School Board Announces \$800,000 Bond Vote

School Tax Payers and Public Meeting

School tax paying group of 203 attended a special meeting in the Floydada High school auditorium Thursday night to ask questions of the district's board about the new tax increase for 1963.

Meeting was conducted in an orderly and informal manner with J. M. Willson, Sr., serving as moderator. Most of the questions were directed to J. M. Willson, Sr., president of the board.

Willson opened the meeting with a welcome to everyone and said that he was glad that they like the new tax rate and that he had only the best interests of the schools at heart.

Willson explained what had caused the increase in the school property evaluation. He cited a 1962 property evaluation which showed a 10 percent increase in value. He said that a 10 percent increase in value would mean a 10 percent increase in tax. He said that the school is a must to the community and that older buildings must be repaired.

McMorries Man Speaks To Club

A representative of the McMorries & Company property evaluators, Lee Jacobs told the Floydada Lions club at its weekly luncheon last week the procedures that his company used in arriving at a fair property evaluation for all patrons of the Floydada school district.

Lion Ralph Rucker introduced the program as, "Taxation with Representation." Jacobs said their evaluation study began with a worksheet of all property on the tax roll, inspection of the property with measurements and classifications. The property then received a comparable sales analysis to see what its market value should be. City lots were appraised on a per front feet value.

Rural property was classified "grass, dry, irrigated" land. Jacobs said that ASC maps were useful in classifying types of land also. Improvements were classified similarly to town improvements.

Jacobs said that the main effort was devoted to equalize farm to city property, industry to private property.

He said that all property valuations were not increased... some were decreased.

Jacobs emphasized the fact that the results of his company's work was the property of the school and that the final decision on each patron's property would be made by the school tax equalization board.

The equalization board is composed of Mal Jarboe, Marion Tucker and Dorris Jones.

In discussing the evaluation of farm land Jacobs said the best irrigated land in the district was appraised at \$350 per acre. In (See McMorries, Page 6)

Tax Payers File Suit Against School Board Of Equalization Proceedings And Tax Roll

Fifty Floydada school district tax payers filed a temporary restraining injunction against the school's trustees, board of equalization and secretary, of the school district, in the district clerk's office in the courthouse Wednesday afternoon.

The group is represented by Harold M. LaFont of Plainview. District judge L. D. Ratliff has disqualified himself and said that a district judge at Lubbock would probably be selected to handle the suit.

LaFont said the plaintiff group would post bond which is customary on a temporary restraining order, to pay any damages of the defendant.

Informed sources say that the September scheduled bond vote could continue, but that the approval and sale of bonds would probably be delayed until the suit is settled should the bond for \$800,000 be approved.

The plaintiffs allege that the board of equalization has not placed on tax rolls or taxed personal property in the school district.

When a Hesperian reporter called LaFont Wednesday night, time of hearing had not been definitely set.

Follow-up petition

That heretofore said District Judge Ratliff, through his Board of Trustees employed a firm represented to be outside experts to evaluate the property located within said district for ad valorem tax purposes. That said firm in conjunction with the Defendants herein have placed arbitrary values on the real property belonging to the Plaintiffs (See Suit, Page 6)

Petitions Ask For Vote On Saturday, September 28th

Petitions are being circulated this week seeking a bond vote for \$800,000 to build a new grade school, more cafeterias, a science addition and a complete remodeling job for all schools in the Floydada school district.

The petition asks that the vote be presented to the people for vote on Saturday, September 28.

The bond vote was anticipated since the district's school board had instructed a property evaluating company to equally appraise all property in the school district in order to make the bonds saleable.

Every tax payer in the school district who is exempt by age or has paid his or her poll tax is eligible to vote on the bond.

The \$800,000 bond will be used as follows if a majority of the voters approve it: Remodeling at Andrews Ward grade school, \$35,619.00; remodeling at Junior High, \$40,990.00; work on Junior High gymnasium, \$2,650.00; remodeling at the high school, \$3,220.00; new 25 room grade school, \$432,520.00; equipment for all schools, \$21,700.00; paving and cement for all schools, \$21,700.00; paving and site improvements, \$12,000.00; science addition, \$41,700.00; cafeteria addition, \$68,812.00.

The petition for vote is reprinted below. It should be noted that propositions one and three are inserted into the approval due to legal technicalities brought about by the addition of more property to the school district in recent years.

Proposition 2 is the important "for" or "against" part of the bond vote.

Mexican Leaders Will Attend Annual Farm Tour Next Week

Over 50 Mexican Peasant Leaders, representing 7200 persons from Old Mexico, will attend Floyd county's annual farm tour which is set for next Thursday, September 19.

The tour will begin on the east side of the square at 9 a.m., all of the county's farmers, business men and anyone interested in agriculture is invited to attend.

The tour is sponsored by the county's two banks, the Floydada chamber of commerce and the Floydada Lions Club in conjunction with the SCS service.

The 50 leaders of Mexican Peasant communities will make the tour in the interest of bettering relations between the United States and Mexico and to learn about our farming methods.

Intense efforts are being made by Russia, Red China, Castro's Cuba and some other nations to influence the Mexican peasants toward collective farms, anti-Americanism, socialism, and communism, as opposed to free enterprise, democracy and private ownership of property.

Because of the similarity of West Texas and New Mexico with old Mexico it is thought that the tour would be especially valuable to these peasant leaders. By letting them see how Americans have transformed these desert areas into blooming agricultural oases, it is hoped that they will carry back to their Mexican communities a new hope and better techniques for a better standard of living.

Free barbecue will be served everyone who makes the farm tour at noon at the Baptist campment. Barbecue will be prepared by Johnny Harris.

Hospital Business Increases

People's Hospital board members were pleased to note this week that their monthly board meeting had increased 102 per cent over August of last year.

The profit and loss statement was presented to the board by manager Carl Prichard. Prichard said that more nurses are being employed to take care of the increase in the business and that Floydada's new doctor, Dr. Ed Bayouth was staying "very busy".

In other business the board approved the current bills, the minutes of the August meeting and discussed the number of charity cases that the hospital is serving.

Engineer Discusses Floyd Dams

State water engineer Bud Norton told the county SCS group, county commissioners court and the county's water board last week that he could see no feasible location for a small dam on the running water draw that would work in with the Plainview project.

He said that the dams were built on the merits of flood control and that if a dam were built near the country club that it would only be protecting grassland below it from damage. He said that if a dam were built further west in order to protect farmland in the county from being flooded that it would necessarily need to be built on the county line or that vicinity and that he could find no draw steep enough there to stand the construction of a dam.

Norton did suggest to the group that it begin preliminary survey studies of the site just above the country club (gorge area and sites along the Quitaque River for dam possibilities that would hold enough water supply Lockney and Floydada.

The group agreed to begin work on two possibilities: County judge McBrien is going to check the records to see if the White River Dam project has any control on a dam being built near the country club and Wendell Tooley has sent a letter (See Engineer, Page 6)

Yarborough Speaks To Over 200 Here

Over 200 Floydada Rotarians, their Rotary Anns, the Floydada school teachers, school board and their guests heard Houston's Dr. Yarborough speak at the club's annual rotary teacher banquet in the high school cafeteria Tuesday night.

Yarborough, who was introduced by district attorney John Stapleton, told the group that the occasion was to honor the teachers, but the things he would say would apply to everyone.

He challenged the group to teach and learn in young persons the capacity to adjust to a fast moving world. He said that automation was fast making social cliches of our society, and that scientific knowledge jumps the gap or teaching and understanding faster each day.

"As automation increases, manpower needs decrease, and the person without an education is fast becoming obsolete," he continued.

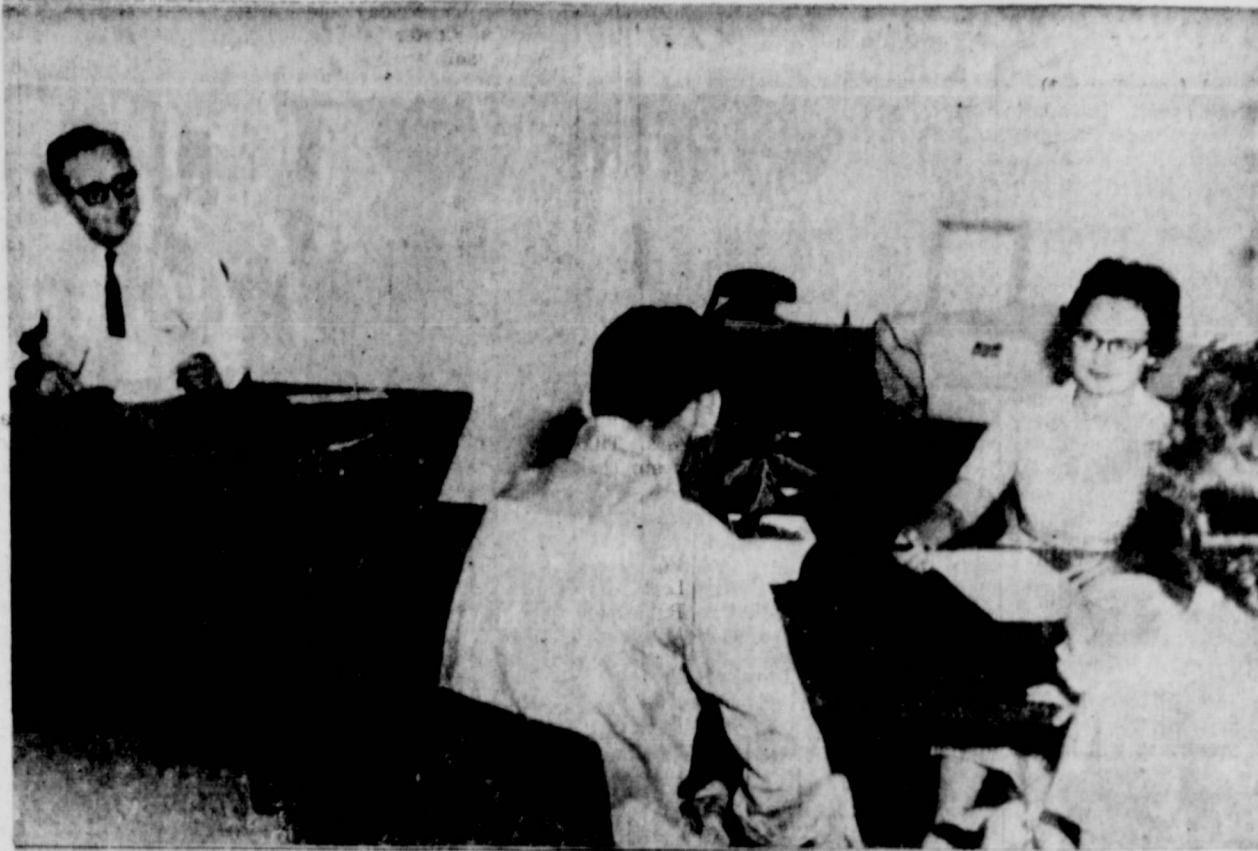

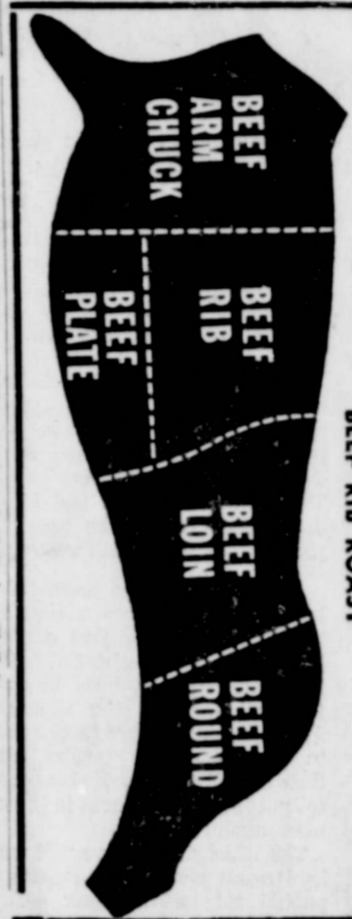
