It is most prominent in cattle from 6 to 18 months of age, but can be contracted by sheep, goats, and sometimes swine.

The Fawvers have vaccinated all their cattle that don't have the disease and it is recommended by County Agent Joe Wilson that all cattle in the entire county be vaccinated to prevent the spread of the disease.



Water Use Nears 2 Million Gallon Mark In Floydada

took a sharp rise last month as near drought conditions cover the city proper and much of the surrounding rural area. The average usage during the month was only 1,097,866 per day but on the peak day, June 29, this amount reached

1,913,000, just short of 2 mil-

lion gallons. As the dry weather continues, more water is used to keep lawns alive, the air conditioners are run more, and people just naturally drink more water for more evaporates from their

bodies. According to Marshall Haney, Director of Public Works, this figure was probably surpassed Monday, July 5. Most people were not working on their regular jobs and therefore more were home to take care of the yards.

As the temperature continues to climb and reach toward the 100 degree mark each day the water use will continue to climb. It is expected that the city can handle near a 3 million gallon per day demand, if there is no difficulty with the water system.

Wait For White **Blooms Before Watering Cotton**

Floyd County cotton farmers have started applying their first The water use in Floydada irrigation as the cotton has started blooming.

The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station through their tests have shown that if two irrigations are applied to cotton, the most profitable time to put the first one is when the first white bloom appears. It should not be applied before then unless it is an early maturing variety of cotton and then it should be applied only a few days in advance of the white bloom stage.

According to the Experiment Station results, the most profitable time to apply the second application is at the peal bloom period.

Each application should no be over 4 acre inches of water. Tests show an increase of approximately 20# lint per acre for each acre inch of water applied up to 4 acre inches

If the water is limited greatest returns can be obtained from two summer applications applied in alternate rows a compared with summer irrigation applied every row. FEDERAL GAS TAX FORMS

On an average weekend during the summer I estimate there must be at least 20 million lawnmowers running in the United States, and while it's no concern of mine, the noise doesn't bother me, I can't hear it from out here on this Johnson grass farm, and I don't own one myself, I let a cow do the mowing, it's cheaper, no breakdowns, requires no fuel and you can do it while sitting in the shade on the front porch, still I was interested in an item I read in a newspaper last week while my cow was cutting the grass.

According to it, some scientists have developed a new lawn grass that grows solid but only three inches tall. Stays the same height, no matter how long you let the sprinkler run. Never have to mew it.

I was discussing this with a friend of mine in town who mows his lawn every week and is good at figures and sells lawnmowers.

"Look," he said, "say there are 20 million lawnmowers in this country and they average about \$50 each. That's a billion dollars worth of lawnmowers. Also, they must use at least \$100,000 worth of gasoline a week, parts are always needing replacing, blades have to be sharpened, Lots of boys earn \$2.50 a lawn or more mowing for other people, hospitals get business from lawnmower accidents, insurance companies sell accident policies, take it all in all, those grass scientists are fixing to wreck a two-billion-dollar industry, right when the President is banking on an expanding economy to justify more tax cuts to open the gates to the Great Society. Those scientists ought to destroy that new grass and start working on one that grows twice as fast and requires mowing two times a week. Make two blades of grass grow where one grew before, each twice as tall, and double the lawnmower business

JOHN TOWER NEWSLETTER THE MILITARY IMPORTANCE

All Americans are thrilled over the outstanding success of our Gemini IV space flight. The bravery of our two astronauts, Major James A. Mc-Divitt and Major Edward H. White, is a source of pride for all of us. Their example, like the example now being set by our fighting men in Southeast Asia, will inspire a whole new generation of Americans.

Those of us in Texas are especially aware of the importance of outer space. Our people have traditionally been concerned with frontiers, and the frontier of our age is in outer space. It is here that the safety and security of our nation will find new application, for it can be truly said that whoever controls space can and will control the security and destiny of nations on earth. The race for that control is now being run. We had better be sure that we don't come in second

Sometimes in the current contest for new space achievements, many lose sight of the military importance of space. A feat like that of Major White and Major McDivitt tends to remind us once again of the military importance of the space around our own earth. As the astronauts passed over Texas, they were able to define landmarks to a remarkable degree. The significance of this should not be lost.

The planned Manned Orbiting Laboratory is a vital part of our military space program. It will determine just how well a man can work in space. The first unmanned launches in this program are scheduled for this

The Armed Services Committee, on which I serve in the Senate, exercises Congressional supervision of the military space efforts. This is of considerable importance to Texas due to the location of the Manned Spacecraft Center in Hous-



I am an "old timer" of Floyd Co., coming there in 1901 - my father, W. T. Brown - Edd and Fred Brown are my brothers. I worked for the "Hesperian"

"Lovey" ran it. I was 13 years

old. I folded papers for the paper each week - at 15¢ an hour which was LUSH money for a little girl in that day and time. One night, as we worked "fe-verishly" to get the week's paper printed, a terrific storm came up and it stormed and rained almost a water spout and something went wrong with our machinery (altho. I think we had a gasoline motor) but this was an old time press where the ink roller rolled over the great oval face between each printing and when it drew back the paper was turned over in order to print the other side. It was an arduous and particular task, but it worked o.k. They set the type by

But this stormy night something went wrong, and the ink roller refused to work automatically. Mr. Adair was frantic! What could he do!

Finally we solved the problem very nicely by my standing on a strong wooden box and as the press went down I rolled the hand roller (an old one) over the huge ink pad. And as the press raised back I rolled the ink roller over the press.

We worked for hours - swiftly and efficiently, and toward the last, out of pure joy and satis-
