

Every qualified voter in the Flovdada school district is entitled to vote this Saturday on an \$800,000 bond vote to build a new 25 room grade school, more cafeterias, a science addition at high school and a complete remodeling job for all Floydada schools.

The bond vote also includes equipment and library for the schools.

Voting will be in the county courtroom. Every school tax payer who has paid his or her poll tax, or is exempt by age is elgible to vote in the election.



The 800,000 bond\$ will be used as follows if a majority of the voters approve it: remodeling at Andrews Ward grade school \$56,619.00; remodeling at Junior High \$40,990.00, work on Junior High gymnasium, \$2,650.00; remodeling at the high school new 25 room grade \$2,320.00; school, \$432,520.00; equipment for all chools, \$21,700.00; paving and science addition, \$41,000.00; cafe teria addition, \$88,812.00.

I would favor as soon as we are able, to raise the teachers sal aries to the scale that would be at least near the salaries of teach ers in school systems of our neighboring schools.

I would not favor the voting of bonds now, for we should be able to get a clearer view of the needs we are going to go in debt for. Many people disagree on this at present.

I would not approve the land values that have been set by the appraisers for it will effect the settlement of estates, further the land should be valued in part on the allotment set by the government, and lastly it should be taken into account that the value of land at \$350.00 per acre is not what you get when you have made a sale for land average of 30% for income taxes has to be paid.

I think it is more than right that a larger part of property assessed in town is just as applicable as that of the farmer who has been accussed of having it so good as to values, furniture and bank deposits are in this list and it has been determined that money in a local bank is subject to as sessment, but as yet money owned and on deposit in other banks outside the district are not assessable by this school board but the board where the money is on deposit. I have this from the best legal advice but it is in no way given as a fact, so many have asked about this.

I would hope that all the people of the district could get to gether and settle this issue and leave as few people unhappy as possible, and then get for the school what we can afford and need. I would hope that we would get better construction on any future building than we have in one case here.

I am for good schools as much as any one, I want my five grand children to have the best education that is possible which was not the case with my four children. I can say they were only average students.

After all this we need to get together for a hospital that we can afford and need. Churches first, good schools and a hospital needed badly. Floydada needs all three of these facilities and is entitled to the best and I think we are able to provide all of them if we do not let too much selfishness enter into the getting same.



Q-I heard there is an entire family in my neighborhood being taken care of at a VA hospaal. How did they manage to get free medical care for the children?

A-You may have VA care confused with the Armed Forces medical care for families. The VA has no program of medical care for wives and children, although wives may be hospitalized by the VA on their own eligibility if they are veterans. It is possible the family was in some disaster such as an automobile accident and was taken in by a VA hospital briefly, as a life-saving measure.
