



Sift-21/4 cups sifted all purpose flour, 2 tablespoons sugar, 2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder and 1/2 teaspoon salt into mixing bowl.

Cut in-1/3 cup butter until particles Stir in-1/3 cup scalded milk, cooled to lukewarm, 1 unbeaten egg and softened

yeast; beat well. ** Toss-on well-floured surface to coat with flour. Roll out to 15x10 inches. Cream—1/3 cup butter with 3/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar until fluffy. Wrap, freeze.




