Unidentified flying objects of a type reported over at least eight states showed up as blips early Monday on a radar screen at the Wichita Weather Bureau.

Lockney Co-op Elevator at Sterley received the load which tested 46 in weight and above 15 percent in moisture. Capacity of the load was not available.

Combines were cutting in the C. W. Jones field 2 miles north of the Matador highway on the Bethel place yesterday afternoon. Sample test showed 14 1/2 percent moisture.

Against Mail Route Consolidation

After careful consideration of the overall situation The Hesperian believes that the Post Office Department's decision to eliminate route 2 in Lockney and consolidate other routes out of Lockney and Floydada is not to the best interests of the Post Office Department nor the patrons affected.

Although, some savings in operating cost would result from this proposal, it is The Hesperian's opinion that the savings do not compensate for the poor mail service that will result to the people on the proposed consolidated routes.

It is apparent that the people on routes 3 and 4 out of Floydada will receive a later daily mail service and of course the people in the Cedar Hill area will also be affected with a poorer mail service, plus the inconvenience of address changes.

Likewise, there will be a considerable cost to the Post Office Departments in Lockney and Floydada for the next year in re-addressing and re-routing mail to the affected persons on the proposed consolidated routes.

The Hesperian joins with other concerned groups and individuals in requesting Post Office officials to change their decision to consolidate these routes.

Floydada Invitational Tourney Slated For August 12-15

The tenth annual Floydada Country Club Invitational Golf Tournament will be held August 12 through August 15 according to Bobby Westfall, club pro. Qualifying and medalist play will be August 12 with the rest of the tournament being played the remaining three days.

Westfall said that qualifying scores may be mailed or phoned to Floydada Country Club, YU3-2769. Westfall also said, "I would like to urge more of our local people to come on out and enter this tournament. At this time we have about 30 entries, but next week they will pick up considerable speed. We

will stop the entries at 160, and we want to get all the local people in it we can before that time."

The entry fee for the tournament is \$17.50 per person. The championship flight will play 72 holes of medal play, consisting of 18 Friday, 18 Saturday and 36 Sunday.

In all other flights there will be 16 man match play consisting of 18 holes Friday, 18 Saturday and 18 Sunday. In all consolation play there will be one round of match play on Saturday and 18 holes of medal finals on Sunday.

After the first 36 holes, the championship flight will be cut

to the low eight players and the ties. All other flights will be cut to four players and ties for the final round Sunday.

Westfall said that defending champion John Farquhar would be back to defend his championship. Farquhar toured the 72 holes in a 17 under par 271 in taking the championship last year.

There will be prizes given in each flight with the winner receiving a full set of 1965 irons and the runners up a full set of 1965 woods. The consolation winners will receive a \$45 golf bag.

BUT WORTH IT . . .

World Trip Almost Was Afterthought

FOR 13 YEARS, Bob McGuire engaged in an exacting profession that measured success in split-seconds.

But last autumn, the veteran Lubbock Public Schools track coach quit punching a stopwatch and sailed for Japan on the first leg of a seven-month world tour that took him to three continents, 23 countries, 17 national capitals and, ultimately, to the altar.

Trip Unique In Several Ways

McGuire's trip was unique for a variety of reasons. First, a profound sacrifice was required to free McGuire for his 30,000-mile odyssey. When McGuire learned that school policy forbids taking leaves-of-absence for other than professional reasons, he resigned his job.

Secondly, he traveled on a whim instead of a prescribed schedule and, as a result, the length of his trip was extended from one month to seven months.

And, finally—true to the unrehearsed nature of the trip—McGuire's intercontinental adventure ended as a honeymoon.

Included Wedding In Rome

LYNNETTE McMillan flew from Lubbock to Rome on March 3 to join McGuire and 10 days later—with the help of a translator, Maria Capoccealo, a former exchange student at Floydada—they were wed in an Episcopal Church in the Eternal City.

With his bride as a member of the travel party, McGuire's trip assumed a more conventional air.

Instead of sailing on a freighter—as he had done in the Far East—McGuire booked passage on a luxury liner for the voyage home.

Instead of hitchhiking, McGuire transported Lynnette across the European continent in a German-bought automobile.

Train Station Sleeping Out

And instead of sleeping in a train station—as he had done in Egypt—or spending the night in a desolate range of mountains—as he had done in Afghanistan—McGuire arranged for lodging in a few choice hotels.

In short, the arrival of Lynnette had effected the "Re-Americanization of Bob McGuire." In Europe, he was often mistaken as a tourist; whereas, in Asia, he traveled, dressed, ate and bargained like a native.

In fact, Lynnette thought he carried the native routine a bit too far. She said, "When I landed at the airport in Rome, I thought Bob had forgot to meet me. Finally I spotted him. He looked like an Arab—beard and all."

Arabia One He Missed

ACTUALLY, Arabia was one of the few Asiatic countries McGuire neglected to visit.

In the first six months of his trip, he followed a path roughly similar to the course of Alexander the Great in 356 B. C.

His itinerary included stops in Japan, Hong Kong, Malaysia, Viet Nam, Ceylon, India, Pakistan, Afghanistan, Iran, Iraq, Syria, Jordan, Lebanon, Suez, Egypt, Greece and Turkey.

In the final six weeks of the tour, Bob and Lynnette visited Italy, Switzerland, Germany, France, England and Ireland.

Traveling Goodwill Ambassador

While traveling solo, McGuire, a master in the art of conversation, accumulated a wide cross-section of friends—one that would make the U.S. State Department envious.

In Japan, Afghanistan and India, he obtained lodging from native families; in Japan, he spent the night in a Buddhist temple with a group of students from Kyoto University; in India, he won a turban on a wager from a bearded Indian, and while at sea, he cultivated friendships with an adventurous Englishman, a former member of Hitler's Youth Corps and two students from Notre Dame.

Visited Ancient Historical Sites

HE ALSO toured the historical centers of the world, visiting three cities that claim to be the oldest in existence, attending a massive political rally in Athens, Greece—The Cradle of Democracy—and touring the sites where four of the Seven Wonders of the ancient world once stood.

While journeying through the history-steeped Tigris-Euphrates Valley, he saw a new page of history written in Iran, entering Tehran on the day the Iranian prime minister was assassinated by a religious fanatic.

McGuire's means of transportation were as varied as his experiences. He spanned the evolution of air, land and sea transportation, riding everything from a rickshaw to an ocean liner.

Cost Was Remarkably Low

Considering the distance McGuire traveled and the length of time he was abroad, the cost of the trip was remarkably low—running somewhere in the neighborhood of \$2,500.

Bob, of course, regards it as a sound investment. "It was a rewarding experience, something that can't be evaluated in dollars and cents.

"I originally planned to attend the Olympics in Tokyo, but once I got that far, I decided to keep going. I knew I would never get another chance like this one."

McGuire, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert McGuire of Anton, felt only one twang of homesickness on the entire trip, and that was fleeting. It came on New Year's Eve when he was crammed in a cold, airy upper berth of a ricket train that was traveling through the heart of India.

He described the rest of the trip—which began in Japan, an island in the Pacific, and ended in Ireland, an isle in the Atlantic—as "exhilarating," "awesome" and "humbling."

Experiment Helps Control Crown, Root Rot in Wheat

Wheat and root rots cut your wheat yields this year, you're making some changes in your cultural practices. Research by University of Missouri plant specialist David Wysong suggests several changes in management practices which help control these diseases.

Planting is extremely dependent on fall cropping practices and growing conditions, says Wysong. The fungi causing crown and root rot thrive under hot, dry conditions and weather with adequate moisture limits their activity.

Wysong can't do much about the

weather, but you can reduce the severity of attacks. First, use recommended resistant varieties coupled with seed treatment, advises the researcher. Healthy seed planted in firm seed beds appear to have a lower incidence of rot than wheat planted in loose seed beds, according to Wysong's tests.

The date of planting is also very important. Tests over a 5-year period show that at 4,000 feet elevation, September 10 is the best planting date. Higher elevations require an earlier date and lower elevations need a later planting date for wheat. For each 100-foot difference in elevation, add or subtract one day, says the scientist.



carved from solid rock, according to an itinerary. When visiting and shopping in Paris the Guthries found the weather there much cooler than in Madrid. The food in Paris was very good. Fishing spots were filled with carp, cat and gold fish. They enjoyed a detailed visit of the home of Napoleon and Josephine with its collections of relics of the first and second empire. They toured the gardens and home of Marie Antoinette, saw the Palace of Versailles, Gallery of Mirrors, Gallery of Battles and the Royal Chapel in Madrid. The monument was built in memory of the Fallen in the Civil War of 1936. Some 40,000 unknown soldiers are buried there and the 500 foot high monument is

up to date shops fully stocked in contrast to East Berlin where ruins still prevail. Streets are almost deserted and the people in East Berlin have a hollow and drawn look with very little laughter. Crossing Checkpoint Charlie they found it well guarded and tourist thoroughly searched. They reported East Berlin drab and uninviting. They saw the Royal Guards, The Royal Yacht just returned from America, and the large square where all the meat is brought and butchered. Thousands of cattle and hogs were hanging on display and in trucks. Their tour took them to the house of Hans Christian Anderson in Odense, which is now a museum with Anderson's personal effects. They took an afternoon drive visiting castles one of which is the Kronborg Castle in Elsinore known from Shakespeare's "Hamlet". In Stockholm the Guthries found the Swedish food very good. Department stores there were said to be large with good merchandise and well stocked. They were told that when a couple decides to marry in Stockholm they had to wait from two to three years to find a flat (apartment) in which to live.

They visited the world's oldest theatre and the Royal Residence of Drottningholm. In Oslo, Norway they found chief industry is shipping. Norway was beautiful from the air with its many forests, farms and lakes, they related. Oslo is among the five largest cities, by area, in the world and is where one of the highest ski jumps is built for international competition. A record jump was made there last year, 280 feet by a Norwegian. Tehri tour included seeing the Viking Ships, the Kon-Tiki Raft and the Polar Ship, "Fram", which has sailed over the world to both north and south pole. They begin a three day Norwegian Fjord Tour, traveling through idyllic farmlands to Eidsvoll, visited a National Shrine, then along the enchanting Lake Mjosa, enjoyed a native dish in a farm hut at Fagernes, drove through scenic Valdres Valley, across barren reindeer mountains and then visited a very fascinating 12th century stave church. They passed roaring waterfalls along the beautiful Hardangerfjord to Norheismund and Bergan, Norway. They stayed in a county hotel which proved not too favorable and the food very poor. In Edinburg, Scotland they had a full days tour of the Trossachs, Loch Lomond and other scenic points. In Belfast, Ireland they enjoyed a full day excursion to the Giant's Causeway, Dunlauce Castle and the famous Antrim Coast road. They had a tour of Trinity College, Dublin Castle, St. Patrick's Cathedral, Guinness Brewery and to the Blarney Castle to kiss the world famous Blarney Stone. They left Killarney via the rugged Pass of Keilmoneigh and Lady's View, probably the best point for viewing the Killarney Lakes. A drive through County Kerry to Tralee was via the Shannon Valley and Foynes, to Limerick on to Shannon Airport where the family departed at noon on July 15 for New York and the return trip home. The Guthries said they could not describe in words all the many enchanting scenes of their entire trip, the beautiful paintings and decor of the lovely castles and museums, and the lovely green rolling hillsides in some of the lush countries, a trip described "worth taking".

Tech To Study Irrigation Wells In Floyd County

Test wells in this area to be periodically checked in a three year project conducted by the Agricultural Engineering Department at Texas Tech and sponsored by rural electric cooperatives in Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma were given a primary efficiency test this week.

R. I. Cole, Gerald Lackey, and Delmas McCormick have had their wells tested in this area. Other wells will be tested in the Floydada area shortly. Wells will be tested for pump efficiencies under the various pumping conditions in this area, water depletion, cost of pump-

ing, and effect of pump wear on overall operating costs through a period of years.

The irrigation wells will be checked twice yearly, once under heavy pumping conditions and once during the off-season. A day by day record of all costs will be kept by the farmer, in order to establish a true over-all cost of operation.

Albert Sechrist, formerly of Lorenzo and now on the faculty at Tech is conducting the research project assisted by electric cooperative personnel, extension service personnel and farmers.

While Mrs. Dixon's record as a seeress is studded with amazing accuracy, sometimes—but rarely—she misses. But this fact, it is Miss Montgomery's thesis, only makes her successes more striking and removes from Mrs. Dixon any charge of fakery.

Currently, according to Miss Montgomery, Mrs. Dixon sees the U. S. plagued by foreign and domestic troubles through the 1970s, with the racial problem continuing as a major national woe. Apparently, she believes there are before us through 1967 various issues which will split the nation, because she forecasts a Republican victory, nationally, in 1968. Before anyone attempts to shrug that off at the moment, let it be remembered that when all others were expecting the defeat of Harry Truman in 1948, Mrs. Dixon, correctly, was forecasting his victory.

Unquestionably, the most striking of Mrs. Dixon's present-day forecasts has to do with the appearance of a Messiah, in 1999, she says, when the world actually will enter into a lasting era of "peace on earth, good will toward men."

This Messiah, she avers, was born of peasant parentage somewhere in the Middle East on February 5, 1962. She says his force will begin to be felt in the era 1980-99 and throughout a period of a world holocaust, brought about by war with China, in the 1980s. This Messiah, says Mrs. Dixon, "will unite all sects and creeds." Notably, this forecast comes close to describing the Second Coming within the life span of many people alive today.

This woman, of high reputation and social standing in Washington, has been sought after by many of the nation's great, along with others of ambassadorial and similar ranks in this country from abroad. Whether her great gift is exactly as it appears, or something of a "happen-so," perhaps none can say with finality. Yet the fact

remains that she is one of the most interesting and talked-about residents of the country today and widespread dissemination of information about her—in addition to her current forecasts for the future—should bring a verdict. One way or another, as to the extent of her powers.

It or not, but the original building in Lockney is the same structure as the one in Floydada. Actually the building in Floydada is better built.

I did not talk to the directors of the old hospital to see if they would be willing to give up their part they have in it, to give it to a doctor like the one was done in Lockney, for a little of nothing. If the new one was built, they would automatically lose it, so it looks like it would be better to use it.

The reason for this is, a farmer or businessman in Floydada or anywhere, is not capable of telling a doctor how to run a hospital. We will have an eight hundred thousand dollar hospital without a doctor most of the time, because of bosses telling them what to do. Another boss will be the Government with the Hill Burton money being used.

Another reason is charity cases. The way they plan to do this is for the doctor to have his own office at another location and send his patients to the hospital. He will get his money, but tax payers will pay the hospital for many, because they say they can not pay it. If it is individually owned, they come nearer paying the bill.

Where people can come by something for nothing, many will take advantage of it. In most cases of county hospitals, this is what happens. The directors will finally ask the doctor to help with some of the charity. He gets tired of it, so he leaves. But we the tax payers that are paying for the building and charity cases still have to pay even more.

Another thing that we all like is to know that the doctor is in the hospital when we get there. Any doctor, farmer, or businessman is going to have more incentive to stay on the job if he is sole boss and owner.

There is no use in people kidding themselves that specialists are going to come to Floydada when people will go to them in larger cities where they have a greater volume of business. Do you think people will

try a doctor in a small town when they know of a specialist in Lubbock?

All we need is a hospital like the one in Lockney, a good hospital but just a first aid station as far as emergencies are concerned. We are not going to stay in a hospital like this if there is something serious, we will go to a specialist. It makes me very happy to know a doctor will send me or a member of my family on to Plainview, Lubbock, or Amarillo, or even to Dallas, which has been the case in our family, if there is a better doctor there. I do not think it is as much the hospital being better equipped as it is better doctors that know how to meet the situation. If I had a broken back I would not want to stay in Lockney or Floydada either one if I could go to a specialist, regardless of how the hospital is equipped.

You ask some of the businessmen, how their business is doing compared with last year. If you get the same answer I get it will be about one third less. Many businesses in the county are on the verge of closing. I have had to tighten my belt this year on spending, and I am not the only one. We need to watch what we are doing with our county business also.

I like to see progress as much as anyone, but it will look bad if we get to where we have a building that we are paying for and not getting anything out of it because we can not get doctors.

It would be nice to have large barns, etc. on the farm but we do not build them because we can not afford it. Can we afford a hospital like is proposed, plus charity constantly and no guarantee of a doctor all the time.

I have talked to a few people in the minority you were talking about in the editorial and they think that remodeling of the old hospital, given to a good doctor to run on his own is a better way to do this thing. He will have a greater incentive to work.

Most of the people in our community use the Lockney Hospital,

and we think the doctor and hospital are wonderful until it is a very serious thing that needs a specialist.

Editor's Note: Thank you for your letter and your opinion concerning the building of the Caprock Hospital District Hospital. Although our opinions do not agree, I like you, Durrell, and appreciate your expressing your opinion.

It is my opinion that our people are getting more for their money in an \$800,000 hospital at a local cost of \$400,000 than they would get in a \$100,000 repair job on our present hospital.

Investigation shows that the Hill-Burton government agency has no control over the operation of the hospital, but it does require that it be well constructed and equipped.

Your idea about giving the hospital to a doctor or doctors was first pursued by the district hospital group. They found that they could not give new or old hospitals to doctors. Doctors make all the money they want administering to the sick, and do not want the worries of trying to keep a hospital operating out of the red. Do you know of such a doctor?

In speaking of money, I have observed that Floyd County people usually buy the things they want badly enough. This is not a money making project---but a humanitarian need of this hospital district.

In conclusion, we are both agreed on the fact that the hospital is needed.

The foregoing notwithstanding, any lands in the Veterans' Land Fund which have been first offered for sale to veterans and which have not been sold may be sold or resold to such purchasers, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law.

"All moneys comprising a part of said Fund and not expended for the purposes here provided shall be a part of said Fund until there are sufficient moneys therein to retire fully all of the bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board, at which time all such moneys remaining in said Fund, except such portion thereof as may be necessary to retire all such bonds which portion shall be set aside and retained in said Fund for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law. All moneys becoming a part of said Fund thereafter shall likewise be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund.

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"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by said Board for the purpose of purchasing lands situated in the State of Texas owned by the United States or any governmental agency thereof, owned by the Texas Prison System or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas, or owned by any person, firm, or corporation. All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of said Fund. Such lands heretofore or hereafter purchased and comprising a part of said Fund are hereby declared to be held for a governmental purpose, although the individual purchasers thereof shall be subject to taxation to the same extent and in the same manner as are purchasers of lands dedicated to the Permanent Free Public School Fund.

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"The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by said Board in such quantities, on such terms, at such prices, and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law to

receive to their own use any fees, costs or perquisites of office. All fees that may be payable by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this Section or in his office, shall be paid, when received, into the State Treasury.

Sec. 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1955, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendments providing a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office and Secretary of State; and certain statutory state officers; providing for the necessary election and the form of the ballot; and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 4, Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 4. The Governor shall be installed on the first Tuesday after the organization of the Legislature, or as soon thereafter as practicable, and shall hold his office for the term of four years, or until his successor shall be duly installed. He shall be at least thirty years of age, a citizen of the United States, and shall have resided in this state at least five years immediately preceding his election."

Sec. 2. That Section 22, Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 22. The Attorney General shall hold office for four years and until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the state in all

suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the state in which the state may be a party, and shall specially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and from time to time, in the name of the state, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power or demanding or collecting any species of taxes, tolls, freight or wharfage not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor and other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall reside at the seat of government during his continuance in office. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature."

Sec. 3. That Section 23, Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution."

Sec. 4. Nothing contained in this Resolution shall be construed so as to extend the term of office of any officeholder previously elected to a two-year term.

Sec. 5. The Governor shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 47 proposing an Amendment to Section 4, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, to provide four-year terms of office for State Representatives.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 4, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 4. The members of the House of Representatives shall be chosen by the qualified electors for the term of four years; but a new House of Representatives shall be chosen after every apportionment, and the members elected after each apportionment shall be divided by lot into two classes. The seats of the members of Class A shall be vacated at the expiration of the first two years, and those of Class B at the expiration of four years, so that one-half of the members of the House of Representatives shall be chosen biennially thereafter. Representatives shall take office following their election, on the day set by law for the convening of the Regular Session of the Legislature, and shall serve thereafter for the full term of years to which elected and until their successors shall have been elected and qualified. Except in case of an election to fill a vacancy, and except in the first election following each re-apportionment, a person who has been elected to the House of Representatives shall not be eligible to be a candidate again for membership in the Legislature until the term for

which he was elected has less than one year remaining." Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of the state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to provide for a four-year term of office for State Representatives." "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to provide for a four-year term of office for State Representatives."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the constitution and laws of this state.

Sec. 4. In the event the Constitutional Amendment proposed in this Resolution is adopted by the people of Texas in the election in November, 1965, the Governor of Texas is directed not to issue a proclamation for the election and not to publish notice thereof for the Constitutional Amendment proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 1 of the 59th Texas Legislature, since the provisions of said House Joint Resolution No. 1 are included in this Resolution. But, should this proposed Amendment be rejected by the people of Texas in the election in November, 1965, then the terms and provisions of House Joint Resolution No. 1 shall be in full force and effect and shall be proclaimed and published and submitted to the electorate in November, 1966, as provided in said House Joint Resolution No. 1.
