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Crop Insurance Program to Get Underway Soon

farms by the state office, it was announced this week by F. G. Collier of the county office. All details of the program except the announcement of actual premium rates have been worked out, Collier said.

The flat premium rate for 75 per cent coverage has been set at 1.7 bushels per acre for irrigated land and 1.8 bushels per acre on non-irrigated land. For a 50 per cent coverage the premium is .9 bushels per acre and is the same for both irrigated and dry. land farms. But ndividual rates will depend on "check yield" report for each arm.

Rev. Clayton Day to Preach At Baptist Revival Beginning Sunday


A two-weeks revival service at the Baptist church will begin on the coming Sunday, August 5, and continue through Sunday, August 19.
