The Authority will be govby an eight - member Board of Directors, two appointed from each city by the governing body of each city.

The Authority will be able to acquire and develop ground water, but may not produce over two acre-feet of water per year per surfaced acre acquired. Water rights must be acquired by purchase or lease, the same as an individual would have to get the water.

It is specifically spelled out that the Authority does not have the power to condemn under-

ground water rights.



Fairgame III is being conducted in three phases. The initial phase is designed to exercise the U. S. and French carrier task forces in mutual combined support operations. They are opposed by French air forces and French and U.S. submarines.

The second phase will consist of a combined French and U. S. amphibious assault landing at Santa Manze, Corsica. A fast carrier task force will support the amphibious landing. This assault will be opposed by French and U.S. submarines and land forces, and by French air forces.

The final phase of Fairgame 111 will consist of basic individual ship training exercises in which French and U.S. observers will be exchanged for orientation and indoctrination.

Shangri-La is an element of the carrier task force, and is participating in all three phases



COTTON LEGISLATION: At the present time the outlook for cotton legislaton which will be completely acceptable to Farm Bill, now before the House, is definitely headed in the wrong direction. Producers would be much better off without any legislation at all than to accept this proposal.

Congressman George Mahon has informed this correspondent that he has mailed copies of the Cooley Farm Bill, H. R. 8149, to the Floyd County ASCS Office, or he will mail one direct upon request at his office. It would be well if each farm family familiarized themselves with this bill.

FARM ECONOMY: A recent release from Representative Robert Dole, R-Kan., doesn't make the American farmer feel too optomistic concerning the farm economy. Rep. Dole stated, "Congress is still at least two months away from action on farm legislation. It's the same old story, with the farmer waiting and worrying while Congress delays action. No one should be under any illusion that the program now being considered will greatly

improve farm income. "Since 1961, net farm income has remained at virtually the same level while the total farm debt has increased nearly 50%. The toatl farm debt for today, for example, is greater than the entire federal budget for the year 1948. In 1961, American farmers were in debt \$1.97 for every dollar of realized net income. But this year, after four years of current farm programs, the farmer will owe a whopping \$2.86 for every in-come dollar. This is shocking, when considering that the farmer owed only abut \$2.30 per income dollar in 1929, the eve

of the Great Depression. "The farmer is being forced more and more to use credit as a substitute for income. The \$64 question is this, 'What will the farmer do when there are no assets left on which to borrow?"











Seedling Disease Reported In Floyd County Cotton

Seedling Disease has been reported attacking Floyd County Cotton. The disease caused by a soil fungus is most prevalant during cool, damp weather, according to Joe Wilson Floyd County agent,

It attacks the roots of cotton from the stages of just sprouting to about 4 inches in height. The cotton will turn yellow the tap root will rot away and the cotton may die. If the cotton does not die it will grow off

Each year we give recognition to an important part of this responsibility in observance of Soil Stewardship Week. We do so this year from May 23 through 30 with the theme "The Challenge of Growth." We acknowledge man's dependence on the soil and his duty to care for it. We have come to know that a land of conservation is a land of plenty.

Our conservation responsibility is a product of the growth that characterizes the United States, and growth presents a challenge that becomes more demanding with time.

Midway the decade of the Sixties, as we venture into the total and awesome universe, we are fast becoming aware of an extension of man's responsibility. There dawns upon us the realization that, bit by bit, man is slipping his veil of ignorance and misunderstanding, sweeping aside the aged shrouds of timidity and fear, to approach new horizons of human achieve-

In the laboratory, on the soil, beneath the sea and into space, our forays into the unknown in search of the "whys" and "hows" bring us always closer to truths we have only vaguely suspected. Our imagination leaps to engage more profound mysteries. It is imperative, in the face

of this remarkable boldness, that we pause with each unfoldment to understand our role and its meaning.

We are stewards of what we survey. Whatever we may chance to discover about our ease; however, at present there is no control for the disease. Nowhere will we be more constrained to meet our responsibility, to honor our trust, to discharge our obligation as stewards, than on earth with its soil and water resources, the stuff on which, after all, our

lives depend. We have learned from bitter experience the price of disregard for those obligations. Where we misused and abused the land we reaped subsequently the floods and dust and utter desolation.

We in America have survived those mistakes. We are earnestly endeavoring to husband and develop our soil and water resources - to heal the scars of our land. In this effort there are yet too many who believe the problems of soil and water be problems only for the land owner and operator. They must be impressed with the meaning of stewardship. They must come to know that although our resources to meet present and future needs are adequate, they will remain adequate only as we of country and city together use and develop them wisely. The speed with which stewardship becomes a fact of life in our cities can well be marked as a facet of the challenge of

The best use of land and water to meet human demands on a continuing basis becomes more urgent. As each day passes, this fact looms larger in importance in both urban and rural areas. This is the nature of the chal-

lenge of growth that confronts us: To cultivate more widely, among all our people, the conservation attitude, for conservation is the essence of stewardship and stewardship is the God - given privilege of human-


