veevil movement to the west was stopped short when the spray program started. According to Miller, the fall spray progam plus good in-season control practiced by farmers along the edge of the Caprock prevented weevils from The control zone covered about

300,000 acres in portions of Hall, Briscoe, Floyd, Motley, Crosby, Dickens, Kent, and Garza counties. A small number of acres in the southwestern corner of Lubbook County were also sprayed. A total of 1.136.676 acres were sprayed. The entire control zone received four applications - with some of the heavier infested area receiving five to six applications of technical malathion.

They are: (1) Those who need help for alcoholism, (2) Those who could pay at any hospital, (3) Those who can't pay their hospital bills (and this amount would have to be borne by a county or private hospital otherwise) and (4) Those won't normally go to a hospital even when medication is needed for lack of funds.
