Floyd County Receives 8,932.4 Bonus Cotton Acres Wednesday

Creage For 1964 Up Now 101,209

Floyd county's "big money crop" . . . fluffy white cotton got a big shot in the arm Wednesday when the ASC office announced a 10% cotton acreage increase for the county.

Report of an additional 8,932.4 acres for the county was called to the Hesperian by local ASC head Hutchins, who said this would give the county a total of 101,209 acres for 1964 crop.

The "bonus acres" came from unused allotments in east Texas and this means that every Floyd county farmer who had requested extra cotton allotment acres will receive about 10% more acres this year.

Hutchins said this additional acreage allotment is usually granted each year when the unplanted acreages are determined in East Texas. He said this year's bonus acres doubled last year's.

Cotton is Floyd county's number one money crop and the county averaged well over a bale per acre last year and reached the 10th spot in cotton production in the state with 112,515 bales.

The announcement came at a time when Floyd county farmers were beginning to water row crop land and were laying off rows for a new cotton and grain sorghum crop.

78.2% Of 1964 Bond Quota Reached With January Sales

Savings Bond sales in Floyd County totaled \$164,418 during January, 1964 according to Mr. Don Pemberton, chairman of the Floyd County Savings Bonds Committee. 78.2 percent of the yearly sales goal has been achieved.

Land For Sanitation Fill Also Discussed

A public hearing concerning the proposed city's budget for the 1964-65 fiscal year has been set by the council to take place Thursday, March 26 at 7:00 p.m. in the city hall. Any taxpayer is not only invited, but urged to be at the meeting to hear the budget gone over in detail.

The proposed budget was first presented to the city council, by City Manager Olen Petty, at the February meeting, was studied by the members of the council and amended and corrected by the council members at the city council meeting Tuesday night, March 10.

Any taxpayer present is invited to enter into the discussion of the budget and to be present when the final ratification by the council takes place.

The detailed budget shows that the city can expect to collect \$566,743 of revenue from April 1, 1964 through March 31, 1965. Expenses should not run above \$591,306. Should the budget prove to be correct in every aspect, the city will show a total income after expenses of \$175,437.

The breakdown of this amount shows that \$70,608 could then be transferred to the Mercantile National Bank of Dallas, \$67,147 could be transferred to the General Fund, and \$37,682 would be used for the purchase of securities.

At the meeting Tuesday night the council also discussed bids on a backhoe and tractor loading machine that the city is considering purchasing. Most of the local implement firms submitted bids and attended Tuesday's meeting to give further information about their respective bids. Some of the firms bid as many as three different machines. The final decision on which machine will be purchased will be taken up at a later date.

Those firms bidding were: Floydada Implement, three bids; Floyd Tractor and Supply, three bids; Martin and Company, two bids; Service Machine Company of Lubbock, one bid; Payne Implement, one bid; Yellowhorse Machinery of Lubbock, one bid.

The City Council discussed a proposal to lease the land that is under consideration for the new sanitation fill. The previous thought was to purchase the land needed, but this could prove to be a cost saving measure.

Last Saturday, at the Idalou Invitational Track and Field Meet, the local Whirlwinds placed third in team scoring. First place awards were won in the shot put and the discus throw. Bill Potts was the individual winner in those events.

Most Of County Onion Crop Set

"If you can't afford to lose five crops in a row, don't get into the onion business." This statement has been made by a number of people who have profited by the crop, and by a number of people who have lost the shirts off their backs by trying to grow the crop, and hit a low market.

Mr. Jay S. Hale, says, "we have lost as many as three crops of onions in a row, and it's a real setback." There are so many factors to be considered in growing any vegetable crop, that aren't necessary with a grain or fiber crop such as wheat or cotton.

A number of years ago, about 1956, a number of farmers around the south plains area tried growing the "bad breath" crop on an experimental basis. There were several reports of people who made as much as \$50,000 on 25 acres of onions.

Everyone is aware of what takes place when a new crop comes to an area, and someone makes a good profit by growing and marketing the product. The great crop season invariably sees the great numbers of growers in the onion business, the pepper business or whatever business it was that made such a good showing in the profit and loss statement.

Presently there is no subsidy for vegetable crops, and most vegetable growers like it that way, so there is a great fluctuation in the market price of these

products. One year the price may be \$2.00 per sack for White Onions and the next year be only 50c. In fact the market may drop that much in only a very few days.

When great numbers of farmers grow a vegetable crop, the market tends to drop. When few farmers grow a crop the market price usually stays at a reasonable level. This is a principle of marketing almost forgotten, known as "supply and demand". It is for this reason and other (See ONIONS, Page 8)

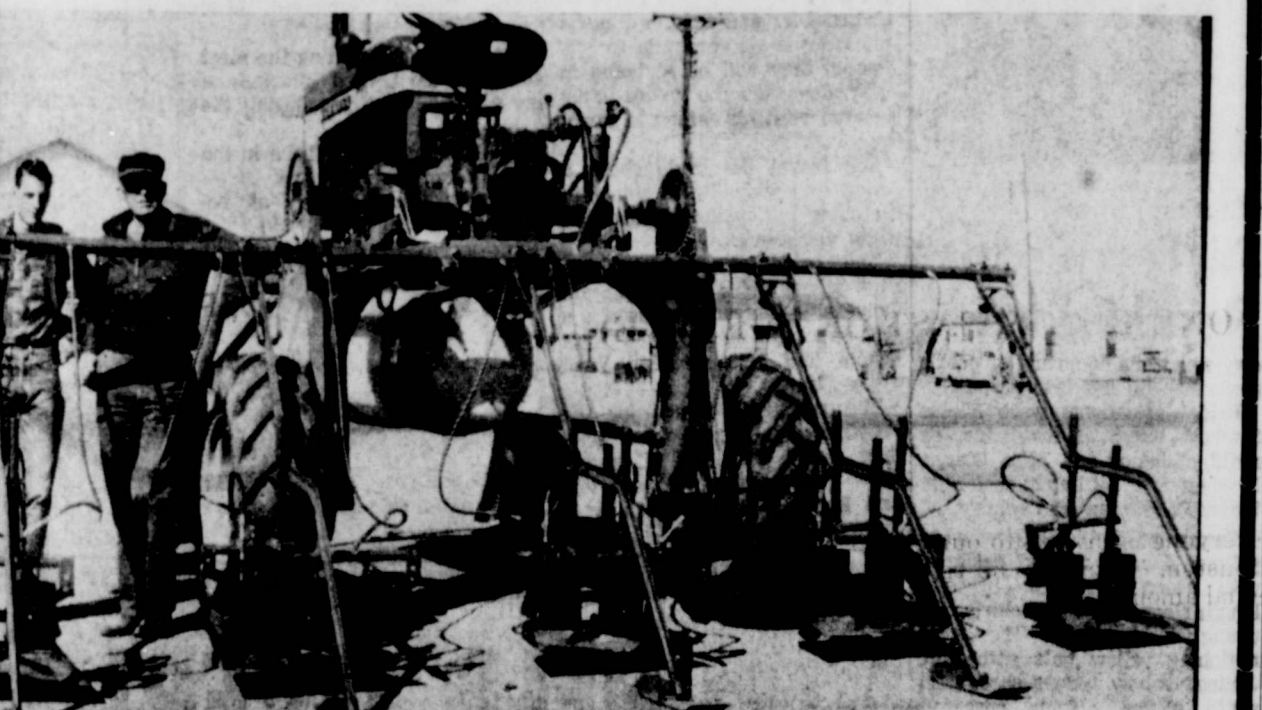

FLAME CULTIVATION WITH THE HI-TRAC

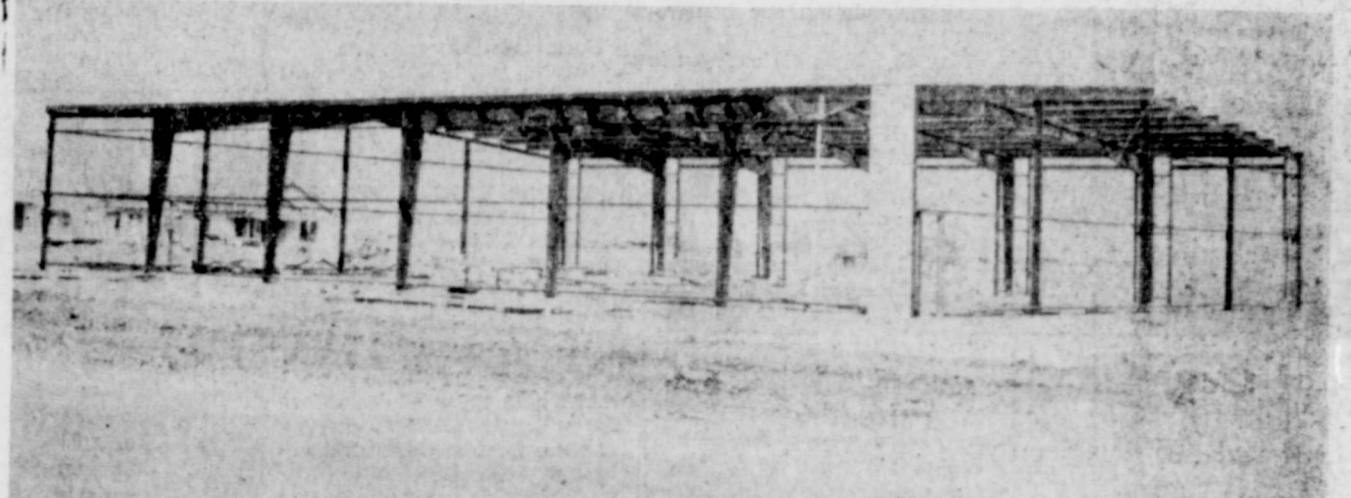

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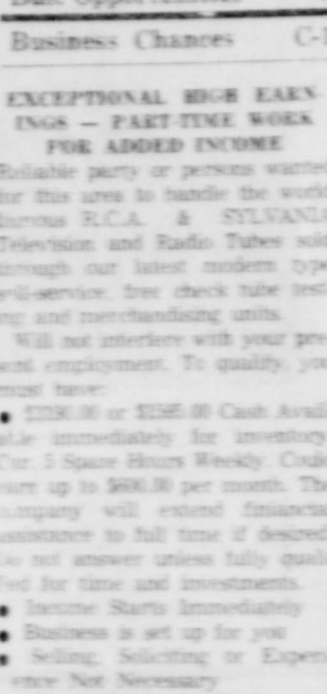

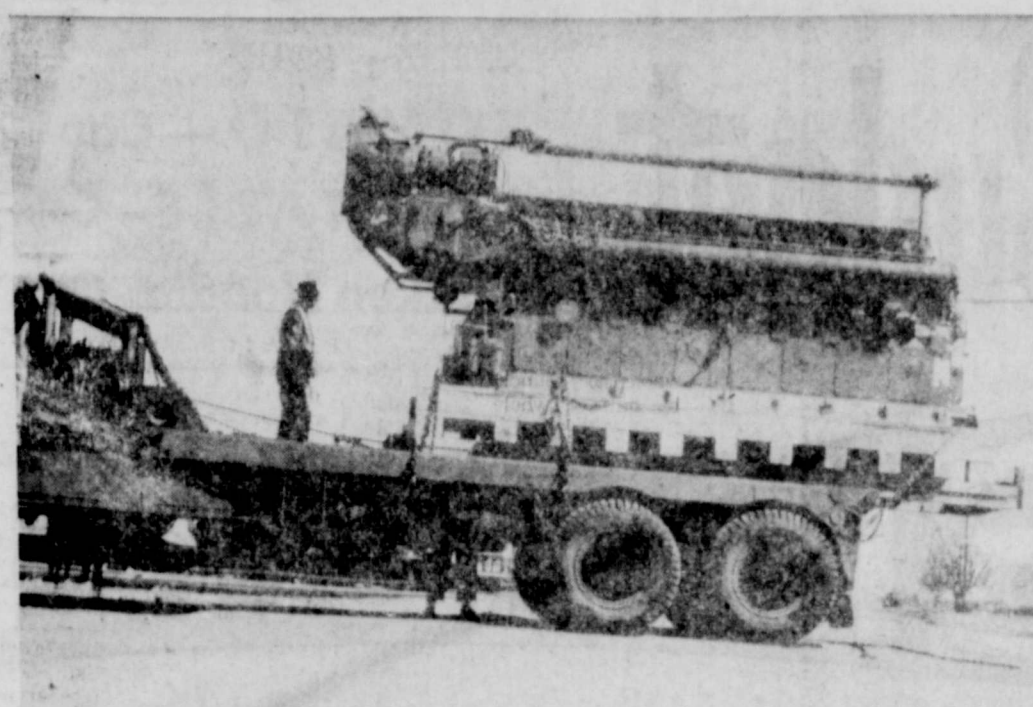

that vegetable growers limit their own acres and of course, try to plant so their product will hit the market when there is very little of the crop being harvested in other parts of the country.

Onions, as are most other vegetable crops, a very high investment crop. To even get the plants into the ground calls for a \$30.00 to \$100.00 per acre investment. The actual growth and care of the plant isn't much different from that of other crops. The plants must be fertilized and the weeds must be controlled.

Fertilization is somewhat different. If a grower gives the plant a good shot of Anhydrous Ammonia while the plants are growing, it can cause them to burst if he fertilized. Mr. Hale said the best fertilizer he had found was applications of 15-20-4.

Hand labor takes much more work than do row crops. In addition to the tilling, the soil must first be pulverized, then tilled into beds. Then a bed shaper is run over the ground, which does what the name implies as well as marks two lines on the top of the beds. When the hands plant the onions, they press them down into the ground about an inch, and cover them with dirt. There are actually two rows of onions on each bed. Water is then run down the furrow.

Cultivation is done either with plows or by flame. Mr. Hale said he prefers the flame, there is less chance of damaging the onions. A plow can cut into the side of the onions and cause a great deal of damage, which, of course, reflects in the price received for the crop.

Harvest of the crop will begin around July 1st. A blade is run under the onions, to clip the roots and loosen the onions in the ground. Hand labor then comes along, pulls the onion up, clips off the top, and puts the onion in a sack. The top is left in the field.

Yield of the crop varies anywhere from nothing to 800 sacks per acre. The sacks may sell for \$1.50 or more, or less, depending on the supply and demand. The actual harvesting of the crop may cost more than the crop is worth. Therefore, if someone had a lot of money tied up in the crop, and at harvest time the price drops drastically it often pays a grower to plow the crop under and not go to the expense of the harvest.

If the price stays good, and the yield is good, a number of onion farmers in Floyd County will make enough profit to be able to grow the crop another year. If the opposite happens, several farmers will have long faces for a long time.

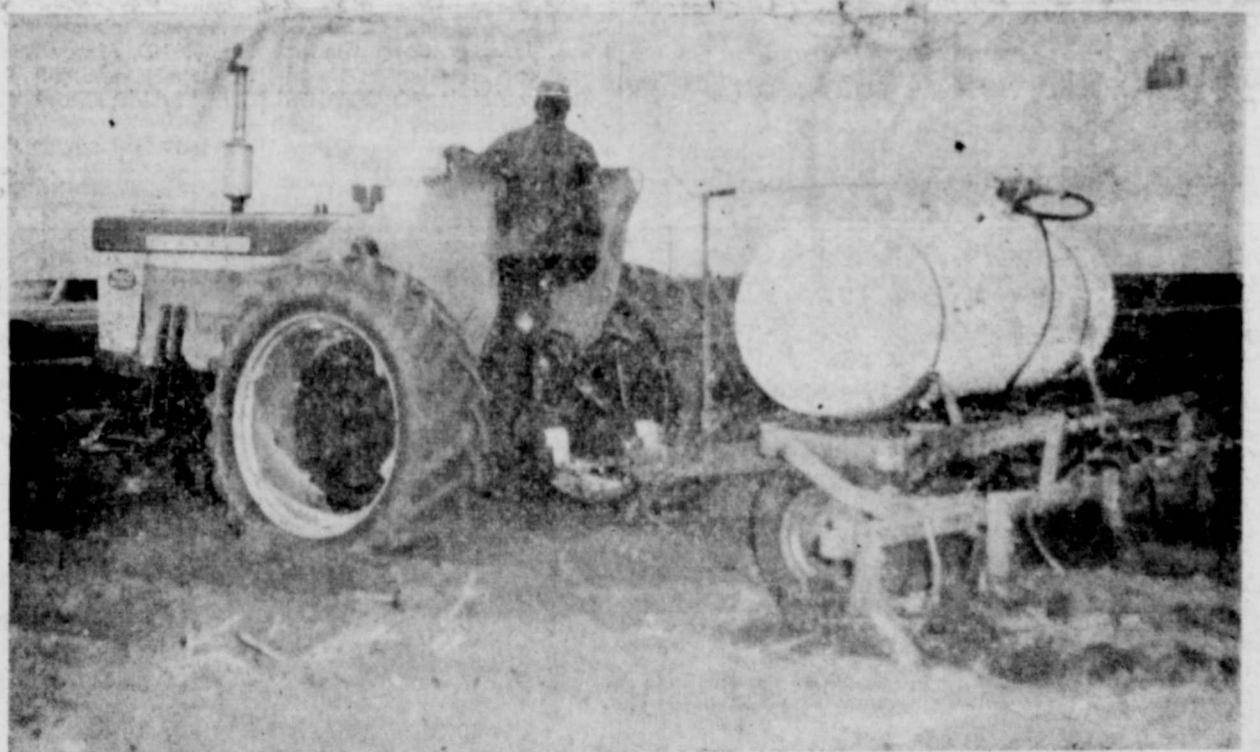

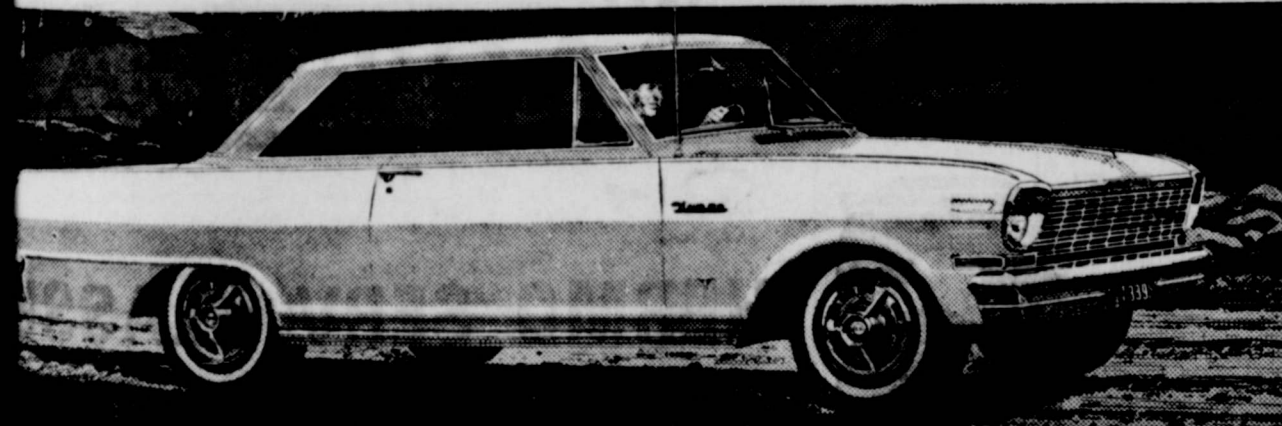

TO MAKE BASKET:
Shape a nest for eggs by using a sharp knife to cut a sloping ridge from edge to center of cake. Cut center no deeper than 1/2 inch. Fill hole made by the tube pan with cut cake.

TO FROST BASKET:
Frost sides of cake and lightly frost top with "NO-FAIL FROSTING". Make a basket weave pattern in frosting on sides of cake by drawing inch-long horizontal and vertical lines with tines of fork. Cover top of basket with green-tinted coconut.

FOR BASKET HANDLE:
Fashion handle of pipe cleaners or coat hanger. Wrap several strips with aluminum foil. Then wrap handle with pastel yellow ribbon; make ribbon secure with cellophane tape. Tie pink ribbon bow on top of handle. Press handle into top of cake basket.

NOTE: To tint coconut. Put a tablespoon or two of water in jar with light lid. Add few drops of green food coloring to water; let coconut soak until it is the desired color. Drain on paper towel; let dry.

NOTE: Recipe for making "NEVER-FAIL FROSTING":
1 cup granulated sugar
1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar
3 tablespoons water
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 unbleached egg whites
1 teaspoon flavoring
Let water come to boiling point in the bottom of double boiler. Then combine all ingredients in top of double boiler, and place top section over the hot water. Beat with mixer on high speed until frosting is fluffy and holds up in peaks, 3 to 5 minutes. When slightly cool spread on cake.

NOTE: A recipe for making delicious fondant:
1/3 cup soft butter or margarine
1/3 cup corn syrup
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cups (1 pound) sifted confectioner's sugar.
Blend butter, corn syrup and salt in large mixing bowl. Add sifted sugar all at once. Mix together with a spoon then knead with hands into a smooth soft ball, kneading in all the dry ingredients. Makes about 1 1/3 lbs. of candy. Flavor and shapes may be varied as desired.

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TO MAKE BEAUTIFUL EASTER BASKET CAKE:
Bake cake in angel food tube pan. Decorate cake as basket. Fill with green-tinted coconut "grass" and candy Easter eggs, or Fondant.

GELATIN EASTER EGGS
Break shells of eggs so carefully that just the tip of the shell is broken when egg is removed. Wash and dry shells. Dissolve gelatin in 1 cup boiling water, and add only 1/2 cup cold water. Gelatin may be colored different colors with food coloring.

Arrange empty shells upright in egg cartons or the egg holders from refrigerator and fill with the colored gelatin. Chill until firm. To remove eggs from shells; carefully break away shell about halfway, hold egg under warm running water a moment, and invert to slip egg out. Serve as dessert in nests of green coconut or as salad in nests of greens.

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

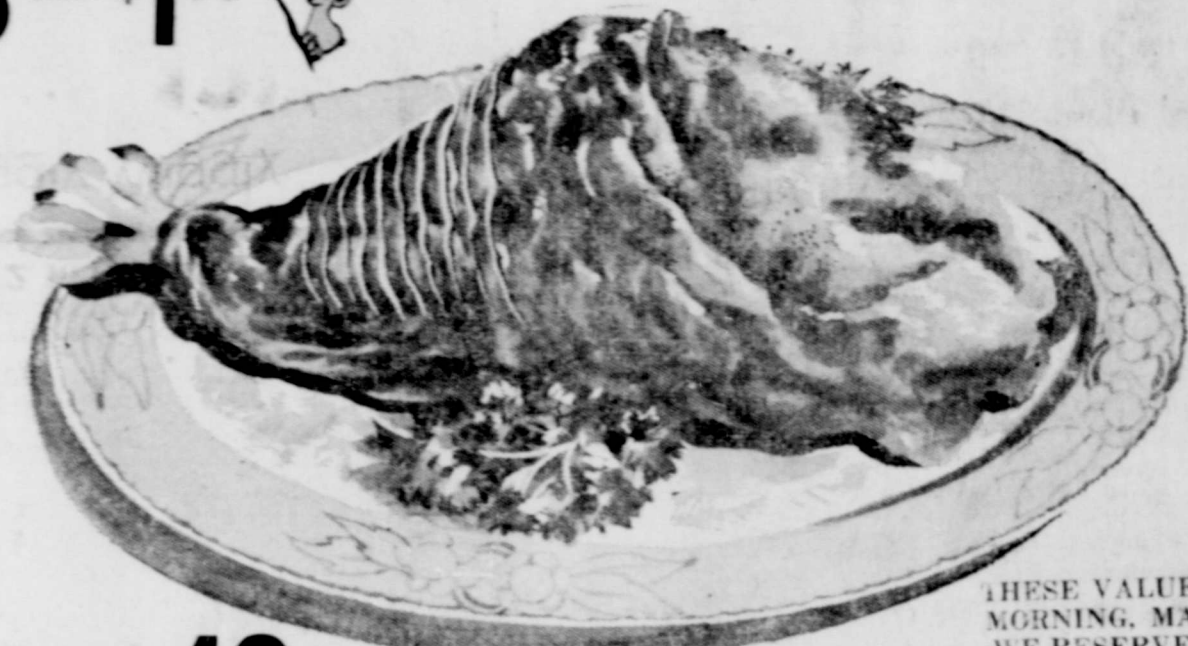
