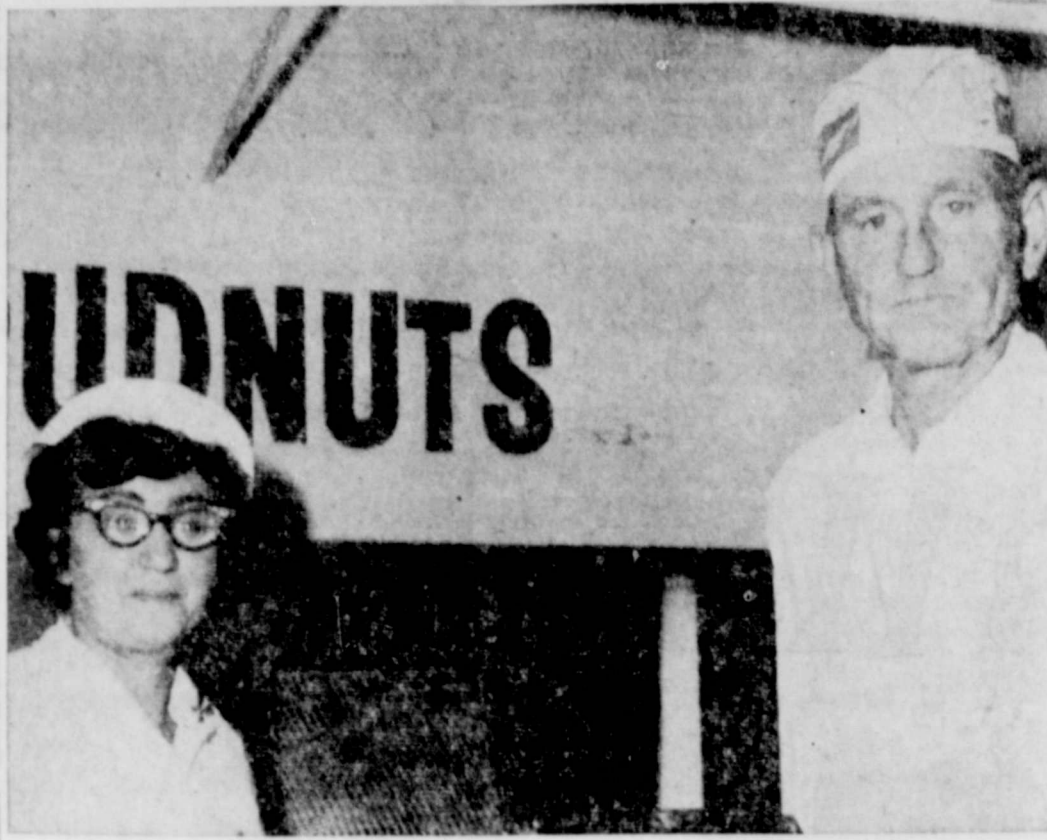

Reading And Writing

More than a billion persons in the world cannot write—44 percent of all the earth's people over 15 years of age.

Universal suffrage and yet more than 400 million illiterate voters are a paradox. Frank C. Laubach, still aggressively looking for the "Each one teach one" method, is a missionary to the Moros in the Philippines. He soon found out he could accomplish as much as all the Moros were illiterate. He came up with the idea that he has spread around the world: "Each one teach one."

Laubach and his associates have conducted mass literacy campaigns in 311 languages in 105 countries. It is on solid ground when he says the probability should be considered in every foreign election—public or private.

There are ten million persons in the world who cannot effectively read or write—in a national election, a relatively few votes have been known to be cast for a candidate.

USA Wins Again

The United States Olympic team, so outstanding in field events in the recent Tokyo games, and to the Russians once again in the number of medals.

In many gallant efforts, the Americans won medals that the Russians because of our team's in gymnastics, women's events, etc. Surprisingly, the United States turned up weak in boxing this time.

After leading in total medals during the games, the United States team fell behind in the forty-eight hours of the four-year event and second in medals.

Although this was a disappointment, the achievements of Americans were many and great. The United States team won more medals than the team won in Rome in 1960. In addition, the team won more gold medals in the 1964 than in any other country.

Our effort in 1964 was an improvement over 1960. It was still not what it should be in some of the popular sports. A way must be found to make team more competitive in these less popular sports that heroic efforts of so many, in the first of the games, in building a lead for the U.S., always cancelled out by almost-complete in canoeing, wrestling, weight-lifting, gymnastics.

Postal Problems

When people scarcely realize that they are fighting a battle in their efforts to get the Post Office down on its feet.

Administration has to have a go at reducing costs and raising rates, and so it is with the Johnson organization. This time, at least, there is no threat to increase first class rates, which are already at the point of diminishing returns. It costs 5 cents to mail a check to the local gas company, and parcel post rates are so high that only rich people or wastrels feel they can afford them.

Although President Johnson and Postmaster General John A. Gronouski haven't decided definitely, they are considering asking for higher second class rates, much to the anguish of magazine publishers who are suffering badly from increasing subscriber resistance to high prices.

They will again make their case that their role in informing and educating the public should not be damaged by higher rates. Their argument is a good one, and ought to be given the most serious consideration by Congress.

Third class, or "junk" mail, is something else. Its users ought to pay more for the privilege of sending unsolicited matters to homes and businesses and should be required to pre-sort the stuff and to use zip codes on all of it.

The real answer to the deficit problem, of course, is to increase the efficiency in mail handling. Any other solution will be suspect in the eyes of the public, which is well aware that the quality of service has been going downhill in spite of higher rates, and that the last round of increases was pretty well wiped out by higher salaries for tightly organized postal employees.

The better pay is not begrudged but it would make everyone

happy it is were accompanied by postal management which could come a bit closer to matching the efficiency achieved by large private enterprises.

Crop Residue Aids In Conservation Many Ways

Crop residues are valuable for maintenance and productivity of the soil. Residues conserve moisture, increase infiltration, reduce soil losses, and improve soil tilth. A fact generally overlooked is that of a more efficient use of fertilizers when the organic matter level of the soil is high. Properly used residues consist primarily of leaving the residue from grain sorghum or small grain crops on or near the surface of the ground until the land is prepared for the next crop.

A 5,000 pound milo crop will produce approximately 6,000 pounds of residues which contain about 85 pounds of total nitrogen, 25 pounds of phosphorus, and 125 pounds of potassium. With good management the nutrients can contribute substantially to the requirements of the next crop.

Seldom do crops such as cotton supply the amount of residues needed. Cotton is a low residue producing crop that should be grown in rotation with high residue producing crops to provide an adequate level of organic matter in the soil—crop production becomes more hazardous and expensive as organic matter declines.

Organic matter in the soil is obtained from plants and animals, crop residues, manures, fungi, bacteria, worms, etc. Decaying organic matter helps bring soil minerals into solution, improves physical condition of the soil, increases water intake, improves aeration, and serves as an important nutrient source. It contains most of the available nitrogen and phosphorus in the soil.

Two of the nicest weeks of my life were at Camp Hale in the spring of 1944. In April, the last week of our "D" series maneuvers as an uncontrolled maneuver with the 87th Infantry (supposedly) on the defensive in Vail Pass against the other two regiments of the 10th Division. The commander of the 87th (Col. Goode) was a wonderful old soldier who made maneuvering a pleasure for his units.

I packed a 60 mm mortar to and fro over all the ridges between Pando and Vail Pass. The snow was good and the temperature not bitter and everyone enjoyed the week (but was glad it was over).

In early May there was a lull in training so the first battalion of the 87th was sent back up to Ptarmigan to hide behind the snow for a week. There were only two requirements, everyone had to be out of Camp from eight to five and everyone had to be in a group which included one or two top skiers. I envy those who are able to go back to the fancy lodge now at Vail Pass.

Agriculture Census Makes Current County Statistics

The 1964 Census of Agriculture, now being conducted by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce, in Floyd County, will bring up to date the farm and ranch statistics last collected in 1959.

Here are a few of the many facts recorded in the 1959 agriculture census for this County:

There were 953 farms and ranches in 1959, compared with 1,184 in 1954. The average size of farm and ranch was 651.4 acres in 1959, compared with 521.4 acres in 1954.

The value of products sold by the County's farmers and ranchers in 1959 was \$29,695,319. The value of all crops sold was \$28,901,960. The value of all livestock and livestock products sold was \$1,600,359.

The 1964 national Census of Agriculture is the 18th in a series which began in 1840. Because of the rapid changes American agriculture has been undergoing in recent years, Census Bureau officials regard the current census as one of the most significant ever taken.

They ask every farmer and rancher to cooperate in compiling an accurate record of these changes by filling out the census form he receives in the mail and holding the completed questionnaire until a census taker calls for it.
