Post Office Remodeling Gets Underway Today

Front Door To Be Locked At Night

"Please excuse the inconvenience." Words to this effect will be found around and in the post office here for the next four weeks while remodeling is going on. Work will begin today, Thursday, on the remodeling project that will result in a complete reworking of the interior of the building. However, this is a sign of progress, as the signs may state.

The new post office will feature all new box sections, a bank type counter, office space in the southwest corner, and the entire ceiling will be lowered to eight feet. The boxes will be in a straight line near the east wall of the building. When finished the post office will have a double front door which will allow the personnel to lock the area leading to the counters and offices and still allow people to get to their boxes to pick up the mail.

Post office patrons are urged to please excuse the inconvenience and note the new hours during the remodeling. Weekdays patrons may pick up their mail anytime between 7 a.m. and 6 p.m. Sunday they may pick up their mail from 8 a.m. until 1 p.m. The windows at the counter will continue to open at 8:30 a.m.

Hightower Announces For Senator From State's 30th Senatorial District

State Senator Jack Hightower of Vernon today formally announced his candidacy in the Democratic Primary for reelection to a second term in the Texas Senate. He seeks election in the new 30th Senatorial District which includes Floyd County.

Senator Hightower, 39, was the choice of a wide margin of voters in 1964 to succeed the well-known Sen. George "Cotton" Moffett of Chilitcothe, longtime agricultural leader.

During his first term in the Senate, Sen. Hightower became

well-known as an effective and dedicated legislator. He has achieved the enviable record of appointment as chairman of an important committee and a member of twelve of the Senate's committees, some of the most important of which are: Water and Conservation; Fi-

Trio Escapes Injury When Airplane Flips

Three men, two from Floydada and one from Plainview, escaped injury when the airplane in which they were riding went off a runway and flipped over. They were Babe Jones and Lonnie Hinsley of Floydada and James Miller of Plainview, owner of the plane.

Miller was demonstrating the plane to the two passengers when the mishap occurred. As he set the plane down on the runway, coasted for a short distance then applied the brakes, the plane went into a spin, off the runway and flipped over.

It was apparent that when the pilot touched the brakes to bring the plane to a halt, the right brake locked and the left brake failed to hold, causing the plane to spin to the right.

The three men alighted from the plane after it stopped. The pilot and the passengers escaped harm, but the plane suffered considerable damage.

Mrs. Hinsley said regarding the incident, "They were lucky to come out of the accident as they did. Lonnie has been taking flying lessons and trying to get me to, but this makes me back up and take a second look at it."

The mishap occurred at Lloyd's Field just south of Floydada.

 nance; State Affairs; Counties, Cities and Towns; and Agriculture and Livestock. He has been named by the Lieutenant Governor to two interim committees to make studies of the Texas Election Laws and the needs of the Nursing Profession in Texas. The findings and recommendations of these committees will be made to the next legislature.

Senator Hightower's distinguished service earned him appointment by Governor Connally as a delegate to the Southern Regional Education Board Conference on Higher Education. His effectiveness has been fully demonstrated in his support of important legislative measures concerning water and soil conservation, education, law enforcement, water and air pollution, health etc.

Senator Hightower has an impressive record of public service. He served two years in the Texas House of Representatives and seven years as District Attorney. In 1957 he was appointed by the Governor to the Texas Law Enforcement Study Commission, and at the time of his election to the Texas Senate, was vice-chairman of the Board of Regents of Midwestern University.

A native of Memphis, Texas,

where his mother, Mrs. Walter Hightower, still resides, Sen. Hightower moved to Vernon in 1951 to begin the practice of law upon his graduation from Baylor University. He served in the U. S. Navy during World War II.

He is a leader in civic, religious and fraternal affairs on the local and state level. His wife, the former Colleen Ward, is a native of Tulsa, Texas, and is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Ward of that city. They have three daughters, Ann, 13, Amy 9, and Allison, 6.

The recent Supreme Court decision concerning redistricting caused a major rearrangement of Senatorial Districts in West Texas.  pesticide before planting the onions, according to Dr. Kyle.

"But the infestations have never been bad enough in this area to warrant any normal procedure, nor has any been bad enough in the valley. I have known of just a few isolated cases around Hareford that have been hurt," Dr. Kyle stated.

The eggs are laid in the soil by the adult fly. When the eggs hatch the maggots bore through the small onions, eat through the plant and emerge as an adult fly.

Since this is a new problem in this area, the two entomologists are only in an investigation stage at the present. They plan to make a survey of all the onion acres in Floyd County around the first of May.

Fleet Fugitive Eludes Officers Of Six Cities

PLAINVIEW—A manhunt contacted southwest of Lockney Tuesday of last week by officers from six cities searching for an unidentified Negro man has been called off, according to spokesmen for Hale and Floyd County Sheriff's offices.

Floyd County Deputy Sheriff Cap Carthel of Lockney comments, "He's probably a thousand miles away from here by now."

The man, described by Petersburg Constable L. E. Lain as about five feet nine inches tall, approximately 30 years of age and "very fast moving," eluded a cordon of officers from Abernathy, Petersburg, Plainview, Lockney and Floydada and a canine corps from Lubbock.

BURGLARY SUSPECT
Although officers believed Tuesday he might have stolen three cars, Deputy Carthel said today "All we really can accuse him of is burglarizing Rowland-Gordon Farm Chemical Co. at Petersburg and stealing one car."

The man, driving a read car, was apprehended in Petersburg between 1 and 2 a.m. Tuesday by Constable Lain. Lain gave chase in his police car and stopped the man about one and one-half miles west of Petersburg, "While I was checking his driver's license, the man suddenly ran," Lain said.

Earlier, Rowland - Gordon had been burglarized of \$25 and an electric razor, and Lain had found an abandoned car in Petersburg stolen at Abernathy, Lain said. The razor was found in the red car.

Hale County officers were called into the case and a car stolen from Petersburg farmer Ray Hillman was found four miles southwest of Lockney about 3 a.m. Floyd County officers entered the case and a canine corps was summoned from Lubbock.

PROWLER REPORTED
Mr. and Mrs. Chester Mitchell who farm six miles southwest of Lockney said Tuesday they believed they had a prowler about 3 a.m.

Deputy Carthel stated today the Mitchell's farm laborer said he saw someone walking around his house about 3 a.m. Tuesday morning, the Mitchells found tracks around their farm vehicles.

Mrs. Mitchell said at a nearby house, owned by her father-in-law and occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Robert Austin, someone apparently had attempted to start a car. She said either the car would not start or the intruder became frightened and "threw the keys down and ran."

Carthel stated, "We are still looking for the man but we do not believe he is still in the Lockney area."

Social Security Office Helping Applicants Prove Dates Of Birth

"As in years past, the Social Security Administration is ready, willing, and able to help you obtain proof of your age." This statement came today from Maudie King, social security officer-in-charge in Plainview.

In answer to recent questions about his agency's proof of age requirements, King reported that several weeks ago social security offices all over the country started asking people for better proof of age.

"Social security's proof of age requirements will not prevent anyone from qualifying for retirement benefits or medicare, and may actually enable a person to get benefits he didn't know about. We ask for a person's birth or baptismal record if he has one. If he doesn't, we want the best evidence he has or can easily obtain. Ordinarily, the oldest evidence is the best, though there are many cases where this is not so. When there is no old record easily obtainable, a person can establish his age on the basis of more recent evidence.

"The primary reason for the proof of age requirement is to assure that every person gets the right benefit at the right time. Because of the large sums that can be paid out in cash benefits and in reimbursement for hospital and medical expenses, it is important that the determination of a person's

age be accurate. In the vast majority of cases, a person knows his correct date of birth, but occasionally we find someone who is younger or, more often, older than he thought. The proof of age requirement is a provision of the Social Security Act."

King suggested that "anyone applying for retirement benefits or for medicare insurance should bring in his birth or baptismal record if he has one. If he does not have either of these, he should bring the best evidence he has. However, no one should delay applying for these benefits simply because he does not have proof of his age. Delay could mean loss of benefits.

"When a person applies, we will be happy to assist him in proving his age. Just visit the social security office in Plainview or phone us at CA3-4371." The address is 1401-B West 5th Street, Plainview.

Where a husband and wife file a joint return, they should list both numbers in the spaces provided on page 1 of the 1965 Federal income tax return.

Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue for northern Texas, said that omission of the number delays the processing of the return, and inconveniences both the taxpayer and the government.

If you do not have a Social Security number, application Form SS-5 may be obtained from your local Internal Revenue Service office, Social Security Administration office or most Post Offices. You should file the application as soon as possible.

These two diseases have caused concern here in Floyd County the past few years. Dr. Berry will explain how to recognize the diseases as well as give the recommendations to treat and prevent the diseases.

Dr. Berry will also include a part on the program about nematodes. This microscopic insect has been known to damage crops here in Floyd County. It generally is found in sandy soils.

Although most all crops are susceptible to this soil borne insect that attacks the roots of plants, vegetables have been damaged more by the insect than other crops here in Floyd County.

LET'S KEEP OUR KITE FLYING KIDS HAPPY-AND ALIVE!

The brisk spring winds will mark the arrival of kite flying time. Kite fliers in abundance will dot the countryside. The brisk spring winds and summer breezes will have the kids out for many months.

Many of these children will be flying kites for the first time. Others will be "old timers" at this ancient art. But we can be certain of one thing - they will thoroughly immerse themselves in the sport of kite flying and perhaps subject themselves to grave danger.

Power lines always seem to get in the way of kites and that is where the element of danger exists. The string of the kite may conduct electricity to the kite flyer.

Youngsters don't understand this and even when they do, they often forget about it when involved in kite flying. Parents and other adults should caution children to fly kites in open fields only. Wet string or metallic string are good conductors of electricity and therefore should never be used.

Tell your youngsters that if their kite ever gets caught in a power line to let go of the string immediately. Don't try to rescue or pull down a kite caught in the power lines. Call the utility company. You'll save yourself and the utility a lot of grief.

Caution your children not to fly kites near power lines - that means danger. Flying in open fields means fun and safety from electric wires - and peace of mind for adults.

Cold Water Laundering Facts Told

What happens to the bacteria count when homemakers launder with cold water detergents?

Many inquiries have been received along this line, and to answer these inquiries the U. S. Department of Agriculture began new tests with actual family washes.

This was done as part of long range research on survival of bacteria in home laundering, using both hot and cold water, says Sherry Mullin county home demonstration agent. Earlier studies indicated that large numbers of bacteria survive laundering with both hot and cold water.

In recent tests with cold water detergent, comparisons were made with and without disinfectants. The same concentration of disinfectants were used with cold water which proved effective with hot water.

With no disinfectant, far more bacteria survived in cold water than in hot water washes. When scientists added the appropriate amount of chlorine in the wash cycle, or quarter-ary disinfectants in the rinse, bacteria count was cut to 4 or less per square inch of fabric at the end of the spin-dry cycle-regardless of the water temperature.

When laundry was washed in cold water with a cold water detergent, on the other hand, the addition of phenolic or pine oil disinfectants in the wash cycle was relatively ineffective in reducing the bacteria level.

Water temperatures ranged from 57 to 64 degrees Fahrenheit during cold water laundering and 122 to 140 degrees Fahrenheit during hot water laundering.

INCOME TAX Local Residents To Pay \$2,849,000

(Special to the Hesperian)

NEW YORK, Mar. 26 - Residents of Floyd County are getting a sharp reminder, as they ready themselves for the April 15th deadline, of the huge bite that the Government is taking out of their earnings.

Last year they turned in approximately \$2,614,000 in personal income taxes to the Federal coffers.

And this year, because of the improved employment situation and the higher average earnings per family, they will be paying even more than that, according to the Administration's expectations.

Just how much of an increase is being counted on, in general, is indicated in the current budget. Nationally, it calls for \$51.4 billion in individual income taxes, or \$2.6 billion more than in the previous year.

Floyd County's share of the tax load was determined by an

Peace Corps To Test On April 9

Floydada area residents interested in putting their skills to use in developing nations around the world are invited to take the Peace Corps placement test at 9 a.m. on Saturday, April 9 at Post Office Building, Lubbock, Texas.

The Peace Corps uses the placement test to determine how an applicant can best be utilized overseas. The test measures general aptitude and the ability to learn a language, not education or achievement. (If test scores indicated a limited language-learning ability, for example, the Peace Corps tries to place the applicant in an English-speaking country.)

The placement test requires no preparation and is non-competitive - an applicant can neither pass nor fail.

The application form, not the placement test, is the most important factor in the selection of Volunteers. Persons interested in serving in the Peace Corps must fill out an application, if they have not already done so, and present it to the tester before taking the test. Applications may be obtained from local post offices or from the Peace Corps, Washington, D. C. 20525.

The placement test takes about an hour and a half. An optional achievement test for applicants who have studied French or Spanish requires another hour.

unofficial breakdown of the returns received from the State of Texas as a whole. The statewide total was \$1,867,000,000, according to the Treasury Department, including what was collected via withholding.

It shows that local residents contributed an estimated 0.14 percent of this state total, or \$2,614,000.

Their contribution this April, reflecting the income gains during the past year, is expected to be in the neighborhood of \$2,849,000, or about \$235,000 more than before.

Large as this amount is, it may be the smallest sum they will be called upon to pay, on an annual basis, for some time to come.

The indications from Washington are that taxes will have to go up in the not-distant future to meet the various financial pressures with which the country is contending.

However, by virtue of the new tax withholding bill just passed by Congress, the financial jolt that comes on April 15th each year will be practically eliminated in the future.

A graduated withholding rate, ranging from 14 percent to 30 percent, depending on income, will replace the present flat 14 percent rate beginning May 1st.

For those in the middle and upper brackets, it will mean less money to spend during the year but, by the same token, fewer headaches on April 15th. April 15th.

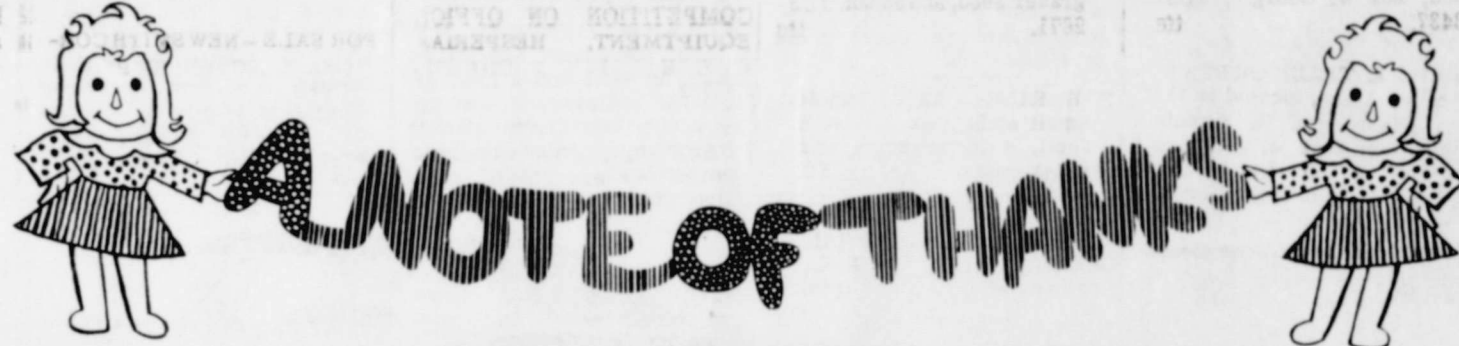

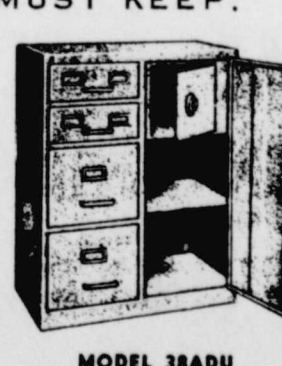

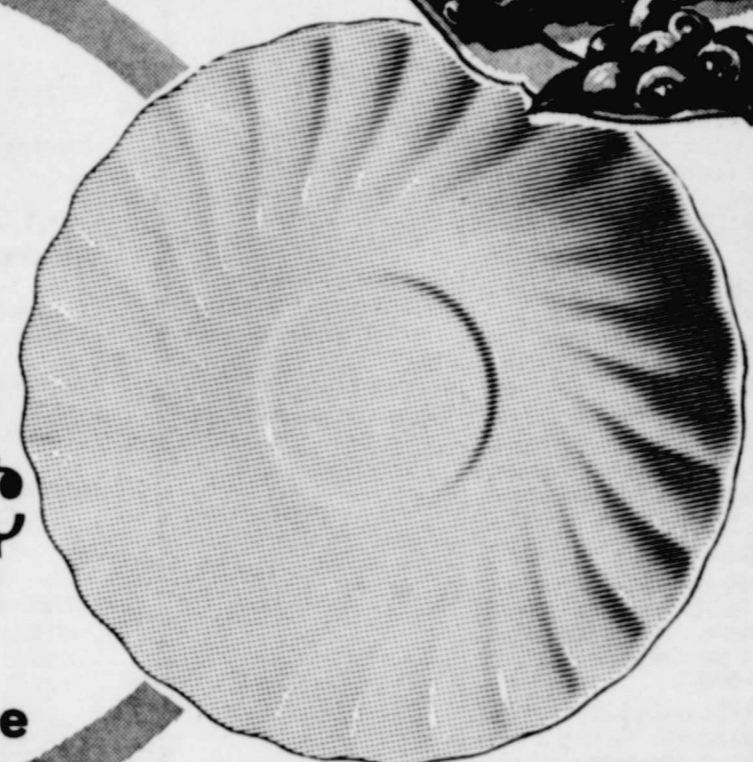
