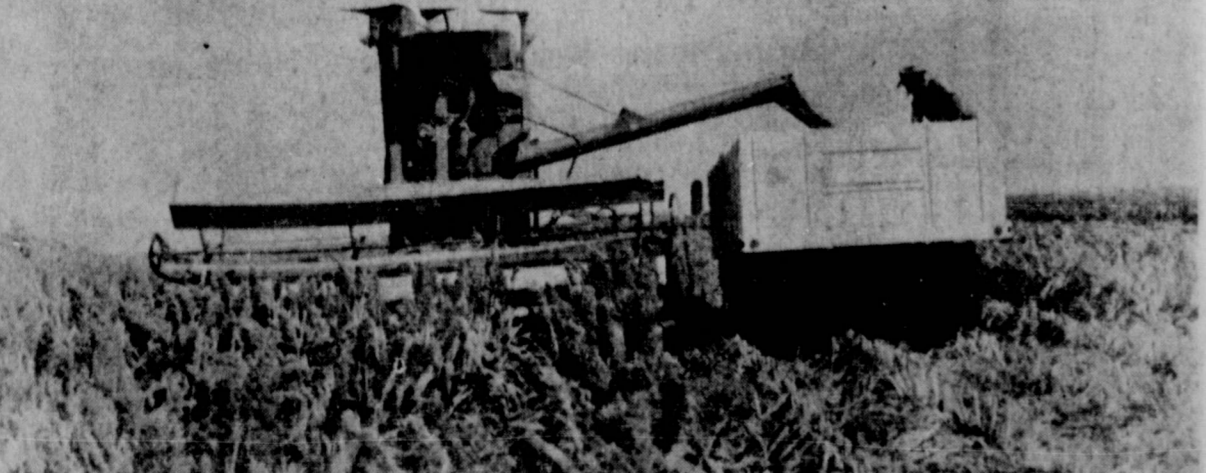
Open House Of New Rent Housing Project Sunday

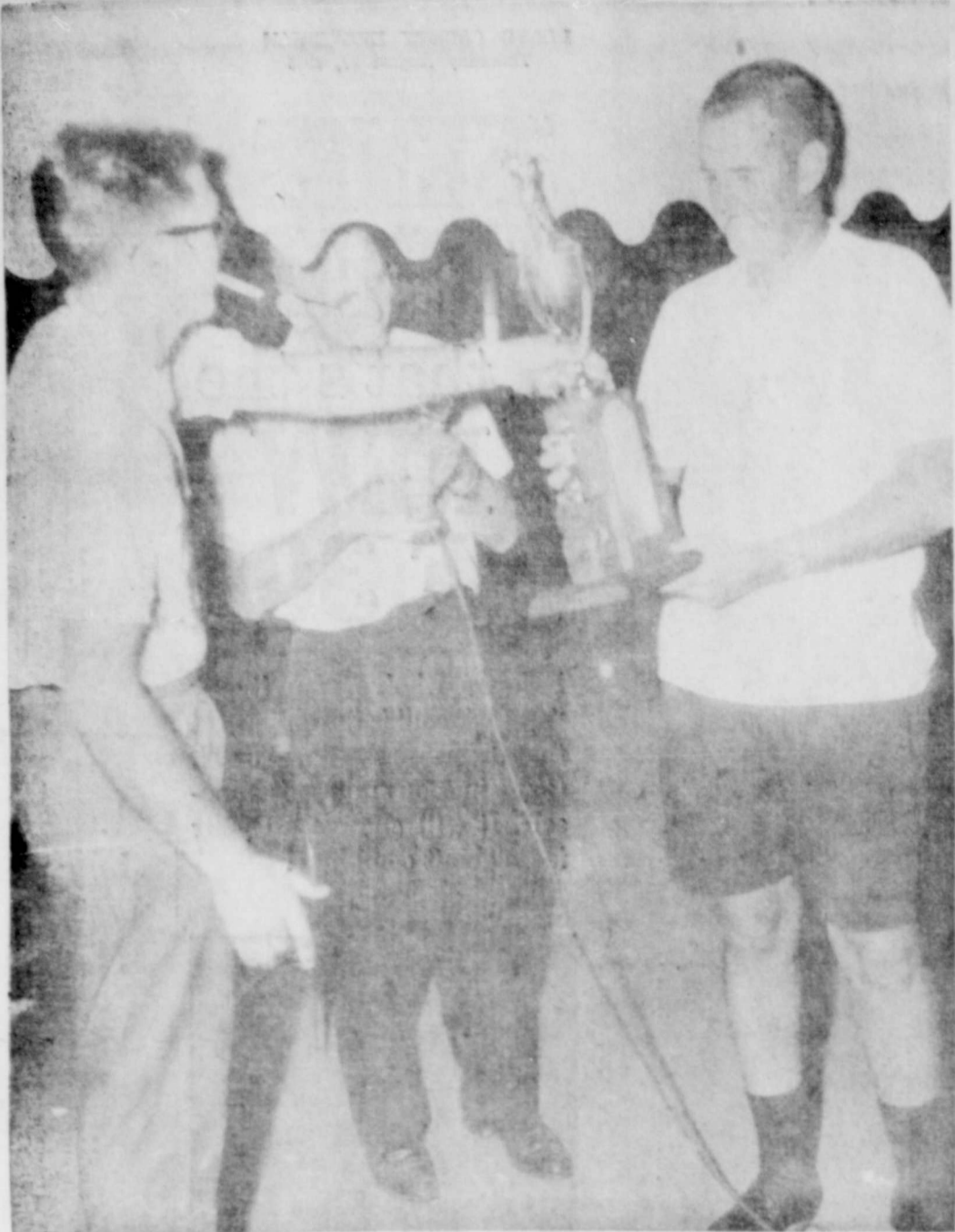

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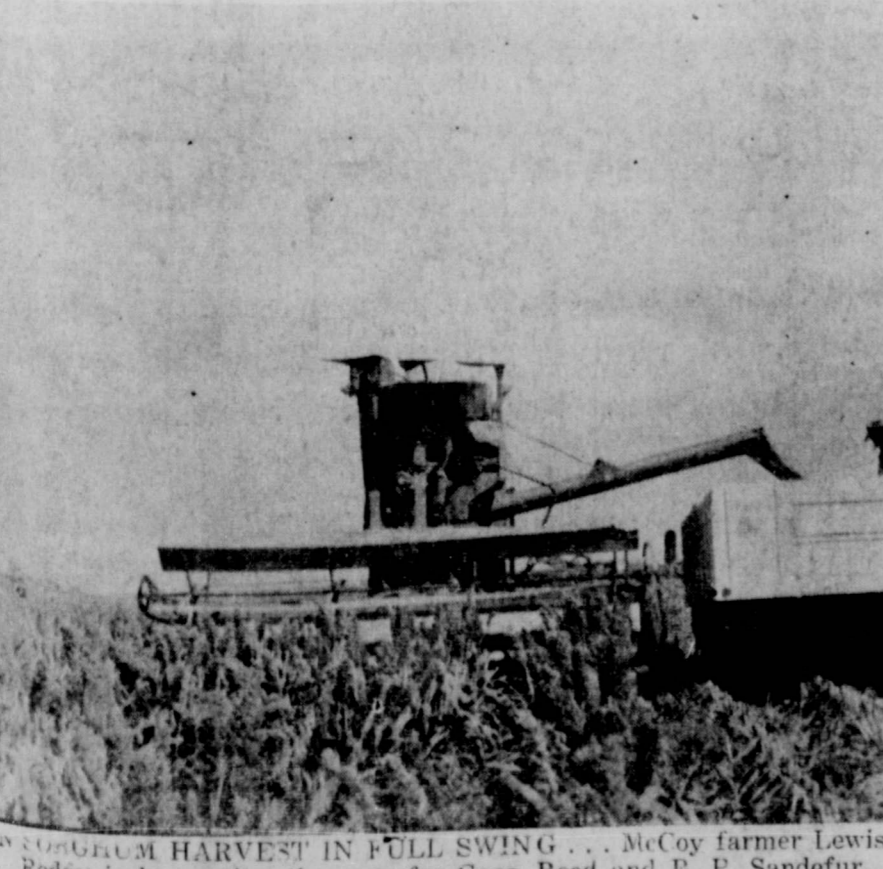
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# Floyd Philosopher Finds Far More Problems In The News Than He Has Any Answers For

Editor's note: The Floyd Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm seems a little puzzled this week. It's not the first time. Dear editor:

There are a lot of things I don't understand. For instance, those European countries in the Common Market have raised the tariff on American chickens, and the U. S. is thinking of retaliating by raising our tariff on things we import from over there, like perfume and wine.

Why couldn't it be quicker to set up a tariff on foreign aid? For every dollar we send them, charge them a quarter. As Benjamin Franklin would say today, a quarter saved in one place is a quarter spent in some place else.

Or take the airlines. I read the other day that the Civil Aeronautics Board has proposed that the annual subsidy to airlines be reduced from 84 million dollars to 54 million. The airlines object, saying the reduction will reduce air service. You mean to say the airlines are no smarter than farmers and have been living off of the government help, why don't they give it up and get a job in town?

On top of this, another article I read listed the grants to municipal airports throughout the country, running into the millions of dollars, about 75 million for the current year. As I understand it, the government gives this money so the cities can improve the runways, buy more land to make longer runways, improve the roads leading to the airports, etc.

It's hard for me to see the difference between a city's taking government money to patch a runway and a farmer's taking money to build a terrace, but this is because I can't see the difference between stand-on-your-own feet farming and municipal improvement, although city papers have been trying to hammer this into my head for years.

Also, I read an article in a big national magazine the other week on how much pork barrel money the government is spending, and I wanted to write and ask that magazine how much subsidy it was getting in the form of low postal rates, but I was afraid the magazine would ask me how much it would have cost me to deliver my letter from this Johnson grass farm to New York in person, instead of getting the government to do it for a nickel.

When it comes to denouncing government help, it's hard to find a man to throw the first rock, although I will undertake the job if the government will pay me to do it.

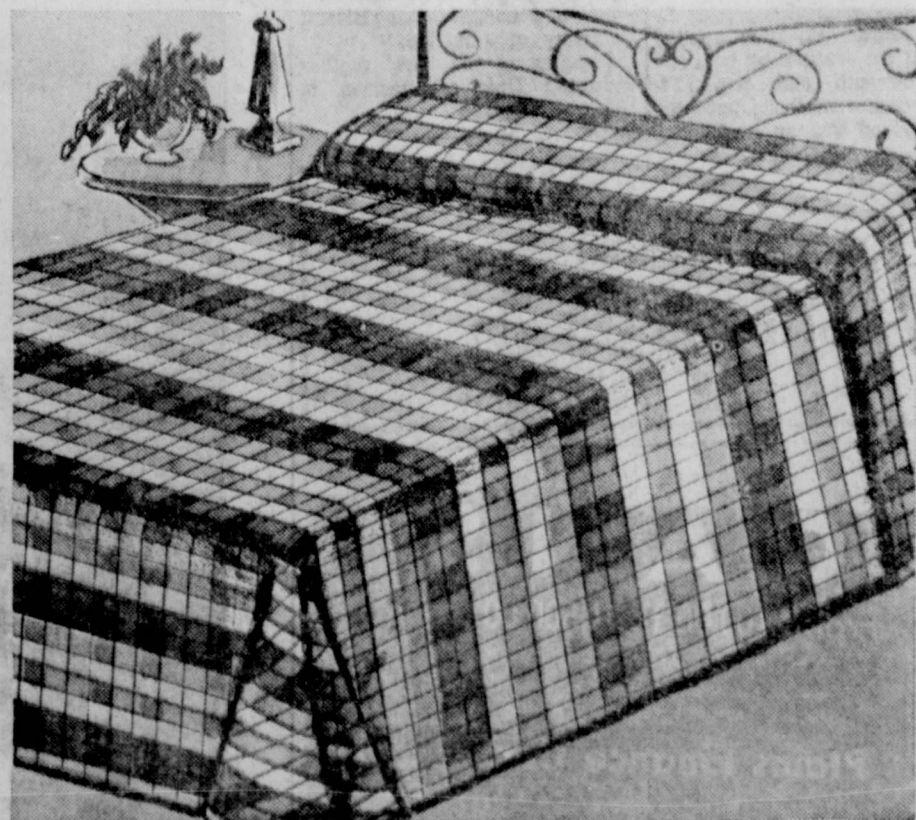

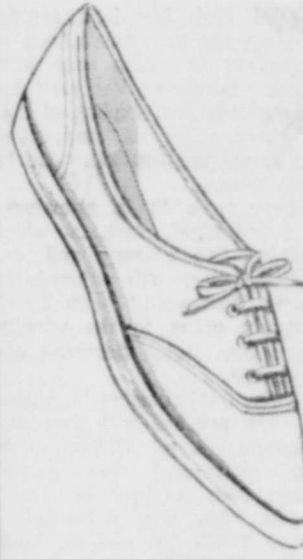

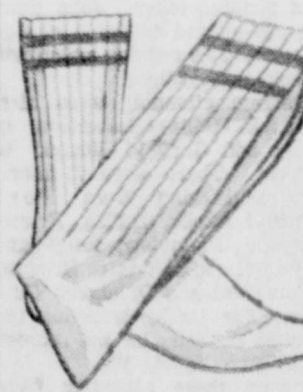

### Congressman George Mahon

#### Visiting In Home District

LUBBOCK, Sept. 5 - Congressman George Mahon spent the first part of the week in the District, stating that the House was marking time for a few days.

Mahon said that the issues in Congress were being hard fought in the best American tradition and that the indications were that Congress would be in session until much later in the year. He said that it was the duty of Congress to remain in session until the work was completed. Mahon agreed the legislative output of Congress this year has not been very great, but added that he felt Congress should be judged not only by the legislation it passed, but also by the legislation it did not pass. He pointed out that a considerable volume of work would have to be completed before Congress could adjourn later in the year.

He said that the most important pending legislation directly affecting West Texas was cotton legislation designed to deal with the crisis in cotton. The outcome of such legislation, he explained, was uncertain at this time.

With respect to pending Bracero legislation, he indicated that the chances were fairly good that Congress would agree on a simple one-year extension of the present law. In late May the House, in a surprise move, voted down a two-year extension.

Mahon stated that if the legislative program in Congress permitted he would return to Texas next week to attend the annual meeting of the Plains Cotton Growers at Lubbock and the Field Day program of High Plain Research Foundation at Halfway near Plainview.

### County Agent Warns Of Cotton Wilt

Cotton Verticillium Wilt ising up to some extent says County Agent H. T. Davison. This disease causes a definite mottling of leaves with pale yellowish areas on the margins and between the veins. As the disease progresses, the yellow areas in the leaf turn brown. Shortly after infection, the cotton plants will show brownish streaks in the stem and may completely darken the wood.

Disease readily spreads as diseased plant parts are scattered. Certain practices of precaution should be exercised.

1. Plant seed free of trash, as diseased leaf and stem parts will carry the fungus. Verticillium may be carried on but not in cotton seed.

2. Plow under crop residue immediately after harvest.

3. Refrain from spreading gin trash on fields as most gin trash will be infested with Verticillium wilt.

REDUCE LOSSES BY

1. Follow a crop rotation. Other crops not susceptible to Verticillium wilt will sow the hold-up of the disease. Potato, tomato, cantaloupe, sugar beet, soybean and flax are susceptible and should not be used in rotation.

2. Do not over-irrigate. Use no more water than necessary for cotton production, since water lowers the soil temperature this favors the wilt fungus.

3. Try dry summer fallow. Tests in wilt areas have shown this to be beneficial in reducing 4. Weed control.

5. Plant tolerant varieties.

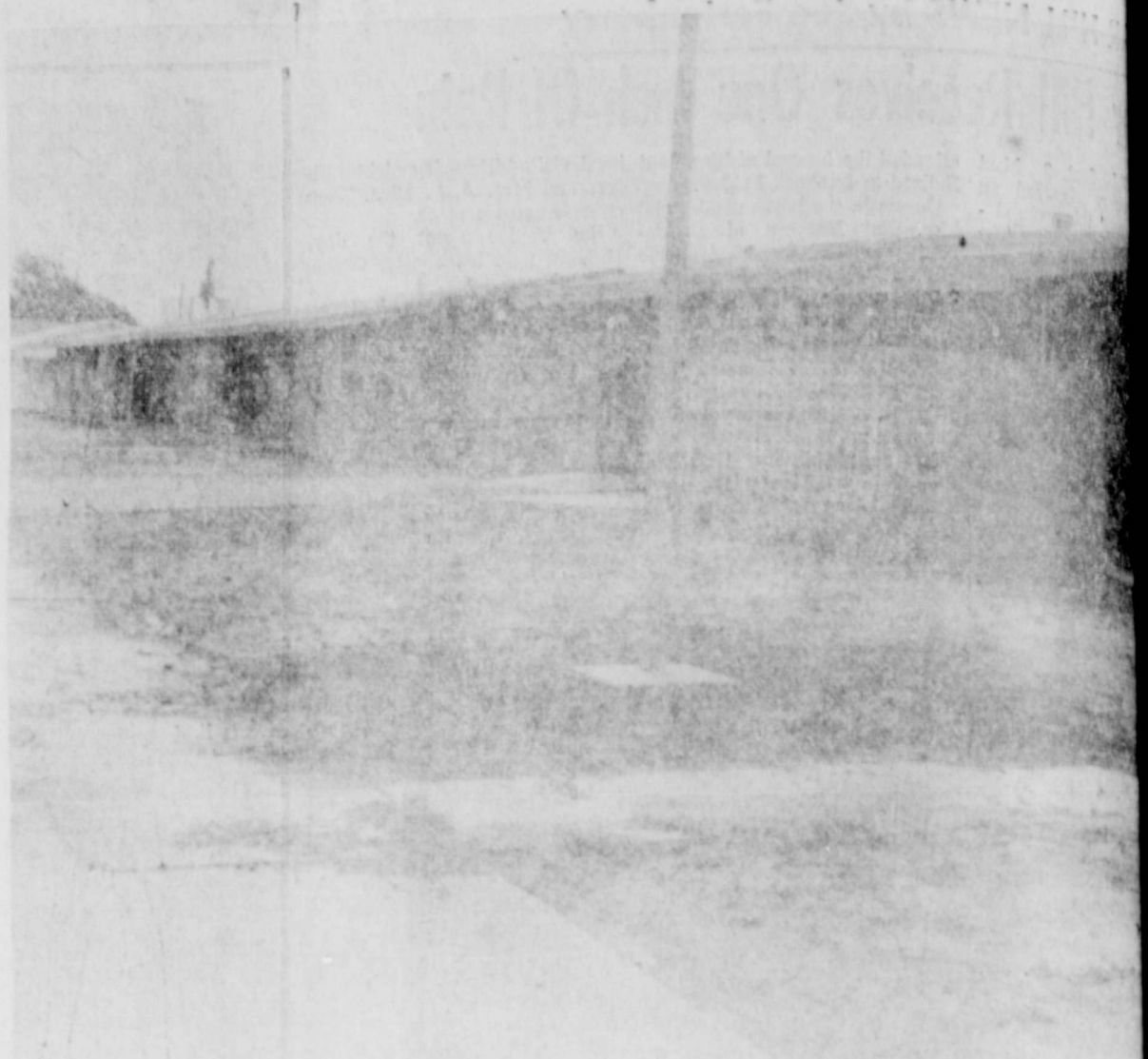

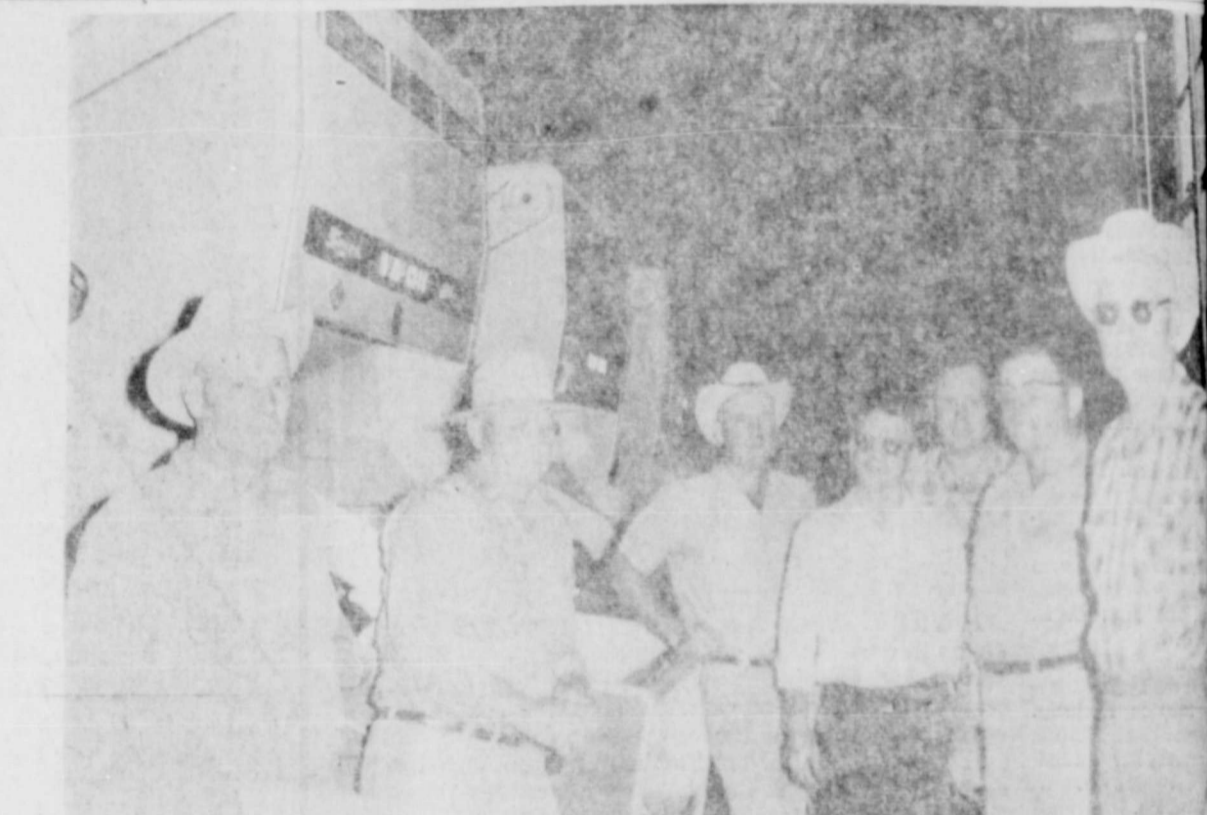

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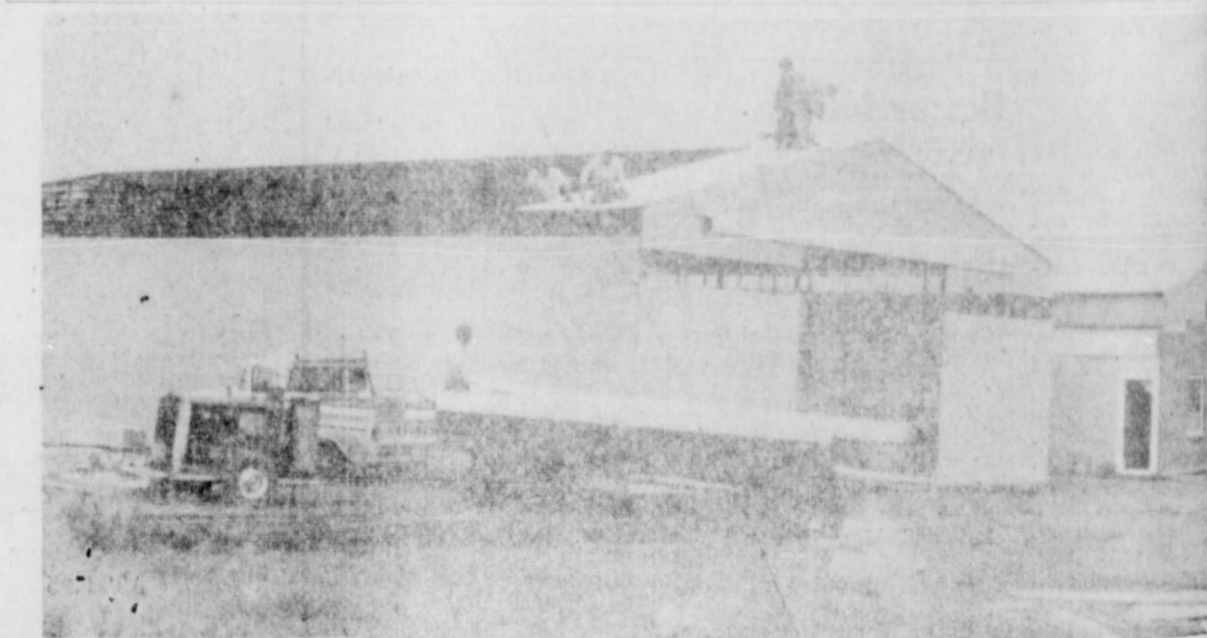

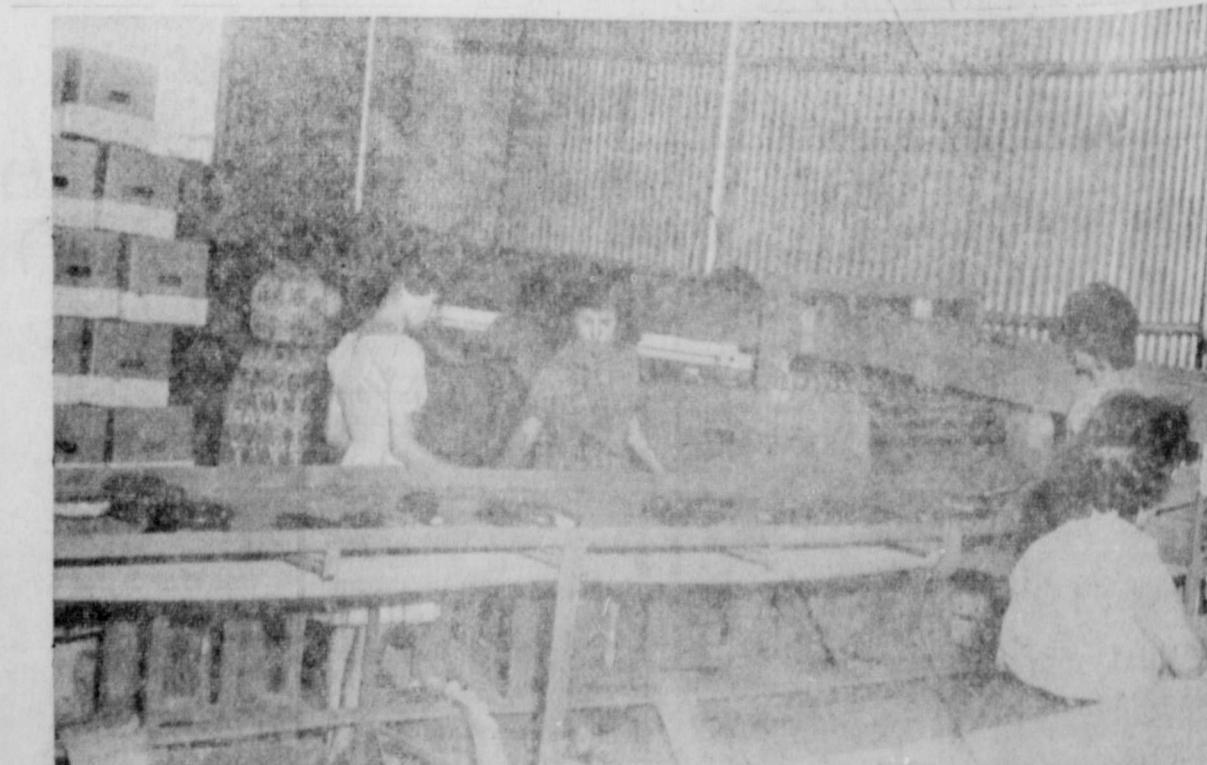

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## 1200 Floyd County Acres Leveled This Year

Interest in land leveling in the Floyd County Soil Conservation District is at an all time high. This is evidenced by the fact that 1200 acres of land was leveled last year. Since 1955, 8,522 acres of land has been leveled in the district. This represents a financial investment of approximately one half million dollars.

When and leveling is carried out it results in conservation of moisture and prevents damage caused by water erosion. It also aids in the even distribution of water in the soil profile. Studies conducted by Soil Conservation Service Technicians after spring rains showed that the moisture penetrated to a depth of 6 feet on leveled areas as compared to 2.5 feet on hilly sloping fields adjoining this area where no leveling was carried out. This is very significant since it has been proven by the High Plains Research Foundation at Halfway that it takes 75 percent more water to produce the same amount of cotton, sorghum or soybeans on sloping land than on leveled land.

A good start has been made in applying this practice on the Norman, S. J. McIntosh,

 Now everything is set - roll fork and work it like an axle, winding spaghetti in to a light ball. Long scraggly pieces, cut off by pressing against edge of spoon.

Well, here she goes! Shove the compact little bundle into the mouth. It's a big bite. But don't worry, that's eating spaghetti, and many an etiquette critic approves - because it's you, and not the vest, that gets the gravy.

Italian sophisticates claim that the correct procedure is to take but a few strands on the fork, forking near the edge of the plate. Twist the fork with a gentle movement from left to right until the ends of the strands show at the fork's bottom. So a little lump is formed which fits easily into the mouth, and straggly bits can be broken off by pressing fork against the plate edge, or a piece of crusty bread held in the left hand. Raise the fork and bring it sideways into the mouth. This way it slips in easily.

Remember, it is the fork that must reach the mouth, and not the eater reaching the fork!

WHILE WE'RE on the subject of crops, it is interesting to ask our area farmers "well, how much wheat are you gonna sow?"

Since the nation's farmers have rejected the Freeman 1984 wheat certificate plan, a farmer is allowed to plant all the acres

of wheat he desires this September. Most of the farmers I have talked to will sow the same amount of wheat as last year, staying within the allotment in hopes that a new wheat program will be developed by the government before next spring.

Some will plant more than the allotment with plans of grazing wheat until plow up time.

The farmer who plants over his allotment could possibly suffer as much as a 9 percent loss of acreage allotment if a new program is set up by the government next year according to the local ASC office.

Many a farmer will make the decision to stay within the acreage allotments simply because he has most of his other land in soil bank, cotton or milo and doesn't have just an abundance of other land available for more wheat. Others who have only a limited amount of water, can only water allotted acres.

The decision to fertilize wheat acreages or not poses another problem. It takes very little figuring to see that \$1.25 wheat won't pay to be fertilized.

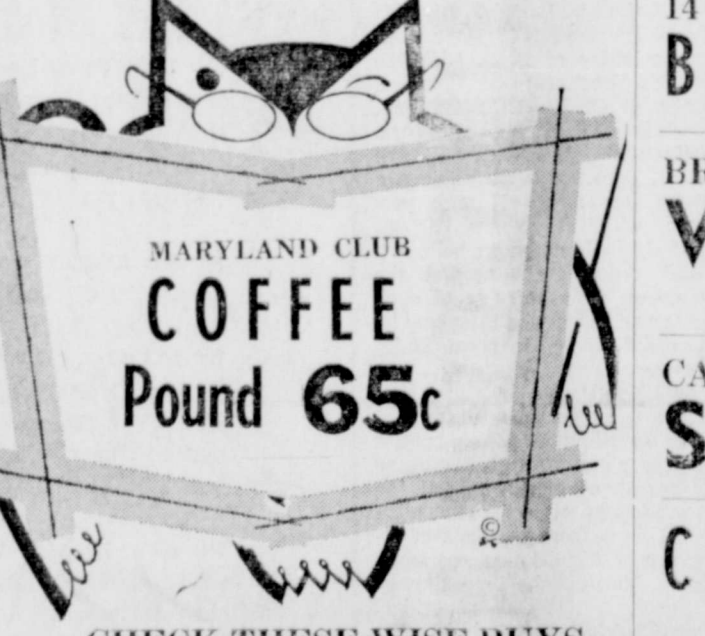

He has looked over several of the sugar beet crops in the county and has made purity, sugar content, and ton per acre estimations. He said he had been in the sugar beet business for 24 years and had "never seen

beets grow as fast." He found some of the county's crops to show a potential of over 30 tons to the acres, sugar content ratings of 15.7 and purity tests up to 90 percent. This all indicates a very excellent crop he said.

He also said that he was estimating some crops in this area would make an outstanding yield of 40 tons per acre. Knaus said that the president

of Great Western will personally tour Castro, Swisher, Hale, Lamb and Floyd Counties this week and personally see how the crop looks. Knaus said that he expected to take the president to the Hereford area to see sugar beet crops that have been hit with a blight — that the Plainview area beets were superior this year to Hereford's crop.

When asked what the gross price would possibly be on the beets, Knaus said that after freight was paid on the beets from Plainview that the grower should receive ten or eleven dollars per ton.

The Rotary speaker was introduced by chamber of Commerce manager John Reue, who also introduced two beet producers present.

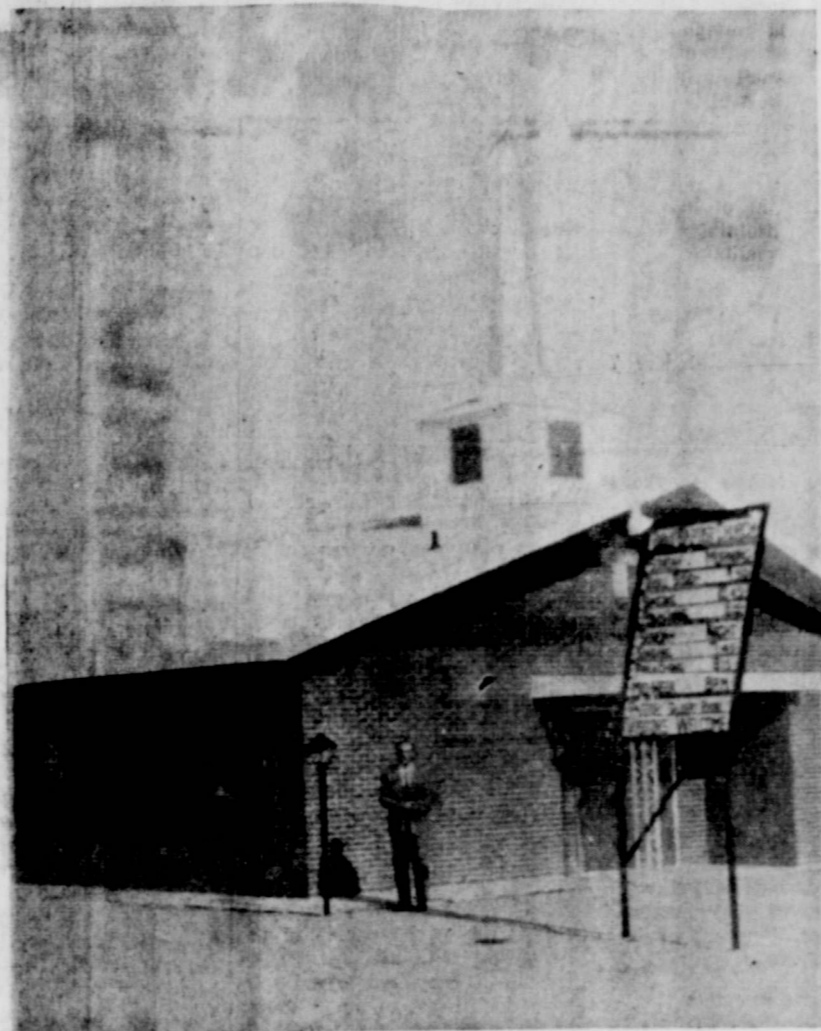

### Dividends For Korean Vets

This is to advise that the Special Dividend payable to Veterans of the Korean Campaign, who hold Government Life Insurance known as "RS" Insurance who either exchange such RS Insurance for "W" Insurance, is payable only to Veterans known as FIVE YEAR LIMITED CONVERTIBLE TERM INSURANCE, or convert such RS Insurance to permanent type Insurance. The period for exchanging RS Insurance for W Insurance in order to become entitled to the SPECIAL INSURANCE DIVIDEND expires SEPTEMBER 13, 1965, — the Second Friday in September.

This Law only applies to the Korean Campaign Veterans who obtained their RS Insurance within 120 days after their release from Active Service. RS Insurance was no longer available after December 31, 1956. D. G. ## Canyon Favored To Repeat As District 2AA Champion

Before the football hopefuls of district 2AA put on their pads for the 1962 season the so called experts had already come up with some predictions as to how the championship would go this year.

Most of these typewriter jockeys tabbed the Canyon Eagles as the team to beat and placed them in the favored spot. Behind Canyon they picked Tulia to finish second, Floydada third and Abernathy and Lockney to battle it out for the cellar position.

Taking a look at the old football programs left over from last fall, studying the teams won last season and then taking a peek at what the coaches are hoping for in 1962 we have found the following "pop" which may or may not be of interest to the fan who is finding it hard to wait for whistle time on Friday night.

The loop leading Canyon Eagles had a season record of eight wins against three losses and scored 261 points while allowing 84.

Floydada for the season won eight and lost two as the Whirlwinds scored 216 points while giving up 102.

Tulia had a fine year also as the big Hornet team went for seven wins against three losses. Tulia scored 217 points and gave up 133 in their 10 game schedule.

Abernathy won six and lost four for the year. The Antelopes

scored 213 points and gave up 168 for the season.

The Lockney Longhorns started out like a house afire in inter-sectional play going for five straight wins. They ran out their string before loop action started and lost four straight. The Longhorns scored 101 points and gave up 119 in a nine game schedule.

A Look At This Year

Canyon the king of the district, graduated 13 seniors last May, and six of these boys started against Floydada, and several others were important cogs in the machine. The Eagles will be strong again, however, as they return five starters and have back 13 of last year's 26 man traveling team. Canyon has a good program to feed their varsity team. The Eagles may well be one of the favorites this fall but they have lost a lot of their big guns.

Runner up Floydada suffered even worse from graduation. The Whirlwinds also lost 13 seniors last spring but eight to nine of these were starters on offense and six or seven were normally defensive regulars. The Winds had some experienced backs to return but not very many regular linemen. Floydada should be strong in '63 but it will be hard for them to improve on their 1962 season record.

Tulia finished third last fall. The Hornets graduated nine boys who suited out against the Winds. Seven of these seniors were starters leaving only four regulars to return this fall along with a total of 15 squadmen. Tulia will be about in the same slot again this fall.

Abernathy can look forward to little relief this year in the district wars. Last year the Antelopes finished one notch out of the cellar. They graduated 14 seniors including nine regulars and the big guns of their offense and defense. The Antelopes do not stand to be improved much this year.

Lockney's Longhorns finished at the bottom of the heap last season. The Horns graduated 13 from their squad of 21. They will have trouble trying to field a team anything like as strong as in '62.

On the inter-sectional slate Spur graduated eight seniors including four starters. They will be stronger but no power house. Olton's Mustangs graduated eight seniors including only three regulars and should be a very strong contender in '63.

Childress had a senior ball club last year. Their graduation losses were heavy and got a lot of key personnel. With a big squad and a good program they will be strong but not as strong as in '62.

Ralls Jackrabbits may be stronger this fall. They graduated only six from their squad and Ralls played a lot of underclassmen much of last year in a building program. They could be tough this fall.

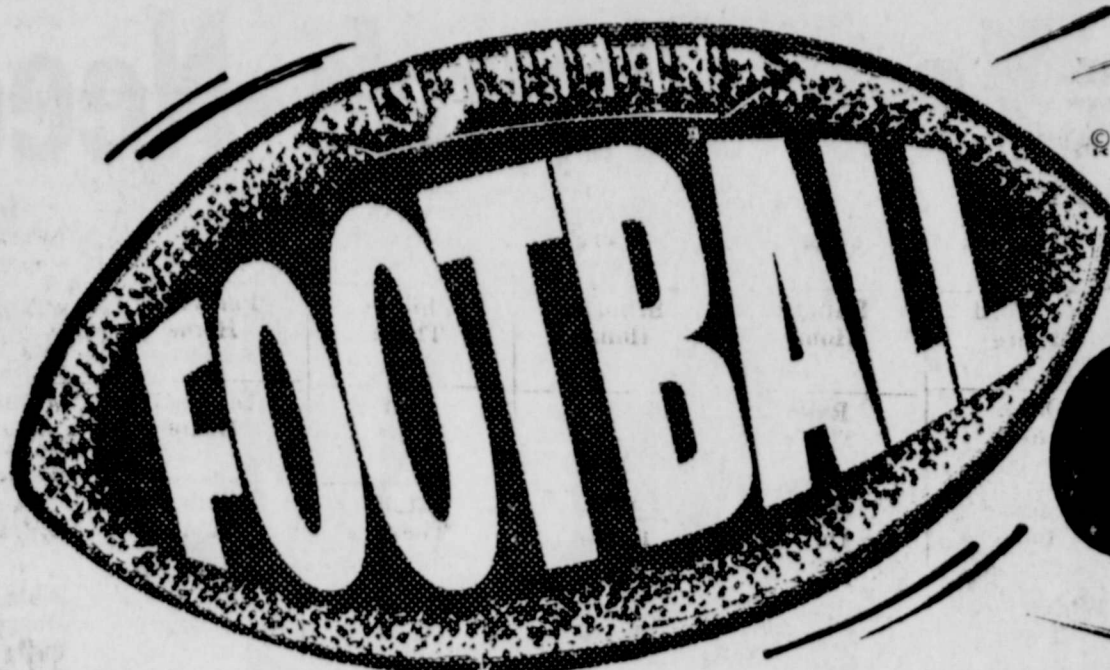

# School Board Announces \$800,000 Bond Vote

## School Tax Payers and Public Meeting

School tax paying group of 203 attended a special meeting in the Floydada High school auditorium Thursday night to ask questions of the district's board about the new tax increase for 1963.

Meeting was conducted in an orderly and informal manner with J. M. Willson, Sr., serving as moderator. Most of the questions were directed to the board.

McMorries Man Speaks To Club  
A representative of the McMorries & Company property evaluators, Lee Jacobs told the Floydada Lions club at its weekly luncheon last week the procedures that his company used in arriving at a fair property evaluation for all patrons of the Floydada school district.

Lion Ralph Rucker introduced the program as "Taxation with Representation." Jacobs said their evaluation study began with a worksheet of all property on the tax roll, inspection of the property with measurements and classifications. The property then received a comparable sales analysis to see what its market value should be. City lots were appraised on a per front feet value.

Rural property was classified "grass, dry, irrigated" land. Jacobs said that ASC maps were useful in classifying types of land also. Improvements were classified similarly to town improvements.

Jacobs said that the main effort was devoted to equalize farm to city property, industry to private property.

He said that all property valuations were not increased, some were decreased.

Jacobs emphasized the fact that the results of his company's work was the property of the school and that the final decision on each patron's property would be made by the school tax equalization board.

The equalization board is composed of Mal Jarboe, Marion Tucker and Dorris Jones.

In discussing the evaluation of farm land Jacobs said the best irrigated land in the district was appraised at \$350 per acre. In (See McMorries, Page 6)

## Petitions Ask For Vote On Saturday, September 28th

Petitions are being circulated this week seeking a bond vote for \$800,000 to build a new grade school, more cafeterias, a science addition and a complete remodeling job for all schools in the Floydada school district.

The petition asks that the vote be presented to the people for vote on Saturday, September 28.

The bond vote was anticipated since the district's school board had instructed a property evaluating company to equally appraise all property in the school district in order to make the bonds saleable.

Every tax payer in the school district who is exempt by age or has paid his or her poll tax is eligible to vote on the bond.

The \$800,000 bond will be used as follows if a majority of the voters approve it: Remodeling at Andrews Ward grade school, \$36,619.00; remodeling at Junior High, \$40,990.00; work on Junior High gymnasium, \$2,650.00; remodeling at the high school, \$3,300.00; new 25 room grade school, \$432,520.00; equipment for all schools, \$21,700.00; paving and cement for all schools, \$21,700.00; paving and site improvements, \$12,000.00; science addition, \$41,700.00; cafeteria addition, \$86,812.00.

The petition for vote is reprinted below. It should be noted that propositions one and three are inserted into the approval due to legal technicalities brought about by the addition of more property to the school district in recent years.

Proposition 2 is the important "for" or "against" part of the bond vote.

## Engineer Discusses Floyd Dams

State water engineer Bud Norton told the county SCS group, county commissioners court and the county's water board last week that he could see no feasible location for a small dam on the running water draw that would work in with the Plainview project.
