Floyd county voters approved Democrats Lyndon Johnson and Hubert Humphrey to lead the nation for another term as a record crowd of voters flooded votng places here Tuesday.

Johnson-Humphrey received 2,333 votes in comparison to 1,229 votes for Republicans Barry Goldwater and Bill Miller. In 1960 the county went Republican voting 1580 for

Nixon and 1447 for Kennedy. U. S. Senator Ralph Yarborough won re-election in the state and carried Floyd County 2,056 votes to

George Bush's 1,611. J. K. Holmes easily won the county judge's office in spite of a strong Republican write-in campaign for Goree C. Applewhite, 2,768 to 706.

Ralph Wayne, Democratic candidate for the state legislature won over Republican Ralph Nafzger in the district 13,345 to 3,796 and Floyd voters favored Wayne 2,688 to 773.

It is noteworthy that state attorney general Waggoner Carr received the most votes of any candidate on the ballot, 2,990.


