

Sale Of School, Hospital Bonds Top 1965 Events

the construction of a 50-bed hospital here topped the news stories in 1965 for Floydada. The information confirming the sale of the school bonds

came in April, shortly after which, Ralph Johnston was re-elected president of the school board. Republic National Bank of Dallas bought the school bonds.

In September the First South-west Company of Dallas bought the bonds that were for sale by the Caprock Hospital District. Hollis Bond is chairman of the District.

Both the hospital district and the school district had experienced a series of law suits to block the sale of bonds for

the proposed construction. Fred Lenz and Gerald Howard of the Texas Department of Public Safety, were moved to Floydada where they are now stationed.

Leonard Matsler became the new Mayor, and Louis Anderson and John Smitherman became new councilmen. S. W. Ross was the former Mayor and the councilmen replaced Lon Davis, Jr., and Aldine Williams.

Newell Burk and Shirley Irwin were elected to the school board and Dennis Dempsey, who was serving out the term of

ment of poll taxes are slow this year, for two reasons. There is no presidential election this year and a Voting Bill passed during the session of Congress states poll tax is discriminatory. State Attorney General Carr is contesting the bill against Texas, the five which requires payment of poll taxes as a prerequisite for voting. The General has pointed out that 97% of the Negroes

qualified to vote paid their poll taxes last year, while only 51% of the Whites paid theirs. The decision in the case is still pending, and should the decision be delayed until after January 31, the law probably wouldn't be effective this year, according to C. J. Payne, Floyd County Tax Assessor-Collector.

Therefore, the poll tax will in all probability be required for the voting in any election this year. The city is holding an election to allow issuance of \$350,000 worth of bonds to improve the local water situation. Three terms expire on the city council and two occur on the school board.

The entire slate of state officers expires from the Governor on down. On the county level, the County Judge, Treasurer, Clerk, School Superintendent, Commissioners for Precincts 2 and 4, the Justice of the Peace and the District Clerk's terms expire.

The Representative and one Senatorial term expire this year. The poll tax is not required for voting in a Federal Election. It is possible the city residents will vote to approve or not approve bonds to build the proposed Mackenzie Dam.

Election Slated Tuesday, January 11

Ernest Lee Thomas of Floydada and Chester Mitchell will vie for the position of director of the High Plains Underground Water District when the election is held Tuesday, January 11. In the election Floyd County voters will elect a district director and a committeeman-at-large. At the same time voters will vote on the annexation to the district of certain eligible lands in Cochran County. Mitchell is presently the director from Floyd County serving on the five-man board of directors who run the water district affairs. His term expires this year, and he will run for re-election. Thomas is contesting Mitchell for the position. Floyd County is considered Precinct 5 in the water district.

'66 License Plates On Sale February 1

There are four names on the ballot in this county for committeeman-at-large. They are J. S. Hale Jr., Route 1, Floydada, who holds the office at present; E. J. Foster, Route 1, Lockney; Kenneth Bean, Floydada, and Orland Howard, Dougherty. Hold-over members of the county committee include Bill Sherman, Lockney; Tate Jones, Floydada; M. M. Julian, Lockney, and M. J. McNeill, Floydada. There are two tracts of land which are proposed to be added to the water district, both in Cochran County. One tract lies south and west of Whiteface and the other lies north and west of Morton. The propositions will appear on the ballot in about the same form as constitutional amendments appear with a "for" and "against" paragraph on each. Absentee balloting on the water district officials is now underway and those who will not be in the county on the date of election may vote by contacting Mrs. Lavera Johnston at the

With the coming of the New Year, those who are interested in seeking a public office, or seeking re-election to the one they presently hold, are looking to the Spring elections. People will go to the polls and vote on personnel to fill Federal, State, County, City, School Board, and Hospital Board offices, terms of which expire this year. Only Four Days Left To Transfer Cotton

According to the ASCS office in Floydada, Floyd County farmers have four more days in which to find and transfer acres from other areas to their local farms. The deadline for transferring acres is Monday, January 3. The transfer came out of the recent cotton referendum in which local farmers turned down the sale and transfer of cotton from the county, but this does not keep farmers from transferring cotton from other areas, within the state of Texas, to Floyd County. Sixty-one counties approved the sale and transfer portion of the referendum. The local ASCS office has kept no running record of transfers so at present does not know the number of acres transferred to here. Most of the transferred acres are coming from East Texas, where the farmers are turning more to grass and cattle than to cotton. Farmers are able to buy, or lease, the cotton land, and the cotton history of the farms in that area. Prices, of course, vary, but purchase price has run around 25¢ per pound projected yield and lease has been around 6¢ per pound. If a farmer has a projected yield of 500 pounds on his Floyd County farm and transfers 100 acres of cotton from another area that has a projected yield of 250 pounds, for example, the person transfers only 50 acres. This is done by multiplying the transferred (100) acres by the transferred projected (250) yield and dividing by the local projected yield (500). Some estimations indicate the transferred acres to the High Plains will offset the diverted acres.

"Peace And Prosperity" Should Continue: Some Problems Seen

"Peace and Prosperity" should continue to be the dominant theme in 1966. President Johnson will push ahead in attempts to capitalize on the inroads he has already made with his Great Society program. However, since 1966 will be a Congressional election year, he may find the going less easy than it was this past year; the Congressmen and Senators who are up for re-election will likely think twice before being so generous with the taxpayers' money. I, of course, would like nothing better than to be completely optimistic in this forecast, but my more than 60 years of experience in predicting trends has taught me that unexpected events are most dangerous when conditions are brightest. 1. The health of world leaders may well be a prime factor in 1966. These include President de Gaulle, Mao Tse-tung, and even President Johnson. 2. Perhaps the biggest threat

war with Red China in 1966. Mao is not yet ready to risk major confrontation. His lagging farm and industrial programs still loom as major problems, and the task of extending Red China's nuclear progress is a heavy burden. 7. The foremost task for Red China still is to get a seat in the United Nations. While Southeast Asia is an attractive plum, territorial expansion may well have to wait in Red China's timetable, as a peaceful profile on her part would make gaining a seat at the UN easier. UN admission, of course, would greatly enhance Red China's prestige in dealings with the Afro-Asian nations. 8. SEPTEMBER

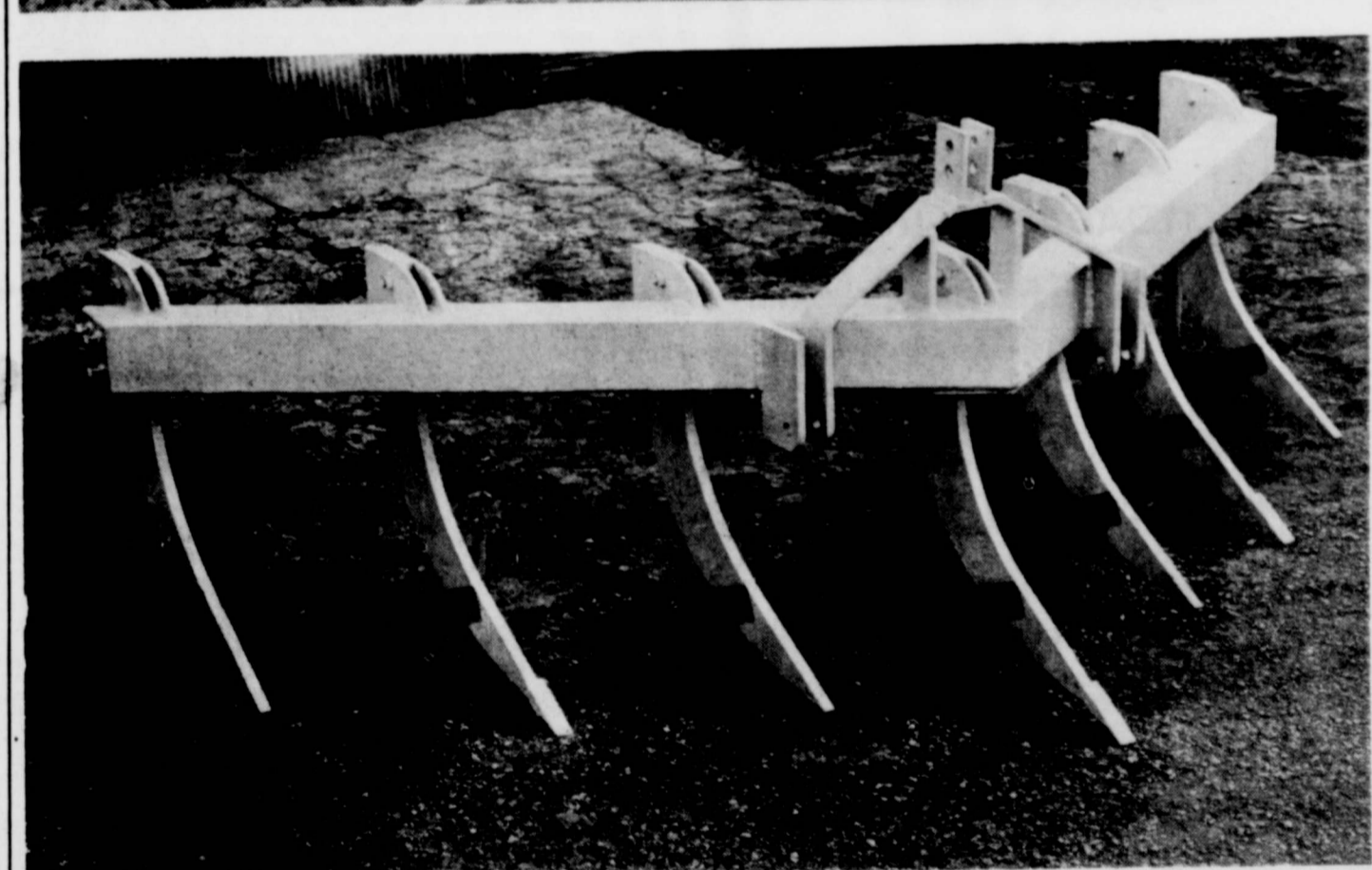
JIM WORD

Many vegetable growers do not know that the USDA issues a daily report of the quantities and prices of vegetables at most of the main vegetable markets, such as Dallas, Denver, St. Louis and San Antonio.

Probably the South Plains area would be most interested in the closest market to home, at Dallas.

The report is free, and if you are interested in what prices vegetables are bringing and wish to receive these quotations, just phone me and I will send in your name and have you put on the mailing list. Or you may send your name to United States Department of Agriculture Service, Dallas, Texas and ask to be put on the mailing list.

Vegetable growing is a peculiar business and newcomers are never welcome. Prospective buyers that I have contacted state that they would be glad to cooperate if the quality is satisfactory and, of course, at the market price.

The USDA bulletin tells the farmer what the prices are that day.

I am sold on the idea that farmers of Floyd County must raise something that pays more per acre.

The marketing arrangement is the key to this situation and I think I could be helpful.

Floyd County Families Move More Than Most In U. S.

(Special to the Hesperian)

NEW YORK, Dec. 18 - Residents of Floyd County do a great deal of moving - more than is done by people in most other areas of the country.

Because of the frequency with which local families pick up and move to new addresses, they are rated more mobile than average.

Sometimes it is to live in better style. With larger incomes, many of them are switching to fancier, more modern houses than they were able to afford previously.

In other cases, business or job opportunities present themselves in another location and a move becomes desirable.

Americans as a whole are more mobile and restless now than they were in former years, according to a recent report by the U. S. Census Bureau.

In the period of just one year, from 1963 to 1964, nearly one person out of every five in the United States moved to a new address.

The tendency of Floyd County residents to move is revealed in another Census Bureau study covering a five-year period, based on data compiled during the last census.

It shows that 5,912 of them were living in different houses than they had been living in five years earlier.

Of this number, 3,094 merely changed to other locations within the county. The other 2,818 were newcomers who arrived from other sections to make their homes in the local area.

No figure is given, however, for the number who may have moved away in the period.

The net result is that 55 out of every 100 people in Floyd County changed their addresses at least once in a period of five years.

This proportion, 55 percent,

Mahon Protests Feed Grain Administration

Congressman George Mahon of Lubbock today filed official protest with Secretary of Agriculture, Orville Freeman, as to the administration of the 1966 Feed Grain Program. The Congressman charged that the Secretary had broken faith with members of Congress who had been assured that the program would be administered in such a manner as to "maintain farm income" of producers if Congress would give wide authority allowing for administrative decisions in view of the rapidly changing world situation.

Specifically, Mahon pointed out expected income losses to Southwestern grain sorghum producers ranging from \$3 to \$12 per acre. Information as to the Congressman's action came in the form of a telephone call directly from him to the Grain Sorghum Producers Association whose officers had just returned from Washington where actual case studies proving the lower income position of sorghum growers had been presented to USDA officials as well as Administration farm policy advisors, members of Congress and Washington staff of other farm organizations.

Elbert Hartp, Hale County farmer and President of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association, immediately commended Congressman Mahon for his fast action and insistence that farm income to the sorghum producers be restored. Congressman Walter Rogers of Pampa earlier had expressed similar indignation with the Secretary of Agriculture and assured Association members of his strong support in attempting to get corrective action in USDA.

The Grain Sorghum Producers Association's efforts and those of Congressman Mahon follow an earlier announcement by the Secretary of Agriculture that provisions of the 1966 Feed Grain Program were being altered even though Congress had passed the law similar to previous years which provided a system of price support payments, price support loans, and diverted acre payments.

Current provisions call for producers in 1966 to receive no diversion payments on the first 20% diversion and a maximum of price support payments on only 50% of the base acres. In addition, the price support loan has been lowered

from \$1.65 on sorghum to \$1.52 in 1966. The support payment has been increased from 35¢ to 30¢ hundred.

The combination of changes resulted in the expected net income loss to producers, according to Elbert Hartp, president of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association and other organizations are striving to change in the program provisions, that at this time, plans for grain sorghum should be based on any assumptions than the implementation of feed grain program as outlined by local ASCS officials.

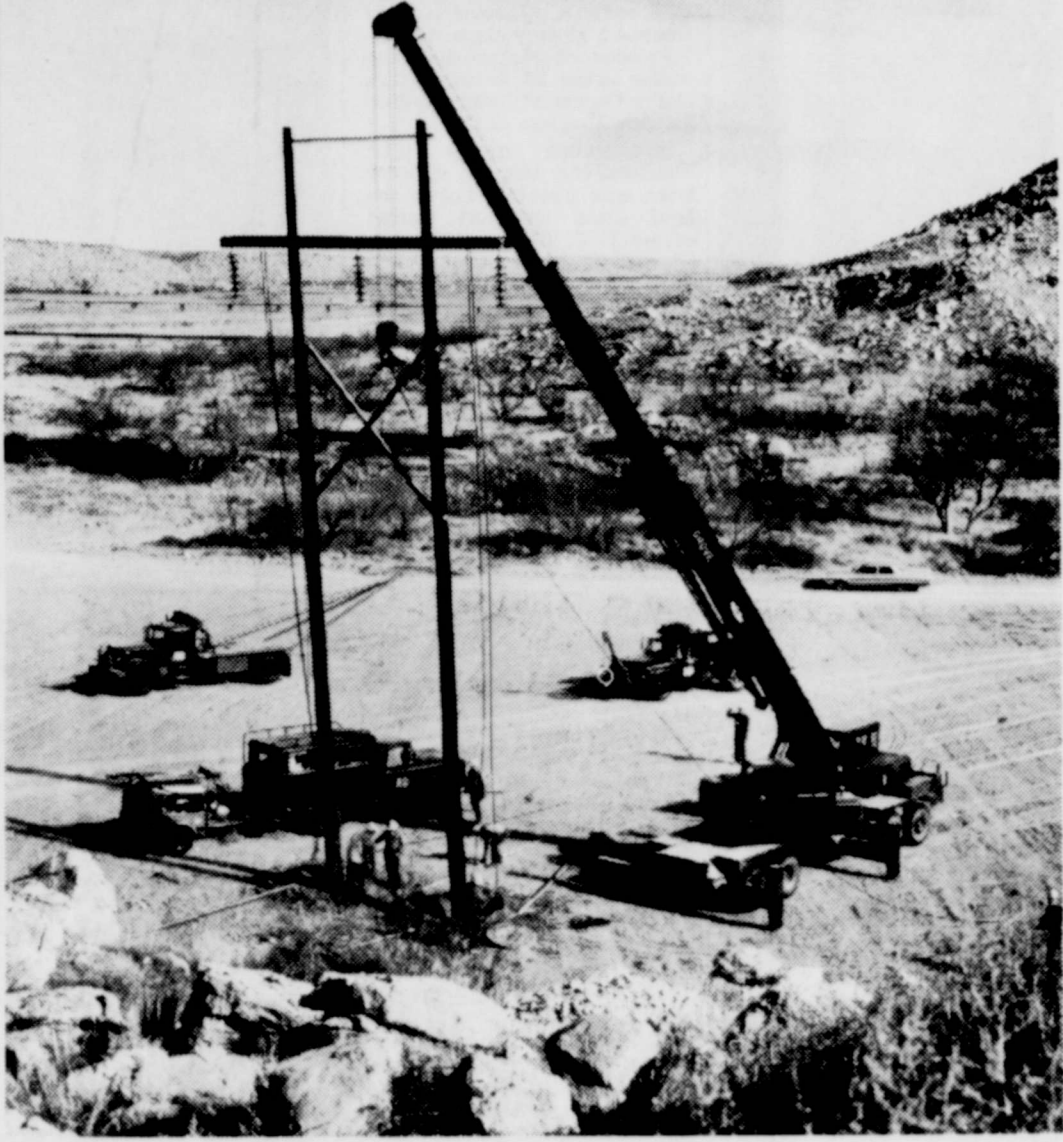

SECOND IN NATION - An 80 foot electric transmission line structure can be lifted and set into place in 8-1/2 minutes with Southwestern Public Service Company's new hydraulic crane. The unit, the second one to go into service in the nation, was specifically designed for use in the electric utility industry. Southwestern Public Service Company has announced a 1966 construction program calling for the investment of \$19,353,000 in new facilities, with a large portion of the additional investment to be in transmission lines.

DURING 1966:

Public Service Plans \$19 Million In Improvements

A 1966 construction and improvement program which calls for the investment of \$19,353,000 in new facilities throughout the company's service area was announced today by A. R. "Lon" Watson, president and general manager of Southwestern Public Service Company.

"Comparing our construction plans with a military operation, 1966 could be described as a year when we are going to strength and consolidate our position. In other words, this is a year when we are going to build into an already strong interconnected electric system new facilities which will provide even greater service dependability for our customers," Watson said.

New transmission lines, and related equipment, are the largest single investment in the 1966 program, with nearly \$7,500,000 of the total construction program designed for the construction and improvement of the electrical highways which bring the power from the generating stations to the areas served by the electric company.

A principal result of this new construction will be that the "backbone" transmission line, or principal electric artery linking the three largest generating stations will become a 230,000 volt line. Nichols Station, northeast of Amarillo, Plant X, in Lamb County, and Cunningham Station, west of Hobbs, N.M., are the three generation stations.

This means that early next year, it will be possible to move four times more power than we are able to now transmit between these three major plants.

"Let me emphasize that this conversion to 230,000 volts of the 'backbone', or main, line is an addition to existing facilities, and means there will be one more way to move power throughout our system. In other words, there are other transmission routes, in addition to this new one, which can transport the power between all of our 11 generating stations and carry the load in the event of an emergency," Watson reported.

Watson went on to point out that the generation and transmission of electric power is controlled automatically insofar as the principal transmission lines are concerned, and that the changeover to an alternate route is accomplished instantaneously in most cases.

Major construction will begin during 1966 on another 210,000 kilowatt steam-electric generating unit at Nichols Station, Northeast of Amarillo. This will be the third generator installed since 1960 at this location and will increase the capability of the plant to 534,000 kilowatts. Completion of the new unit is scheduled for mid-1968.

"The continued installation of major electric generating units is, of course, the best kind of evidence of our confidence in the future of our service area. There are many opportunities to attract small industries to this region, and a number of communities are actively engaged in well-planned industrial development programs. The advantages of this area are obvious, with our excellent climate, the optimism of our people, and good local governments. All of these will lead to new progress for the region," Watson said.

Electric power's role in meeting the municipal water needs of the region are a part of the 1966 improvement program. A 115,000 volt transmission line will be completed during the year to provide the power to pump the water from Lake Meredith into a storage reservoir near Amarillo. The Lake Meredith water is scheduled to be distributed to the 11 member cities of the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority, beginning in late 1967.

Idea For Peace, Farm Production

Senator George S. McGovern has a new bill for Congress to consider that will appear far fetched, impractical, and impossible to most people. It is an approach to world peace that dates back as early as the Bible. . . and to us it makes sense.

History records the fact that wars do not settle anything. . . they only destroy. McGovern's approach of love for the peoples of the world certainly follows the teaching of the Bible, and his thoughts in conjunction with an increased farm production for the relief of starving people all over the world is one that is refreshing.

According to the following national news report the plan would work as follows:

WASHINGTON —Sen. George S. McGovern (D-S D) said Sunday he is confident Congress next year will approve at least a start toward reversing the present strict controls on food production.

McGovern is author of a bill, now before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, which would permit farmers to grow more crops on more land, and use their produce to feed the hungry nations.

President Johnson reportedly agrees in principle.

"I've been told by high officials in the administration that the President has on his desk, awaiting only his signature, orders to put into effect a program which goes at least part of the way toward what I have in mind," McGovern said.

Under his bill, Congress would provide \$500 million to buy food for the starving abroad, build ports and facilities for distributing the produce in the underdeveloped countries, and to help them improve their farming methods. The program would be increased at the rate of \$500 million a year for seven years, then continue three more years at the \$3.50 billion level.

McGovern does not agree with some persons who warn that administration budget officials, ordered to pare expenses, will view the program's cost with raised eyebrows.

The government now pays between \$2.5 billion and \$3 billion a year to farmers for growing food, he said. He quoted unidentified Agriculture Department "experts" as estimating it would be only 20-30 per cent more expensive to allow the crops to be grown.

9. I foresee no crisis over Cuba in 1966. The agreement Castro has made to allow more Cuban refugees to enter the U. S. A. underscores the problem he has in feeding his people.

10. The Vietnam situation and the Dominican Republic incident have convinced the Administration that the military might of our nation must be maintained at a "ready" basis. This means stepped-up defense spending, which should add another prop to the economy.

11. While such defense

solvent, and in coming years we may well have to reckon with it. The draft-step-up only temporarily eases things and gives a false sense of well-being.

20. Retail trade should enjoy another excellent year. Much of the gain in dollar volume, of course, will come from price rises. Nevertheless, as long as personal incomes, employment, and business hold high, consumer confidence will encourage spending.

21. Spending for food, apparel, and general merchandise should continue upward; also for leisure-time and vacation lines. Color-television is catching on, and I look for continued strong demand in this field.

22. The automobile business will not be left out in the spending spree. It will enjoy another prosperous year, but I foresee no significant upsurge beyond the high levels of the past two years.

23. In view of the drain on our gold supplies, the government has been endeavoring to promote domestic travel and vacations. Nevertheless, I forecast further interest in foreign vacations. In one sense, I am happy to see this. I have done considerable foreign traveling, and I feel that such activity is definitely advantageous. Furthermore, I feel that foreign travel can help Americans to wake up the advantages here at home and make them more thankful for the blessings they enjoy.

24. Many readers—especially those retired and living on pensions and social security—are worried about the threat of inflation. I forecast no radical inflation during 1966—the Administration is committed to "non-inflationary progress". However, some price increases appear unavoidable.

25. I predict that the greater danger will lie in CREDIT inflation, rather than in PRICE inflation.

26. With the rise in defense spending and the cost of legislation for the Great Society, the federal budget will suffer a sizable deficit. In addition, states and municipalities are unable and unwilling to live within their means. Consumers will also go further into debt.

27. Look for new increases in the cost-of-living index. The government may try to head off substantial price hikes in key areas, but selective price rises will occur.

28. Industrial commodity prices should remain firm to higher, particularly in the first half of 1966. The primary bulwark against a price-runaway is competition, which should be basically more effective than government influence.

29. I look for an increase in domestic competition in 1966. This should become more evident as the business upthrust tapers off. Also, we must not forget foreign competition. With many nations feeling the pinch of a dollar shortage, they will work to remedy this by increasing their sales here.

30. Business in 1966 need fear no major labor tie-ups. Strikes, however, may well be numerous among the secondary labor units.

31. I look for business fail-

ures to increase, both in numbers and in dollar liabilities. This will be due to token competition, excesses of debt and inventory accumulations, unwise credit extensions, and careless management.

32. Of greater concern to me is the steady climb in nonfarm real estate foreclosures; I expect a further rise in 1966.

33. Business profits in 1966 will not advance as sharply as in the past two or three years. The squeeze is on in profit margins; hence I look for a tapering off in the rise of corporate profits, although I foresee no drastic slump while activity holds near peak.

34. Looking at the farm sector, I see no radical change from the excellent 1965 year. Barring a crop failure or severe drought, farm prices, at worst, should shade only slightly lower.

35. Farm equipment manufacturers should enjoy good business in 1966. This goes also for fertilizer and pesticide producers.

36. The important building and construction lines should hold their own in 1966, but their dollar volume may be due largely to price and cost inflation. The Great Society program is a plus factor for construction, including urban renewal and highways.

37. Private home and apartment building could show slight improvement, but the real boom in residential building will not register significantly in 1966.

38. Hence, I forecast that real estate conditions will remain selective. Well-located sites for homes and industrial and commercial complexes will do well, but study of local conditions is imperative.

39. I predict a further increase in farm land values in 1966. With costs still rising, the physical size of farms must expand so operators can benefit from mechanization. This places a premium on well-located land in the important and larger agricultural regions.

40. The steady advance toward fuller automation should make further progress in 1966, helping industry to cope with rising operating costs and shorter work weeks.

41. Trees do not grow to the skies; neither does the stock market rise unendingly. While I forecast that the stock market—as measured by the Dow-Jones Industrials—can surpass the high mark of 1965, I anticipate a volatile 1966 market with a good-sized drop-off a real possibility sometime during the year.

42. Even though the stock market may push to new highs, any further advance may not bulk large percentage-wise. If business and corporate profits show a tendency to taper off, the fundamental basis for a worthwhile advance will be removed.

43. Speculative enthusiasm and inflation fears can be expected to figure prominently in the stock market during the course of 1966. The urge to make a quick buck is increasingly evident.

44. I forecast that 1966 will not be the time for illogical

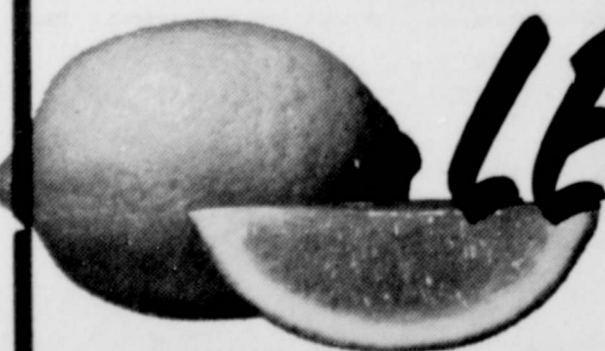
