They are our responsibility as long as they live here and they will never rise above the present level of subsistence, unless the people of the state of Texas do everything in their power to educate them. Large areas of the South have been forced out of cotton produc tion because of the boll weevil Until recently, agriculturalists believed the winter weather on the Plains would prevent boll weevils from ever migrating to this territory.

But two years ago, a few were found in eastern Floyd county Then, last year, extensive weevil damage was reported in eastern Floyd and Crosby counties.

This year, weevils have been found all along the caprock country and as far interior as ten miles or more from Briscoe county down through Floyd, Crosby, Garza, and Lynn as far south as Draw. Weevils feed almost exclusive

ly on cotton, and fly as far as 35 miles, Mr. Griffin says.

Farmers in some of these counties, particularly Floyd and Crosby, where infestation has been damaging, organized a sixcounty Boll Weevil Committee, headed by Don Anderson, Crosbyton farmer, and means of fighting the boll weevil migration are being studied.

Last Friday, 65 key area agricultural leaders and boll weevil researchers and specialists met in Lubbock to discuss the alarming migration of weevils, growing threat to the vast Plains cotton industry, and methods of halting the spread.

Attending the meeting were boll weevil specialists from Washington, D. C., Beltsville, Md., Gulfport, Miss., Arizona, Texas A&M College, and from several agricultural agencies,

Fighting the insect is an expensive proposition, sometimes as much as \$50 an acre, and certainly not less than \$15.00 an acre. Cotton men say the wee-vil must be controlled, regard-

Boll weevils pass the winter a adults in weeds, grass, woods, cotton fields. They leave winter quarters and return to cotton fields in the spring when the weather is warm enough for cotton to grow, and they remain there until frost. Boll weevils prefer to feed on and to lay their eggs in squares, but they also at tack bolls. Eggs are laid singly in deep punctures made within the squares or bolls, and after 3 to 5 days they hatch into white larvae, or grubs. The grubs feed for 7 to 14 days and then change into pupae within the squares or bolls. The adults emerge from the pupae in 3 to 5 days and cut their way out. 


