## Crosby County Sheriff Assailant Caught Near Here

### Wounded Man Is Brother Of Law Enforcement Official

County Sheriff's Department, City Police and the patrolmen joined in a search for a teenage youth accused of shooting Fletcher Starks, sheriff of Crosby County, Sunday afternoon.

The shooting occurred, until around 5 p.m. Monday, when the assailant was apprehended in an onion patch on a farm near the Harmony Community.

Starks is the brother of R. C. Starks of the Floydada Police Force. The youth is identified as 15-year old Juan Rodriguez. According to reports bond has been set for the youth at \$25,000.

According to officials, the shooting incident occurred when Sheriff Starks was called to a gin camp in Crosbyton to look into a report of molesting. A laborer there said a young man had attempted to molest his teen-age daughter. The sheriff and his son were met near the barracks residence for migrant laborers by the father and daughter who pointed out a young man about 15 and said he was the brother of the youth whom she accused of attempting to molest her.

When the sheriff questioned the young man and attempted to search him, the youth broke away from the officer and started running. As the sheriff pursued him the youth turned and fired at the sheriff with a .38 caliber pistol. The bullet entered the sheriff just below his right shoulder, passed through the lung and lodged just above the right kidney, according to local patrolmen.

Monday after undergoing four hours of surgery for the removal of the bullet, Starks remained in serious condition. Law enforcements were called in to help in the man-hunt from Floydada, Post, Paducah, Lubbock, Silvertown, Plainview and other places.

The lead to the location of the young man was given law officials when Fabian Torrez, a farm laborer, led officers to the field where the youth was apprehended.

A car with only Texas Ranger Renfrow and Goetz, of the liquor control board approached the farm and had the youth in the car with them in about five minutes after reaching the farm.

The youth is charged with assault with intent to murder, according to reports.

### Vinson Sinks Hole-In-One

Jerrold Vinson, playing on the Floydada Country Club Golf Course July 4, sank his second hole in one. Both of the oddities have occurred on Hole Number 2.

The distance from tee to cup is 136 yards. Vinson made the shot with a 9 iron. He went on to shoot a 74 on the round of 18 holes.

That day a small Handicap Tournament was played and Vinson won the prize for low gross with his shot on Number 2. Red Watts and two men from Crosbyton, whom Club officials did not know, were playing with Vinson at the time of the shot.

### Group Seeks Temporary Injunction Of County Tax Roll

Plaintiffs in the suit entitled Rene Yeary et alvs. Hollis Bond et al have petitioned the district court to hear their petition seeking a temporary injunction on the county tax roll.

District Judge L. D. Ratliff will conduct the hearing at 9 a.m. Friday in the district courtroom here.

The suit, which was filed several months ago, concerns the valuation of taxable property in the Caprock Hospital District, which is based on the county tax roll.

Wednesday, attorney for the plaintiffs had issued subpoenas to former county tax assessor-collector T. T. Hamilton, Floydada school business manager and tax assessor-collector David Eaton, chairman of the hospital board Hollis Bond and county judge J. K. Holmes to appear at the hearing.

### Local Druggist Recovering From Wreck Injuries

Baird Bishop, local druggist, is reported recovering from injuries sustained in a two car mishap Wednesday evening of last week on Farm to Market Roads 378 and 784. His brother, J. B., was admitted to Peoples Hospital for treatment as was James Donald Apple, driver of the second vehicle.

According to investigating officers, the two Bishop men were returning to Floydada, traveling east on the Sandhill Highway. Baird was driving his 1961 Ford and Apple, who was traveling south, was driving a 1953 Ford pick-up. Bishop was given a citation for failing to yield right of way, officers said.

Baird was taken to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock where he is still under treatment. He suffered a broken pelvis, a deep laceration on his head and other cuts and bruises. His brother was admitted to Peoples Hospital with broken ribs, cuts and bruises, as was the driver of the other vehicle involved. He sustained minor cuts and bruises. Both have since been dismissed.

Both vehicles were a total loss. A second wreck last week on Thursday, nine and one-tenth miles southwest of Floydada, on a dirt road, resulted in no injuries and minor damages to the vehicles.

Officers said Alfredo Salvadore of Ropesville was driving a 1960 chevrolet pick-up and Pedro Vega Cordere of Petersburg was driving a 1951 Plymouth sedan. The collision occurred on a curve. Both drivers were given a citation for driving on the wrong side of the road, officers said.

### South Plains Also Would Be Affected

Tuesday morning beginning at 9 a.m., a hearing will be held before the county school trustees to determine whether a part of the Floydada School District, namely the Cedar Hill area, will be annexed to the Lockney School District or whether it will remain with the Floydada District. The hearing will be held in the District Courtroom. It is open to the public.

Since the area involved is not more than ten percent of either of the districts, neither the Floydada district nor the Lockney district vote their preference, and the decision of the County Board will be final.

### Winn Receives Go Ahead From Washington

A group of local citizens who have shown an interest in a sound and light project of Welton (Skinny) Winn received some good news from the National Park Service in Washington, D. C. Tuesday.

The news came in the form of a letter from George B. Harzog, Jr., director in the service which stated that the department would permit Winn to make a showing of his light and sound extravaganza in Glen Canyon at a future time to be arranged with the superintendent of this particular park.

Winn said his group will now seek the assurance from the Park Service that it will have a delegation on hand to see the light and sound display. Winn's group seeks a franchise to operate in national parks.

However, if the County Board decides to annex Cedar Hill to the Lockney District, the only other step required is the approval of the Lockney School Board.

In this particular case South Plains School district would be affected. Most of the students transferring from that district to go to high school choose Floydada. If Cedar Hill is annexed to Lockney, then South Plains, too, would go to Lockney, for the residents of one district cannot transfer across another district to go to school.

South Plains students coming to Floydada would be crossing the Cedar Hill portion of the Lockney district, if the annexation is approved. (See CEDAR HILL page 6)

### Black Leg Cases Noted In County

An outbreak of Blackleg in the Baker Community has caused the loss of 12 or 13 cattle, according to a report from the G. L. Fawver family in that community.

Mrs. Fawver said they had lost 3 calves, and some had lost 6, 2 and 1 or 2 calves because of the disease.

It is most prominent in cattle from 6 to 18 months of age, but can be contracted by sheep, goats, and sometimes swine.

The Fawvers have vaccinated all their cattle that don't have the disease and it is recommended by County Agent Joe Wilson that all cattle in the entire county be vaccinated to prevent the spread of the disease.

The first report of the disease came Saturday from the Baker Community.

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**Heart Attack Claims Life Of Area Kinsmen**

Ned McNeill, 39 year old nephew and cousin of several local residents, was stricken with a fatal heart attack about noon last Thursday in Wichita Falls. He was assistant dean of boys at the Wichita Falls High School.

McNeill, his wife and two sons were at the Skyline Country Club to go swimming when he was stricken. Steve Shelton, 16, the lifeguard, applied artificial respiration until the ambulance arrived. However McNeill was reported dead on arrival at a Wichita Falls Hospital.

### Water Use Nears 2 Million Gallon Mark In Floydada

The water use in Floydada took a sharp rise last month as near drought conditions cover the city proper and much of the surrounding rural area.

The average usage during the month was only 1,097,866 per day but on the peak day, June 29, this amount reached 1,913,000, just short of 2 million gallons.

As the dry weather continues, more water is used to keep lawns alive, the air conditioners are run more, and people just naturally drink more water for more evaporates from their bodies.

According to Marshall Haney, Director of Public Works, this figure was probably surpassed Monday, July 5. Most people were not working on their regular jobs and therefore more were home to take care of the yards.

As the temperature continues to climb and reach toward the 100 degree mark each day the water use will continue to climb. It is expected that the city can handle near a 3 million gallon per day demand, if there is no difficulty with the water system.

### Wait For White Blooms Before Watering Cotton

Floyd County cotton farmers have started applying their first irrigation as the cotton has started blooming.

The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station through their tests have shown that if two irrigations are applied to cotton, the most profitable time to put the first one is when the first white bloom appears. It should not be applied before then unless it is an early maturing variety of cotton and then it should be applied only a few days in advance of the white bloom stage.

According to the Experiment Station results, the most profitable time to apply the second application is at the peak bloom period.

Each application should not be over 4 acre inches of water. Tests show an increase of approximately 204 lint per acre for each acre inch of water applied up to 4 acre inches.

If the water is limited greatest returns can be obtained from two summer applications applied in alternate rows as compared with summer irrigation applied every row.

District Director of Internal Revenue. This claim will be allowed only if filed on or before September 30, 1965. The period covered by this claim is from July 1, 1964 through June 30, 1965. If you do not have one of the Forms 2240 please call us and we will mail you one or come by the office in the Agricultural Bldg. on corner of Courthouse square.

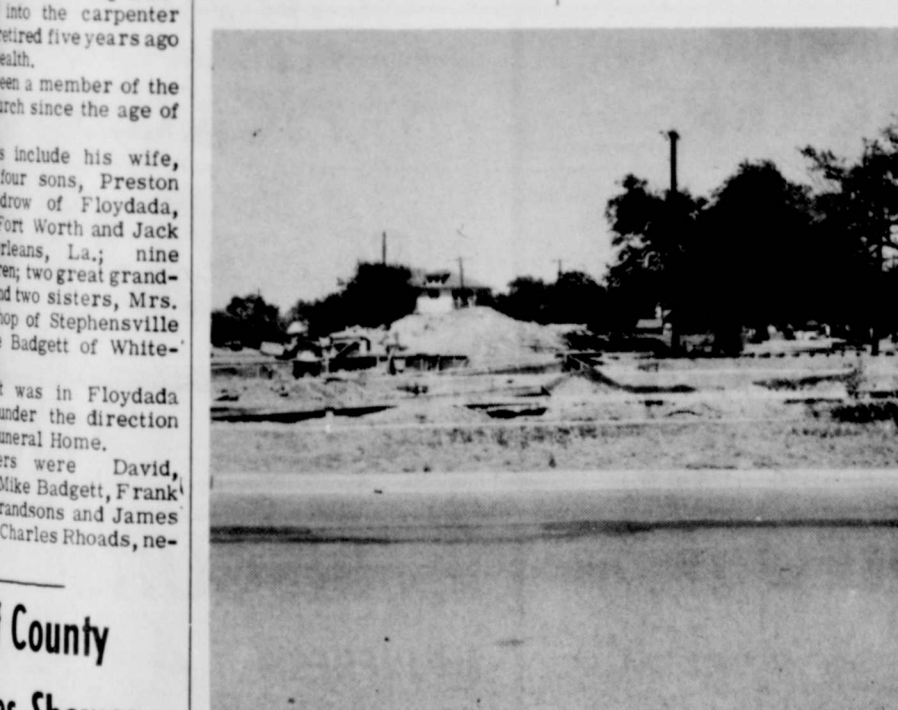

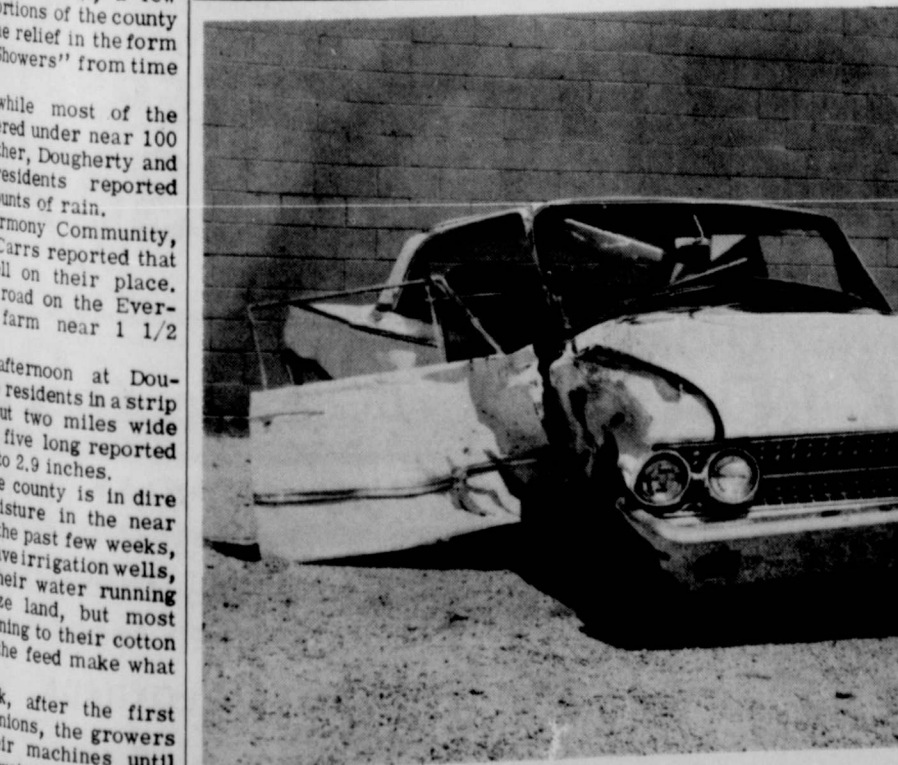

## Floyd County Has Over \$4 Million Food Bill In 1964

NEW YORK, June 26--Incomes in Floyd County were up in the past year and, as a result, retail spending was heavy.

A record amount of money poured into the cash registers of local stores, putting most of them ahead of their previous highs.

Good progress was made by those selling cars, food, household appliances, clothing and furniture, among others.

Just how well they made out is shown in a new report on consumer buying, released by the Standard Rate and Data Service. It reveals the way people in each section of the country have been spending their dollars.

In Floyd County, a large part of it went for food. The amount spent in the year in local grocery stores, bakeries, butcher shops, supermarkets and such came to \$4,093,000, topping the prior year's \$3,621,000.

This outlay was solely for food that was purchased for home consumption. Not included was the sum spent in restaurants, at lunch counters and in other dine-and-drink places.

Approximately 20 cents out of every dollar that was spent in local retail stores went for such food purchases.

If the \$4,093,000 that was expended for food were divided equally among all local families, each of them would have a bill of \$1,047 for the year. This is more than was spent in most parts of the West South Central States. The average was \$950 per household. In the State of Texas it was \$1,008.

Other retail lines also shared in the strong consumer buying locally.

Stores selling automobiles, motorcycles, boats and other automotive equipment had receipts totaling \$5,321,000 for the year. This was equivalent to 27 cents of every dollar spent at retail.

Sales of general merchandise, in variety and department stores, came to \$887,000, or 4 cents of the dollar.

Specialty stores and apparel shops, including those carrying dresses, shoes, hats and other clothing, had a sales total of \$907,000, or another 4 cents.

Home furnishings and furniture stores accounted for \$399,000, representing 2 cents of the dollar.

According to preliminary re-

ports covering the early part of this year, consumer spending continues strong. Advances comparable to those made in 1964 are indicated.

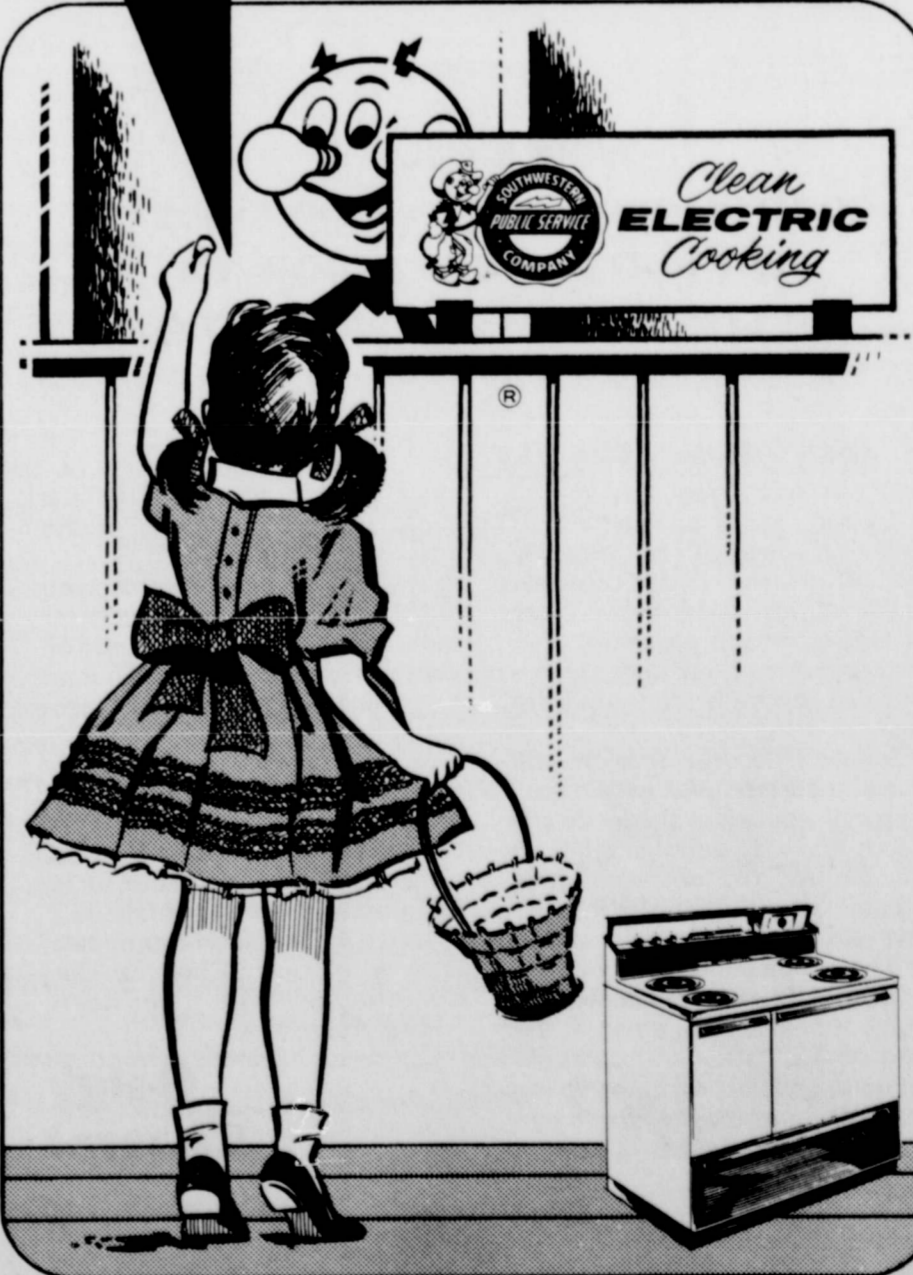
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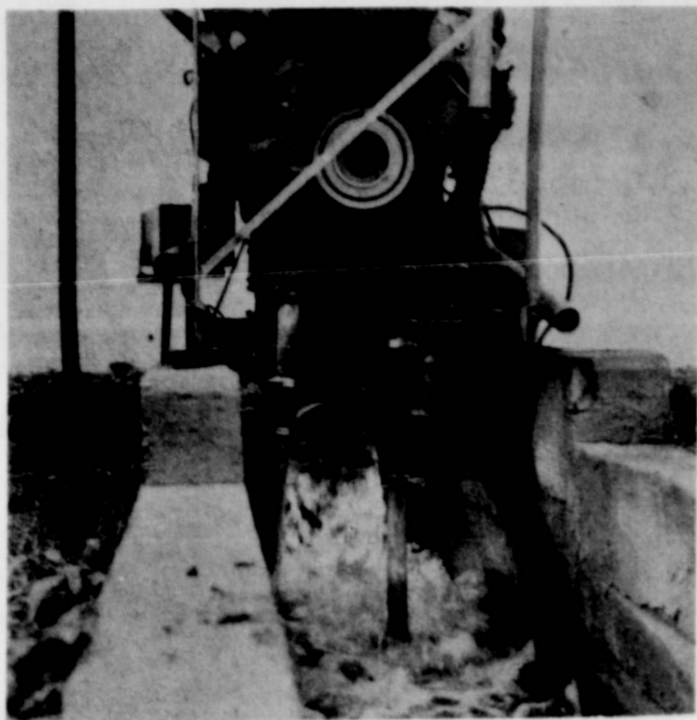

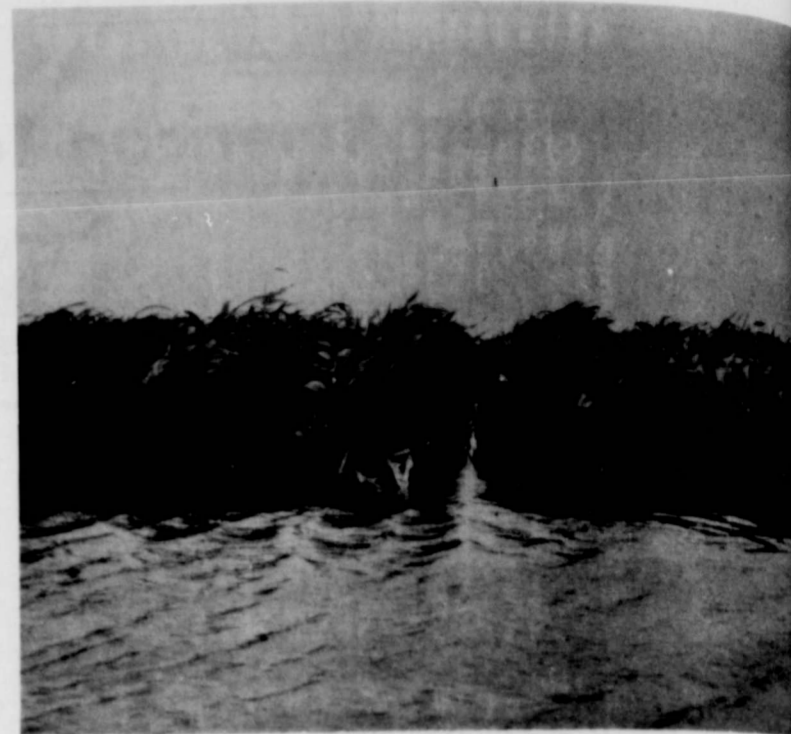

When people are paying their income tax there's always a lot of fussin' about taxes being too high. The Internal Revenue Service carefully shows taxpayers how the tax dollars are spent in the publication "Your

Federal Income Tax" and in the Teaching Taxes course. The big cartwheel is divided up into pie slices as follows: National Defense, 45¢ - Health, Labor and Welfare, 23¢ - Agriculture, 6¢ - Veterans, 5¢ - Fixed Interest Charges, 7¢ -

Space, 3¢ - International, 2¢ - and Other, 9¢. Internal Revenue also points out that it costs less than 1/2 ¢ on the dollar to collect this tax. Civil Service 1/18 The United States Civil Service Commission announces

## Favors Avoiding Mowing While Retaining Economy

Editor's note: The Floyd Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm considers the economics of lawn-mowing in his letter this week.

Dear editor:

On an average weekend during the summer I estimate there must be at least 20 million lawnmowers running in the United States, and while it's no concern of mine, the noise doesn't bother me, I can't hear it from out here on this Johnson grass farm, and I don't own one myself, I let a cow do the mowing, it's cheaper, no breakdowns, requires no fuel and you can do it while sitting in the shade on the front porch, still I was interested in an item I read in a newspaper last week while my cow was cutting the grass.

According to it, some scientists have developed a new lawn grass that grows solid but only three inches tall. Stays the same height, no matter how long you let the sprinkler run. Never have to mow it.

I was discussing this with a friend of mine in town who mows his lawn every week and is good at figures and sells lawnmowers.

"Look," he said, "say there are 20 million lawnmowers in this country and they average about \$50 each. That's a billion dollars worth of lawnmowers. Also, they must use at least \$100,000 worth of gasoline a week, parts are always needing replacing, blades have to be sharpened. Lots of boys earn \$2.50 a lawn or more mowing for other people, hospitals get business from lawnmower accidents, insurance companies sell accident policies, take it all in all, those grass scientists are fixing to wreck a two-billion-dollar industry, right when the President is banking on an expanding economy to justify more tax cuts to open the gates to the Great Society. Those scientists ought to destroy that new grass and start working on one that grows twice as fast and requires mowing two times a week. Make two blades of grass grow where one grew before, each twice as tall, and double the lawnmower business and keep this country moving forward."

After listening to a speech that long, I didn't argue, but he has a point, although an application of modern thinking can get around it.

Let the scientists go ahead and get the grass ready, but

don't sell it. Rent it.

Big business half the time doesn't own its big electronic calculating machines. They're rented.

You don't own your telephone, do you? Of course not, you just rent it for so much a month. When you get down to it, most people just rent their automobiles.

Get one of those rented calculating machines to figure up

what the average man pays for mowing his lawn, then rent him this new grass on those terms.

Add it to his telephone bill. Two billion dollars worth of lawn mowing money will still flow into the economy, nobody will be hurt, the economic index won't waver, and people can sit on their lawns on weekends and enjoy their tax cuts.

### JOHN TOWER NEWSLETTER THE MILITARY IMPORTANCE OF SPACE

All Americans are thrilled over the outstanding success of our Gemini IV space flight. The bravery of our two astronauts, Major James A. McDivitt and Major Edward H. White, is a source of pride for all of us. Their example, like the example now being set by our fighting men in Southeast Asia, will inspire a whole new generation of Americans.

Those of us in Texas are especially aware of the importance of outer space. Our people have traditionally been concerned with frontiers, and the frontier of our age is in outer space. It is here that the safety and security of our nation will find new application, for it can be truly said that whoever controls space can and will control the security and destiny of nations on earth. The race for that control is now being run. We had better be sure that we don't come in second best.

Sometimes in the current contest for new space achievements, many lose sight of the military importance of space. A feat like that of Major White and Major McDivitt tends to remind us once again of the military importance of the space around our own earth. As the astronauts passed over Texas, they were able to define landmarks to a remarkable degree. The significance of this should not be lost.

The planned Manned Orbiting Laboratory is a vital part of our military space program. It will determine just how well a man can work in space. The first unmanned launches in this program are scheduled for this fall.

The Armed Services Committee, on which I serve in the Senate, exercises Congressional supervision of the military space efforts. This is of considerable importance to Texas due to the location of the Manned Spacecraft Center in Houston.

This backing came with the discovery that there really are four corners of the earth and that Ireland is at the center of one of these "corners," or gravitational high points.

The revelation was credited to a number of Navy research satellites. By studying rises and dips in their orbits, scientists were able to pinpoint the globe's high and low areas.

It was an arduous and particular task, but it worked o.k. They set the type by hand.

But this stormy night something went wrong, and the ink roller refused to work automatically. Mr. Adair was frantic! What could he do!

Finally we solved the problem very nicely by my standing on a strong wooden box and as the press went down I rolled the hand roller (an old one) over the huge ink pad. And as the press raised back I rolled the ink roller over the press.

facton, I remember we began to sing religious songs - his mother, his sister, Linda, Mr. Adair and I - "Onward Christian Soldiers" - and so the "Hesperian" was published that week and all the county, who waited eagerly for the news in that early pioneer time, had their weekly paper on time.

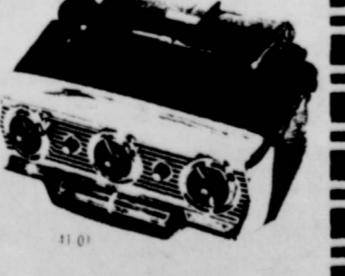
