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Notice Gas Users

Dear Fellow Member:

It is time to go to Austin again! Your Board of Directors of the Plains rigation Gas Users Association at its regular meeting in Hale County night (January 14, 1965) appointed a Legislative Committee to determ the advisability of introducing your gas bill into the Legislature which w give all irrigation gas users a right to buy gas at a fair and reasonable by making irrigation gas rates subject to review by the Railroad Commiss Your help in Austin will be needed if we are to pass our legislation.

The Plains Gas Farmers Cooperative Society has filed an application with the Federal Power Commission to purchase gas from Transwestern P line Company at a flat rate of 261/2c per mcf, and it looks as if the applicant might be granted in the very near future and that these farmers near Transwestern line will be able to get gas at 261/2c instead of paying 40c mcf or better. Many more farmers in the area of El Paso Natural Gas pany line anticipate similar applications in order to buy gas direct from Paso at a still greater savings than those farmers who will be able to chase from Transwestern.

Much work is to be done and a great deal of activity is planned for next ninety to one hundred twenty days which will be very critical not insofar as the legislation is concerned, but also with respect to the purch of gas from other natural gas resources.

Your Floyd County meeting will be held on the 8th day of February 7:30 p.m., 1965, at the District Courtroom in Floydada, Texas where a report of all current activities will be made by officers and representati from the Plains Board of Directors and their representatives. It is hoped every irrigation farmer in Floyd County can and will be present for meeting.
