- GREEN TOMATO PRESERVES 1 1/2 pound tomatoes 1 pound sugar 1 pint water 2 tablespoons lemon juice Wash tomatoes; cut out stem. Add sugar and water and cook slowly until thick. Add lemon juice when nearly done.

looking over her shoulder (and her son-in-law) she proceeded to make Lorin's recipe, and when it was poured up, and we had all sampled it, we agreed that it was excellent peanut brittle.

Christmas will soon be here and in order for all our readers to make up a good batch of peanut brittle, we'll reprint it just like Lorin told Dave Eaton, who in turn gave it to us by memory!

Mix 2 cups sugar, 3/4 cup white Karo syrup, 2 tablespoons cold water and bring to boil.

Add two cups of raw peanuts. Boil until peanuts pop and mixture turns brown . . . then sprinkle in one teaspoon of soda and pour into buttered pan to cool.

MOST OF us keep wishing for things we don't have . . . but what else is there to wish for?

I WONDER what old Edgar Hays will have to say about Lockney beating Floydada last Friday night. I hope he gets so excited about it, he forgets to get out a paper this week.

Luckily, I missed the humiliation of watching Lockney beat us. I just happened to be in Denver City watching them clobber Morton. It was a good first half, 8-8 at halftime but the second half saw Denver City's Big Reds come to life and the final score was 36-8.

Folks down that way would rather play Floydada than Friona in by-district play because the game would be played in Denver City, since Denver City played Floydada here in 1969 for bi-district championship.

Their football is outstanding in every detail: fast hard hitting line, three very fast backs, a very fine pass offense and a sweeping end play that leaves nothing to be desired. They have two Davids . . . David Lofin and David Mitchell. Mitchell is the passer, both are plenty fast. Then Number 31 (I believe his name is Young) is extremely fast with the ball and many times goes down and receives Mitchell's passes.

There are over 100 in the Denver City band and it is very impressive. The Morton band wasn't nearly as large, but had good quality . . . and something I've never seen before, a one arm twirler. She twirls that baton with her left hand and is very good. This is very admirable . . . a girl with a handicap such as this . . . and of all things a twirler in front of the band.

You can hear these high school bands play a little of everything. Morton's band did a swing version of the Beatles' "I Want to Hold Your Hand." Another note of unusual band numbers was the Post band who played "San Antonio Rose" when they visited here.

THE GROUP from Borger who visited here last week needs the cooperation of our chamber of commerce and county court in working to make the highway from Borger to Post (which comes through Floydada) a state highway. With the proper "sign" advertising many tourists would come directly from Borger through Floydada to Post . . . eliminating the problems of going through those old crowded cities like Lubbock, Plainview and Amarillo. of carved ivory, a tortoise shell hand carved comb decorated with miniature silver roses, a sterling silver hair pin with a butterfly on the spring, black jet combs of every color, form and fashion from all over the world, mother of pearl, gold, and one which has the colors of a peacock and in the center an eye of a peacock.

Also one of her favorites is a silver comb once the property of Zona Gale, author who won the Pulitzer Prize for dramatization of her book, "Miss Lula Betts" in 1920.

One comb in particular is about a foot long and Mrs. Hollums calls it her "Head Hunter's Comb". She is still looking for the head to fit it, she said.

Mrs. Hollums chooses a different comb each day to wear in her tresses from the more modern group of her collection but her pride and joy is showing them to friends.

She said she started the collection as doing something different. Her collection has grown over the years and now she has them stored in two show cases.

About three years ago she loaned several to the dramatic class at Texas Tech to be worn by the girl's cast in a play. Who knows before long the trend again may be long hair done up with combs.

The comb collection is just a few of many antiques that are possessed by Mrs. Hollums. Her new home is furnished with antiques and in her abstract office are found many. Each year at Old Settlers Antique Windows display a number of her collections.

She still has a collar button holder, a gift from her to her husband when a young girl. She has a Jew's harp which she remembers her mother playing and along with her comb collection are many many beautiful hat pins fit for a queen.

Although a very busy woman at the age of 78 Mrs. Hollums is never too busy to stop her work and show friends through her room of antiques and to tell the history of each.

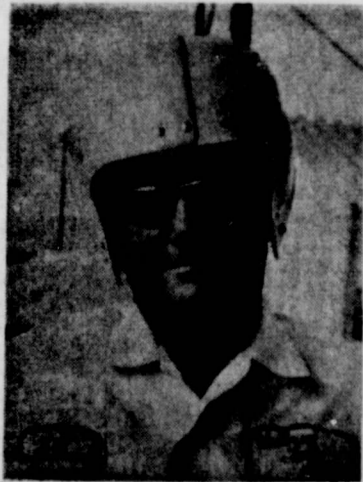

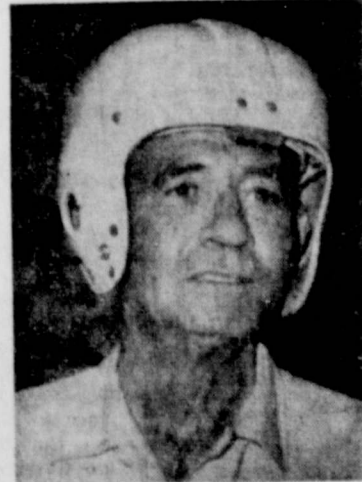

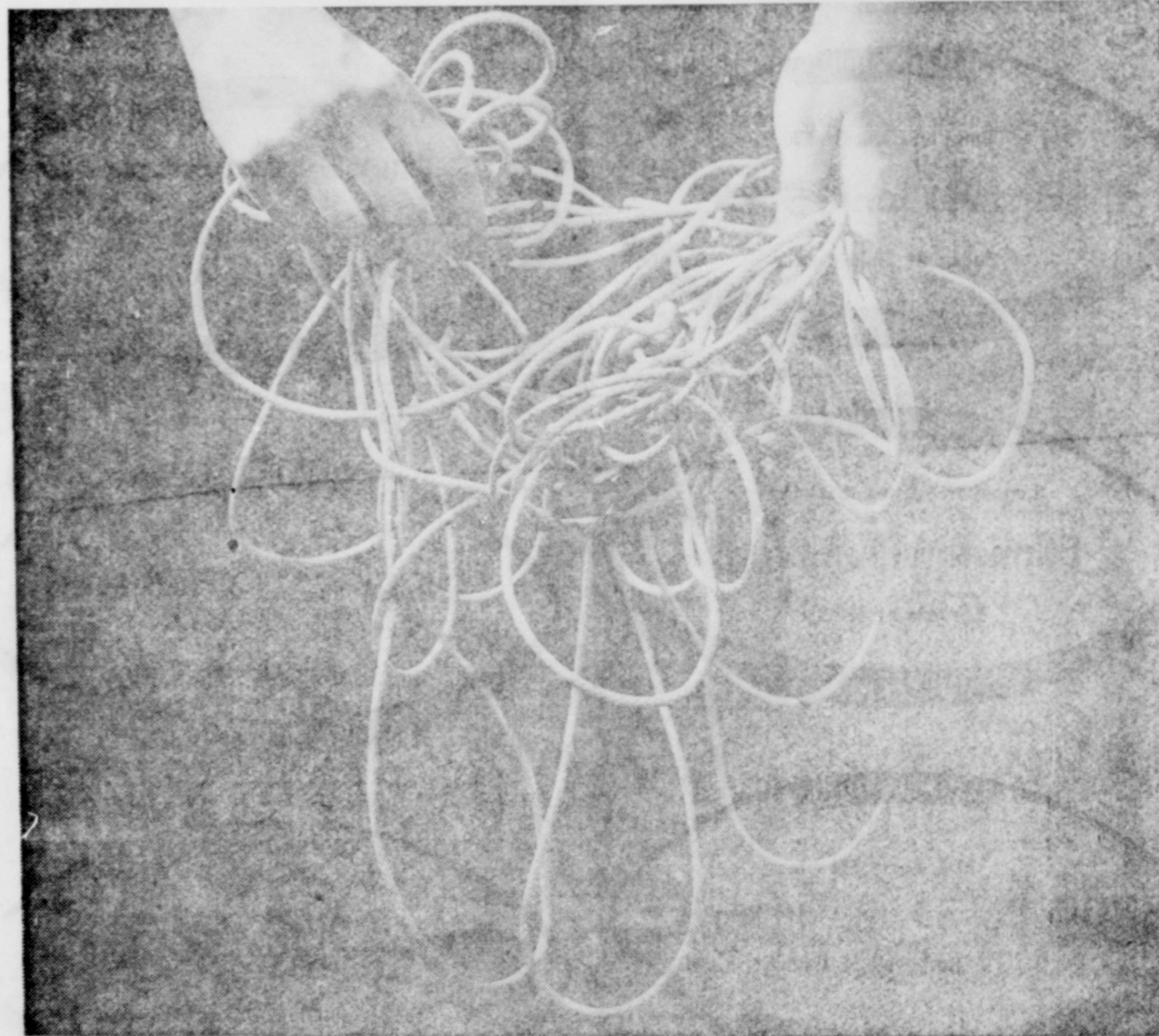
