The second annual Easter Egg Hunt, sponsored by Producer's Coop Elevator of Floydada, will be held here Saturday, across the street west of the high school, according to Bill Cagle, manager of the firm.

Children from toddlers through 10 year olds are invited to participate, and the parents are urged to bring their children and watch the fun.

At 10 A.M. the toddlers to 5 years will take to the field to try to find the eggs, and particularly the prize eggs that will be hidden somewhere in the field.

At 2 P.M. the 5 year olds through 10 years of age will toe the line then race across the field at the starters whistle to try their luck with the hidden eggs.

Prizes will be given for the prize eggs.

Floyd Crop Sign-Ups Virtually Complete

The sign-ups for the 1966 farm programs, have virtually been completed by the ASCS office here in Floydada. In all areas, over 95% of the farmers have responded to the programs.

The cotton sign-ups were the highest with 98.2% of the county farmers putting their farms into the program for the year. There are around 1,400 cotton farms in the county.

The feed grain sign-ups reached 96.8% of all farms in the county by press time this week and 96.9% of the wheat farms in the county had been placed in the program.

Thursday, March 31, is the final day a person may place his farm in the programs mentioned above or the Crop-Land Adjustment Program, which retires an allotted crop on the farm from five to ten years.

The farmers in the county, for the most part, took the 35% diversion on the cotton acreage, primarily because the price paid for the cotton grown in this area does not compete in the textile market with that grown in other sections of this country and foreign countries.

An article from a recent issue of The Southern Textile News, states that "The entire two million bale High Plains crop is not soon likely to be in the 1-1/8 inch staple range, but certainly a good portion of it will be out of the short staple category within the next two or three years."

"Until now Plains farmers haven't had much trouble deciding what seed to plant," the article states, "because there has been no great pressure to produce any particular quality or variety."

"But it's getting to be different and more and more farmers on the Plains are determined to grow cotton that will sell on the market instead of going into the government loan."

That difference, as the article points out, is largely one of price and markets. Hence the emphasis on quality.

The author of the article, James S. Parker states that to get a better price for their produce and regain some of their markets, Plains farmers know they will have to switch to varieties that produce the fiber mills are buying--longer and stronger fiber.

He goes on to say that the move to improved cotton quality and new varieties on the Plains is not only coming, it is already underway.

A number of Floyd County farmers have tried the long staple cotton in the past. Throughout the Plains, however, the growing season is the limiting factor in producing the long-staple crop.

Registration Of Vehicles Nears Total Of 5,200

With the deadline for registering vehicles Friday, the County Tax Assessor-Collector's office shows a total of near 5,200 vehicles registered at this time.

Through March 28 4,200 had been registered, an additional 700 were added Monday and about 500 Tuesday.

Last year nearly 7,000 vehicles were registered by the office when the April 1 deadline had passed last year.

Another vehicle deadline, that of safety inspection is not so near, but a rush is always expected by the inspection stations.

According to Homer Garrison, Jr., of the Texas Department of Public Safety, approximately 2,185,000 vehicles have been inspected.

This leaves a total of over 1,378,000 yet to be inspected. This breaks down to an average of 12 cars per day per station.

AT DOUGHERTY In-Season Weevil Control To Be Explained At Meet

A low cost method of in-season control of the boll weevil will be explained by an Extension Service entomologist in a meeting at 7:30 p.m. April 4, in the Dougherty School.

Entomologist Don Rummel, of Lubbock, will discuss an in-season control system in which a few timely applications are used to keep weevil populations at low levels throughout the summer.

Wilson said Rummel and other entomologists across the nation developed the new in-season control recommendations from data gathered in the diapause control program and in other research.

AT LOCAL DANCE 'Computer A Go-Go' To Give New Twist

A new twist will be given to dancing at an event set Saturday night at 8 p.m. in the Floydada High School Gymnasium. It is entitled "Computer A Go-Go," and is just what the title implies. A computer matches the first "Go" with the second "Go." The partners at the dance, at least for a time, will be matched by a computer, according to Student Council representatives, sponsors of the event. A group of students in Boston, Mass., working on the graduate studies, developed the computer, the question sheet and answer card that is designed to match the personality of a certain boy with a similar personality of a girl, thus making them the proper dates for each other. A total of 132 questionnaires were mailed in to the computer, and an additional 25 will be expected to attend the dance. The students participating in the Computer Dance, answered 50 questions ranging from (multiple choice), "are you beautiful or handsome, below average, etc.," "what is your favorite sport?" "my date should be very thin, thinner than most, average, heavier than most, very heavy?"

"People need convenient places to park just as much as cars do," says Whitney North Seymour, Jr., president of the Park Association of New York City, Inc.

In a booklet entitled "New Parks for New York," Mr. Seymour said that small parks in cities "would increase the value of adjoining properties, quite probably well in excess of the park's cost."

Observation in Paris and other European cities shows that parks on small city lots can work perfectly well, Mr. Seymour states. "Above all," he concludes, "the important consideration is people. We have many congested areas in New York - both residential and business - where there are no parks at all within walking distance. We hope the ideas presented here will help provide a workable means for creating cheerful new parks where they will serve the people who need them."

The illustrated booklet is an admirable exposition of the vital need for small inexpensive parks in American cities. The Park Association of New York City, Inc. is located at 15 Gramercy Park, New York, N.Y. 10003. "From the point of view of the city itself, such a system of midtown parks makes very good sense," the booklet states.

"There is an increased need to develop new concepts so, however planners and, indeed, all of us can deal with the problems of making highways more aesthetically attractive and compatible with the environment," says William Babcock in "Design of the Highway."

"We believe the American motorist deserves the best view from the road of a more beautiful America," Fred Farr, in "Scenic Roads and Parkways."

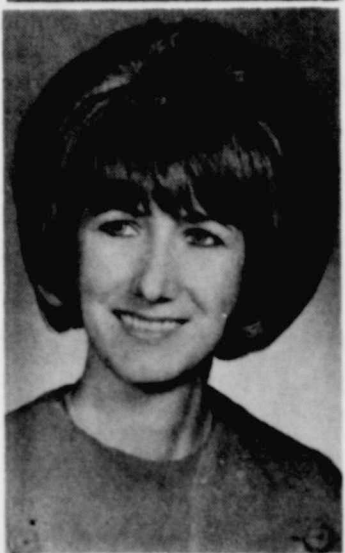

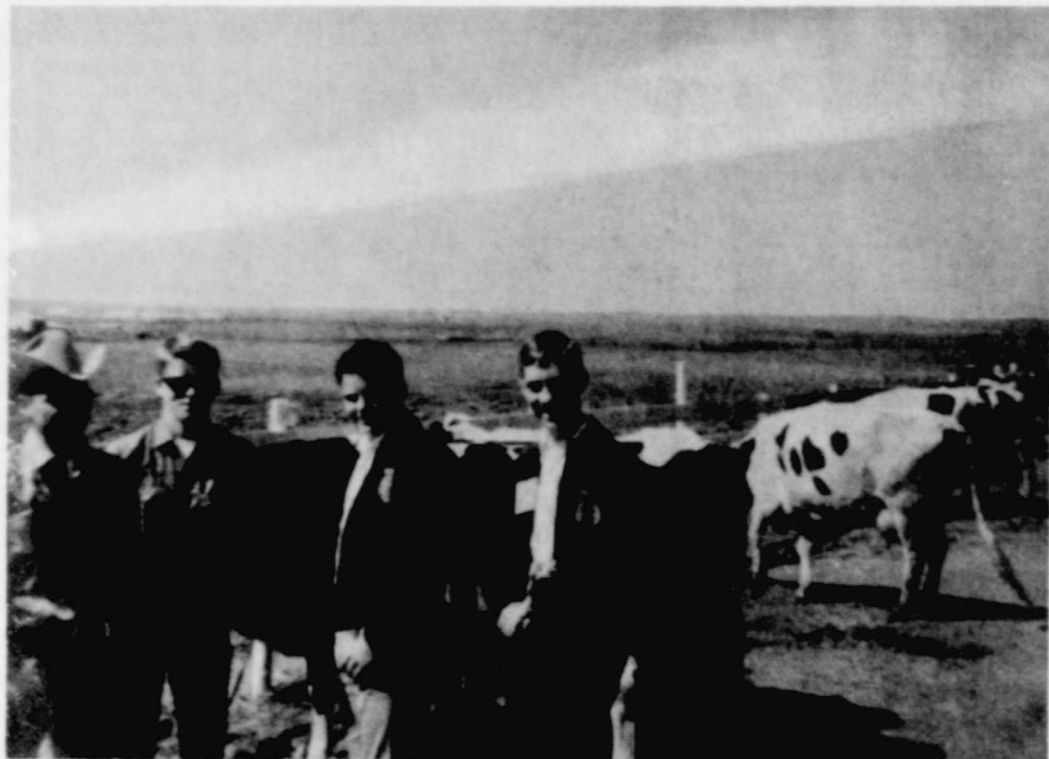
FFA Teams In Contests At Sweetwater

SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

Changes In Agriculture Create More Decisions Regarding Crops

With the many changes in agriculture, farm owners and operators face many decisions on the type and amounts of crops to plant. Regardless of the plan chosen an important consideration should be given to a planned system of rotating high residue crops along with cotton.

These high residue crops such as grain sorghum, double-rowed soybeans, castor beans, and small grains should be grown on the land a minimum of one year in 3 (or a substitute of cotton burs could be used) for the Pullman type soils which are predominate in our area. These high residue crops will return much organic matter to the soil. This is very important in preserving the desirable qualities of these Pullman soils.

These same high residue crops as well as sudan, millet,

or guar could be used as a cover crop on diverted acres in order to add organic matter and also to help control erosion. The importance of cover on these acres will prove to be a worth while practice to help hold the soils in place.

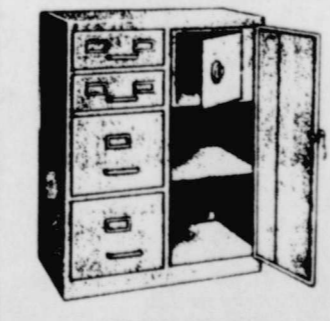

Accidents In Floyd Cost \$1,540,000

(Special to the Hesperian)

NEW YORK — From the point of view of safety, are residents of Floyd County living more hazardously or less so than people in other areas?

Do the records show that the chances of a local resident becoming involved in an accident—fatal or otherwise—are greater or smaller than elsewhere?

The Government's annual vital statistics survey, released by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, shows just what the odds are.

It comes at a time when attention has been focused on the accident problem by President Johnson's message to Congress calling for legislation that would improve safety, especially on the highway.

The Government feels that it must take a hand in the situation because of the mounting toll—107,000 lost in the past year as a result of accidents of all types, including 49,000 due to auto accidents.

The latest official figures from the Public Health Service, covering the year ending January 1, 1964, show that there were 11 fatal accidents among residents of Floyd County, of which 5 were attributed to motor vehicles.

Related to the local population, it represented a rate of 83 fatalities per 100,000 people.

The local rate was comparatively high. Throughout the United States as a whole, the average toll was 53 per 100,000. In the State of Texas it was

58. The enormity of the accident problem is seen in figures from the Public Health Service. They show that more than 50 million persons in the United States received injuries in accidents last year that required medical attention and disabled them for at least a day.

In other words, for every person who dies as the result

of an accident, 460 others who suffer serious injuries. The economic cost to the country, in lost bills, property damage, reduced production, is more than \$15 billion.

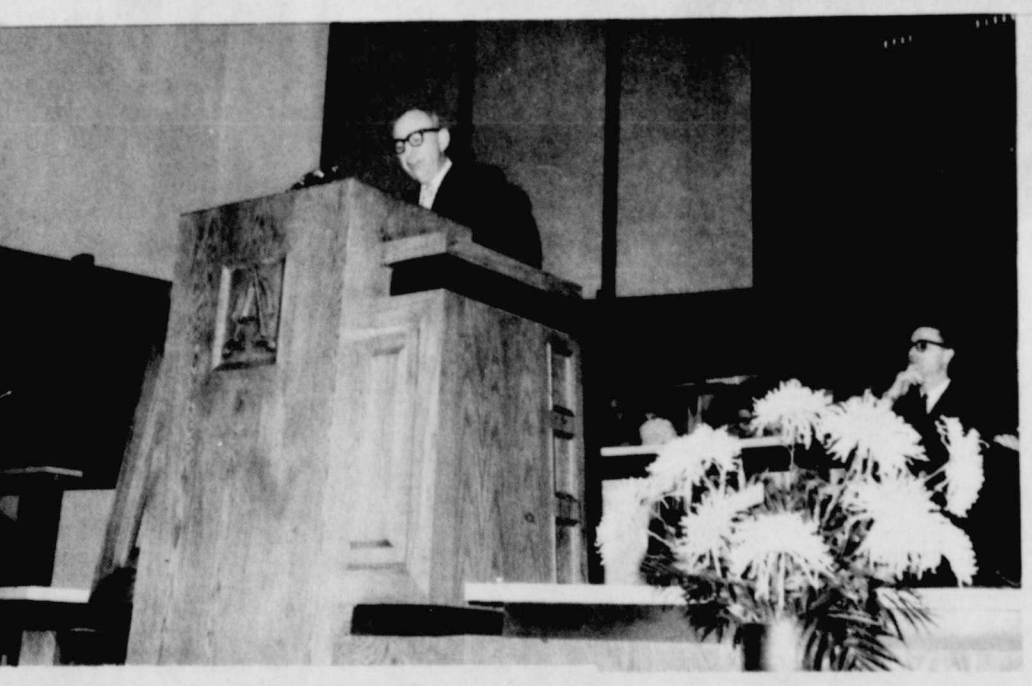
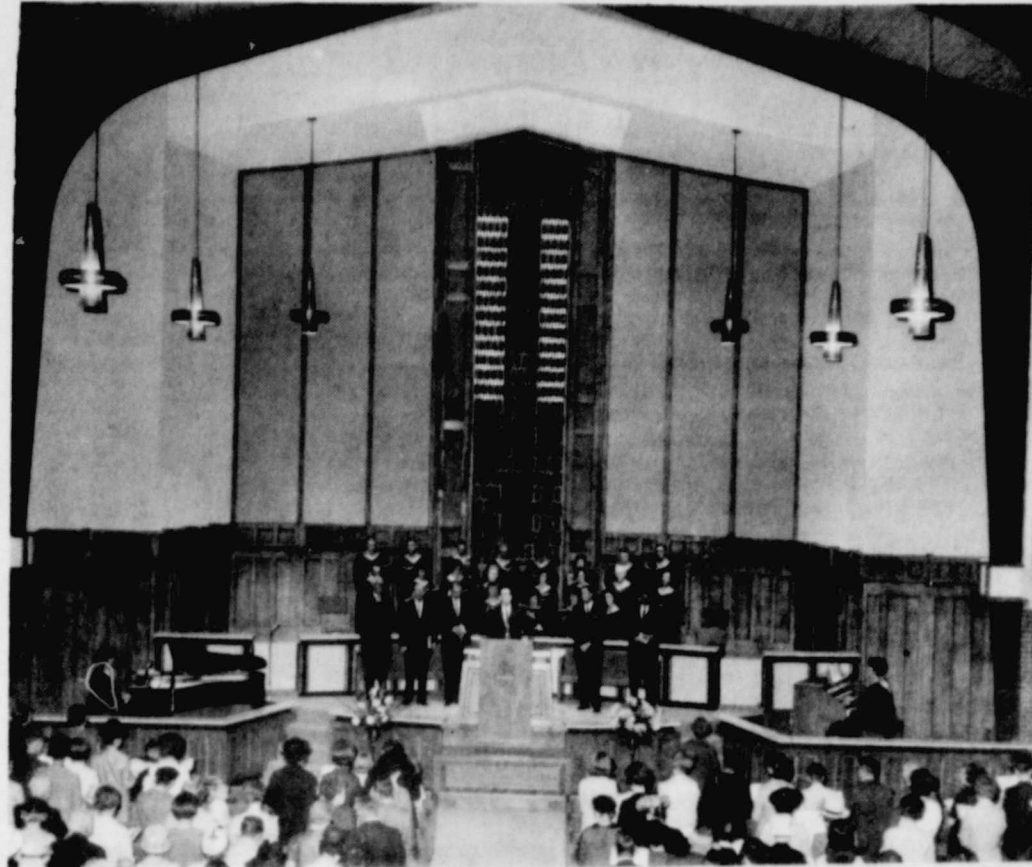

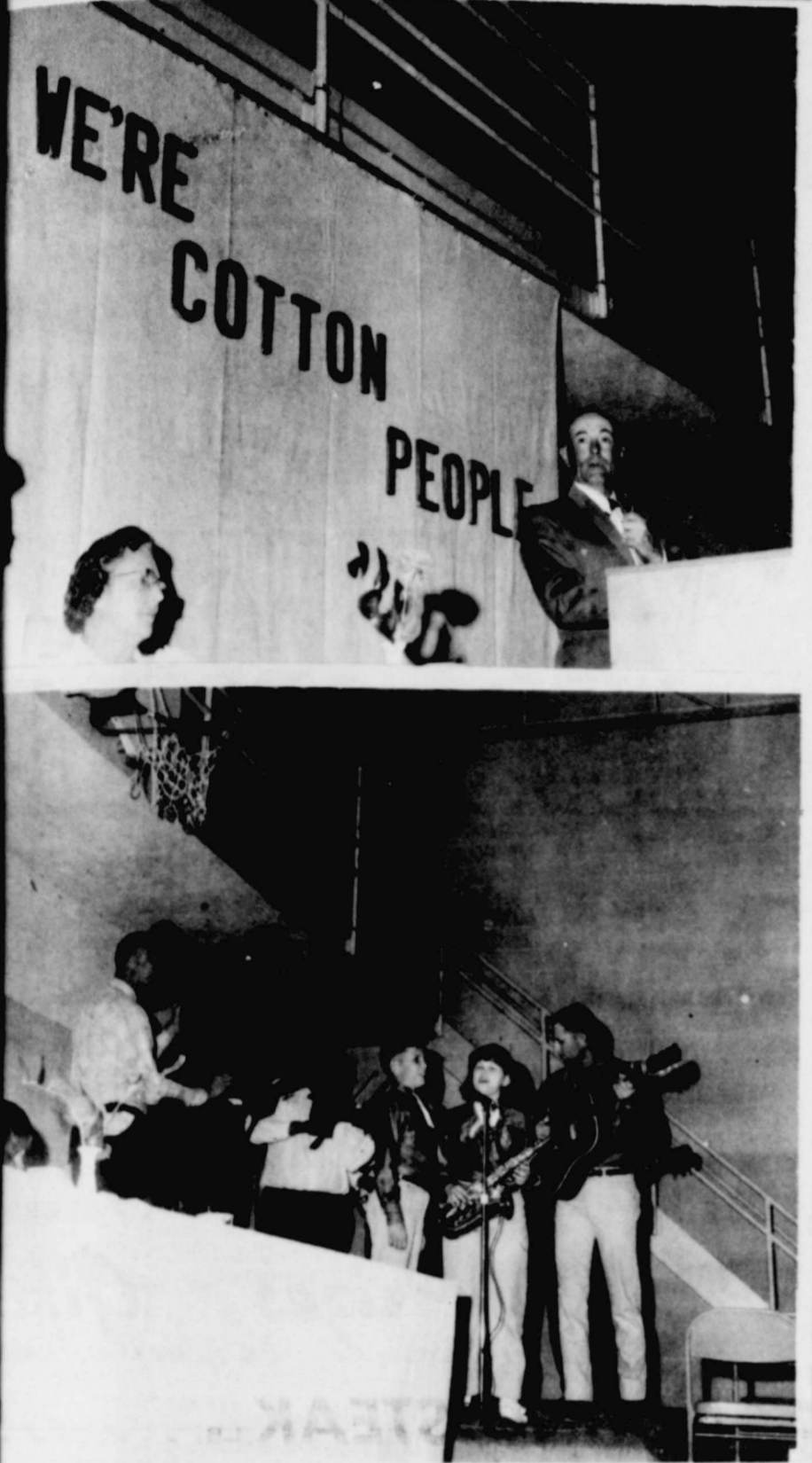

"Your cross becomes a life stretched out
to show what God is like."
This was the ringing challenge to residents

tian progress squarely on the individual church
members rather than the paid or professional
church leaders. It is typical of the brilliant
new and different approach of the visiting min-
ister.
Wichita Falls has had many excellent
speakers and preachers both in our own
churches and among the many visitors. But
never before have the words of any man stirred
the community as have those of Dr. Mar-
ney. His approach has discarded all of the
trite and traditional themes.
This challenge for every professing
Christian to dedicate his time, means and
talent to church work is one of his most im-
portant themes. Dr. Marney says each church
member must be a priest.
A Christian can not serve by merely attend-
ing church once a week or merely supporting
with funds the work done by the ministers
and hired staff. Dr. Marney says we must
use every possible intelligence to be a priest.
We must aid the poor and suffering. A Chris-
tian must listen to those in grief and comfort
them. He must feed the hungry and bind up
the wounds of those injured. He must speak
up the message of Christ at every opportunity.
And live to reflect credit to God.
The visiting minister said each church mem-
ber puts nothing into his religion until he
personally participates in its services. Until
he gives of himself, he has given nothing.
Wichita Falls will always be a finer place
because Dr. Marney has visited us for a while.
