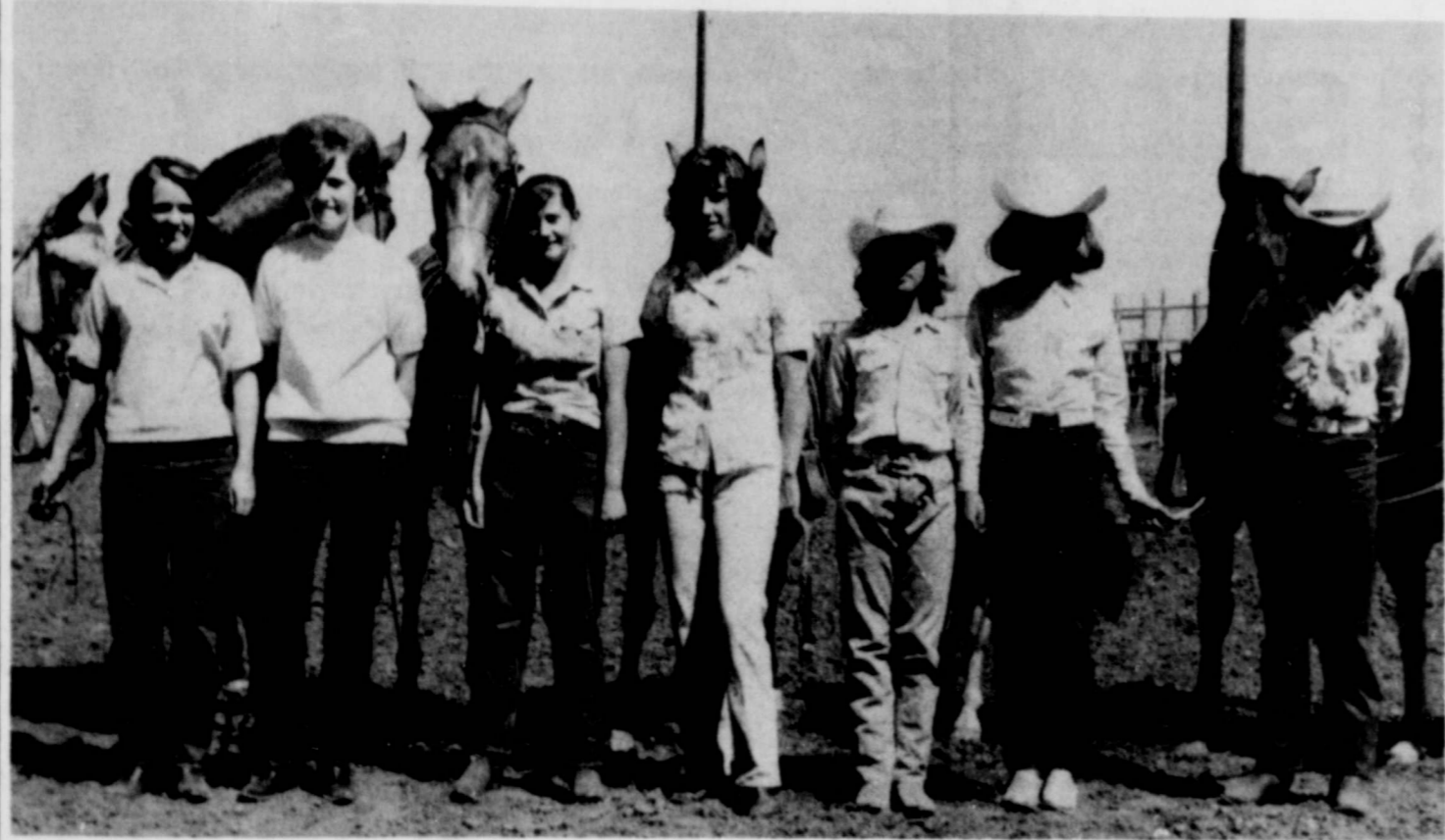

IN CONVENTION

County Democrats Support National Administration

Twenty-two Democrats of Floyd County attended the county convention at the courthouse here Saturday and approved a resolution of support for the National Democratic Administration and its program.

The resolution reads as follows: "BE IT RESOLVED that the delegates of this, the Floyd County Democratic Convention, to the State Democratic Convention of Texas, be instructed to support a resolution or resolutions to support and endorse without qualification the National Democratic Administration and its programs, as led and advocated by our President Lyndon B. Johnson and our Senator U. S. Senator Ralph W. Yarborough.

This 14th day of May, 1966." Ben Ayres was elected chairman of the convention, Bill Hardin elected secretary.

Nine delegates were elected to attend the state Democratic Convention in Austin on September 20: Mr. and Mrs. Hubert Frizzell, Wayne Collins Junior Simpson, W. L. Davis and Randy Hollums. The resolution was read by Alton Higginbotham.

GOP Selects State Delegates, Drafts One Resolution

At the Floyd County Republican Convention, the county delegates selected two to attend the state convention in San Antonio September 20 and two alternates. The group also named the precinct chairmen and drafted a resolution. David Battey was selected chairman of the convention and Peggy Medley was named secretary. Robert Lee Smith and John Farris were named delegates to the state confab and Bud Turner and Mrs. Robert Lee (Lucille) Smith were named alternates.

Well Depth Over 5,200 Feet On Battey Property

The well depth of the Wildcat staked on the Fred Battey property about eight miles south of Floydada reached over 5,200 feet this week. The workers at the site said several samples would be taken at that depth to determine possibility of oil bearing formations at a greater depth. If they are favorable the drilling will continue. Monday the rig had reached a depth of 4,725 feet and was progressing at about 2-300 feet per day.

The land owners in the Texas Addition have presented a signed petition to the Floydada City Council asking that the property be annexed to the city. The land is located just west of Texas Avenue and extends from Crockett Street on the south to Price Street on the north. The public hearing set by the council to hear any objections to the annexation of the property by any Floydada citizen will be held at 10 a.m. Tuesday, May 31. If there are none, or none substantiating further study, a special meeting at 10:30 that morning will involve the annexation of the property.

Retail Group Plans Sales Promotions For May and June

In a special called meeting last week of the retail merchants committee of the Floydada Chamber of Commerce it was decided to run special buys May 28th, during the Old Settlers Reunion. The group also decided to promote "Harvest of Values" on three days, June 24-25-27. It was also agreed that all merchants and their employees should dress in Western or old settler's attire May 28. An official holiday for the city of Floydada also comes up this month and Floydada businesses will be closed Monday, May 30, Memorial Day.

The petition presented the city officials bears the signature of all the landowners west of Texas Avenue. About 12 lots had been sold during the past several months and those signatures had to be on the petition as well. Two houses have already been constructed on lots purchased by individuals in the Texas Addition. The annexation involves 13 blocks and about 104 residential lots. Utility poles and lines are being put up in the area at this time, and after the annexation is complete the water and sewer lines will be installed by the city and the streets in the area will be paved. The property involved is technically described as follows: 69 7/10 acres of land situated in Floyd County, Texas, being a part of the East one-

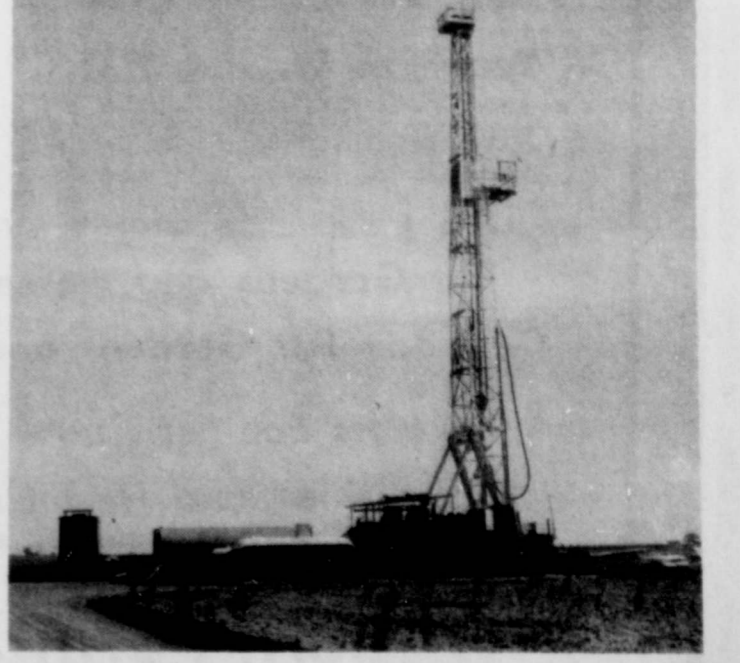

Floyd Grain Sorghum Production Up 19 Per Cent Over 1964 Crop

Floyd County's grain sorghum production for 1965 was 9,493,000 bushels according to final figures released by Grain Sorghum Producers Association. This was a gain of 1,853,000 bushels, or a 19% increase over the 1964 crop which was 7,600,000 bushels. This ranked it 8 in grain sorghum production among all counties in Texas according to Y. F. Snodgrass, South Plains Reg. CSPA. Farmer County again led the state and nation in grain sorghum production with 18,683,500 bushels this past year. The unit to be in Floydada from 9 A.M. to 5 P.M. and will be located at South of courthouse. Everyone is urged to take advantage of this opportunity to have his chest x-rayed. This is just another service to the community sponsored by the schools and the club. The chest x-ray detects many of the abnormalities of the chest besides tuberculosis, such as cardiovascular, and other respiratory diseases. It is hoped that a large number of our citizens will avail themselves of this opportunity which is given to you in the interest of the general health of the people in this area. Cost to each person is 50¢.

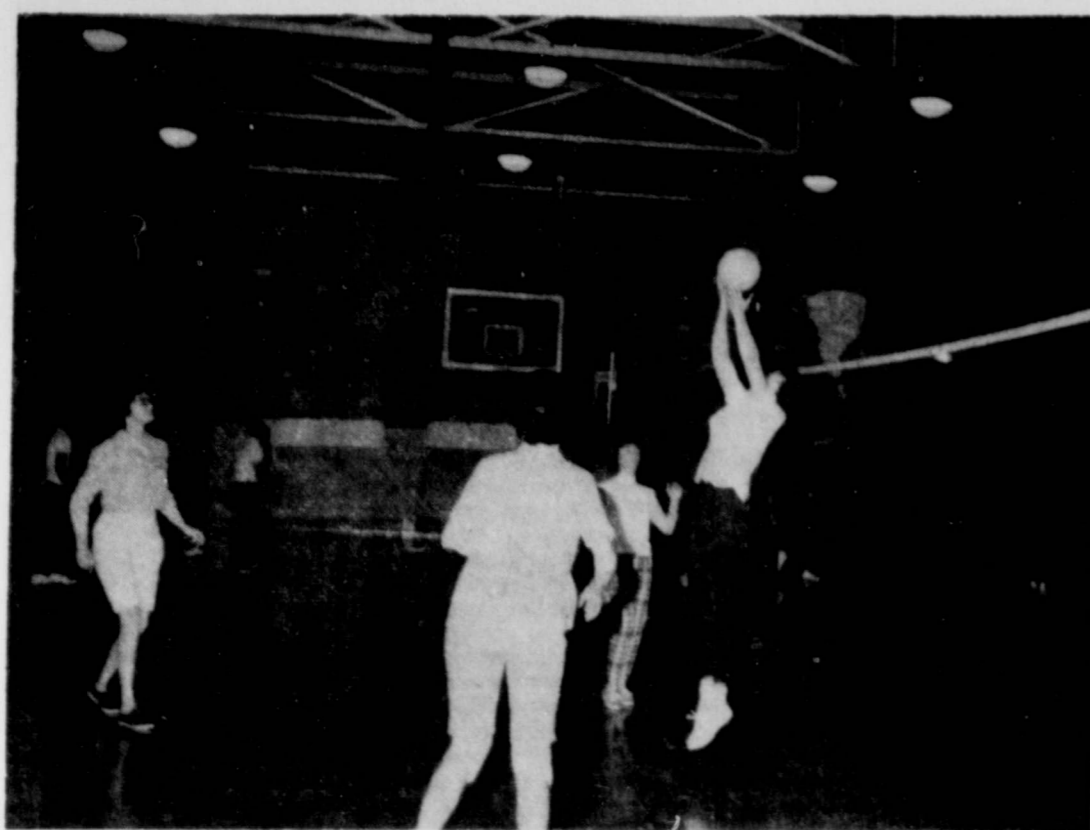

## Favors Car Defects, Rather Than Humans In Spotlight

Editor's note: The Floyd Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm has found out about the car safety controversy, his letter this week indicates.

Dear editor: In nearly every newspaper I've gotten my hands on in the past two weeks there has been at least one article on the big controversy over whether cars are safe, and while I'd prefer to have the argument going on over whether tractors are safe, if you know what I mean, still I have followed the hearings closely.

According to a report at one session of the Senate Investigating Committee, 8 million cars in the last few years have been found to have defects, out of the 40 or 50 million produced. Of course that included everything, such as a horn that stuck and a windshield wiper that went too slow. Understand, I'm not in favor of cars' having defects, I'm not even in favor of having one with a tail pipe that'll rust out or oil that needs changing and I think a fender ought to snap back into place when you graze

it on a fence post, but you can carry statistics too far. For example, I would not be interested in seeing a Senate Investigating Committee come up with the figures on how many human beings have defects.

Out of the 200 million people produced in this country in the last decade, how many of us you reckon would really pass a safety inspection? If checking up on that many people is too big a job for the Senate and it decided to narrow the field and get closer to home, how many Senators you reckon would show up without a defect?

I don't have the figures, but it would be interesting to see which are multiplying faster, garages or hospitals. At any given moment, are there more cars in garages than people in hospitals? I'm not saying I'm typical, but out of the next 365 days, there will be more days when my car and my tractor are in better shape to start than I

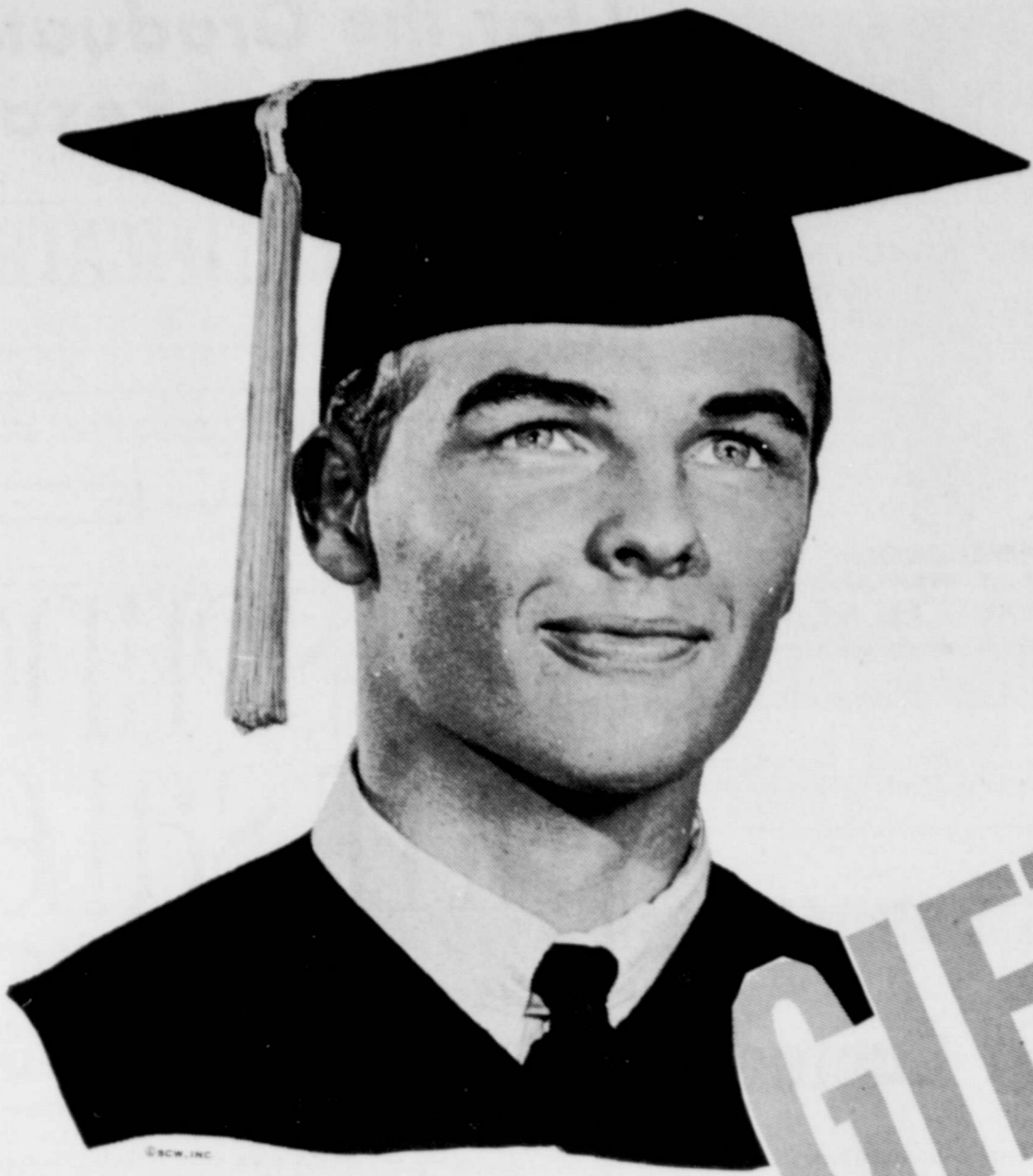

**Supreme Court Upholds Ruling**

Herald Austin Bureau  
 The Texas Supreme Court Wednesday upheld a 110th District Court decision issued in Floyd County, and T. C. Hollums of Floyd County will collect \$875 from R. D. Sharkey of Hale County.  
 Hollums collected on the conversion of personal property and improvements on 180 acres of land in Floyd County which were deeded by Sharkey to G. W. Robertson without Hollums' knowledge.  
 Hollums allegedly was given prior guarantee any improvements made on the land would be his own, and that the owner of the land would have no title to the improvements.  
 An irrigation farmer, Hollums was a tenant on the land since 1945, and Sharkey was a purchaser and seller of the tract.  
 The trial court ruled Hollums owed Sharkey \$3,250 in farm rent that Sharkey owed Hollums \$3,250 for the agreed price of personal property and improvements and Hollums should get \$875 for the conversion of the personal property to Robertson.  
 Improvements included better irrigation facilities, a three-room house for laborers at the farm, installation of a hot-water system and other fixtures.
