County Receives First Killing Frost Of Year

fastest tempo of the season this 32,960 at this time last year week just after the first killing freeze was received Sunday

The first freezing temperatures were recorded here last . . .and Friday night, November 26, but the killer came early Monday morning, November 29, when a low of 27 was recorded. This is the latest freeze on record for the Floydada area.

> Prior to this year the latest freeze came November 22, 1934 exactly a week earlier than the one received this year.

> Farmers throughout this area had been waiting for a killing freeze and cooler weather to kill green bolls and mature the crop, which is expected to be one of the largest cotton harvests on record for this area.

Some spotted areas had received spotted freezes by the end of last week, but a majority of fields were still untouched by freezing temperatures. As of last Friday evening Floyd County had ginned a to-

Cotton Harvest reached its | tal of 35,964, compared with and 42,505 two years ago. The four-county area to date has ginned 72,430, compared with 78,052 with last year and 89,-553 two years ago, according to the Texas Employment Commission in Plainview.

According to most reports from individual farmers the yields continue to be very good, with the moisture received this fall having little effect on the quality or yield of the crop.

Cotton classed last week at the Lubbock Classing Office of the USDA was considerably lower in micronaire and staple length than during the previous week, according to W. K. Palmer, in charge of the Lubbock

Micronaire is much lower this year than at this date in 1963 or 1964. Only 44 per cent of the cotton classed at Lubbock last week was in the desirable category of 3.5 and better. This was an 18 per cent drop from the previous week and a 29 per cent drop since November 12th.

Average staple length also declined last week but continued to average 15/16 of an inch. Seventy-nine per cent of the cotton classed at the Lubbock Classing Office last week was 15/16 of an inch and shorter compared to 50 per cent the previous week.

Grades of the cotton classed at the Lubbock Office were

The South Plains cotton harvest continued to pick up momentum last week and the volume of samples received at the three USDA Classing Offices was the highest for any week this season.

The USDA Cotton Classing Offices at Lubbock, Brownfield, and Lamesa received approximately 25,000 samples daily during the week ending Friday, November 26th. This brought the total classed at the three offices this season to 394,000. This year's harvest is now ahead of the pace of the 1964 harvest. Through November 26th last year 373,000 samples had been classed.



ing - you see all the set expenses such as cost of the airplane, hangar rent, insurance and maintenance are divided equally among the members. Then the charge for each hour of actual flying time is kept at a very low rate, just enough to cover the cost of oil and gas and to maintain the airplane in first class flying condition. You see an airplane is different from practically all other vehicles we may own in that the government has many regulations that govern the care and maintenance of it. The plane must be taken to a government certified aircraft and engine mechanic every 100 hours for a thorough inspection and anything that does not check out perfect must be corrected immediately. Then every 1000 hours approximately the engine will require what is called a major overhaul. Thus the aircraft is kept in the best condition possible. This also accounts for the exceptional resale value of used aircraft. It isn't unusual to find some of the more popular makes of aircraft that are worth more today than they were several years ago.

You may ask how would I ever get to fly the plane if there are eight people wanting it. This is done through a reservation board and in actual practice there are very few conflicts. You just don't fly as many hours as you might imagine you would. 100 to 200 hours a year is really a great deal of flying for most private pilots.

Some people have said to me that they would not like the idea of flying a plane that other people have been flying, yet they would probably think nothing of going to one of the rental companies and paying three times as much to rent one of their planes that they have no idea who flew last. We feel that each of our members certainly has a personal interest in our plane.

We chose the Cessna 172 for several reasons. It is one of the most popular planes made today and will have a good resale value and it is also one of the best planes to learn to fly in. Only three of us had our pilots license to begin with so we wanted a plane that would be a good trainer and also good for cross-country flights. This plane fills that bill although it is not a fast plane, cruising about 110 miles per hour. We are already planning to buy a faster and better plane as soon as all the members have their licenses. This shouldn't be long now for all the members have the required hours and just need to take their written and flight examinations.

I would recommend a membership in a flying club to anyone that is just learning to fly for it is certainly the most inexpensive way to learn and it is probably the most enjoyable for you are sharing with other friends an interest in the most fascinating hobby imaginable.

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

Many poisonous plants are so common and seemingly innocuous that you don't suspect their toxic qualities. Who would guess that the beautiful oleander bush, grown indoors and outdoors all over the country, contains a deadly heart stimulant, similar to the drug digitalis? So powerful is this toxin that a single leaf of the oleander can kill a child. And many people have died merely from eating steaks that had been speared on oleander twigs and roasted over a fire.

It's easy to be deceived by plants, for one part may be edible while another is poisonous. For example, twigs of cherry trees release cvanide when eaten. Peach tree leaves contain hydrocyanic acid, one of the most dangerous poisons known. Five children became 'll recently after drinking "tea" brewed with hot water and peach

Most dangerous of all plants in the vegetable garden is rhubarb. Its stalk, commonly used in baking and cooking, of course is not toxic, but the leaf blade contains oxalic acid which crystallizes in the kidneys, causing severe

Some plants are more toxic than others, and some produce strange symptoms. The jimson weed, commonly called thorn apple and stinkweed, grows almost everywhere - in backyards and wastelands - and is responsible for more poisonings than any other plant. It grows from 2 to 5 feet tall, and has large leaves and white, funnel-shaped flowers resembling morning glories. All parts are poisonous, but the seeds and leaves especially so. Children have become ill after simply sucking nectar from its flowers or chewing a few seeds or leaves. Symptoms are often mild, although they can be as severe as delirium, distorted sight, coma and even death. Both adults and children have been fatally poisoned by tea brewed from the plant's seeds and leaves in the mistaken belief it would cure asthma and other

The greatest threat to children are plants with small attractive poisonous berries. The deadly nightshade is a

vinetype plant prevalent throughout the country. It stretches along the ground or grows upright to a height of about 2 feet, and has clusters of berries. The unripe berries are deadly; those that have ripened to a bright yellow, orange and red are the least

toxic part of the plant. Castor bean seeds have caused widespread concern among officials because they are so readily available. They are sold in any garden store for about 25 cents a packet, and are extremely popular, especially with amateur horticulturists, because they produce large plants with lush greenery in only one season. Yet, only one seed contains enough ricin, a powerful blood poison, to kill

a child. The Christmas season is here and so many people are using games. Mistletoe and Poinsettia in their decorations. Did you know that one leaf from the poinsettia can kill a child if eaten? The berries on mistletoe can also be fatal if eaten. Both children and adults have died from eating the berries.

Look around you - do you have a potential killer in your home or yard?

NMMI Dedicates **Marshall Infirmary** Homecoming activities at New

Mexico Military Institute in Roswell Thanksgiving Day, was the dedication of the NMMI infirmary as Marshall Infirmary, honoring Dr. I. J. Marshall, Institute surgeon. Dr. Marshall graduated from Floydada High School, and is the son of Mr. and Mrs. L. A. Mar-

shall of Floydada. Marshall Infirmary, originally constructed in 1920, has been

renovated, air conditioned and enlarged to provide space and facilities for day-to-day medical attention for the corps of cadets to a projected strength of 1,400. With the addition of 8.813 square feet, the total space now is 16,286 square feet. The improvements were begun in July 1964, and were completed in March 1965. The contractor was Compton Construction Co.,

of Roswell, and the architect was Frank M. Standhardt, A.I.-A., Roswell. The infirmary includes a physiotherapy and minor surgery

room, consultation office, outpatient department, dining room and kitchen. It has a present capacity of 38 beds, with a potential of accommodating a total of 60 beds. It can provide all the services of a modern hospital with the exception of major surgery. With its medications and equipment, it can give out-patient care in addition to daily sick call.

The staff of the infirmary consists of a surgeon, four registered nurses, a cook and two housekeepers.

This year, Dr. Marshall began his 31st year as surgeon of New Mexico Military Institute. He joined the staff in September 1935. During the past 30 years, he has watched daily over the health of the corps of cadets and has been present at every campus athletic contest or other event in which danger might exist of possible injuries.

In addition to his medical accomplishments, he has participated in other enterprises to promote or improve the status and character of the cadet corps, such as the recruitment of cadets, providing money for needy cadets, and organizing fund drives. In recognition of

these efforts, the Alumni Assn. elected him an honorary alumnus of the Institute in May 1965. Marshall received his A.B. degree from Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene, Tex., in 1927, and his M.D. degree from Baylor School of Medicine. Dallas, Tex., in 1932. In 1954, he became a Fellow in the International College of Surgeons. He has held important positions in many medical organizations. societies and hospitals in New Mexico. These are as follows:



He must, then, plant within the acreage he has chosen, and finally he must divert the intended acreage. He must also comply with other farm programs to be eligible to participate in the





Grain mites and leaf rust are attacking Floyd County Wheat. The two foes are stunting the growth of the wheat thus reducing the grazing value.

The leaf rust is extremely bad in parts of the county. Symptoms of the fungus disease are yellowing of the leaves and small round orange-red pustules being formed on both sides of the leaves. Leaves often die when the infection is

Rust is favored by moderately cool weather and may be found on wheat during the fall, winter or spring. Often it becomes established on wheat in the fall and remains all winter.

There is no cure for rust, however, a change in weather often helps destroy the disease. Cold dry weather seems to be the hardest on the disease. Some varieties are bred to

be rust resistant, however rust fungus may adapt to these varieties after a few years.

The brown wheat mite, which is often found in wheat here in the panhandle, is doing some damage to wheat in Floyd The mites are about 1/32 to 1/16 of an inch in length and are brown to blackish in color. The mites stay at the base of the plant during the day and feed mostly at night.

The advisability of controlling the mites is questionable as experiments have not shown a substantial increase in the yield. The grain mites should peal from award | not be confused with greenbugs Accident Board. as they are very destructive to

Results of a planter box survey conducted in Crosby County showed that on the average \$30 an acre more could be made by planting certified cotton seed or seed directly from the company.

Farmers often catch their seed at the gin for planting the coming year. The seed often becomes contaminated with other varieties and yields are reduced. Seed quality is often hurt in harvesting and storing seed.

If seed are to be saved for planting it would be wise to have a germination test run on them. The test can be made by the State Department of Agriculture, Seed Testing Laboratory, 2814 34th St., Lubbock, Texas. The cost of the test is Two pounds of seed should be sent to the lab for the

1/2 cup milk

1 1/2 cup sugar

3 beaten eggs 1 teaspoon ginger

1 teaspoon cinnamon

1 teaspoon cloves

1 teaspoon allspice

pinch of salt 1 teaspoon vanilla

2 tablespoons butter

400 degree electric oven for about 45 minutes

Marshmallow Pumpkin Pie

1/2 pound (about 32 large) marshmallows 1 cup mashed pumpkin, cooked or canned

1/2 teaspoon cinnamon 1/4 teaspoon ginger 1/4 teaspoon salt

Place marshmallows, pumpkin and seasonings in top of double boiler. Heat, stirring occasionally until marshmallows are melted. Mix well. Let cool (not in refrigerator) 50 to 60 min-utes. Stir 1/3 cup whipped cream into cooled pumpkin mixture them carefully fold in remaining whipped cream. Pour into baked 9-inch pastry shell. Freeze. Then wrap and return to the freezer. To serve -thaw 20 mintues at room temperature.

Sprinkle gelatine over water in saucepan. Place over low heat; stir constantly until gelatine dissolves, 2 or 3 minutes. Remove from heat; add brown sugar; stir until dissolved. In mixing bowl, combine pumpkin, milk, salt, cinnamon and nutmeg. Gradually blend in gelatine mixture; stir until smooth. Fold in whipped cream. Sprinkle 1 cup praline crunch over bottom of baked pastry shell. Turn pumpkin mixture into pastry shell. Chill until firm. At serving time, garnish with additional whipped cream and remaining praline crunch.




