The City of Floydada, Light-house Electric Coop. and South-western Public Service put up the lights this week.

There will be no Christmas Bonanzas with free prizes this year and there will not be the traditional Santa Claus parade as in the past.

The merchants in the downtown area, particularly in the process of getting their Christmas displays in their windows and decorating their stores for the coming season. All day Monday the stores will feature a Christmas Dollar Day.

Floyd Approves Cotton Quotas

Floyd County Cotton farmers approved the cotton quotas but turned down the portion that would allow one to sell or transfer allotments from one county to another. Gaines County was the only one on the South Plains that approved the sell and transfer. Sixty-one counties in the state approved the portion.

The county voted 306 for and 84 against on the quotas and voted 210 for and 183 against on the sell and transfer. Both items required a 2/3 majority approval to be accepted.

By approving the quotas the local farmers voted to accept

the allotments and support prices previously set. Had the farmers turned down the quotas, they would not have to comply with the cotton program and would receive no support price.

Under the sell and transfer portion the farmers stated they did not approve the moving of cotton acreage from one county to another, although two farms in separate counties might be owned by the same person.

The people owning land in those 61 counties approving the measure may transfer or sell acreage to those owning land, or to another farm owned in another county approving the measure.

Oil Derrick Begins Drilling North Of Town

An oil derrick that was moved onto the farm belonging to Mrs. Cleo Goens five miles north of Floydada, was erected Tuesday afternoon, and the drilling operations began immediately.

The land is leased for oil exploration by Perry and Larsons of Dallas.

It was also learned this week that the Texas Company is in the process of leasing land northwest of Cedar Hill for similar oil explorations. Payments vary from \$1 to \$5 per acre.

Last year at about this time a derrick was erected south-east of South Plains and drilling took place for about a month. No signs of oil were found there.

Local Officials In Albuquerque For FAA Confab

City Manager Bill Feuerbacher and City Engineer Bill McMorris went to Albuquerque this morning to speak with a representative of the Federal Aviation Agency about the construction of the Floydada Airport.

The two were to meet with W. O. Karpenko, Chief of Area Airports Branch for the FAA in Albuquerque.

The agency intends to go through the project with the engineers and make sure the plans are in line with Federal specifications.

The city has already received \$12,000 from the state and \$53,289 from Federal sources to build an airport. A drive in progress whereby local funds will account for \$25,000 for the airport. The city is to pay engineering fees and the county will contribute through the use of manpower and equipment when the construction begins.

County Receives First Killing Frost Of Year

Cotton Harvest reached its fastest tempo of the season this week just after the first killing freeze was received Sunday night.

The first freezing temperatures were recorded here last Friday night, November 29, but the killer came early Monday morning, November 29, when a low of 27 was recorded. This is the latest freeze on record for the Floydada area.

Prior to this year the latest freeze came November 22, 1934 exactly a week earlier than the one received this year.

Farmers throughout this area had been waiting for a killing freeze and cooler weather to kill green bolls and mature the crop, which is expected to be one of the largest cotton harvests on record for this area.

Some spotted areas had received spotted freezes by the end of last week, but a majority of fields were still untouched by freezing temperatures.

As of last Friday evening Floyd County had ginned a total of 35,964, compared with 32,960 at this time last year and 42,505 two years ago.

The four-county area to date has ginned 72,430, compared with 78,052 with last year and 89,553 two years ago, according to the Texas Employment Commission in Plainview.

According to most reports from individual farmers the yields continue to be very good, with the moisture received this fall having little effect on the quality or yield of the crop.

Cotton classed last week at the Lubbock Classing Office of the USDA was considerably lower in micronaire and staple length than during the previous week, according to W. K. Palmer, in charge of the Lubbock office.

Micronaire is much lower this year than at this date in 1963 or 1964. Only 44 per cent of the cotton classed at Lubbock last week was in the desirable category of 3.5 and better. This was an 18 per cent drop from the previous week and a 29 per cent drop since November 12th.

Average staple length also declined last week but continued to average 15/16 of an inch. Seventy-nine per cent of the cotton classed at the Lubbock Classing Office last week was 15/16 of an inch and shorter compared to 50 per cent the previous week.

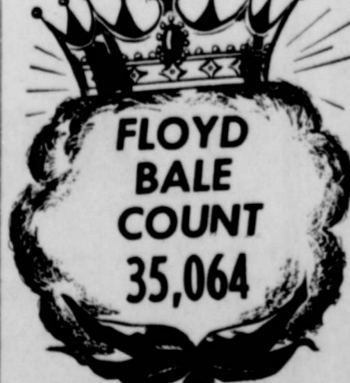

Floydada Flying Club Brings Port Cost To Reasonable Level

A solo license entitles a person to fly an airplane, but he cannot carry anyone else with him, other than the instructor. With a private license the person can carry a passenger with him but not for compensation. The club has a set fee for dues, which covers the payment on the plane, and the set hourly fee covers the cost of the gasoline, oil and minor repairs. Part of the money is set aside for inspections and any major repair work that may need to be done to the plane.

One of the members summed up the group's feelings with the statement, "One of the most enjoyable things about belonging to the club is the fellowship with the other flyers. Sometimes members of the club will be around the hangar and people who own their planes will land and chat with the members of the club, for all those who fly have a lot in common."

Reasons Floydada Flying Club Was Organized
by Bill Brown

The Floydada Flying Club has eight members and one airplane, which at first seems like a very poor arrangement; however let's look a little closer and see the advantages. First and foremost is the financial saving - you see all the set expenses such as cost of the airplane, hangar rent, insurance and maintenance are divided equally among the members. Then the charge for each hour of actual flying time is kept at a very low rate, just enough to cover the cost of oil and gas and to maintain the airplane in first class flying condition. You see an airplane is different from practically all other vehicles we may own, in that the government has many regulations that govern the care and maintenance of it. The plane must be taken to a government certified aircraft and engine mechanic every 100 hours for a thorough inspection and anything that does not check out perfect must be corrected immediately. Then every 1000 hours approximately the engine will require what is called a major overhaul. Thus the aircraft is kept in the best condition possible. This also accounts for the exceptional resale value of used aircraft. It isn't unusual to find some of the more popular makes of aircraft that are worth more today than they were several years ago.

You may ask how would I ever get to fly the plane if there are eight people wanting it. This is done through a reservation board and in actual practice there are very few conflicts. You just don't fly as many hours as you might imagine you would. 100 to 200 hours a year is really a great deal of flying for most private pilots.

Some people have said to me that they would not like the idea of flying a plane that other people have been flying, yet they would probably think nothing of going to one of the rental companies and paying three times as much to rent one of their planes that they have no idea who flew last. We feel that each of our members certainly has a personal interest in our plane.

We chose the Cessna 172 for several reasons. It is one of the most popular planes madetoday and will have a good resale value and it is also one of the best planes to learn to fly in. Only three of us had our pilot's license to begin with so we wanted a plane that would be a good trainer and also good for cross-country flights. This plane fills that bill although it is not a fast plane, cruising about 110 miles per hour. We are already planning to buy a faster and better plane as soon as all the members have their licenses. This shouldn't be long now for all the members have the required hours and just need to take their written and flight examinations.

I would recommend a membership in a flying club to anyone that is just learning to fly for it is certainly the most inexpensive way to learn and it is probably the most enjoyable for you are sharing with other friends an interest in the most fascinating hobby imaginable.

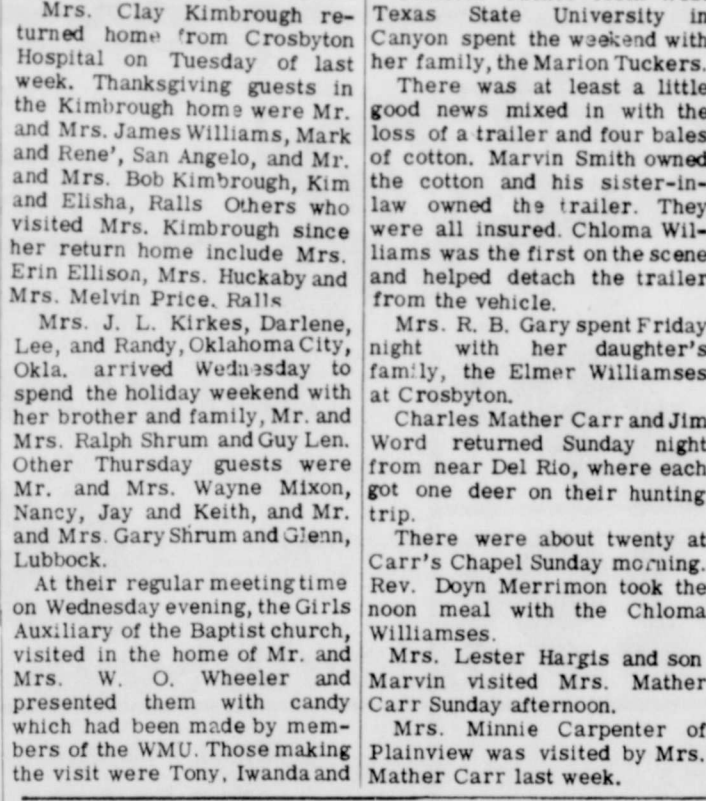

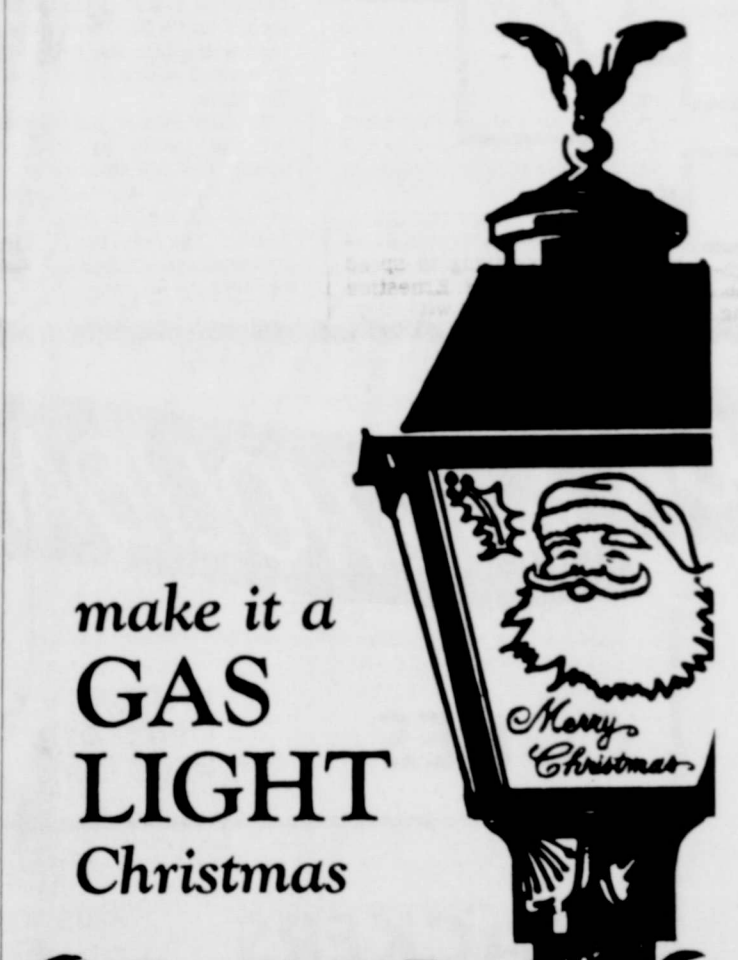

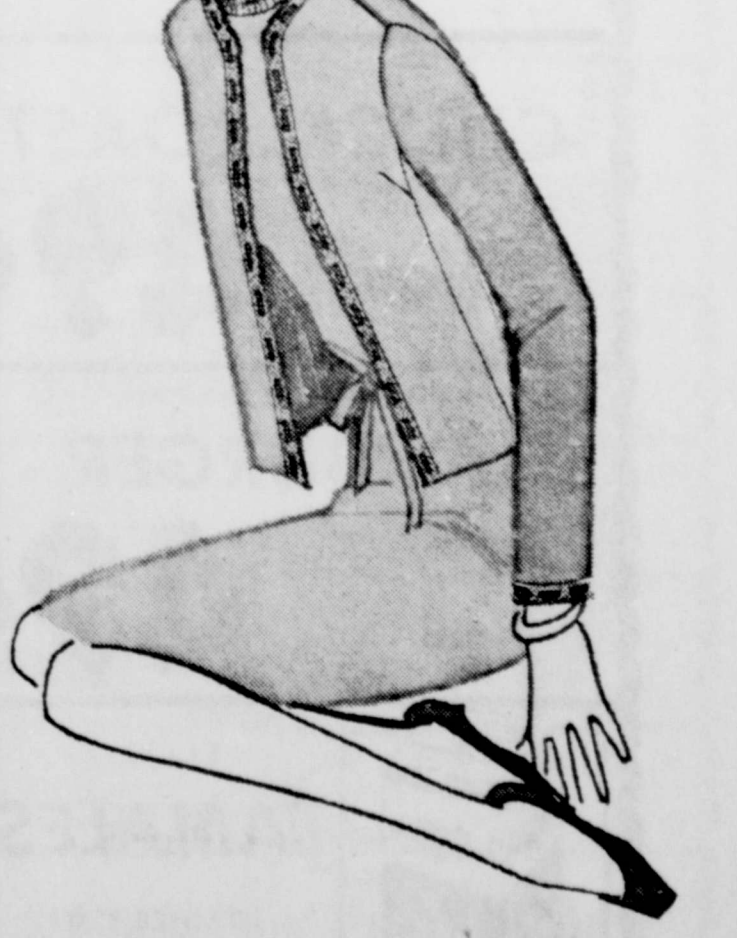

The Floydada boys this year have lost to the Littlefield team this year and the girls have lost to Petersburg.

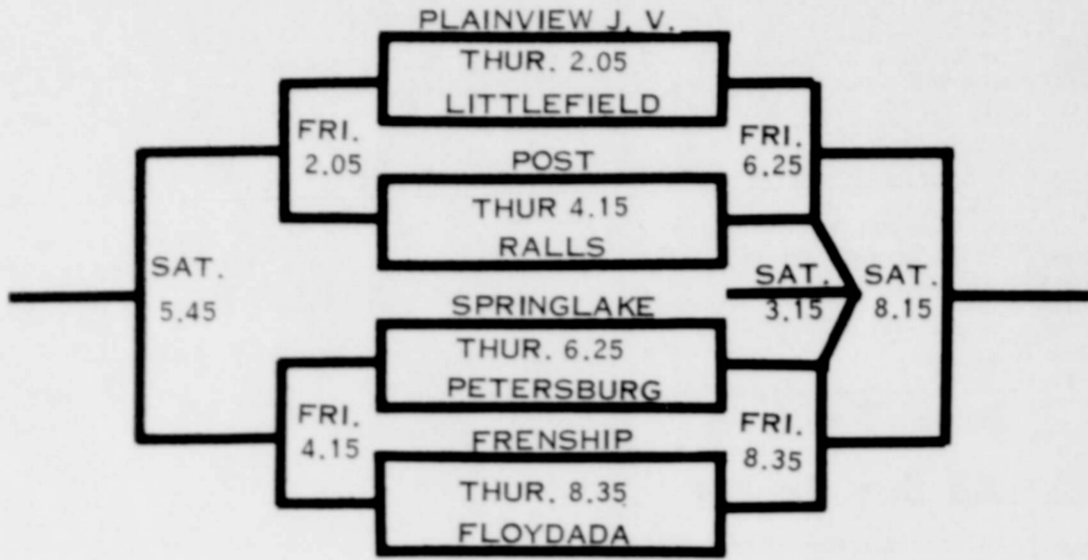

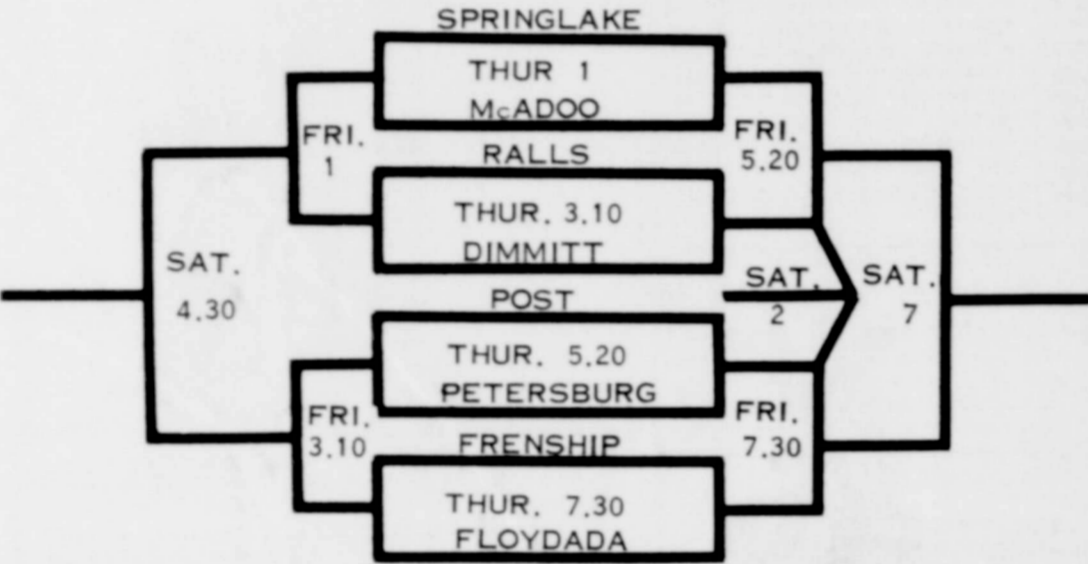

IN FLOYDADA

Home Ownership At New High

NEW YORK, Nov. 20 - In Floydada, home ownership has been on the rise and is now at a comparatively high level. A greater proportion of local families than ever before own the houses in which they live. The proportion is higher by about 13.0 percent than it was in 1950.

The findings are based on an updating of the latest Department of Commerce figures, in line with more recent surveys made by the University of Michigan and others.

As an indication of the change that has been taking place, back in 1950 the official Census of Housing showed that about 57.2 percent of the local dwelling units were owner-occupied.

By 1960, the ratio had reached 65.9 percent. Now, in 1965, it is at an estimated 70.2 percent.

The figures for Floydada compare favorably with those for the United States as a whole, where the home ownership ratio is 64.1 percent. It is 68.8 percent in Texas.

Much of the progress in this direction, locally and nationally, has taken place in the last ten years, aided by rising prosperity and by Government insurance of mortgages.

With incomes on the increase, more and more families have been achieving an economic position that has enabled them to acquire homes of their own. Their way was eased, considerably, by the availability of mortgage money at more favorable rates than were offered in earlier years.

As a result, the proportion of homes with mortgages on them rose from 44 percent in 1950 to 57 percent by 1960.

Although there has been much trading-up in recent years--people selling their homes to buy larger and fancier ones--there has also been much money spent on remodeling, expanding and repairing the older dwellings.

Upwards of \$11 billion per year is now being spent for such purposes, according to the University of Michigan survey.

Each year, it finds, four out of ten families make such outlays, averaging \$550. It amounts to \$220 per dwelling per year when the cost is spread out on an annual basis.

Applying this average expenditure to Floydada and to the number of dwelling units

locally, approximately \$266,000 is spent a year on such renovating.

Floydada folk enjoy all sorts of sports, especially many different kinds of hunting. In the county there are several groups of hunters who enjoy coyotes with dogs.

There are many coyotes off the plains occasionally a few are hunted on the plains. The hunter usually hauls his dogs in the back of a pickup and when he "jumps a dog" he races his pickup as fast as he can then the dogs, so that they get a good run on the

hounds except one of Atteberry's which is a big Irish Wolf Hound, named Fuzz. Atteberry says "Old Fuzz" isn't much on speed, but he has a lot of wind and is a real fighter.

The seven dogs had caught and killed the five coyotes in about two hours time. Atteberry and Poff just have one problem... that's finding

enough coyotes for their very enjoyable sport... and they ask that anyone (preferably up on the Plains) who knows where there are some coyotes to please let them know.

County Agent's Corner

By Joe Wilson

(Cases Disposed)
 Thomas Lee Johnson et ux vs J. C. Haley et al, suit in trespass to try title. Judgment for plaintiffs.
 Grain mites and leaf rust are attacking Floyd County wheat. The two foes are stunting the growth of the wheat thus reducing the grazing value. The leaf rust is extremely bad in parts of the county. Symptoms of the fungus disease are yellowing of the leaves and small round orange-red pustules being formed on both sides of the leaves. Leaves often die when the infection is high.
 Rust is favored by moderately cool weather and may be found on wheat during the fall, winter or spring. Often it becomes established on wheat in the fall and remains all winter. There is no cure for rust, however, a change in weather often helps destroy the disease. Cold dry weather seems to be the hardest on the disease.
 Some varieties are bred to be rust resistant, however rust fungus may adapt to these varieties after a few years.
 The brown wheat mite, which is often found in wheat here in the panhandle, is doing some damage to wheat in Floyd County. The mites are about 1/32 to 1/16 of an inch in length and are brown to blackish in color. The mites stay at the base of the plant during the day and feed mostly at night.
 The advisability of controlling the mites is questionable as experiments have not shown a substantial increase in the yield. The grain mites should not be confused with greenbugs as they are very destructive to wheat.
 Results of a planter box survey conducted in Crosby County showed that on the average \$30 an acre more could be made by planting certified cotton seed or seed directly from the company.
 Farmers often catch their seed at the gin for planting the coming year. The seed often becomes contaminated with other varieties and yields are reduced. Seed quality is often hurt in harvesting and storing seed.
 If seed are to be saved for planting it would be wise to have a germination test run on them. The test can be made by the State Department of Agriculture, Seed Testing Laboratory, 2814 34th St., Lubbock, Texas. The cost of the test is \$1.00. Two pounds of seed should be sent to the lab for the test.
 With deer season open in Texas, many Floyd County residents are planning to go hunting this year. Bulletins may be obtained in the County Agents office on "Field Dressing a Deer" and "Wild Game Care and Cooking." The cooking bulletin includes recipes for large and small game as well as game birds.
 The bulletins are free and may be obtained by coming by the county agent's office or calling requesting the bulletins be sent to you.

- Good Old-fashioned Pumpkin Pie
- 1 pint pumpkin
 - 1/2 cup milk
 - 1 1/2 cup sugar
 - 3 beaten eggs
 - 1 teaspoon ginger
 - 1 teaspoon cinnamon
 - 1 teaspoon cloves
 - 1 teaspoon allspice
 - pinch of salt
 - 1 teaspoon vanilla
 - 2 tablespoons butter
- Mix together and bake in a 400 degree electric oven for about 45 minutes.
- Marshmallow Pumpkin Pie
- 1/2 pound (about 32 large) marshmallows
 - 1 cup mashed pumpkin, cooked or canned
 - 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
 - 1/4 teaspoon ginger
 - 1/4 teaspoon salt
 - 1 cup heavy cream whipped
 - 1 baked 9-inch pastry shell, cooled
- Place marshmallows, pumpkin and seasonings in top of double boiler. Heat, stirring occasionally until marshmallows are melted. Mix well. Let cool (not in refrigerator) 50 to 60 minutes. Stir 1/3 cup whipped cream into cooled pumpkin mixture then carefully fold in remaining whipped cream. Pour into baked 9-inch pastry shell. Freeze. Then wrap and return to the freezer. To serve -- thaw 20 minutes at room temperature.
- Pumpkin Chiffon Pie
- 1 envelope unflavored gelatin
 - 1/2 cup cold water
 - 3/4 cup firmly packed light brown sugar
 - 1 can (1 lb.) pumpkin
 - 1/4 cup milk
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1 teaspoon cinnamon
 - 3/4 teaspoon nutmeg
 - 1 cup heavy cream, whipped
 - Praline crunch*
 - 1 baked 9-inch pie shell
- Additional whipped cream for garnish
- Sprinkle gelatin over water in saucepan. Place over low heat; stir constantly until gelatin dissolves, 2 or 3 minutes. Remove from heat; add brown sugar; stir until dissolved. In mixing bowl, combine pumpkin, milk, salt, cinnamon and nutmeg. Gradually blend in gelatin mixture; stir until smooth. Fold in whipped cream. Sprinkle 1 cup praline crunch* over bottom of baked pastry shell. Turn pumpkin mixture into pastry shell. Chill until firm. At serving time, garnish with additional whipped cream and remaining praline crunch.
- Praline Crunch
- 1/4 cup butter or margarine
 - 1/2 cup sugar
 - 1 cup coarsely chopped pecan meats
- Melt butter in small skillet. Stir in sugar. Add pecan meats. Cook over moderate heat, stirring constantly, until sugar mixture begins to turn golden, about 3 minutes. Remove from heat; turn out onto piece of
