
#### Good Number Turns Out On School Day

WHEREAS, it is provided in the law authorizing the creation and establishment of the Caprock Hospital District that an election shall be held on the first Saturday in April of each year for the election of directors to serve for a period of two years;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE CAP-ROCK HOSPITAL DISTRICT; SECTION 1: That an election be held on the 3rd day of April, 1965, within the Caprock Hospital District for the purpose of electing two directors for said District to serve for a period of two years, and said election shall be held under the General Laws of the State of Texas regulating general elections, except as the same are modified by Chapter 238 Acts of the 58th Legislature, Regular Session, and only resident qualified electors shall be entitled to vote.

SECTION 2: That the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V.A.T.C.S., and written or printed thereon shall be the names of the candidates who comply with the provisions of Chapter 238, Acts of the 58th Legislature Regular Session. SECTION 3: No person shall

be eligible for the office of Director unless he is a resident of the district, owns land subject to taxation therein and unless at the time of such election he shall be more than 21 years of age. SECTION 4: The entire dis-

trict shall comprise one election precinct and the polling place shall be at the County Judge's Office, Courthouse, Floydada, Texas, within the boundaries of the Caprock Hospital District. The Presiding Judge at said election shall be Billy Brown who shall appoint such assistants and clerks as shall be required.

Miss Margaret Collier is hereby appointed as Clerk for Absentee Voting at the election herein ordered and Absentee Voting shall be conducted at the County Clerk's Office. Courthouse, Floydada, Texas, and said Clerk shall keep the office open between the hours of 8:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. each day that is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State Holiday, all in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 424, Acts of the 58th Legislature, Regular Session, 1963.

SECTION 5: Notice of the election shall be given by publishing a substantial copy of this resolution one time in a newspaper of general circulation in the district, the said publication to be at least ten (10) full days prior to the e-

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

Take nothing but 100% cotton, it will help.




Mechanical methods for brush control should be practiced during the season when existing turf can make the fastest recovery and obtain the highest degree of brush kill. Reseeding with adapted native grasses at the time of operation is necessary for and permanent range recovery. Generally a heavy weed growth occurs following the operation. Weeds should be controlled by chemicals or other methods to reduce competition with native

grass seedlings. There is no disturbance of the soil with the use of chemicals for brush control. It is restricted to a short period of time approximately 50-80 days after the leaves first appear in the spring. Best kills are obtained with good soil moisture and lush growth of mes-



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



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#### Jim Morrison Retires From County Work

Jim Morrison of Dougherty has parked his county maintainer and retired after 31 years of continuous service with precinct 4 starting back with the old type grader during the depression days and ending with the most modern road machin-

Morrison has had many experiences to occur during his tenure with the county from digging out cars caught in snow storms to digging graves for saddle horses found dead along his route.

The retired county employe recalls that when he started work it was by the hour, 50 cents. When the depression hit his wages were cut to 35 cents and they had very little machinery to work with.

Among some of his memories was back in January of 1940 when Floyd County was hit with howling blizzard. All roads were blocked for days and Morrison's maintainer was parked at Pleasant Hill. By air was the only possible way

to get to the machine. Dot Hammonds taxied his plane to the south side of barns where very little snow had fallen and took off flying Morrison to his equipment. Morrison said he reached the main highway with the maintainer and pushed e-nough snow off that cars stranded could be driven on into Floydada.

He recalls that one year during his employment he dug a grave for a saddle horse belonging to W. S. Poole. He has worked under five commissioners, Henry Bloodworth H. J. Nelson, R. B. Calhoun Fay Hart and Bill McNeill.

Morrison came to Dougherty in 1927 and has lived there since. He and his wife have two sons, Billy of Midland and J. D. of Fort Worth and two daughters, Mrs. Virginia Cage north of Dougherty and Mrs. Bessie Mae Cohen of Kileen.

His future plans call for extended visits with numerous relatives and plenty of time for fishing.

According to the Surgeon Generals report on "Smoking and Health" last year, a committee made up of 10 non-biased scientific experts were in unanimous agreement, after spending over a year studying all of the facts and figures, that smoking is a health hazard. Still some people appear unconvinved. I think the truth of the matter is that they don't want to be convinced, for they are addicts. In all of medical history there have been few facts with more convincing proof than the association of cigarette smoking and lung cancer.

Keep up your good work, I doubt, however, that our government will do much to interfere with a business in which the public spent \$8.1 billion last year. If there were a "drug" on the market that was implicated in causing over 50,-000 lung cancer deaths this year there is little doubt that controls would be started immediately. And lung cancer is only one of several health hazards of smoking.
