Becomes Effective Next School Term

The Floydada Public School Trustees adopted a zoning plan of desegregation, in accordance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, at their regular meeting held last week.

The purpose of the desegregation plan is to eliminate from the school system any racial segregation of students and all other forms of discrimination based on race, color, or national origin.

The school board and the school staff will do everything they can to see to it that the rights of all students are protected and that the desegregation plan is carried out successfully, according to A. E. Baker, superintendent.

The plan must be approved by the U. S. Commissioner of Education.

Under the desegregation plan, the school each student will attend depends on where he lives. An attendance zone has been established for each school in the system. All students in the same grade who live in the same zone will be assigned to the same school, regardless of their race, color, or national origin and regardless of which school they now attend.

A student may transfer from the school to which he is assigned only under the following conditions:

(a) A student who requires a course of study not offered at the school serving his zone, or who is physically handicapped, may be granted upon his written application, to transfer to another school which is designed to fit, or offers courses for, his special needs.

(b) A school system may (1) permit any student to transfer

Commissioners Canvass Ballots In Monday Meet

The Floyd County Commissioners Court, in its regular session here Monday, canvassed the ballots in the recent school election, and voted to advertise for bids for a new motor grader.

The previous tally in the election was found to be correct by the commissioners, according to J. K. Holmes, County Judge.

Bids will be received until 10 a.m. April 25 by the commissioners on a new motor grader for use in Precinct 4. An old machine will be traded in by the county.

In other business the group paid the bills and accepted the roofing job on the Court House and the Agriculture Building that has just been completed.

City Council Discusses Purchase Of New Equipment, Buys Pickup

The Floydada City Council accepted a bid from Oden Chevrolet for a new pickup, and discussed the purchase of several new items in a long agenda during the business meeting here this week.

Oden's bid of \$1,658.63 was the low of those meeting the specifications called for on the bid. Roe Motors had a lower bid, but the cubic inch displacement of the engine and the wheel base were not up to the specifications called for in the notice to bidders.

The group voted to purchase a new blower and construct a trailer to be used in the Health Department this summer, particularly during the mosquito season. They also discussed the purchase of a tractor, with wide front wheels, to be used in Parks and Street Department, and discussed the purchase of a shredder to be used on the tractor. These items are listed in the budget for this year.

It was agreed the city will help the Baseball Association bear the expense of water and sewer taps for the newly constructed rest rooms at the baseball park. The group also voted to lease the swimming pool operation to E. L. Ginn

Airport Money Needed Now

According to a report from the city airport commission about \$10,000 of the needed \$18,000 is needed now to complete purchase of the land for the airport.

The \$18,000 had been previously pledged by firms and individuals and letters have been sent out asking for the money. In fact, it is reported that the city risks losing the \$12,000 state grant if the land is not soon purchased and work on the airport initiated.

A work day will be held at the baseball parks Tuesday afternoon and night beginning around 5:30 p.m.

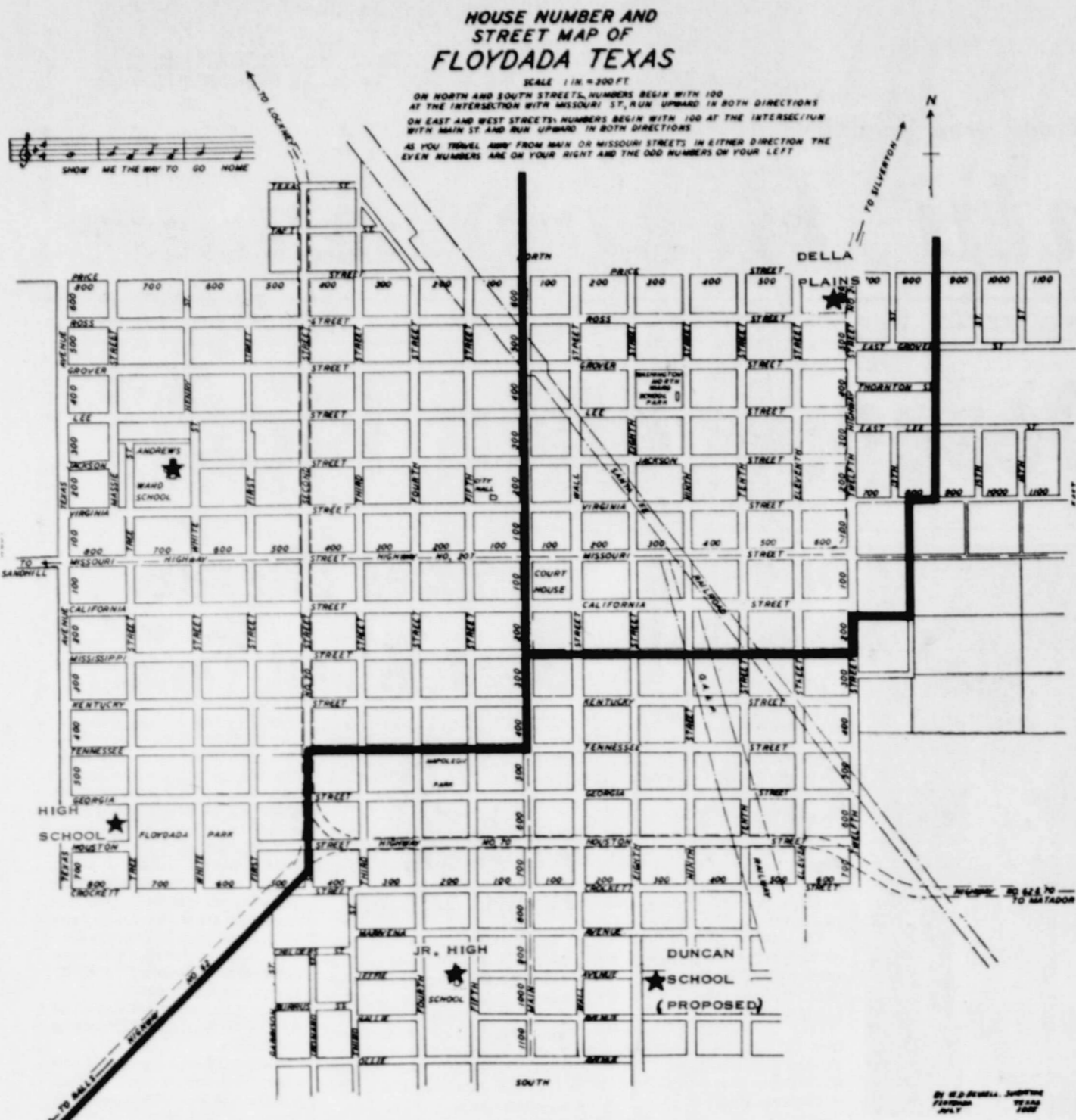
The purpose of the meeting is to clean up around the parks, and particularly around the newly constructed rest rooms there.

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from a school where students of his race are in a majority to any other school, within the system, where students of his race are a minority, or (2) assign students on such basis.

(c) A student who specifically qualifies to attend another school pursuant to the provisions of a desegregation plan accepted by the Commissioner (of Education) may be permitted, upon his written application, to transfer to such other school.

Transfers for any other reasons will not be permitted. The parent, or other adult person acting as parent, of each student enrolled in the local school system will be sent a letter telling him the name and location of the school to which the student will be assigned for the coming school year. The letter will also give information on any school bus service provided for the student's neighborhood.

A copy of this notice will be

enclosed with each letter. The same letter and notice will be sent out on the date named below for all children the school system expects to enter the school system for the first time next year. This includes children entering first grade. If the school system learns of a new student after this date, it will promptly send the student's parent such a letter and a copy of this notice.

The letter will be sent out as soon as possible. Maps showing the boundary lines of the attendance zones of every school in the school system are freely available for inspection by the public at the Superintendent's office. Individual zone maps are available at each school. One is published on page 1 of today's Hesperian.

Any revision of attendance zone boundaries will be announced by a prominent notice in a local paper at least 30 days before the change is effective.

All school-connected services, facilities, athletics, activities and programs are open to each student on a desegregated

basis. A student assigned to a new school under the provisions of the desegregation plan will not be subject to any disqualification or waiting period for participation in activities and programs, including athletics, which might otherwise apply because he is a transfer student.

All transportation furnished by the school system will also operate on a desegregated basis. Facilities will be desegregated, and no staff member will lose his position because of race, color, or national origin. This includes any case where less staff is needed because schools are closed or enrollment is reduced.

No arrangement will be made or permission granted by this school system for any students living in the community it serves to attend school in another school system, where this would tend to limit desegregation, or where the opportunity is not available to all students without regard to race, color, or national origin.

No arrangement will be made or permission granted, by this school system for any students living in another school system to attend public school in this system, where this would tend to limit desegregation, or where the opportunity is not available to all students without regard to race, color, or national origin.

In the Floydada School System grades 7-12 will attend school at the Junior High School and the High School only, whereas grades 1-6 will be conducted at the other three schools, after construction is completed on Arthur B. Duncan Elementary School.

Until the new school is completed grades 1-6 will be at Della Plains and at Andrews Ward. Three sixth grade classes will also be conducted at Junior High School until construction is completed.

When the new structure is ready for occupancy, probably around mid-term of the 1966-67 school year, those classes at Andrews Ward and at Junior High School that will attend the new school will be notified and the entire classes and their teachers will be moved to the new structure.

The "Freedom of choice" plan was considered by the local board, but turned down, because Washington, too, views the plan as a step in a transition and not a permanent situation.

The zoning decided on by the board affects only grades 1-6 and does not affect the bus students. Those 1-6 grade students riding buses to school will attend either Andrews Ward or Duncan Elementary School, thus assigning the students to schools without regard to race, color or national origin.

As the town is zoned, there will be 207 students attending Della Plains, which is the capacity of the school, 482 at Andrews Ward, 427 at Duncan Elementary School, 325 at Junior High and 400 at High School.

With the town zoned as it is, the hazard of students crossing main arteries of traffic has been cut to a minimum. Few students will have to cross one of the U. S. Highways serving

Floydada on their way to or from school. However, there will be exceptions.

The desegregation plan will be more economical for the school district in that, in addition to not losing Federal monies, there will be fewer teachers and less equipment to buy. The latter is particularly noticeable when it comes to purchasing science or homemaking equipment.

The plan will take effect at the beginning of the 1966-67 school term.

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be added from substations to form loops and interties with other facilities of the Co-op. Along with this, additional voltage regulators and capacitors will be added in Crosbyton and Aiken substations.

Lighthouse Electric Cooperative is participating in an irrigation research project in cooperation with Texas Technological College and other electric Co-ops. The three year project is aimed at reducing irrigation costs, and providing a method of more realistically determining annual irrigation operating costs, as well as providing a check on water depletion on the Plains.

This year marks the 28th consecutive year of growth for Lighthouse Electric Cooperative. As our agricultural economy continues to expand, Lighthouse Electric will be looking for new and better ways to improve the economic and living standards of the area.

Post Office Remodeling Underway

A bit of inconvenience is found around the Post Office as the remodeling of the building got underway here last week. Plans for the project call for completely remodeling the interior of the building.

Although patrons will be inconvenienced for a short time by the work, the appearance and convenience of the office, when completed, will be worth the wait, according to reports.

An office space will be built in the southwest corner of the building, bank type counters will be included, and a double front door will be installed, which will allow patrons to get to their boxes, that will be near the east wall, without going into the counter area of the building.

Consequently, the door leading to the offices and the service counters may be locked at night, and the door leading to the boxes may be left open.

Patrons may get their mail between 7 a. m. and 6 p. m. weekdays and between 8 a. m. and 1 p. m. Sunday. The service windows will be open from 8:30 a. m. until 5 p. m. each day.

ASCS NEWSLETTER Cropland Measuring Methods Announced

MEASURING UNDER THE 1966 PROGRAM: As we have advised you in previous letters, it is the responsibility of the farm operator to measure and report the acreage of crops and diverted acreage on his farm in 1966. You must measure

the acreage of wheat and barley and make your report by May 2nd and measure the acreage of cotton, grain sorghum, corn, and diverted acreage and make the report by August 15th. There are two ways you may compute the acreage. They are

as follows:
FIRST, you may pay the fee and hire an employee of our office to measure your crops after you finish planting. We will measure the crops and diverted acreage and notify you of the acreages on the farm. If you have too much cotton or feed grain, you may destroy it to get down to the permitted acreage. Any excess acreage must be plowed up before August 15th.

Lockney Man Joins Plainview Bank In New Position

In 1958, Wilson accepted a position as cashier with the Security State Bank in Littlefield and was promoted to vice president and cashier in 1961. He moved to Truth or Consequences in 1964.

Wilson and his wife, Wanda, have four children, Lavenia, 14; Joe Anna, 11; Roger, 9, and David, 6. They are members of the Baptist Church.

Former Floyd County Woman Found Dead

Charges of manslaughter have been filed against Harley Van Johnson, 42, of Hobbs, New Mex., in connection with the death of Mrs. Don Martin, 43 year old former Floyd County resident. Her body was found early Friday morning, April 1, on a deserted road northwest of Hobbs.

Relatives of the family said Mrs. Martin left her Hobbs home with Johnson for some unknown reason. He is the husband of a friend of the deceased. The dead woman was found dressed in slacks and blouse and there were no obvious marks on the body. She had left her handbag at home and apparently carried nothing with her. Autopsy reports as to cause of death had not been learned here this week by local relatives.

Authorities were told by Johnson when first questioned, that he had no knowledge of Mrs. Martin's death, but later officers found her watch inside his car. He was first charged with murder then manslaughter after he told officers that he had picked up Mrs. Martin about 5 p.m. Thursday at her home and they were driving around when she slumped over dead in the car. This means that the city will be zoned into three areas for the grades of 1-6. It also means that we will have three elementary schools. Some 207 children in the northeast area of Floydada will attend Della Plains, approximately 427 children in the southeast area of the city will attend Arthur B. Duncan Grade School, about 482 will attend the Andrews Ward grade school, 325 are expected at Junior High and 400 at High School.

It should be emphasized that only children who live in the city limits will attend their neighborhood schools according to the zoning plan. . . . but students will be assigned according to the need to fill each school.

In order to relieve some of this assignment confusion before it starts, the school office will send out letters as soon as possible to each student informing him as to where he will attend school next year.

And it should be remembered that the new grade school won't be ready for use until mid semester next year. . . . so there'll be no assignments there until that time.

In compliance with integration requirements it looks like there'll be some negro teachers in all grade schools and the Junior High school. . . . and possibly high school. White teachers have already been integrated into Della Plains this year and I expect there'll be more white teachers there next year.

Since only grades 1-6 will be taught at Della Plains next year, all students, regardless of race will attend Junior High and the High School.

The usual leaky faucet will average between 30 and 60 drops per minute — an average waste of 80 gallons a month, or 960 gallons annually, according to researchers for the A. Y. McDonald Mfg. Co., makers of products for the plumbing industry.

And, if the faucet is leaking hot water, in addition to the water waste, the homeowner is footing a cost of \$1 a month for heating heated it.

McDonald found that, along with leaky faucets, leaky underground pipes are the biggest wasters. In the average underground water supply pipe, a hole only one-sixteenth inch in diameter will waste 970 gallons daily. Should the hole be one-eighth inch, the daily loss will be 3,600 gallons — enough to fill the daily water needs of 60 persons.

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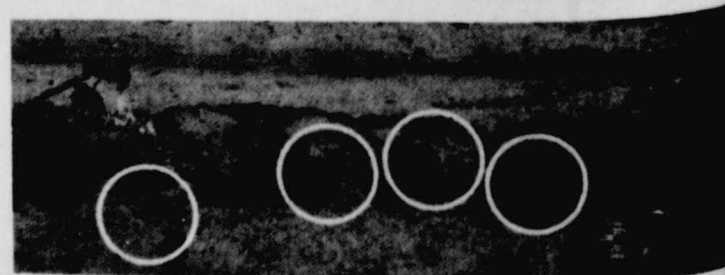
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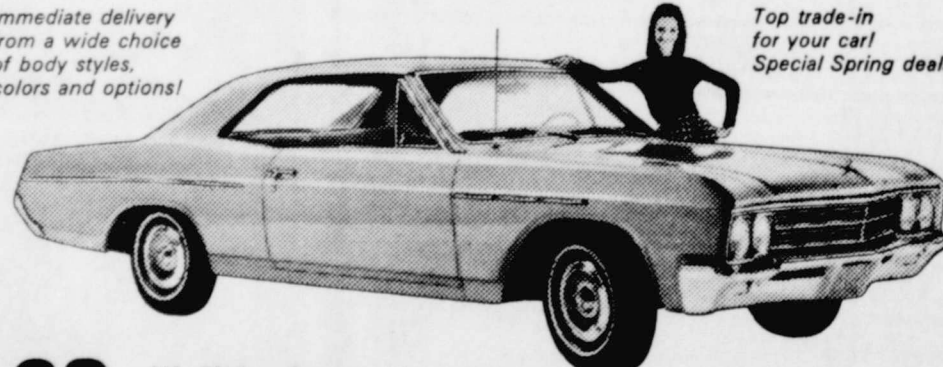

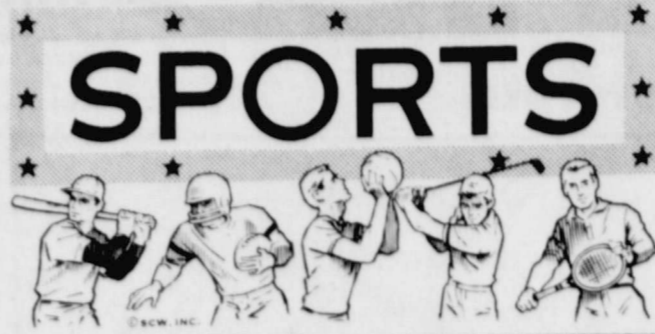

Precision Cotton Planting Yields 13 Per Cent Boosts

by Joe Wilson

Cotton yields in Texas A&M University tests are being upped a sizeable 13 percent by using reshaped beds and a new-fangled precision-depth cotton planter.

A&M Extension Specialists and researchers say most any cotton farmer can do the same. Lambert Wilkes, Agricultural engineer at A&M, designed both a bed shaper and the planter to pay the way to the higher cotton yields.

Wilkes uses the bed shaper about a month or more before planting. It smooths and leaves the beds table-top flat for faster, more accurate seed placement.

Then, he used his new precision planter on the flat beds, since the shaped beds are level on top, the usual sweep which runs in front of the furrow opener on a conventional planter, is eliminated on

Wilkes' model. His precision has a curved, runner-type furrow opener that forms a narrow "V" shaped furrow. It slices cleanly into the soil, leaving a neat seed trench about 1/2 inch and a half wide for the seeds to drop into.

Wilkes says the old-type sweep and chisel furrow opener usually leaves a ragged, wide, uncertain furrow, where some seed will be deeper than others. Also, seed is usually scattered from one side of the furrow to the other.

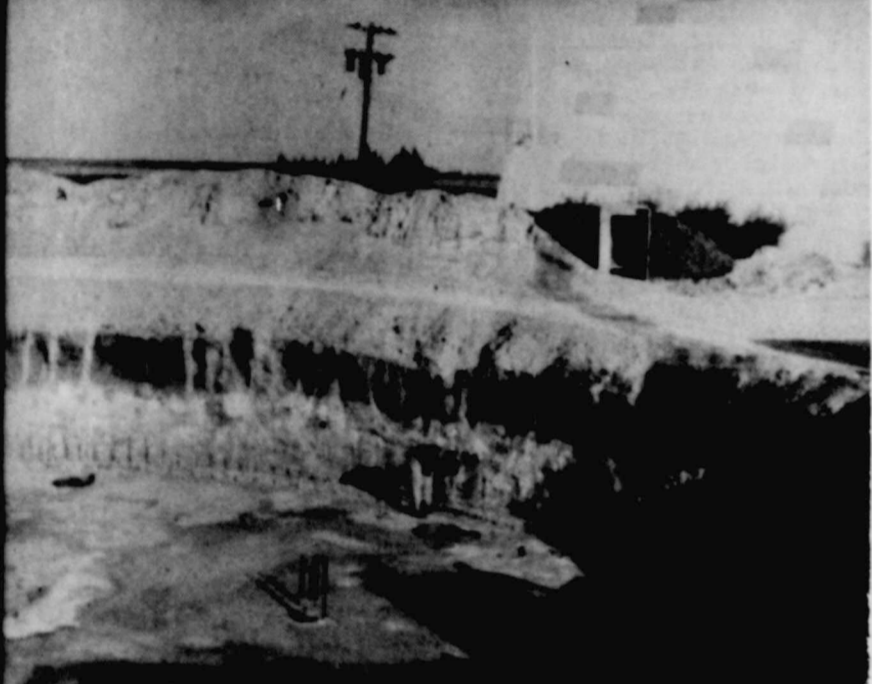
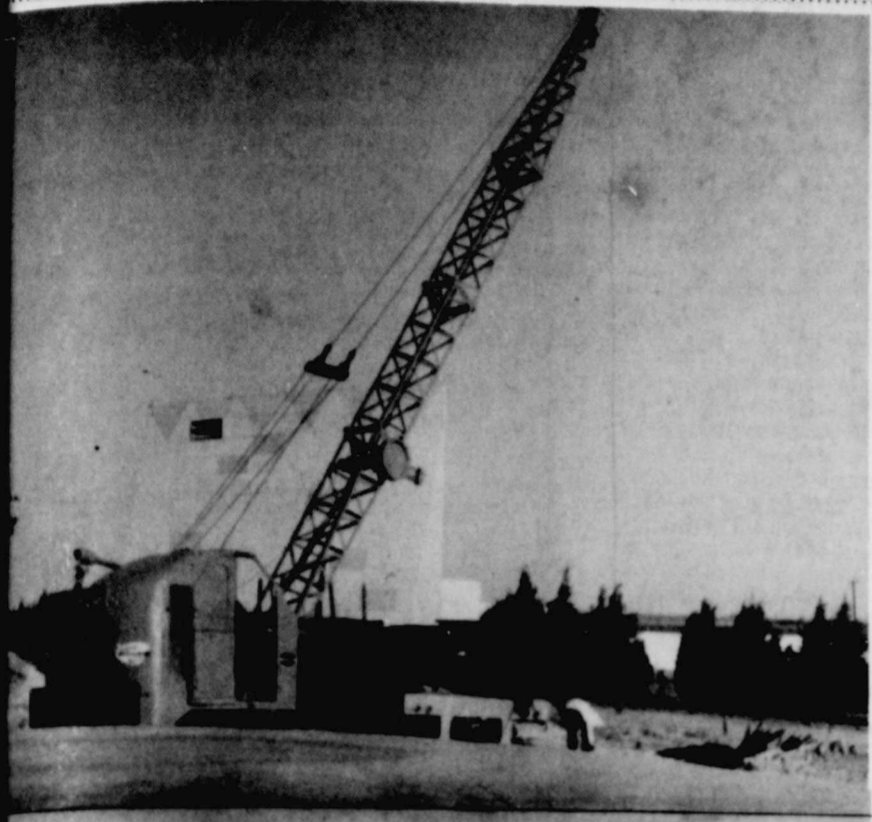
But not so with the precision planter. Each seed is dropped neatly into a seed trench at a uniform depth, in a straight line.

The shaped beds are from 1 to 3 degrees warmer at planting

time because the flat top absorbs more direct sun, he says. This, combined with precision spacing of the seed, promises faster germination and emergence. In A&M tests, a 70% stand was up on conventional beds.

As a result of the rapid germination, says Wilkes, in A&M tests 72 percent of the precision planted cotton was ready to harvest on September 9. But only 54 percent of that planted with regular methods was ready. And precision planted cotton yielded one-fourth bale per acre more.

Wilkes figures the earlier harvest and higher yield adds up to about \$40 an acre more income. Quite a talking point, most growers will agree.

PHILOSOPHER WONDERS

India Can Build Missiles, Then Why Not Tractors Too

Editor's note: The Floyd Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm touches on a point that we don't understand either.

Dear editor:

The trouble with picking up two newspapers instead of one is that it frequently leads to confusion.

For example, in one paper I found out here yesterday I read an account of Mrs. Indira Gandhi's visit to the United States in her job as Prime Minister of India to discuss world affairs and possibly step up the amount of grain the U.S. is sending over there.

In a speech she made at the White House she said India is staying neutral in the nuclear arms race, that while her country has the brains, the techniques, and the capacity to make nuclear bombs if it sets its mind to it, it has decided not to.

In another paper I found, apparently blown against the same fence by the same wind, an article explained how the United

States is sending agricultural experts to India to try to teach that country's 60 million farmers how to produce more.

This is what's confusing about getting too many facts at one time.

If India has the capacity to produce something as complex and expensive as a guided missile if it wants to, it seems to me it'd use some of that capacity to produce a little more grain. Launching a tractor isn't any harder than launching a rocket, and you can do the former on a cloudy day. Looks like India would drop its program of providing guided walking plows for its farmers and get into the tractor age. I believe any man who could build a guided missile could operate a tractor, even if it's as complicated and headstrong as the 17-year-old one I use on this Johnson grass farm.

As I understand it, the American farmer is now growing enough for himself and 33 other people. If the 60 million farmers in India did as well, they'd produce enough for nearly 2 billion people, which is five times that country's population.

About a dozen attended the meeting.

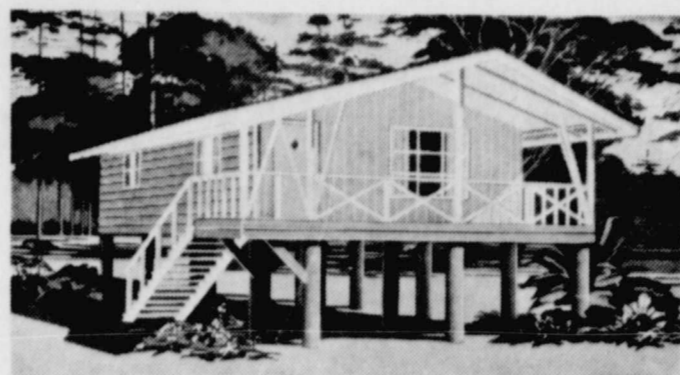
Rites Held For Mrs. Tom Weeks
