Much Building Rev. Clayton Day, 25 years Now in Progress


Workmen employed in the construction of the new building on Sixth Street, which will house the business activities of the Friona Locker Company, are making decided progress in their work.

Instead of wrapping, the received at the AAA office early this week, the local rate is figured at 24 cents less than the \$1.62 rate which prevails at Galveston, so it is assumed that \$1.38 (also the national average loan rate) will be the rate here.

AAA committee, the loan price is moisture to escape. The ma- Oklahoma City, Okla., his home, Office Opened supposed to reflect 90 per cent of parity; and if the parity figure is increased before July 1 there will be a corresponding increase in the loan price.

For the most part, loan procedure and regulations will be the same as they have been in the past; and farm storage rulings have not been changed, except that this year no farm storage payment will be advanced by Commodity Credit. Instead, the producer may receive the earned seven cents per bushel payment if the wheat is delivered to the Commodity Credit Corporation on or after Apr. 30, 1946.






