



REDUCTION A statement from Plains Cotton Growers in Lubbock gave a seldom - thought - of - light to what the effect on the world cotton market is when cotton acreage is reduced in the U.S. It said: "Free-world cotton production in 1965-66 dropped about 200,000 bales from the previous year, but this output decline was more than offset by gains in the USSR where the

crop reportedly reached 8.7 million bales, an increase of 500,000 over last season.

"Total world cotton production is estimated at 52.1 million bales (480 lb. net), which is about 200,000 bales above the record set last year. The world crop was grown on 82.1 million acres, a half-million acre increase over 1964-65. Women spend over half of their at-home working hours in the kitchen. Take time to plan the location and size of your kitchen for convenience and enjoyment. If possible, locate your kitchen near your laundry or work utility room.

Roberts said a complete tox-icology analysis of the dead woman's stomach fluids would be sent to the state crime laboratory in Lubbock to determine the exact cause of death. Mrs. Banks was found by her

husband, Carl L. Banks a mechanic at Amarillo Air Force Base, about 5:30 p.m. after he returned home from work. Banks called police and said he found his wife dead in the bathtub.

Officers first feared Mrs. Banks had met with foul play after a pathologist said the stocking found knotted about her neck had to have been placed there prior to several razor wounds found on her neck.

Detectives said several blood stains on the stockings indicate the wounds were inflicted before the stocking was tied about the woman's neck.

Mrs. Banks apparently tied two nylon stockings together, knotted one end around her throat and the other to a bath-room doorknob. She then turned on a gas heater in the bathroom, stepped into the bathtub and turned on the water, detec-tives theorized.

Officers said Mrs. Banks was seated in the tub with her back to the faucets and could easily have applied enough pressure with her legs to result in strangulation and a crushed windpipe.

A water glass with ammon-ia was found beside a half full bottle of ammonia in the kitchen sink, according to police. A note found in Mrs. Bank's purse said, "Don't blame anyone but me for this. God bless my wonderful family." The note

was unsigned. Mrs. Banks was a native of Floyd County and moved to Amarillo some 20 years ago

following her marriage. Mrs. Banks is survived by her husband; a son, Randall of the home; brothers, Lowell and Bob Jarrett of Lockney, Carl and Eddie Jarrett of Floydada and Lonnie Jarrett of Clovis, N.M.; sisters Mrs. Dewey Parkey of Littlefield, Mrs. Gene Hollums of Anderson, Mo.; and her father, C. L. Jarrett of Floydada. Funeral services for Mrs. Banks were held yesterday afternoon in the Amarillo Primitive Baptist Church with the Elder E. J. Norman officiating. Burial was in Llano Ceme-

June 1, 1966, Coker said. Late in April, the VA expects to have application blanks and full information available at all VA offices and at the admission offices in most approved schools.


