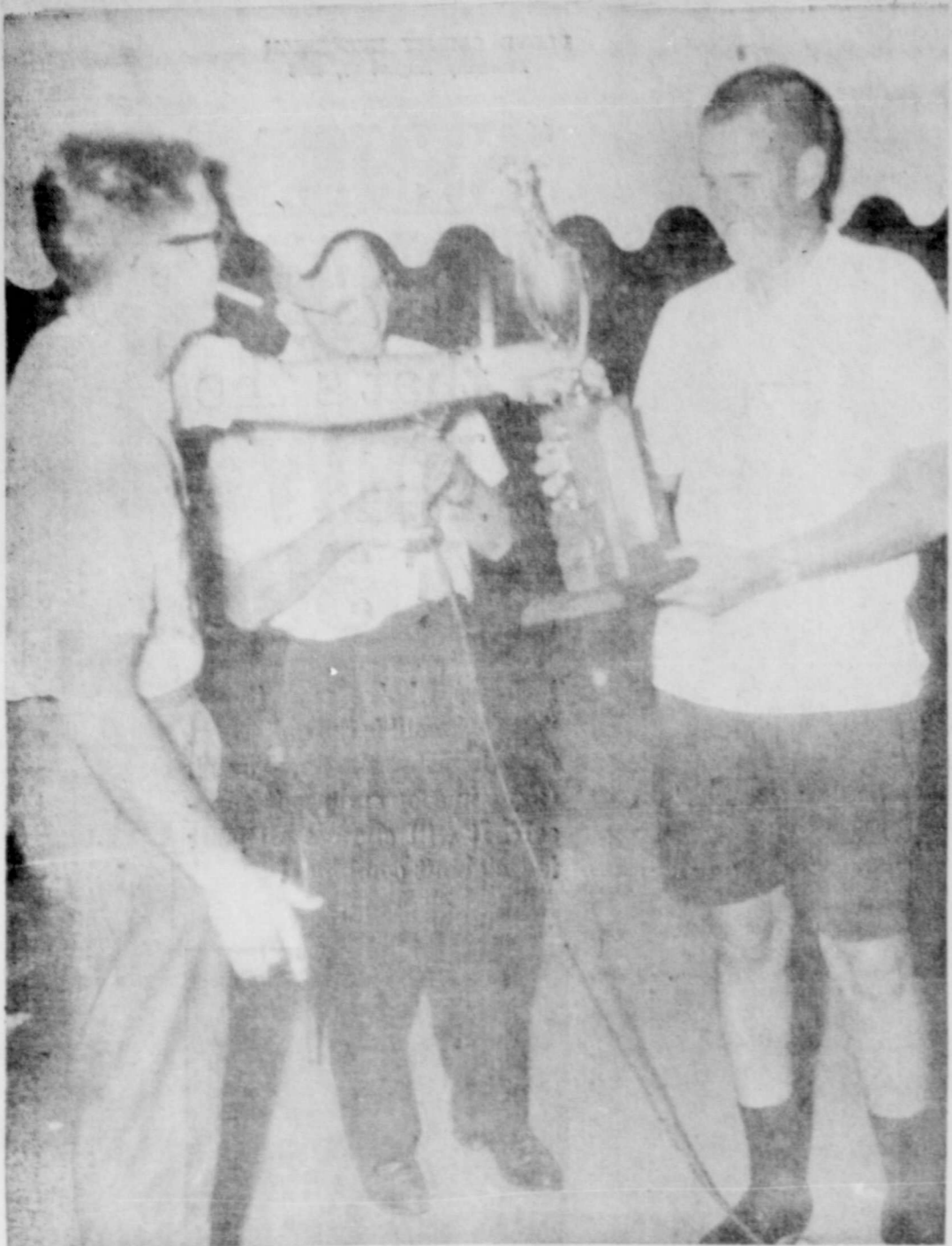

Editor's note: The Floyd Philosopher on his Johnsongrass farm discovers a new idea on increasing farm income, his letter this week indicates.

Dear editor:

With so many other grave problems facing the thinkers of the nation the farm problem generally has been ignored lately and it was therefore a pleasure to find an article in a newspaper last night getting back to the subject.

According to it, one way for a farmer to increase his dwindling income is to sell farm vacations to over-worked, wound-up city people. Instead of going to the beach or the mountains, a city family relies on a farm. The way it works is, a wound-up city man comes out and

spends a week or two in your home, away from the noise of the metropolis, where he can rest, view the scenery, enjoy a simple life, help with the fascinating chores, watch the sun go down, eat three solid meals a day, walk through the country, sleep soundly, and awake to the sweet lowing of cows, which generally takes place around daybreak.

Then he pays you for all this, and you take the money and go on a vacation of your own.

Now I don't know whether this will work or not, but I can testify that I have tried it on a limited basis and my advice to any farmer planning on making money off of city visitors is to watch

his prospective clientele pretty close.

I mean, the first thing you want to do is to steer clear of relatives and in-laws. You can get a lot of business with them, but the financial gains are awfully meager. It's sort of like the foreign aid business, all you get is good will and that stops when the aid does.

If there are any city people who want to vacation on this Johnson grass farm, I want it understood it's cash in advance. I wouldn't be interested in a swap where I'd have to spend a week in the city. I don't need to unwind, I never have wound up.
