

Trio Escapes Injury When Airplane Flips

Three men, two from Floydada and one from Plainview, escaped injury when the airplane in which they were riding went off a runway as the plane was landing, went into a plowed field and flipped over. They were Babe Jones and Lonnie Hinsley of Floydada and James Miller of Plainview, owner of the plane.

Miller was demonstrating the plane to the two passengers when the mishap occurred As he set the plane down on the runway, coasted for a short distance then applied the brakes, the plane went into a spin, off the runway and flipped over.

It was apparent that when the pilot touched the brakes to bring the plane to a halt, the right brake locked and the left brake failed to hold, causing the plane to spin to the right.

The three men alighted from the plane after it stopped. The pilot and the passengers escaped harm, but the plane suffered considerable damage. Mrs. Hinsley said regard-

PCG Sets Floyd **Bale Count At** 121,337 For 1965

A news release from Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. in Lubbock set the final bale count from the 23 Texas High Plains counties represented by PCG at 2,205,097 bales in 1965. Floyd County is credited with 121,-337 of these bales, as compared with 120,174 counted by PCG for 1964 production.

This is the third argest crop on record for the area and is over 300,000 bales above the 1,899,351 bale total for 1564.

The last 1965 Water and Conservation; Fiestimate of High Plains pro-duction, issued jointly by the Lubbock Cotton Exchange and Plains Cotton Growers last December 1, was 2,273,000 bales, slightly over three percent above actual production.

The 23-county High Plains area accounted for 14.79 percent, or about one-seventh of the 14,912,461 bale total U. S. production, and 47.62 percent, almost one-half, of the bales grown in cotton.

Lubbock again led all High Plains counties with 271,943 bales, and was the fifth largest producer in the nation behind California's Fresno and Kern counties, each with over 400,000 bales, and Maricopa and Pinal counties in Arizona, with 304,753 and 277,141 bales respectively. Other High Plains counties ranking in the nation's top ten were Hale, eighth, and

Hockley, tenth. Other High Plains counties leading the Texas production were Hale with 216,475, Hockley with 199,288, Lamb with 193,141 and Lynn with 185,619. These were followed in Texas by Hidalgo County which turned out 169,739 bales.

Other High Plains counties topping Floyd's production were Terry and Crosby counties with 142,261 and 151,155 bales respectively.



The eggs are laid in the soil by the adult fly. When the eggs hatch the maggots bore through the small onions, eat through the plant and emerge as an adult

Since this is a new problem in this area, the two entomologists are only in an investigation stage at the present. They plan to make a survey of all the onion acres in Floyd County around the first of May.





Social Security Office Helping Applicants Prove Dates Of Birth

"As in years past, the Social Security Administration is ready, willing, and able to help you obtain proof of your age." This statement came today from Mancie King, social security officer - in - charge in Plainview.

In answer to recent questions about his agency's proof of age requirements, King reported that several weeks ago social security offices all over the country started asking people for better proof of age.

"Social security's proof of age requirements will not prevent anyone from qualifying for retirement benefits or medicare, and may actually enable a person to get benefits he didn't know about. We ask for a person's birth or baptismal record if he has one. If he doesn't, we want the best evidence he has or can easily obtain. Ordinarily, the oldest evidence is the best, though there are many cases where this is not so. When there is no old record easily obtainable, a person can establish his age on the basis

of more recent evidence. "The primary reason for the proof of age requirement is to assure that every person gets the right benefit at the right time. Because of the large sums that can be paid out in cash benefits and in reimbursement for hospital and medical expenses, it is important that the determination of a person's

age be accurate. In the vast majority of cases, a person knows his correct date of birth, but occasionally we find someone who is younger or, more often, older than he thought. The proof of age requirement is a provision of the Social Security

King suggested that "anyone applying for retirment benefits or for medicare insurance should bring in his birth or baptismal record if he has one. If he does not have either of these, he should bring the best evidence he has. However, no one should delay applying for these benefits simply because he does not have proof of his age. Delay could mean loss of

"When a person applies, we will be happy to assist him in proving his age. Just visit the social security office in Plainview or phone us at CA3-4371." The address is 1401-B West 5th Street, Plainview.

LET'S KEEP OUR KITE FLY-ING KIDS HAPPY-AND ALIVE! The brisk spring winds will mark the arrival of kite flying time. Kite fliers in abundance will dot the countryside. The brisk spring winds and summer breezes will have the kids out

for many months.

Many of these children will be flying kites for the first time. Others will be "old timers" at this ancient art. But we can be certain of one thing – they will thoroughly im merse themselves in the sport of kite flying and perhaps subject themselves to grave danger.

Power lines always seem to get in the way of kites and that is where the element of danger exists. The string of the kite may conduct electricity to the kite flyer.

Youngsters don't understand this and even when they do, they often forget about it when involved in kite flying. Parents and other adults should caution children to fly kites in open fields only. Wet string or metallic string are good conductors of electricity and therefore should never be used.

Cold Water Laundering

Facts Told
by Sherry Mullins

What happens to the bacteria count when homemakers launder with cold water detergents?

Many inquiries have been received along this line, and to answer these inquiries the U.S. Department of Agriculture began new tests with actual family washes.

This was done as part of long range research on survival of bacteria in home laundering, using both hot and cold water, says Sherry Mullin county home demonstration agent. Earlier studies indicated that large numbers of bacteria survive laundering with both hot and cold water.

In recent tests with cold water detergent, comparisons were made with and without disinfectants. The same concentration of disinfectants were used with cold water which proved effective with hot water.

With no disinfectant, far more bacteria survived in cold water than in hot water washes. When scientists added the appropriate amount of chlorine in the wash cycle, or quarternary disinfectants in the rinse, bacteria count was cut to 4 or less per square inch of fabric at the end of the spindry cycle-regardless of the water temperature.

When laundry was washed in cold water with a cold water detergent, on the other hand, the addition of phenolic or pine oil disinfectants in the wash cycle was relatively ineffective in reducing the bacteria level.

NEW YORK, Mar. 26 - Residents of Floyd County are getting a sharp reminder, as they ready themselves for the April 15th deadline, of the huge bite that the Government is taking out of their earnings.

Last year they turned in approximately \$2,614,000 in personal income taxes to the Federal coffers.

And this year, because of the improved employment situation and the higher average earnings per family, they will be paying even more than that, according to the Administration's expectations.

Just how much of an increase is being counted on, in general, is indicated in the current budget. Nationally, it calls for \$51.4 billion in individual income taxes, or \$2.6 billion more than in the previous year. Floyd County's share of the

Peace Corps To Test On April 9

Floydada area residents interested in putting their skills to use in developing nations around the world are invited to take the Peace Corps placement test at 9 a.m. on Satur-

day, April 9 at Post Office

Building, Lubbock, Texas. The Peace Corps uses the placement test to determine how an applicant can best be utilized overseas. The test measures general aptitude and the ability to learn a language, not education or achievement. (If test scores indicated a limited language-learning ability, for example, the Peace Corps tries to place the applicant in an English-speaking country.) The placement test requres no preparation and is non-competitive - an applicant can neither pass nor fail.

The application form, not the placement test, is the most important factor in the selection of Volunteers. Persons interested in serving in the Peace Corps must fill out an application, if they have not already done so, and present it to the tester before taking the test. Applications may be obtained from local post offices or from the Peace Corps, Washington, D. C. 20525.

The placement test takes about an hour and a half. An optional achievement test for applicants who have studied French or Spanish requires another hour.
