## All Canning Sugar Allotments to Stop August 25th

Issuance of sugar for home canning will stop Aug. 25, the War Price and Rationing This simply means that is end of this month.

Original plans were to continue issuance through October, but the local board has been advised to issue the entire allotment for 1945 by the end of August so that the home canning sugar program can be completed, he stated.

"This simply means that issuance will be speeded up and what we have for canning purposes will be issued by the end of this month," Norton said.

All applicants in this county received only five pounds per person after the drastic cut in sugar rations was announced in the early summer.

No one who received a canning sugar allotment prior to June 2 will receive any additional from the amount of sugar left over. The amount of sugar left on hand at close of business on August 25th will be divided equally among all applicants who filed their applications between June 2nd and August 25th.

"There is no need to file a second application thinking it will take precedence over applications which are already in," Mr. Norton said, "because you will receive additional coupons for your equal share of any amount of sugar that may be left on hand at the close of business on August 25."

## Fat Fallwell Dies Suddenly While on Fishing Trip

It was with a deep sense of sadness that the word was received here last Friday night telling of the sudden death of William E. (Fat) Fallwell, which occurred just before sundown on Friday evening on the banks of the Rio Grande River, somewhere in the wilds of New Mexico, where in company with his uncle, C. H. (Clarence) Fallwell, he had gone on a vacation and fishing trip.

They had parked their car near what is usually a dry bed of the river, but the river was up and this dry bed was filled with a waist-deep stream of swift water of considerable width, which they must wade in order to get to the bank of the main river, where they had planned to do their fishing.

Fat took a box containing the fishing tackle and weighing about forty pounds and waded the stream, while Clarence carried a bucket of bait. On reaching the further shore of the stream, Clarence took the box and left the pail of bait with Fat, who was somewhat exhausted and stopped in the shade of some trees to rest and cool while his uncle went on to the bank of the main river and made their tackle ready for baiting.

Fat not having yet arrived, Clarence called but received no answer and he then returned to where he had left him, but he was not there. He called again to know where he was and received the answer: "Here." He then went to the point where the voice came from and found Fat, again in the water and trying to lift himself onto the top of a two-foot bank. He got him by the hand and helped him up to where he could grasp his belt and by almost superhuman strength succeeded in getting him clear of the stream and on the bank, but realized that the younger man was far spent and unconscious. He gave him all the ministrations in his power and then went to where three other men, strangers, were fishing not far away, and they all returned to find that Fat had passed on.

The three strangers had with them a boat which the four men carried across the strip of dry land and the body was placed therein and conveyed again to the main east bank of the river, and one of the men drove to the nearest town, fifty miles away, for an ambulance and officers, who arrived at the point about three o'clock in the morning.

The E. B. Black undertakers of Hereford were notified and later took charge of the body, returning it to Hereford and later directing the funeral arrangements for the services which were held in the Congregational church of Friona, Tuesday afternoon and conducted by Rev. A. E. Irvine, pastor of the local Methodist church, assisted by Rev. Dale Baker of the Congregational

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### Manderscheid is Rifle Champ of Regiment







### R. J. Coleman Dies in Clovis

R. J. Coleman, 51, prominent farmer of the Messenger community, died Sunday in a Clovis hospital. Stricken on Aug. 9, Mr. Coleman was sufficiently recovered from his first attack to be able to recognize and talk with a son, 1st Lt. James Ray Coleman, who returned home on Aug. 12 following his liberation from a German prisoner of war camp where he had been held since his capture after being shot down over Germany in 1944.

Mr. Coleman was a road contractor in Missouri, Oklahoma and Texas prior to acquiring wheat and cattle interests here. He bought a farm in the Messenger community in 1929 and the family had lived there since 1931, taking a leading part in all community activities. Members of the First Christian Church of Hereford, the Colemans attended the Methodist Church in Friona and services were held there yesterday with the pastor, Rev. Edgar A. Irvin, officiating.

Born June 17, 1894 in Guthrie, Okla., Mr. Coleman was married on Aug. 18, 1919 to Miss Ruth Pinkerton of Elk City, Okla. Survivors besides his wife includes two sons, 1st Lt. James Ray Coleman and Bruce Coleman, a senior in Friona High School, and one daughter, Mrs. Georgia Nell Coldiron of Friona. Other survivors are his mother, Mrs. Nettie K. Coleman of Oklahoma City, and three sisters, Mrs. Mavis Johnson, Duncan, Okla.; Mrs. Clyde Chambers, Coffeyville, Kans., and Mrs. T. E. Miller of Oklahoma City.






