CITY IN DANGER FOR 3 HOURS

### Vandals Cost City One Million Gallons Of Water Saturday

According to City Officials a group of vandals had a grand time Saturday night at the expense of the city, by taxing the City water supply in the amount of 1,000,000 gallons of water. They did it by going around town turning on fire plugs.

The vandals seemed to stay one step ahead of local law officials all night, for as soon as the patrolmen would find a plug that had been opened they would stop and shut it off. As soon as they would get on the trail of the ones turning on the plugs, they would find another that had been opened.

Finally the law officials called for help from the water department, but still were not able to catch the vandals.

According to the water department officials, there were at least four plugs turned on. As far as can be seen, none of the plugs themselves were damaged, but the ground around them was torn

One plug across from the high school building on Tree Street (see picture) was turned on and ran water for some time. A hole was dug by the pressure of the water about 20 feet long and nearly two feet in depth. Monday afternoon the sand that had been washed up by the pressure and down into the curb had caused water to back up several feet toward the school house. The sand had washed down Tree Street, was lifted by the water and ran down Crockett to the Rollis Highway. The aftermath is still visible to curious individuals that desire to see what had happened.

One city official said, "The thing that bothers me is not necessarily that they wasted so much of the area's most valuable resource, the water, nor the moral factor involved, but rather, the danger they created. For the city was without any fire protection for more than 3 hours, with all the city's pumps in operation. If there had been a fire, it would not have done any good to hook onto a fire plug, for there wasn't any water pressure. I saw a box car burn about 9 years ago because of a similar action, and there wasn't any way to get any water pressure."

### Contests Developing For Local Positions

Monday, February 3, has been set as the final day to file for a place on the Democratic Primary according to Ben Ayres, Floyd County chairman. The first primary is slated May 2 and the second on Saturday, June 6.

A number of contests have developed thus far and the sheriff's office and tax assessor-collector's office drawing the most candidates with three each.

#### 400 Expected At C of C Banquet

Approximately 400 tickets have been sold for the Floydada chapter of commerce banquet which will be held in the High School Friday night February 7, 1964. At a called meeting of the chamber board of directors Tuesday morning final plans were made for the banquet and a tally made on ticket sales.

Texas Attorney General Waggoner Carr will be the featured speaker.

In the sheriff's race El Robinson of the Dougherty community is the latest to announce his candidacy. The incumbent, Walter Hollums and Cameron Reed, a former Floydada officer are the other two candidates.

The tax assessor-collector's office, which also has three candidates, all from Floydada, being sought by T. T. Hill, the incumbent, Carl James C. J. Payne, Commissioner, Precinct 1 which covers the southern part of the county has three districts, as well. They are James P. Duchs and F. Helms.

Commissioner, Precinct 2 which covers the northern part of the county has only one candidate, W. C. Elmer.

No one has filed for the county superintendent position. Presently held by Clarence Guffee.

John Stapleton, the present district attorney has announced he will seek re-election to post. He is not contested.

For the office of state representative of the 8th district, G. Wells, the incumbent has announced that he will not seek re-election. The position is sought by Ralph Wayne of view.

Joe Phillips, of Lubbock, the latest to file for any office and he is in the race against George Mahon who is presently representing the 19th Congressional District of Texas. Mahon has had the position for 30 years.

Kenneth Bain, Jr. has filed for re-election as county attorney. All state offices are due for election this year, for state offices are elected for only two terms. County and precinct officials are elected for four terms. The precincts not previously mentioned are not due for election until 1966.

Mrs. Ruth Starks Green, first white child to be born in what was known then as Floyd City on June 26, 1890, died shortly before 1 o'clock Tuesday noon in the Lockney Convalescent Home. She spent some time in Peoples Hospital and in the Lockney Hospital prior to becoming a patient in the home.

Mrs. Green was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Starks. At the time of her father's death in September, 1936, he was the last member of the original Cowboy outfit that operated the Matorador Ranch in the first year of its establishment

### Davis And Gregory Seek School Board Re-election

According to the school tax office, two school trustees, Howard Gregory and Lawrence Davis, have filed their intentions to seek reelection to the Floydada school board.

The election will be held April 4, which is the first Saturday in April. The deadline for filing for a school trustee position is March 4, and filing must be done at the school tax office.

Both men are experienced at the task, for Davis has been on the school board for five years

and Gregory boasts three years experience. Both men are farmers.

The hearing will consist of the parties who are property owners and other interested parties along the right-of-way. At the present time it is undecided whether a broadened two-lane road will be reconstructed or a split four-lane highway will be built.

The proposed work would include the highway from the city limits to .25 miles east of FM 615.

The preliminary drawings, plans and sketches showing the proposed location of the highway are on file at the Resident Engineer's Office, Room 205, Court House Building in Floydada.

## Only 54 Per Cent Of Buying Power Stays In Floyd County

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percentage of their money spent at home with 97 percent. Child-recess was close behind with 96 percent. Most of the counties checked ranged from the mid 70's to the upper 90's.

The surrounding counties have a much higher percentage than does Floyd. Surprisingly enough, they are not the counties with the larger cities. Crosby County keeps 81 percent of its wealth at home, Motley retains 94 percent and Hale only 81 percent.

Lubbock County, which seems to have a market and an outlet stores for almost every product, keeps only 85 percent of its wealth at home.

A comparison was drawn for Floyd and Castro counties, since there is a comparison in total in-

come and geographical location of county towns. Although Floyd County has two trading centers, compared to Castro's one.

A few of the comparison figures follow.

For food, Floyd County spends 13 percent of its income, Castro spends 3 per cent; General Merchandise, Floyd 2 per cent, Castro 3 per cent; Apparel, Floyd 2 per cent, Castro 3 per cent; Furniture, Floyd 2; Castro 1; Automobile, Floyd 9 and Castro 9; Gas Stations, Floyd 5, Castro 7; Lumber, Building and Hardware, Floyd 11 per cent, Castro 24 per cent, and for Drugs, Floyd 2 per cent, Castro 8 per cent.

The figures do not necessarily total 100 per cent for these are not all the items people buy.

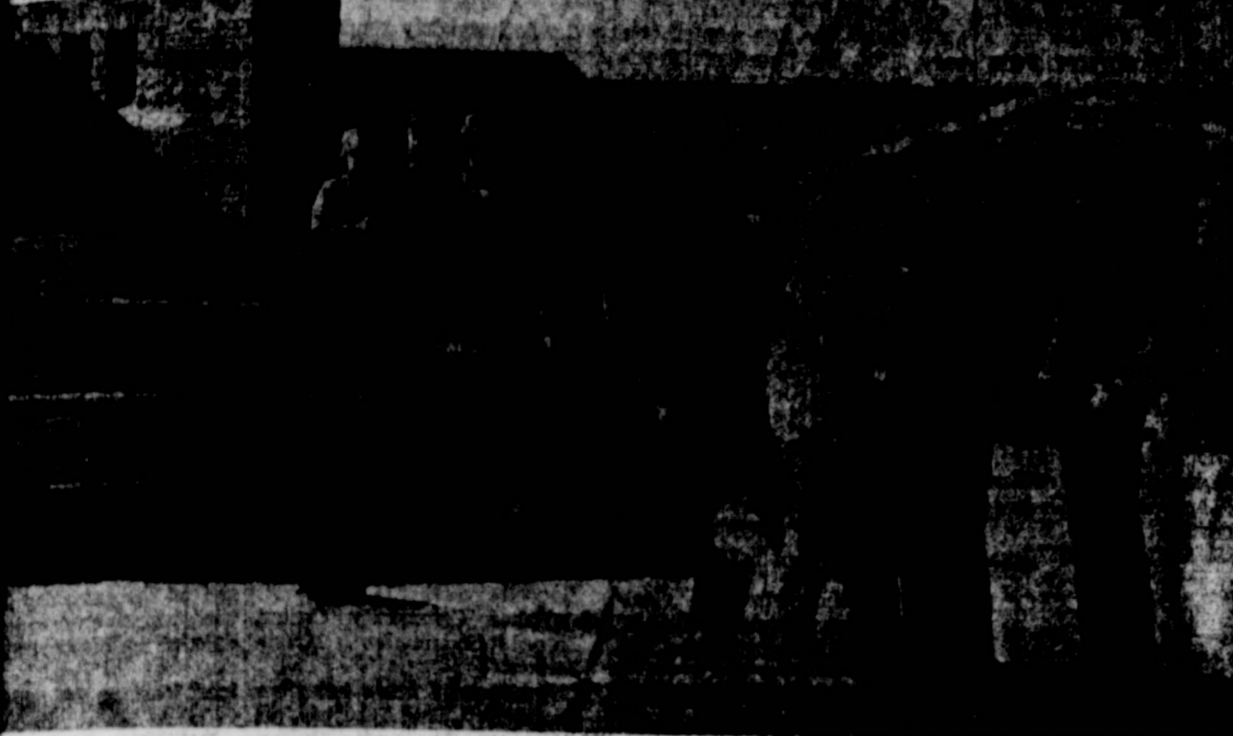
It is interesting note that most of the figures are relatively close, percentage wise, in a comparison of the two counties. Too Floyd spends a much larger percentage of its money at home for drugs, but goes to other places to buy most of its lumber, building materials and hardware.

The counties, and the percentage of their income they keep at home are: Floyd, 54; Crosby, 81; Swisher, 74; Castro, 72; Bailey, 97; Garza, 77; Childs, 76; Motley, 94; Cottle, 91; He, 81; Lubbock, 85; and Larr, 86.

Someone was overheard to say, concerning these figures, that it's a good thing Floyd County is fifth in Agriculture income, or we could support our business on 54 percent of our income.

Roy Archer, pastor of the church, extends a cordial invitation to all residents, and particularly the youth of the community to attend the revival.

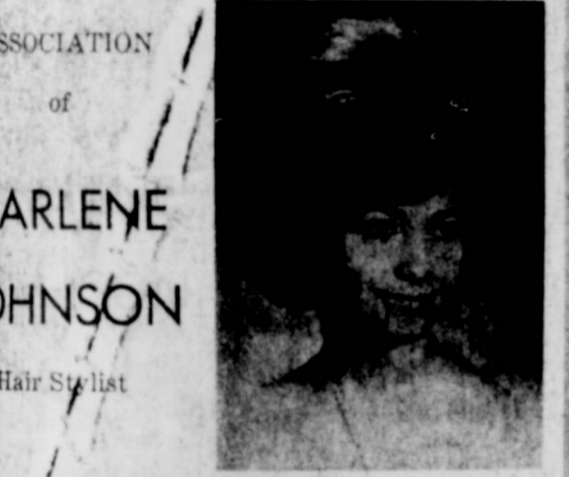
**Methodists Announce Revival Date**

The evangelist is Dr. Thomas Carruth of Atlanta, Georgia.

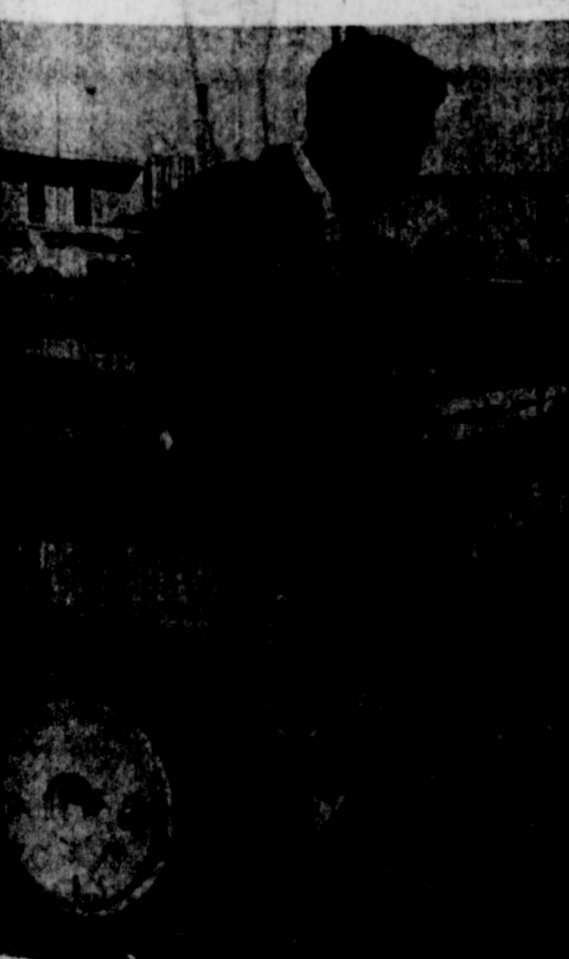

## Work Up For New Elementary At Lockney, Ready By Fall

The school is located on the west edge of Lockney and three blocks west of the junior-senior high school. The cafeteria in the new building will accommodate community affairs in addition to regular school affairs. The

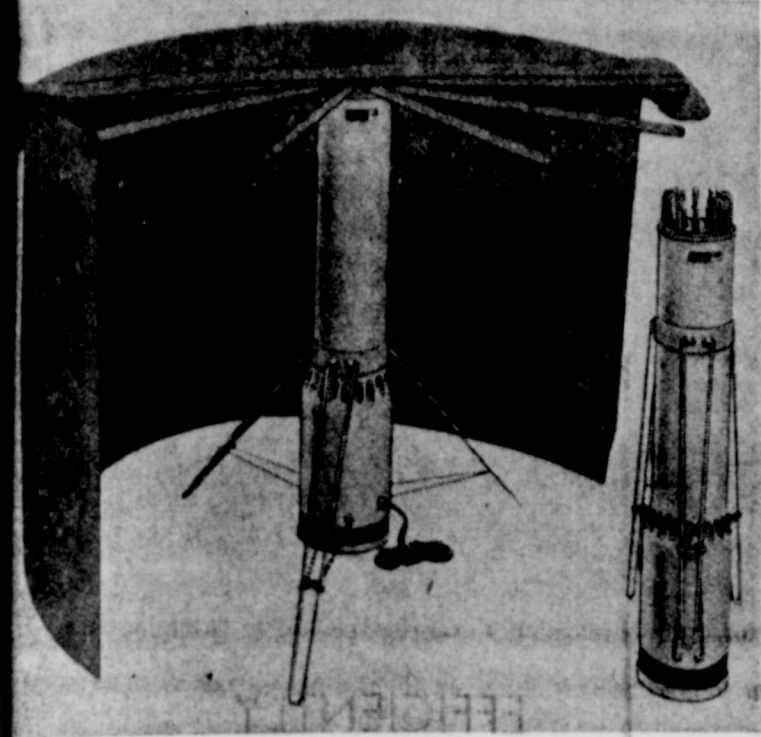
large room will have a seating capacity of from 375 to 400. Located on the south side of the building will be the cafeteria and service hall. The main entrance to the school will face the east with a covered porch adjoining the south-

cast portion. The stage has a performing area of 32 feet across and 30 feet in depth. Dressing rooms and a storage room adjoin. The music room is just off the stage and the kitchen and library is located alongside the cafeteria. Acoustical tile will cover the ceiling with all floors on ground level. Each classroom is to have and inside and outside door for fire protection and also to allow the children outside with no disturbance to anyone else. The 22 classrooms are connected with the cafeteria, main entrance, and lobby which utilizes skylighting and by the principals' and secretary's offices, teacher's lounge, workroom and nurse's room.

Supt. H. H. Nichols said the school was patterned after the one in Abilene with considerable changes. The north end of the building which stretches 443 feet long and 136 feet wide, about two blocks long, north and south, will be occupied by primary students. They will have separate rest rooms in the center of the sections. The building will cover approximately 40,000 square feet and the cost per foot set at \$2.50. This amount however does not cover furnishings and paving costs. It will be completely air conditioned and the outside brick will be of salmon pink. Floors are to be terrazo and wooden portions will divide the classrooms. The only glass in the building will be that around each room's steel door and at the ends of the halls.

The 22 classrooms will house 30 pupils each, 660 in all with a probability of 600 pupils using them next fall. Mrs. Albert Dutton, principal of C. N. Townsend Elementary school in Lockney, will be the principal of the new school, yet unnamed. The old elementary school will be vacated and not used for school purposes, Nichols said. It consists of barracks with brick on the outside, erected 15 years ago for temporary quarters to replace one which burned. Completion of the new building is set for mid July.

Addition to the junior-senior school will probably start in February and be completed in September. The addition will extend west from the junior section. Beginning there will be three new

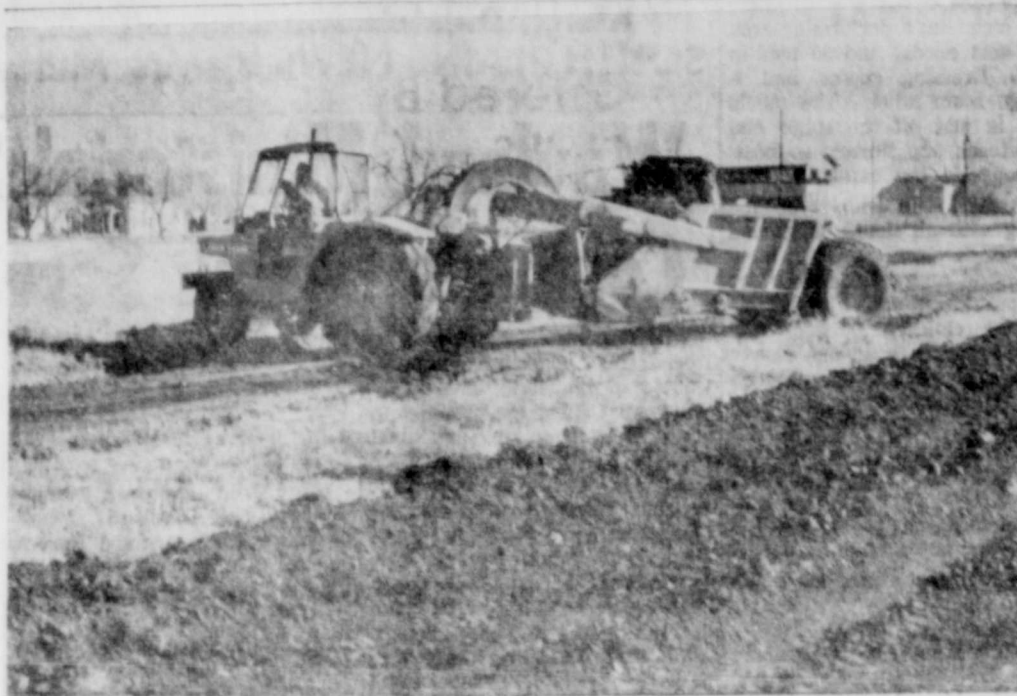

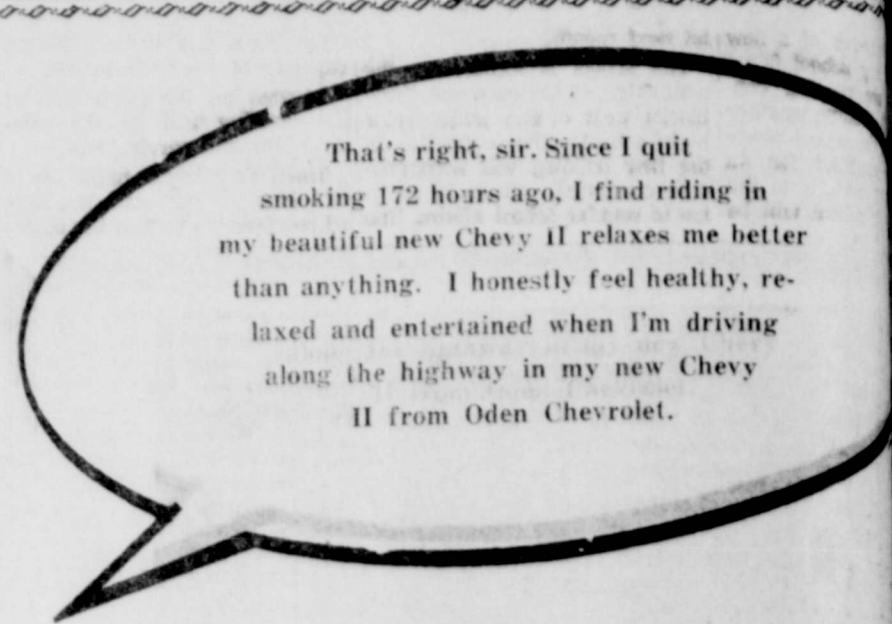

A spokesman for the television industry said such a strike could shut down national television for several days.

This is what I'm talking about. I do not believe the American people can survive several days without television, it's a threat to national security, and Congress ought to drop everything else if it happens to have anything in its hands at the time and attack this crisis before it arrives.

You leave 150 million people at loose ends every day and night for a week, especially in an election year, and there's no telling what would happen. If I was a Congressman, for example, the least thing I'd want is to have the people thinking for a week on how long it takes Congress to act.

I don't know what the solution is, but anything that keeps one program from following another every night in the year is an open invitation to unrest and possibly widespread thinking, and if Congress wants to keep lumbering along it had better stop long enough to keep television on the air.

The "Right To Keep And Bear Arms" Challenged

AN EDITORIAL from the Winchester News Bureau is reproduced for consideration of citizens who own guns. It is presented as 1964 with such discussion and much legislation directed at gun owners.

"It would be an ironic footnote to history if one of our liberties—the 'Right to Keep and Bear Arms' as guaranteed in the Second amendment of the Bill of Rights—were to be sacrificed in the name of our late President, who was himself a member of the National Rifle Association.

"We need not state that honest gun owners everywhere are being challenged with the most serious threat to their constitutional right to private ownership of firearms—a threat more serious than ever before, at both the national and state level.

"We sincerely urge that each and every man who cherishes this right to do his utmost to defend his heritage for future generations as others have done for us in the past.

"We urge that you write your congressional and state legislators and reaffirm your dedication to the principal of the ownership of firearms by all free-men-mental, mentally sound ad-

Too Much Committees?

We were amazed to read the other day that a Houston woman has launched a new enterprise. She has decided to become a professional committee chairman, doing the behind the scene drudge work for busy people who are chairmen of all kinds of committees.

She found out that her clientele turned out to be 90 per cent men who welcomed the chance to let somebody else do the details of committee work for various community projects. This is certainly news to us but demonstrates how far behind the tim-

all Americans. We are not against any law that deprives the criminal, the mentally ill or the untrained juvenile of access to firearms.

"But we are unalterably opposed to the deprivation by bureaucratic and authoritarian restriction of firearms owned by the vast majority of honest citizens. We have yet to witness any 'gun law' that effectively disarmed the criminal.

"Unfortunately, the record is full of abuses inflicted upon honest men by sweeping anti-gun laws. Once a law is passed a near miracle is required to revise it. Now is the time to fight anti-gun laws—not when it is too late."

"Every gun owner is involved in this issue. It's more than just a shotgun for quail hunters, a rifle for deer hunters—it gets right inside the door of the Bill of Rights. Since the end of World War II there has been a tenancy toward group thinking, group planning, legislation for the multitude. This is a highly personal matter with every sportsman, and if he doesn't act in every way he can he may not have a gun by this time in 1965. It's up to you, and what you want.

Veterans Ask

Q—Are "peacetime" veterans entitled to hospital care?

A—Yes, but only if they were discharged for a line-of-duty disability or if they are receiving compensation for a service-connected disability.

Q—My service-connected disability is rated 30 percent. Can I be entitled to extra compensation because of my dependents?

A—No. Only veterans whose service-connected disabilities are rated at 50 percent or more are entitled to additional compensation for dependents.

Q—As an eligible War Orphan I have educational rights but I wish to continue working, too. May I attend school for less than half time under the War Orphans Educational program?

A—No. Regulations require that a student must attend school at least half time to be eligible for the War Orphan program payments.

County ASCS Office Has New Aerial Maps Of Farms

According to Tom Hutchins, Manager of the Floyd County ASCS Office, the office has received a new flight of aerial maps of all farms in the county. If anyone desires to purchase one of these maps he may do so by contacting the local office.

NEW FARM NUMBERS - Some farm serial numbers in the county have changed. This is caused by the reconstruction of farms during the past several years as these farms take a number in the thousands series, each year representing a different thousand number. About every 5 or 6 years the ASCS office starts over to keep the number from becoming too large.

COTTON PREMEASUREMENT - For the past several years, the department has offered premeasurement of cotton allotment acreage to farmers who desire this service. The charge for this service will be exactly the same for 1964 as it was in 1963. The cost for premeasuring service is: \$10.00 per farm plus .50 for each plot over 1 plus .09 for each mile of travel plus .05 for each acre of cotton allotment.

Farmers interested in this service must make a written application at the county office beginning February 1 and not later than March 31, 1964. Forms will be available at the county office to make the application for premeasurement.

OPERATION CHANGES - If your address is different from the one shown on the envelope or if you are operating a farm that you did not operate in 1963, or if you have bought or sold some land, please notify this office in order that allotment notices and correspondence in connection with the 1964 crop year will not go to the wrong person or the wrong address.

1964 FEED GRAIN PROGRAM - Feed Grain sign-up has been set to begin February 10th and close

March 27, 1964. Notices of yields will be sent to each producer prior to the sign-up period. A change is in effect in 1964-65 feed grain year which raises the maximum amount of diverted acre from 30 to 50 percent of the base. Any producer desiring to divert in excess of 40 percent and up to 50 percent may receive the higher rate on the entire acreage diverted.

PRICE SUPPORT PROGRAM - Deadline date to place what, Barley, Grain Sorghum and Soybeans in the loan is January 31, 1964. RELEASE AND REAPPORTMENT OF 1964 ACREAGE - A 1/2 acreage of cotton allotted to a farm for 1964 that will not be planted should be released to the Floyd County Committee for reapportionment to other farms. This should be done immediately in order that the county and state will not lose the unplanted acreage as future history.

Farmer requests for 1964 reapportioned acreage are now available in our office and we urge each farmer who desires additional cotton acreage who has not already filed the request, to come in and make his request. No released acreage may be reapportioned to any farm except by written request. March 4, 1964 is the final date.

1964 ACP - The maximum amount that can be earned per farm per person under the 1964 ACP has been changed from \$800 to \$900. At a called meeting in the ASCS office on January 9, 1964 the county committee decided on the change to make ACP cost-sharing available to more farmers in the county.

1963 WOOL INCENTIVE PAYMENTS - December 31, 1963 was the end of the 1963 marketing year under the wool program. Farmers have until the end of January, 1964 to file applications for 1963 marketing year payments.

Good Starting Place

Someone has said that history will record the High progressive cotton and grain producing era as a stupor.

They are not harsh words, but words of speculation. The thinking behind the statement is that the High Plains farmer will pay from \$300 to \$700 for land on which he intends to reap crops that will net him \$40, or less, to over that.

It is a high price to pay for land to be used for this value. More important than the price of the depletion of water, our most valuable under-resource, to produce crops that will pay the mentioned amounts in return.

This progressive era is based largely on government subsidies, in the form of price supports for grains and the fibers that are grown in the area.

In our opinion that no governmental agency, Democrat or Republican, whether corrupt or not, whether popular or unpopular with the will ever solve the problem of crop surpluses the country now faces. The answer, we think, is here at home.

At meetings as we witnessed last week, when a group of farmers gathered in the high school cafeteria to hear Mr. Roy Davis, of the Plains Coop Oil Lubbock speak on the possibilities of castor and soybeans becoming cash crops in the High Area, we think holds the answer. Another crop that has already been experienced by a group of Floyd farmers, is that of sugar beets, which brings in considerable more money to the grower, but, too, costs much more to produce.

Do not contend that castor beans, soybeans or beets are the answers to surplus crops or any other farming problems, for these crops, too, have their drawbacks.

We do think the fact that these crops are being grown in Floyd County is indicative of the thinking of the progressive farmers, to find new crops that are suited for the area and crops which are grown in surplus quantities.

In the meantime we believe that our farmers who are entering the onion, pepper, potato, and other vegetable crops are also to be commended.
