1965 Cotton Production For County Expected To Be 99,000

According to a report compiled by the Lubbock Cotton Exchange and Plains Cotton Growers Floyd County is expected to reach a total of 99,000 bales of cotton this year.

Last year the county reached the 117,000 bale mark after first estimates set the expected amount at somewhat less than 95,000...

The actual planted acreage in the county is just above 100,000 acres. The estimate would therefore place actual production at slightly less than a bale per acre.

According to the report the 23-county High Plains area should produce around 2,061,000 bales, thus pouring around \$309 million into the area's economy.

The irrigated cotton looks as good as any crop before but once again this year the dryland crops are showing signs of strain under the intense heat that has covered the area the past 5 or 6 weeks.

Although scattered showers continue to hit various places throughout the area and this county a good general rain is still needed to put the area crops in good shape.

This moisture often brings more devastation than good as seen in a separate story on this page.

Theoretically, the cotton farmers would prefer to have no rain whatsoever, but control all the moisture with irrigation wells.

Council Meets In Short Session

At the regular City Council meeting Tuesday night the members appointed S. W. Ross and Bill Brown to represent Floydada on the Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority.

Each of the member cities appoints two representatives to the Authority for two year terms. The council is the appointing authority.

In other business the members voted to accept the Evaluation Board's recommendations for valuations and to try to find a more consistent way of assessing property for future tax rolls.

The length of franchise with Southwestern Public Service Co. was discussed and a new length of time was voted to be offered the Public Service officials.

In the original contract, drawn up by Public Service, the company asked the city for a 30 year franchise to operate in the city. The city offered a counter-proposal and 5 years. Public Service officials said they disagreed with only about a dozen words in the 30 page proposal...

The council members also agreed that upon being petitioned by Ralph Mardis they will annex his property on the west side of town.

All council members except Clem McDonald were present. McDonald is on vacation.

To Determine Remodelling Needs Today

The Floydada school board put its approval on the architect's plans for a new 25 room grade school at the regular board meeting Monday night. The new building will also feature a "cafeteria" that will seat over 400 persons.

The building will be on a southwest corner of a plot of land given the school by Mrs. Maud Hollums, located in south-east Floydada.

To date the school board has approved plans for a new cafeteria at Andrews Ward, a new science wing at the High School and the above mentioned new grade school.

Architect Marvin Stiles met with the board. He was accompanied by an engineering specialist, Tracy Roberts, also of Lubbock.

Stiles told the board that the new construction items should cost approximately \$727,740.00. Members of the board will accompany Stiles on an inspection of the system's buildings today and determine an estimate of the needed repairs and remodeling that they will require.

The board has \$800,000 to spend for new construction and remodeling.

BUDGET HEARING The board approved a budget hearing open to the public at 3 p.m. Tuesday, August 17, 1965. The budget for the new school term is \$1,776,000.00. This includes the \$800,000.00 bond issue money.

BUSES SOLD The board opened bids on three buses that had been offered for sale. The board accepted a bid of \$2,733 from Clarence Carpenter of El Paso, Texas.

TEACHERS RESIGN The board accepted the resignation of Della Plains coach Alvin Johnson, Geneva Adams and Lynette Resasing.

The board hired Joe Ellison to replace Johnson and hired Mrs. Alma Fulton as a fourth grade teacher.

OTHER BUSINESS The board opened bids on service and fuel for the school buses this coming school term. The job was granted to Carthel Oil & Fertilizer. Consumers Fuel Association was the only other bidder.

A bid was approved to Kirk and Sons to install tile flooring in Andrews Ward school.

All board members were present.

One-Car Wreck Takes Life Of Man Here

A one-car mishap just after midnight Sunday took the life of Don L. Williams, age 27. He was a resident of Floydada.

The accident occurred when Williams, driving a 1961 Oldsmobile, failed to negotiate the curve at the Floydada City Limits on Texas Highway 207 as he approached Floydada.

The wheels on the vehicle's right side left the roadway near the end of the curve, but, it appeared as though all wheels were back on the highway shortly thereafter. The vehicle left the highway once again, this time almost directly in front of Della Plains School House, knocked down a utility pole at the corner of the highway and Price Street, and knocked down another pole shortly before the vehicle came to a stop. The car came to a stop about two blocks from where it first left the highway.

Investigating officer, Fred Lenz of the Department of Public Safety summoned an ambulance from Moore Funeral Home, but Williams was dead on arrival at People's Hospital.

Group Seeks Restraining Order Against School Tax Roll

A petition filed Wednesday, August 4, against the school tax rolls, asks that court block the school district's collection of the 1965 taxes since they are not assessed fairly and accurately. The suit is entitled Edd Munev et al vs. Ralph C. Johnston et al. No hearing date has been set for the injunction.

The plaintiffs claim that the Floydada School District acting through the Board of Trustees, employed out of town experts to evaluate property in the district. The "experts" in so doing placed arbitrary value on property and ignored the market value on real property, the plaintiffs claim. This, the plaintiffs say, is unjust and unlawful.

The petition states that the plaintiffs do not believe the Board of Equalization will make lawful adjustments on the tax rolls and they believe the Board will approve the arbitrary values set by the "outside experts". The plaintiffs assert they will show that the Tax Assessor and Collector and authorities have adopted a plan, preconceived, whereby many and various items of property, including, but not limited to merchandise inventories, stocks, bonds, mortgages, boats, jewelry, etc., are not placed on the tax roll as they should be as required by law, the petition states.

that defense funds requested for this year would be adequate for all our needs.

And, as recently as June, Defense Secretary McNamara said his budget provided all the funds needed to carry out whatever combat operations might occur during the next 12 months.

That view, of course, proved to be incorrect, as many of us had feared.

For more than a month, members of the Armed Services Committee have been calling upon the Defense Department to come back to the Congress and to request additional funds. This week Secretary McNamara did, indeed, ask the Congress for an additional 1.7 Billion dollars.

Added to the 700-Million additional dollars voted earlier for Vietnam, that makes nearly two-and-one-half Billion dollars which have been requested - all over and above that defense budget which was supposed to take care of everything. Let me hasten to point out that our men in Vietnam are now well equipped and are getting every assistance in their fight against Asiatic Communism. There is no shortage of manpower or equipment in Vietnam.

But, in order to assure that no shortage occurs there, we have been forced to strip from other Army divisions in Europe and in the continental United States certain key men, key equipment, and key spare parts.

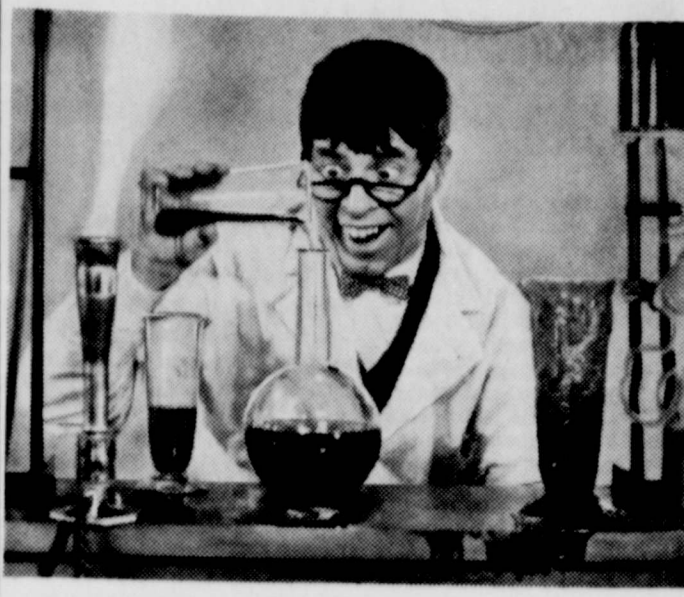
The Preparedness Subcommittee of the Armed Services Committee has found that U. S. Army readiness was not as high as it should have been. This appears to be a result of the restricted defense budgets of the last two years.

Civilians in the Defense Department, for instance, cut almost 7-Billion dollars out of this year's fund requests by our defense forces. Now, we are finding it necessary to replace a large part of those unwise cuts.

Luckily, there still is time for us to make the necessary equipment additions. Luckily, we have not been confronted by another serious crisis simultaneously with Vietnam.

It is my view that defense of this nation must take priority over all other matters. There are many things upon which we would like to spend money - highways, education, and conservation. But, the defense of the country comes first. We must never set arbitrary spending ceilings on defense needs.

We must never restrict our defense preparedness just to save money for expenditure on domestic programs in the gen-

eral category of "welfare". The welfare of our nation must be our primary concern.

So long as America remains secure, there will be opportunity to provide for improved Social Security, improved education, and improved conservation.

But let America appear weak in the eyes of Communism, and we will be faced with ever-greater military challenges, requiring even-greater sacrifice of life and ever-greater expenditure of taxpayer dollars.

To keep our defense forces prepared not only to fight and win in Vietnam, but also to cope with any new emergency, we are going to have to buy a lot of things.

Many items on our military shopping list were struck out or delayed over the past two years. Now, we are faced with buying not only currently-needed items, but also most of those things previously struck off the list.

Already many Texas firms have received rush contracts for millions of dollars worth of helicopters, radios, and ammunition. The Army may need a whole new 15,000 man division. The Navy will need to take some ships out of the "Mothball Fleet." The Air Force will need additional, expensive planes.

As I said before, there luckily still is time for us to make these military preparedness corrections.

I believe it is most significant that the Armed Services Committee and the Defense Department have worked together in discovering these shortages and that all Americans now are working together to correct them.

It's Sad, But Rates Must Rise

Very few of the people of the State of Texas know that insurance companies underwriting automobile coverages have been losing money for some time on this particular item. Most people think that insurance companies are making money hand over fist because their automobile insurance rate is "awfully" high.

But, it is sad but true, claims for losses from automobile accidents have risen sharply in the past several years and court awards have in many cases been unjustifiably high. During this same period of time, insurance rates have not increased proportionately.

Nobody likes to pay high prices for insurance or for anything, but in this day and time, you get what you pay for. And besides, the people of the state are more or less responsible for these increases. Of course, the insurance companies must also share some of the responsibility for increased rates.

But statistically, Texans are much better off than citizens of many other states. Here are some facts to consider. Texas is first in highway mileage, third in the number of vehicles registered, and thirty-fifth in insurance rates (and this ranking is with the new rate increase).

There were 454,762 traffic accidents in Texas during 1963. This was 45.3 per cent more accidents than there were in 1960. More accidents mean more insurance losses and more losses demand higher rates.

During this same period of time the number of bodily injury claims has risen 42 per cent and the number of property claims increased 61 per cent.

To a certain extent the insurance companies are responsible for these increases. Advertising by companies during the past several years has been directed at the prompt and fair claims services, even having testimonials from

Ever found yourself thinking of a traffic light as something personal? Perhaps as a teasing temptress who smiles the "come-on" green...until all at once she throws a fickle wink of amber to slow you down...then a glaring red that halts you in your rubbery tracks? On days when you should have started 10 or 20 minutes sooner, Lady Three Lights seems especially cruel and changeable. She somehow manages to lengthen her long, slow-burn reds and is extremely stingy with her greens...and her amber is even more fleetingly fickle than the amber of literary fame.

Lady Three Lights' amber is by no means "forever"; it is merely a brief and taunting interlude before she flares her angry red--an unsly reminder to "STOP!" if you want to avoid annihilation from right and/or left.

The trouble is, we tend to look upon the Lady of the Lights that Never Fail as a sort of referee, and we look upon driving as a game. We're out to "beat the light," or "squeeze through on the amber".

Driving is no game; driving is serious business -- an essential part of modern living. And our Three-Light Friend is no lady; but she's no unladylike temptress, either; she--or rather, it--is an impartial, impersonal regulator that keeps our traffic arteries from hardening...that keeps bruising, shattering friction out of our lives...that keeps us rolling our uncrumpled way toward wherever we're going, and back again.

Approach friend regulator with respect and thankfulness for the job it does of maintaining harmony in life's traffic. Approach all traffic regulators, human and mechanical, with the same attitude, and forget about "beating" them or your fellow motorists.

But when Lady Three Lights smiles with "come-on" green, don't just sail unconcernedly through the intersection; keep a wary lookout to port and starboard for a driver who might miss the red, or who squeezes through when the amber is only an immediate memory. And if you're approaching an "old" green light, remember that all things eventually die. Hold to a speed that you can comfortably kill if you get caught at the critical spot by that "unforever amber".

"SOMETHING NEW!" New Cheddar-like Cheese Has Fewer Calories.

Made from skim milk, a cheese recently developed at U. S. Department of Agriculture laboratories looks and tastes like very mild Cheddar but has only 5 to 7 percent butterfat. Cheddar usually has about 31 percent. This new cheese con-

tains more moisture and more nonfat milk solids -- thus more protein--than Cheddar. Whereas Cheddar requires 6 1/2 hours to make and 6 to 12 months to ripen, the low-fat cheese can be made in 2 1/2 hours and ripened in 1 to 3 months. The new product has not been fully market tested, but several hundred consumers have sampled it at demonstrations and the majority said it was excellent or good, according to the United States Department of Agriculture Office of Information, Washington, D. C.

Another something new to watch for -- New Peanut for Weight Watchers-- If you like peanuts, but dread all the calories, you'll be happy to know about the low calorie peanut developed by USDA scientists. It contains 75 percent fewer calories, retains its good flavor and high protein content. It's not a new peanut variety, but just ordinary peanuts with 80 percent of their oil pressed out. The process is simple. Shelled peanuts are put into a hydraulic press to remove most of the oil. The pressed kernels become flat and misshapen but return to their original shape and size when soaked in water. Salt, sugar and other flavoring can be added during soaking. After nuts are dried, they are ready for eating. Preliminary studies show that the same process can be used to make low-calorie pecans, walnuts, almonds, and other nut meats. Several manufacturers are not studying the potential for retailing this product, we are told.

SUMMERTIME! and the watermelons are plentiful. And we are again reminded how perfectly delicious watermelon rind preserves can be.

Here is a recipe given me a few years ago by Mrs. Tribble that certainly does make delicious preserves.

WATERMELON RIND PRESERVES:

10 pounds watermelon rind
9 pounds sugar
8 cups water
4 cups crushed pineapple

Select rind from a firm, not overripe melon, and before weighing trim off green skin and pink flesh. Cut in cubes and soak over night in lime water (2 tablespoons lime). Drain, rinse well, cover with fresh water and cook until tender (not soft), approximately 1 1/2 hours. Make a syrup of the sugar and water; add rind and let boil until syrup is thick and rind is preserved. Technician, Social Worker Tests Slated

The U. S. Civil Service Commission has announced two new examinations this week, for Technician and Social Worker.

The Engineering and Scientific Technician examination covers a wide range of positions principally in the Washington, D. C. area. These technicians act as non-professional assistants to engineers, mathematicians, and other scientists such as chemists, physicists, astronomers, geologists, metallurgists, electronic scientists, and the like. The salary ranges from \$4,480 to \$10,250 a year. Varying amounts of non-professional technician experience are required, increasing with the grade of position. Study in college or technical institutes can be substituted for some experience.

The new Social Worker examination covers professional social worker positions and related positions known as Social Work Associate and Social Service Representative for work in Washington, D. C. and throughout the country. Salaries range from \$6,050 to \$16,460 for Social Worker and \$6,630 to \$10,250 for the other positions. Professional Social Workers are required to have completed graduate study in Social Work with professional experience in addition for the higher grades. The Associate and Representative positions require experience in welfare activities although appropriate education may be substituted for some of the required experience.

Neither examination requires a written test. See Announcement 364-B (Technician) and 365-B (Social Worker) for detailed information and instructions about the proper place to apply for the position titles shows.

Announcements and appropriate application forms may be obtained from most post office located throughout the country or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C. 20415.

County Traffic Deaths Hold To Three-Year Average

There were five traffic deaths in Floyd County as compared to the past three year average of five deaths, according to Sergeant D. S. Lawson of the Texas Highway Patrol for this area.

The Sergeant stated that 143 counties had more deaths in 1964 than the previous three year average. One hundred four counties had less deaths in 1964 than the previous three year average. Seven counties had the same number of deaths in 1964 as the previous three year average.

The largest increase in the number of deaths in 1964 over the previous three year average was 53 in Harris County. The largest decrease in the number of deaths in 1964 from the previous three year average was nine in Collin County.

The 1964 death total for the state was 3,006, an increase of 277 deaths over the 1963 all time high of 2,729 deaths. The Sergeant added, "With this increase in traffic deaths, it is a challenge which every responsible citizen must accept to do his best to reduce the traffic deaths on our streets and highways."

Floydada Seeks Airport Aid

AUSTIN - Floydada is one of 14 Texas cities which have applied for aid under the Texas Aid Airport Program, a program which will have \$200,000 to spend during the fiscal year beginning Sept. 1.

Paul M. Fuiks Sr., chairman of the Texas Aeronautics Commission, has announced that midnight Oct. 31 will be the last time for filing of applications under the new program, which authorizes the TAC to provide state money to local governmental units for the purchase, construction and maintenance of airports throughout the state.

Antoni Bingellis, assistant director of TAC, cautioned that competition for the state money is going to be stiff. Only communities with populations of less than 50,000 may apply, and no allocation may be for more than \$20,000 to any one community.

But the TAC will have no more than \$200,000 to allocate, and applications already in seek more than that.

Holland is a 1962 graduate of Floydada High School. He has attended Baylor University and Texas Tech.

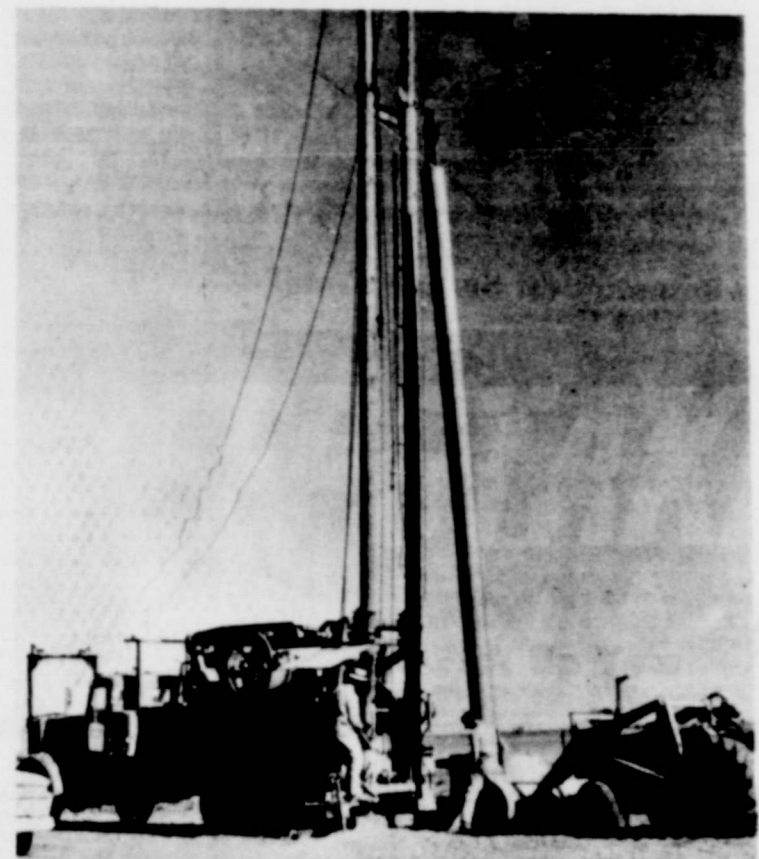
LCC has enrolled a total of 171 students this semester, compared to 130 a year ago. The students represent 63 towns in 6 states and 7 foreign countries.

Proposed Amendments Published

and easy way to be one of the best informed voters the polls when 10 constitutional amendments are Nov. 2 is to read and study these proposed amendments in this issue of The Hesperian and the issue of the week following.

Three issues are appearing in this and the three issues of The Hesperian as legal notices. The Texas is spending tax money to have these amendments published in this newspaper and some 250 other newspapers so that you will know what you are voting for or against.

25 proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution were recommended by the 59th Legislature. One of these amendments is to be voted on Sept. 7, 10 of them on this year, and 14 in the 1966 general election.

One amendment to be voted on Sept. 7 has already been published four times in The Hesperian. It is a proposal to change the size of the state senate from 31 to 39 members. Amendments to be voted on Nov. 2 would:

- change the four year terms of governor and other state officials now limited to two-year terms.
- change state representatives' terms from two to four years.
- require full state participation in federal medicare program.
- authorize the Legislature to set salaries of the lieutenant governor and speaker.
- authorize an \$85,000,000 student loan fund.
- authorize \$200,000,000 more in veterans land bonds.
- authorize district and appellate court judges to retire at age 65 and to be removed for misconduct.
- change the investment authority of the public school system.
- change the state property tax from 42 to 47 cents and the extra five cents to college buildings.
- change the property tax locally a hospital which exceeds \$1,500,000 a year on care of indigents.
- change the Nov. 2 election on the proposed amendments. The Hesperian will comment editorially on these important amendments, and will also publish these "pro" and "con" as they are received on the Nov. 2. In the meantime, we urge you to study the proposed amendments for a clearer picture on what you will be voting for or against when you go to the polls Nov. 2.

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GUEST EDITORIAL REPRINT FROM THE PARADE MAGAZINE

THE TRUTH ABOUT THE WAR IN VIETNAM.

As of this writing the President of the U.S. is reluctant to tell the American people the full truth about our undeclared war in Vietnam. The truth is that the Viet Cong, the Communist enemy, will not negotiate with us or with the South Vietnamese until we achieve sizable victories. We cannot achieve these victories without a large-scale involvement of American troops.

Last month we had 70,000 troops in Vietnam. We need anywhere from 250,000 to 1 million. The South Vietnamese can at best field 225,000 troops. Many of these -- an estimated 10% to 20% -- will desert for a variety of reasons: fear, lack of faith, disenchantment with their own government, enemy propaganda.

This means that in a relatively short time the war in Vietnam will be fought mainly by Americans with South Vietnamese "advisers." We will use these "advisers" for fighting, intelligence, translation, medical, and logistics services, but we are not going to place American troops under command of Vietnamese generals.

In all probability we will field mixed American-Vietnam-Australian units under American command.

In short, we have a near-Korea on our hands -- only this time without the auspices of the United Nations.

Presently the Viet Cong control approximately 50% of the Vietnamese population and possibly 70% of the land. The Viet Cong is a terrorist organization with thousands of dedicated soldiers and civilians, both men and women. Many are devoted fanatics who do not understand the true nature of Communism. They have been brainwashed into believing that they are fighting a war of national liberation. This may have

been partially true in their war against France, which country for many years exploited them shamefully.

It is not true of the U.S. We have no colonial or territorial designs in Vietnam. We seek to prevent the enslavement of the South Vietnamese and to permit them their free choice of government. If the South Vietnamese had wanted to join the Viet Cong, they would have done so years ago. It is the Viet Cong which over the years has escalated the war -- not the Americans. Our escalation has been retaliatory.

On October 23, 1954, President Eisenhower wrote President Ngo Dinh Diem of Vietnam offering "to assist the government of Vietnam in developing and maintaining a strong, viable state, capable of resisting attempted subversion or aggression through military means."

There is no point in arguing whether Eisenhower was right or wrong in going into Vietnam. The fact is that we are there.

The only alternative to attaining an honorable peace is abandonment of our original mission.

It is not the policy of the U.S. to abandon its friends, renounce the cause of freedom, renege on its word, or compromise its honor.

To accomplish a cease fire, in the face of failure by diplomacy, our troops must first take and hold ground in Vietnam. We must drive the Viet Cong guerrillas out of the villages of South and central Vietnam and keep them out.

In our "sweep and clear" operations to date, we have cleared the enemy from several villages at a high cost of lives only to have them return a few weeks later with the same old groups of friendly peasants. We have simply not had enough troops to hold the land taken by the South Vietnamese with American support.

From now on, at a cost of billions of dollars to the U.S., a mounting American build-up is developing in Vietnam. Once the monsoon season is over our troops will shove off from the newly constructed port cities of

the south and central coasts. They will fan out in a counter offensive to the border of Laos, their flanks protected by other troops.

They will hold what land they take, providing security for a peasantry whose loyalty trained teams of educators will try to enlist on behalf of the government.

There will be enemy ambushes. Progress will be slow and costly. American casualty figures will mount sharply. Draft quotas will go up. The National Guard and Reserve will be called up. Chinese Reds and Soviet Reds will threaten retaliation. The war may last for years.

These are the gloomy prospects the nation faces. These are the unpleasant facts the nation is entitled to know.

Sooner or later, as he calls for the sacrifice most wars demand, the President will have to tell the American people the full truth.

Better that he tell it now.

Any one interested in agriculture, or in the future of the economy of the High Plains is invited to attend. One reminder to the ladies, you are invited also.

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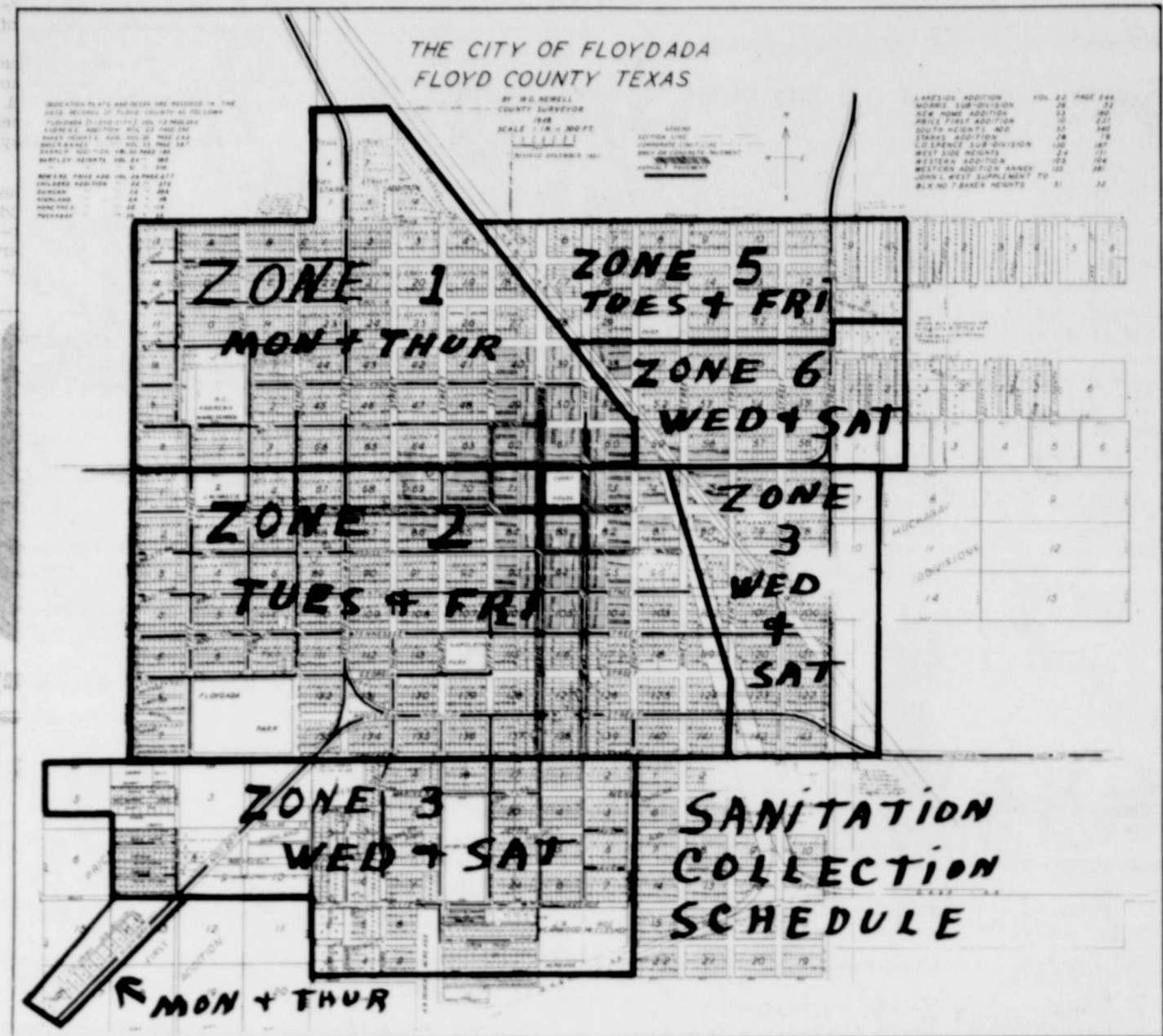

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 57 proposing an Amendment to Section 1-a of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding to said Section as presently written, the following provisions: requiring automatic retirement of certain District and Appellate Judges at age seventy-five (75) or such earlier age, not under seventy (70), as may be provided by law; creating a State Judicial Qualifications Commission and providing for its composition and the qualifications, methods of selection and terms of office of its members; defining the functions and procedures of said Commission, including the duty to investigate, and hold hearings in respect of, disability and misconduct of District and Appellate Judges and to make recommendations to the Supreme Court of Texas for involuntary retirement or removal of such Judges; empowering the Supreme Court of Texas, in its discretion, to retire such Judges for disability and to remove them for misconduct, upon recommendation of the aforesaid Commission and consideration of the record made before it; defining misconduct for which said Judges may be so removed; providing that the proceedings of said Commission shall be confidential until filed in the Supreme Court with recommendation for retirement or removal; and providing that the removal provisions hereby established shall be alternative to and cumulative of those provided elsewhere in the Constitution.

The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for loans to students at institutions of higher education to be known as the Texas Opportunity Plan." (2) There is hereby created the State Judicial Qualifications Commission, to consist of nine (9) members, to wit: (i) two (2) Justices of Courts of Civil Appeals; (ii) two (2) District Judges; (iii) two (2) members of the State Bar, who have respectively practiced as such for over ten (10) consecutive years next preceding their selection; (iiii) three (3) citizens, at least thirty (30) years of age, not licensed to practice law nor holding any salaried public office or employment; provided that no person shall be or remain a member of the Commission, who does not maintain physical residence within this State, or who resides in, or holds a judgeship within or for, the same Supreme Judicial District as another member of the Commission, or who shall have ceased to retain the qualifications above specified for his respective class of membership. Commissioners of classes (i) and (ii) above shall be chosen by the Supreme Court with advice and consent of the Senate, those of class (iii) by the Board of Directors of the State Bar under regulations to be prescribed by the Supreme Court with advice and consent of the Senate, and those of class (iiii) by appointment of the Governor with advice and consent of the Senate.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5 proposing an Amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas so as to authorize an increase in the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board to Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; and providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows: "Section 49-b. By virtue of prior Amendments to this Constitution, there has been created a governmental agency of the State of Texas performing governmental duties which have been designated the Veterans' Land Board. Said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified in all of the prior Constitutional Amendments except as modified herein. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office and two (2) citizens of the State of Texas, one (1) of whom shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and one (1) of whom shall be well versed in finances. One (1) such citizen member shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, be appointed biennially by the Governor to serve for a term of four (4) years; but the members serving on said Board on the date of adoption hereof shall complete the terms to which they were appointed. In the event of the resignation or death of any such citizen member, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to serve for the unexpired portion of the term to which the deceased or resigning member had been appointed. The compensation for said citizen members shall be as is now or may hereafter be fixed by the Legislature; and each shall make bond in such amount as is now or may hereafter be prescribed by the Legislature.

not less than par value and accrued interest; shall be issued in such forms, denominations, and upon such terms as are now or may hereafter be provided by law; shall be issued and sold at such times, at such places, and in such installments as may be determined by said Board; and shall bear rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by said Board but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds may not exceed four (4) percent. All bonds or obligations issued and sold hereunder shall, after execution by the Board, approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchaser or purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas; and all bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board are hereby in all respects validated and declared to be general obligations of the State of Texas. In order to prevent default in the payment of principal or interest on any such bonds, the Legislature shall appropriate a sufficient amount to pay the same.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas to increase the Veterans' Land Fund by \$200,000,000; said Fund to be used for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and March 31, 1955; such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law;" and "AGAINST the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas to increase the Veterans' Land Fund by \$200,000,000; said Fund to be used for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and March 31, 1955; such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this state.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965.
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 47 proposing an Amendment to Section 4, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, to provide four-year terms of office for State Representatives.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 4, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 4. The members of the House of Representatives shall be chosen by the qualified electors for the term of four years; but a new House of Representatives shall be chosen after every apportionment, and the members elected after each apportionment shall be divided by lot into two classes. The seats of the members of Class A shall be vacated at the expiration of the first two years, and those of Class B at the expiration of four years, so that one-half of the members of the House of Representatives shall be chosen biennially thereafter. Representatives shall take office following their election, on the day set by law for the convening of the Regular Session of the Legislature, and shall serve thereafter for the full term of years to which elected and until their successors shall have been elected and qualified. Except in case of an election to fill a vacancy, and except in the first election following each re-apportionment, a person who has been elected to the House of Representatives shall not be eligible to be a candidate again for membership in the Legislature until the term for

which he was elected shall have expired. Sec. 2. The proposed constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote at the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1965, at which time ballots shall have been cast and the following shall be the result: "FOR the Amendment to Section 4, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas for a four-year term of office for State Representatives." "AGAINST the Amendment to Section 4, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas for a four-year term of office for State Representatives."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall cause necessary proclamations for the election of the Amendment shall be in the manner and length of time required by the constitution and this state.

Sec. 4. In the event the proposed Amendment is adopted by the people of Texas in the election of November, 1965, the Governor of Texas is directed to issue a proclamation for the election thereof for the coming House Joint Resolution No. 47 and remain in full effect and shall be published and submitted to the elector as provided in the Joint Resolution No. 47.

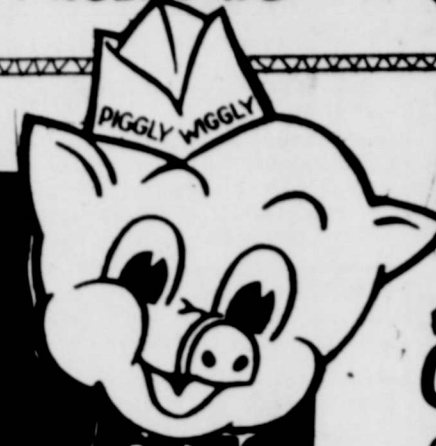

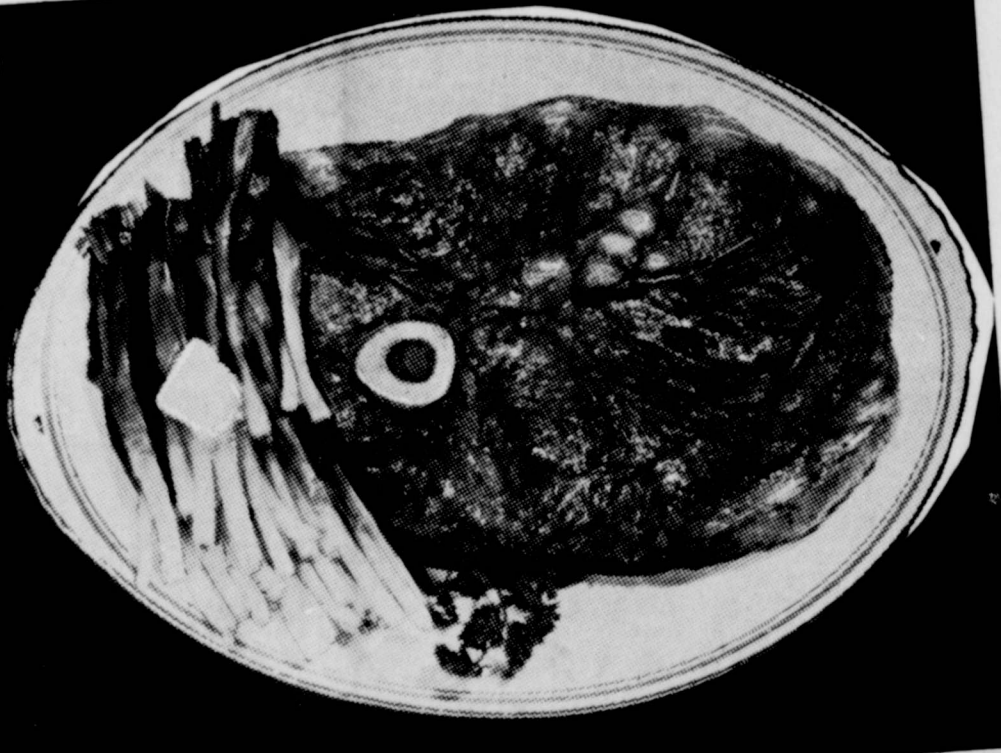
