



These general trends are reflected in the report for Deaf Smith County, where 19 wells in various parts of the district were used for observation purposes. The D. L. McDonald well, oldest well in the county, showed a decline of ten feet in the 30 years since 1914 and a decline of 3.4 feet since 1934. The

H. H. Boardman well showed the largest rise in water level over the ten year period-a rise of 4.8 feet. All wells showed a recovery during 1941 and 1942, with the downward trend resumed in

### Lance Receives Bronze Star for Iwo Action

Cpl. Earl Lance, Jr., of the U. S. Marine Corps has been awarded the Bronze Star Medal for heroic achievement in connection with operations against the enemy at Iwo Jima on Feb. 24, 1945. Cpl. Lance was serving with a provisional field artillery group attached to a Marine Amphibious Corps Landing force at the time. When major wire lines had been destroyed by hostile artilery fire, Cpl. Lance, during the firings and explosion of an ammunition dump, repeatedly repaired damaged lines. Carrying out his mission with resourcefulness and skill, he succeeded, despite extreme danger to himself and grave handicaps because of terrain, in maintaining communications. According to the citation: "By his courage and cool determination he contributed materially to the uninterrupted and accurate fire support of his battalion. His conduct was at all times in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service."
